A mother must not just be a cook, proficient at cooking roasts, biscuits, chicken gravy, Mike's favorite sukiyaki and Greg's favorite spaghetti; but also must be able to decorate birthday cakes and place exactly right the raisin eyes in gingerbread men.

She must be a judge and arbitrator when someone would not let someone ride his tricycle; must be a stern disciplinarian when it comes to too much chewing gum and getting three little boys to bed at night; and she must have a well-padded shoulder for tears and comfort when his best chum throws sand at Mike and goes off with a new friend.

She must not only be an expert laundress, but always remember to remove sand and pebbles and string from pockets; and she must be a seamstress and adept at sewing on buttons, letting down and taking up sleeves and pants legs and able to patch threadbare corduroy knees so the patches do not show.

She must be a doctor and able to remove splinters without hurting, stop bleeding noses, vaporize colds, read stories to measles-speckled boys, and always have on hand an endless supply of ready-cut bandages.

A mother must also be a naturalist and able to dissect caterpillars, remove taillights from fireflies, and touch squirmy worms.

Then a mother kisses three blond heads, turns off the light and hugs a smile to her heart as she walks downstairs. And after the dishes are done, before she gets out her mending box, she puts a batch of cookies in the oven for a surprise tomorrow.

Hahira Man dies in pond

A 59-year old Hahira man apparently drowned Friday night, May 4, when the boat from which he was fishing capsized in a pond near here.

The sheriff's office identified the victim as Freeman Mims of Rt. 1, Hahira an insurance salesman.

Detective Jimmy Norton said Mims left his residence about 4 p.m. Friday to fish in a pond off Union Road and west of Interstate 75.

He did not return home and about 11 p.m. a sister, Geneva Gorley, turned in a missing person report to the Hahira police department.

Officers have notified the sheriff's detective bureau and Norton went to the police department where he talked to Mrs. Gorley.

Norton said when officers arrived at the pond, they saw the capsized boat and found Mims' body about 200 feet from

it. Investigators theorize Mims was unable to swim to shore after the boat turned over because of a lung condition which made him short of breath.

Coroner Harold Moore pronounced Mims dead at the scene and the body was released to Martin Funeral Home of Hahira.

City laying law to load autos

Mayor-Council here has made a move to restore peace and quiet to the city's streets by passing an ordinance prohibiting the operation of any motor vehicle with loud exhausts.

Mayor Gene Webb said the City Council took action at Wednesday night's meeting. "We're clamping down on loud exhausts on all motor vehicles," Webb said. "That includes motorcycles, cars and trucks."

Under the ordinance, the violator is to be warned and given a certain amount of time to repair his exhaust system, he said.

If the motorist fail to conform in the specified time period, a fine is to be levied. Webb said the time given to fix the loud exhausts would vary according to the extent of repairs needed.

The amount of the fine also is to vary, depending to a great

extent on the attitude of the violator, he added.

"We have been having some problems in this area," the mayor said, "and we think this action will eliminate these problems."

In other action, Mayor-Council:

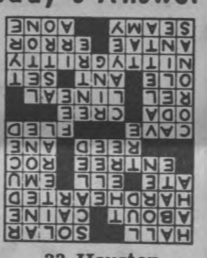

about your Social Security

If you're a widow and you get social security checks, you've probably heard that the new Social Security Law would affect the amount of your checks, beginning with the January check that was due on February 3, 1973.

When social security benefits were first provided for widows by the Social Security Amendments of 1939, they were set at 5 percent of the worker's retirement benefit. This amount was based on the idea that a widow should receive one-half of the combined benefit which would have been paid to her and her husband had both been entitled to benefits. Later, this amount was increased by 10 percent, to 82.5 percent, where it has remained up to the present time.

The new rule considers the widow's age at the time she begins receiving checks. If she is 65 or older at the time she is first paid a widow's benefit, her payment will be exactly the same amount that would be payable to her deceased husband if he were alive and retired. If she accepted widow's payments before her 65th birthday, the amount she gets is determined by her age at the time checks started. If she was 60 or younger, there will be no increase to her under the new law. If she was between 62 and 64 at the time she first collected as a widow, the amount that would be payable to her retired

husband (if he were alive) is reduced by 19 - 40 of 1 per cent for each month she gets a check before her 65th birthday.

