Cook County Livestock Show

Livestock sale produces record prices

The Eighth Annual Livestock Show and Sale in Cook County produced a record in total money and average price.

These figures helped make the two-day affair the best yet and left promoters of the event with all smiles.

There were 21 steers sold at the sale Tuesday night which brought \$14,649.35 for an average of \$70.63 per hundred pounds.

A total of 14 barrows brought \$2,369.44 on the sale for an average of \$80.97 per hundred.

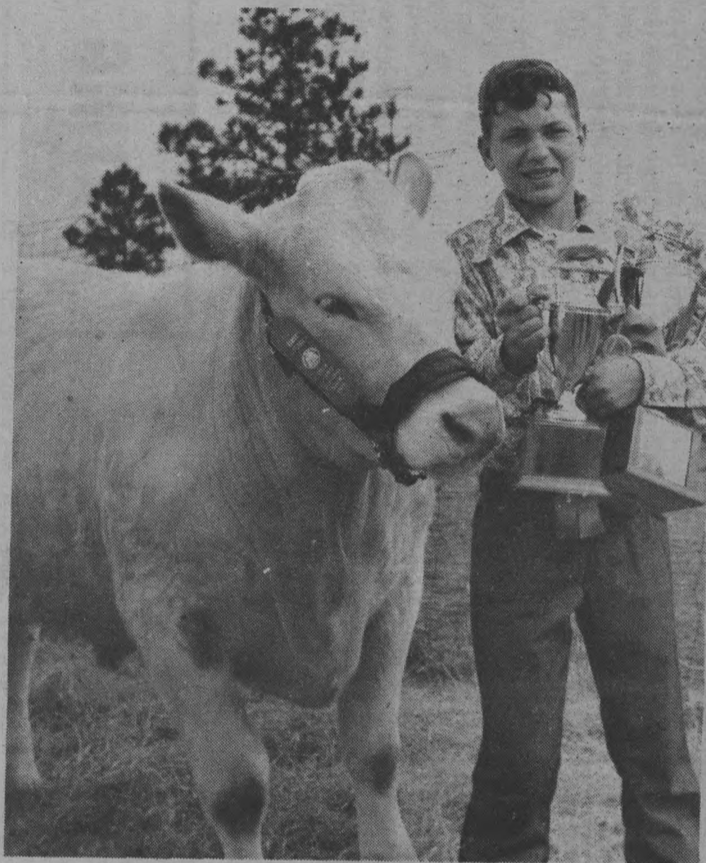
The total sales were \$16,228.42, compared to last year's total sales of \$10,035.83.

Tony Marshall, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Thad Marshall of Adel, showed the Grand Champion Steer. His 1,200-pound Charolais Cross was also judged the Best Home Raised steer and was the top in the heavyweight class. The steer was purchased by Del-Cook Lumber Company for \$1.03 per hundred pounds.

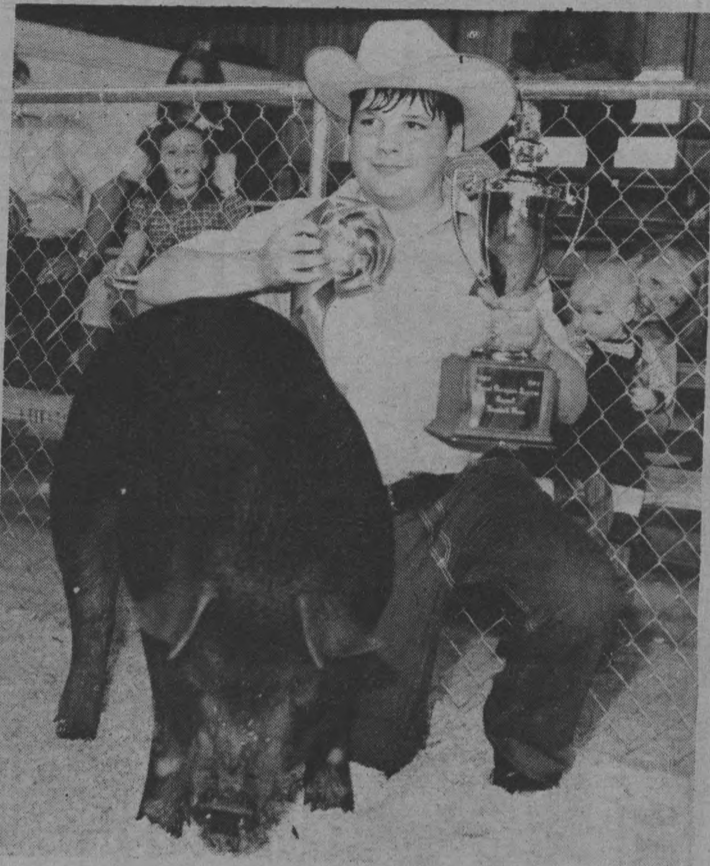
This was the third year in a row that a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thad Marshall had shown the Grand Champion. Timmy Marshall showed the champion in 1971 and brother Tommy had the champ last year.

The Reserve Champion Steer was shown by Teresa Howell. Her 1,089-pound Charolais Cross steer was purchased by Tri-County Gas Co. for \$80 per hundred. Also, this is the third consecutive year that the 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Howell of Adel has received the Showmanship trophy.

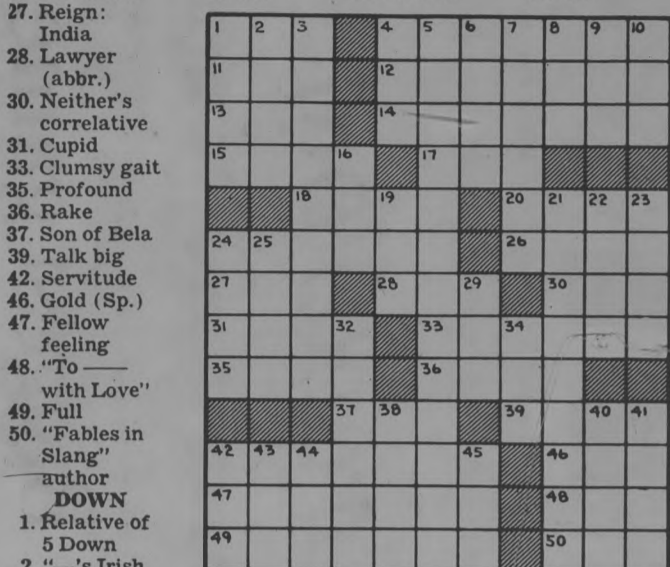
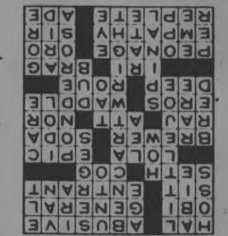

REPORTS FROM THE UNITED STATES SENATE

IT OUGHT TO BE clear to everyone by now—even the most liberal of the free-spenders—that the United States is in a critical fiscal situation. It is too bad that it had to come to this before people recognized the fact that a nation can no more spend itself rich than can a family or an individual. Personal sacrifice, political courage, and a general tightening of the belt all around will be required in our efforts to strengthen the dollar and stabilize the American economy. It is going to take the very best of all of us to stop inflation and restore respect for the dollar abroad, to make American goods more competitive on the world market and correct the trade balance. Now, more than ever, we need to insure that the taxpayers will get top value for every cent of their money spent by the federal government, domestic and foreign. We cannot wait for Uni'ed States' fiscal and monetary problems to solve themselves. We will wait ourselves right into the poor house and bankruptcy. The dollar has been on the decline for years, and the economic situation is deteriorating every day.

WE ARE BEING out-worked, out-produced, and out-negotiated. Hence, a trade deficit of \$6.4 billion last year. We are continuing to funnel money abroad in military and economic foreign aid. Hence, multi-billion dollar balance of payments deficits year after year, going \$10 billion in the red in 1972 alone. We have had seriously unbalanced budgets in all but seven of the past 43 years. Hence, inflation that robs the working man of his earnings and weakens confidence in the dollar, which already has been devaluated twice in the past 14 months.

One does not have to be a Philadelphia lawyer or Wall Street economist to realize the seriousness of the present economic situation. Excessive federal spending and wasteful foreign aid has bled our country's resources, and we have piled up a national debt of \$485 billion, more than the indebtedness of all the rest of the world combined.

We have got to stop trying to do so much for the whole world and, whether we like it or not, we are also going to have to slow down domestic spending, at least for the time being. I realize that everyone has their own special interests and pet programs, but it will be difficult if not impossible to balance the budget and stabilize the economy with people demanding fiscal restraint on the one hand, and seeking more federal assistance with the other.

CONSUMERS' CORNER

Mail Fraud and Diet Schemes

As part of its continuing program to investigate possible cases of mail fraud, the Postal Service is looking into consumer complaints against several companies that sell slimming devices and other weight control products through the mail. It has investigated such products as slimming belts and inflatable shorts that - according to claims in nationally run magazines and newspaper ads - can help you lose several inches in your waist or thighs in "just hours" without dieting.

According to studies made for the Postal Service and other data, most of the slimming devices cause only temporary weight reduction through a form of dehydration - belts and shorts cause you to sweat. Whenever you drink water or a beverage, you gain back water that was lost in perspiration and you regain the inches you lost with the device. Most of the devices are also accompanied by instructions for exercises to do while wearing the devices. As Postal Service officials see it, if this process involves any weight loss, it is probably the result of perspiration during the exercises, not the device.

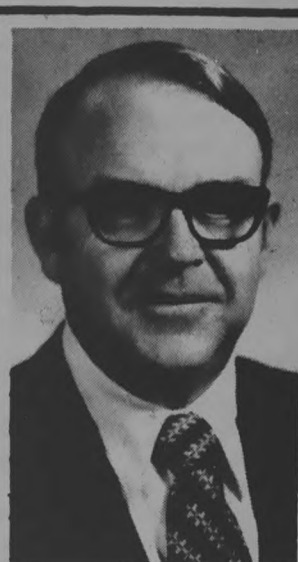

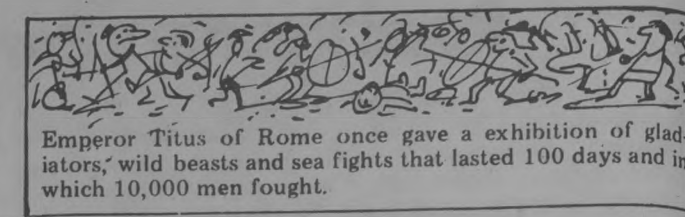

Thought For Food

Inside Chuck Pot-Roast, also called Chuck Eye Pot-Roast, is the meaty inside chuck muscle (eye) of the blade portion of the chuck, which lies directly next to the rib section. A boneless cut, it is made by removing the blade bones, featherbones, back bone and rib bones which surround it. Fat cover, it any, is thin. It often is tied into a roll. Since the chuck is less tender than the beef loin or rib, this cut is most often prepared as a pot-roast. It is braised slowly in a small amount of liquid, covered, on top of the range or in the oven until tender, 3 to 4 hours. A variety of seasonings and braising liquids can be used. If the beef is of high quality, this cut can be prepared as a roast - cooked in an open roasting pan without the addition of liquid in a slow oven (325°F).

In recent years the annual U.S. consumption of canned meat averaged about 14.5 pounds per person - a record level. During the past 20 years canned meat consumption has increased more than 5 pounds per person.

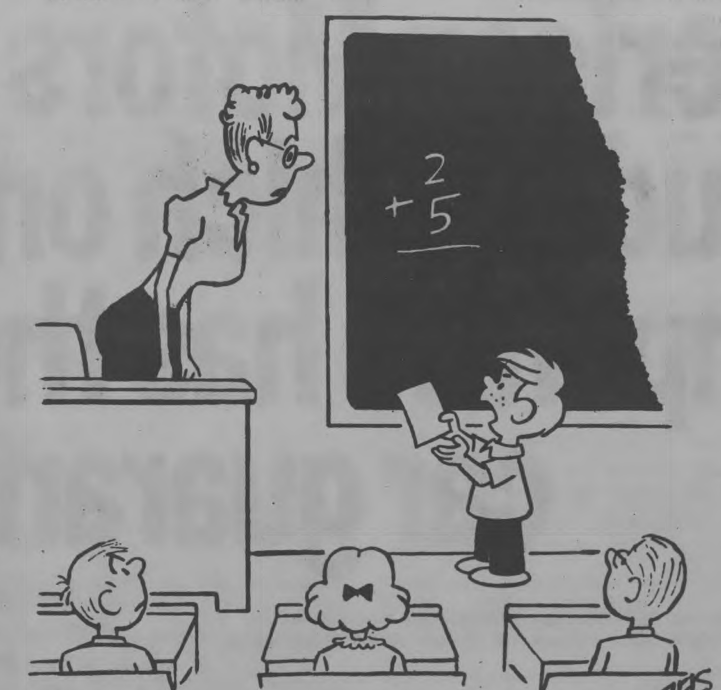

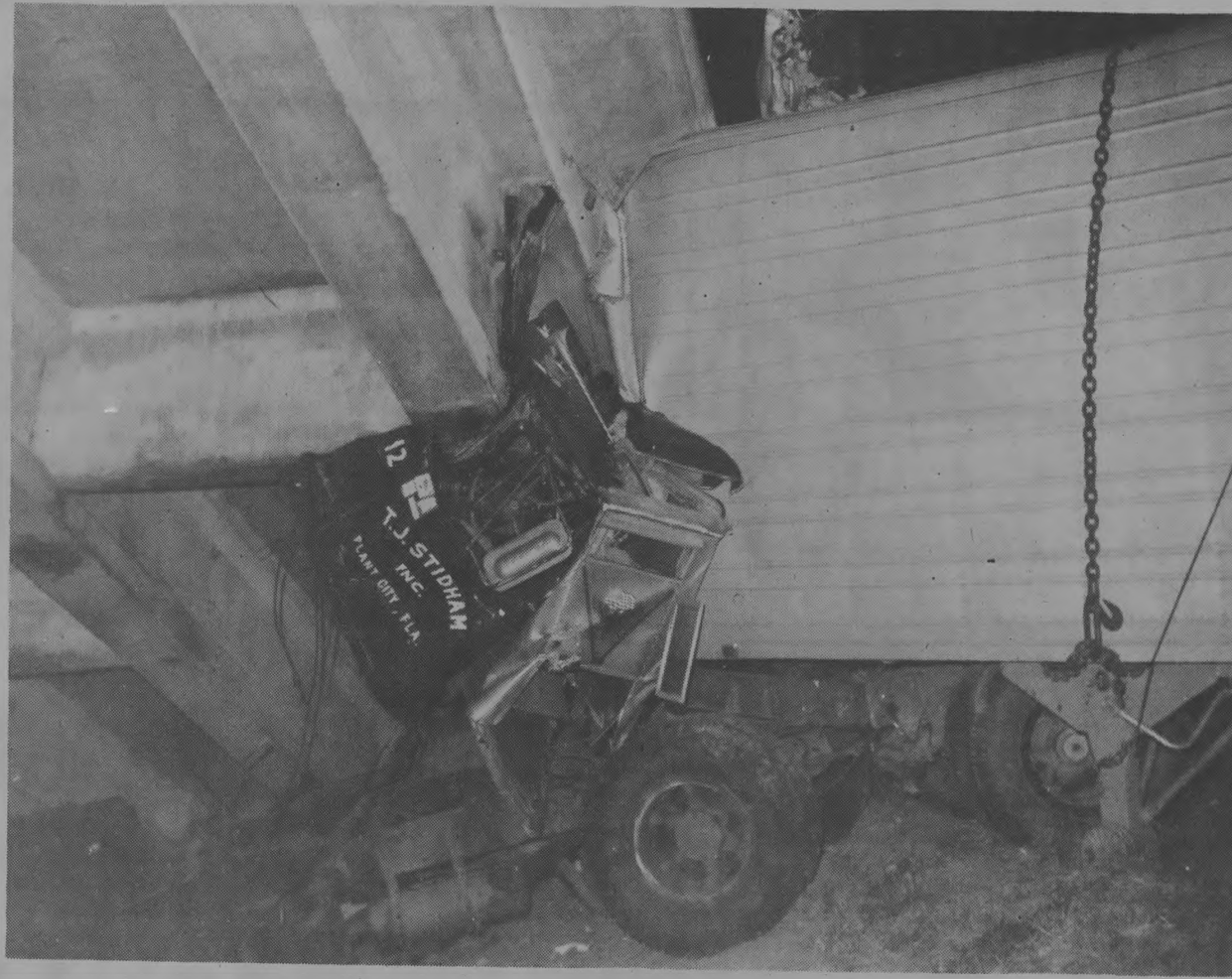

1-75 crash takes life of truck driver

A Florida truck driver was killed instantly early Saturday morning when his tractor-trailer rig crashed into a bridge abutment on Interstate 75 in Lenox.

State Trooper J. W. Cooper of Tifton said that Phillip Donald Sardin, 31, of Box 1192, Plant City, Fla., was the driver of the tractor-trailer rig which hit the bridge on the Kinard Bridge overpass at approximately 2:15

a.m. Cooper reported that Sardin apparently fell asleep at the wheel and estimated his speed on impact of 60 mph.

Trooper Cooper said that Sardin was headed north when he ran off the right side of the road, knocking down an exit sign. The truck traveled approximately 680 feet after leaving the pavement before striking the overpass. The driver was pinned in the crushed cab between the bridge and the trailer.

Wrecker personnel from Adel, Sparks, Lenox and Tifton and Cook Co. ambulance per-

sonnel worked until about 5:15 a.m. before freeing the body of the driver. He was taken to the Memorial Hospital in Adel where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

The 1968 Mack tractor was owned by T. J. Stidham, Inc., of

Plant City and the trailer was owned by Great Dane. Damage to the tractor was estimated at \$10,000, while damage to the trailer was estimated at \$5,000. The exit sign value was placed at \$150. No other vehicle was involved in the accident.

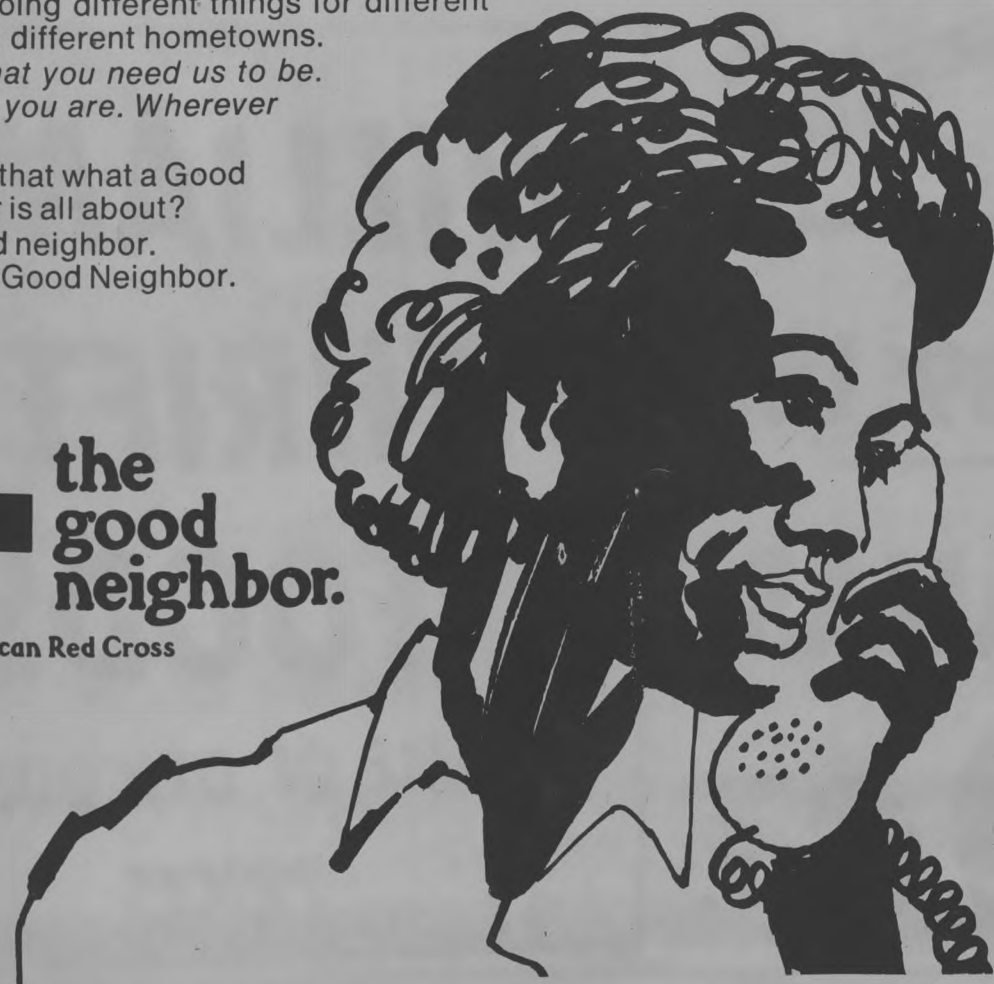

Veterans Corner

(Editor's Note: Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office):

Q -- If I purchase a mobile home with a VA guaranteed loan, just what does this guarantee?

A -- VA guarantees up to 30 per cent of loans -- up to a maximum of \$10,000 for mobile homes and up to \$17,500 if the loan covers a lot as well as the mobile home. The guarantee usually permits eligible veterans and widows to arrange "no down payment" loans with private lending institutions.

Q -- To settle a disagreement in my family, can you tell me if many veterans participate in job and farm training programs under the G. I. Bill?

A -- In Fiscal Year 1972 (ending June 30) there were nearly 170,000 veterans in on-job training programs, which is 20,000 more than in FY 1971 and nine times the total in FY 1968.

Q -- What is the income limit governing entitlement to nonservice-connected disability and death pensions for veterans?

A -- The income limit to such pensions for a veteran or widow with no dependents is \$2,600 and \$3,800 for a veteran or widow with dependents.

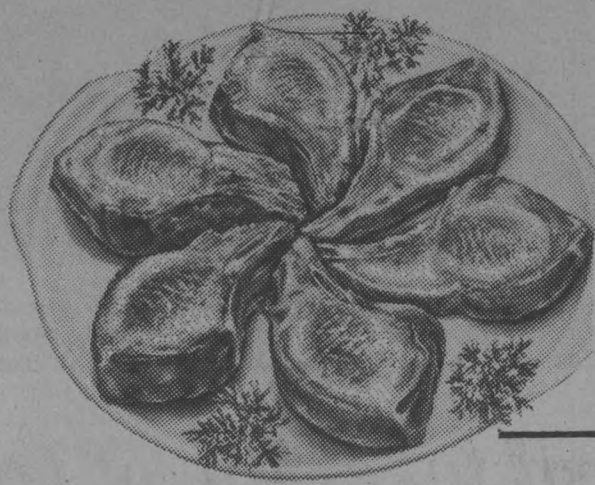

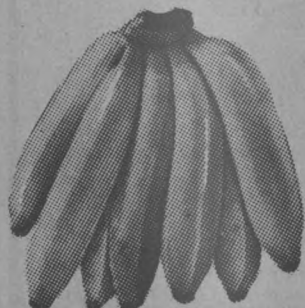