So not all widows received an increase due to the new Social Security law. If you were entitled to an increase, it was figured and paid automatically on February 3, 1973. If you payment was increased, you were one of nearly four million widows and widowers who will be sharing in about \$1.1 billion of additional benefits each year.

A rule affecting widowers also is included in the new Social Security law. Now, dependent widowers can qualify for payments at age 60 rather than having to wait until age 62.

Your local Social Security office will be glad to answer your questions about social security for widows and widowers.

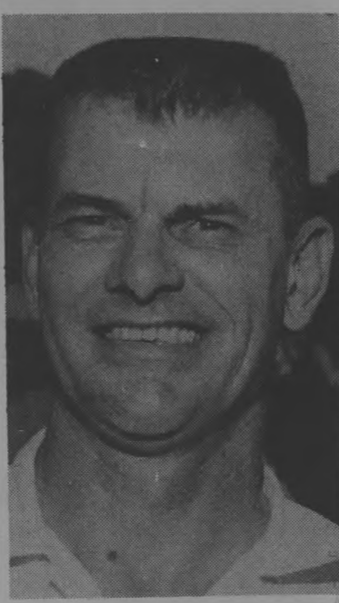

HORTICULTURAL TIMELY TIPS FOR MAY FOR MAY

Cultivating Around Shrubs

There is no advantage of cultivating the soil around shrubs. Digging around established ornamentals, such as azaleas, camellias and hollies can severely injure the root system since some of the roots are located within a few inches of the soil surface. Some gardeners "work in" fertilizers, however, this practice is not necessary since most fertilizers are water soluble. In other situations the soil around shrubs is distributed in an attempt to eradicate bermuda or other noxious grasses. A more satisfactory approach to controlling bermuda around shrubs is to place a sheet of polyethylene plastic on the ground underneath the plant. Cut the plastic into a round shape then make a cut to the center so that the plastic fits up to the trunk of the shrub. Next, cover the plastic with an attractive mulch, such as pine straw. The pine straw and plastic can be left around the shrub year-round.

Gardeners Choice Marigolds

Gardeners have an ever-increasing list of annuals to bring brightness to their gardens, patios, terraces and window boxes. Marigolds are ever increasing in variety, sizes and color. New during 1973 are varieties such as Tiger which has brilliant deep golden ball-shaped flowers covering mound shaped plants, ten inches in height. Others are Aquarius and Happy Face which produce three and one-half inch blooms on plants twenty-four inches in height. This one has stems long enough for cutting. In color range and height, marigolds can provide some very interesting contrast. Depending on variety, they may grow six inches to three feet in height and may range in color from golden, orange, lemon yellow, white or mahogany. Varieties are available which have carnation, single, double, or mum-like flowers. Some varieties have odorless foliage.

Regardless of your preference of color, height, or flower type there are some cultural conditions which are necessary for success with marigolds. They prefer a location which receives full sun, but will grow in light shade. Also, their ability to grow and flower in wet or dry soil makes them most adaptable. They can be grown from seed or from transplants. A monthly fertilization using your regular garden fertilizer and watered in thoroughly will give quick growth and flowers. Most

varieties will flower in eight to ten weeks from the seeding date.

Petunias for Summer Color

Among the many annuals grown in beds, baskets, pots or planters, petunias certainly rank quite high. Their popularity stems from the many beautiful intense colors from deep blue or purple to red to salmon pink to tangerine to coral salmon to clear pink and yes, even to a light yellow. Flower types vary from single to ruffled to doubles. Growth forms vary from the standard to cascade. Just listen to these names: Apollo, Snow Magic, Ambassador, Apple Blossom, Pink Magic, Sunburst, Valentine, Cherry Tart, and many others. They are excellent for bedding and the cascade varieties make excellent hanging basket plants in sunny locations.

Gardeners may start petunias from seed or may purchase transplants in pots, packs or trays. Sound gardening practices in seeding or transplanting will give you good results. Here are a few cultural requirements for you if you have never grown petunias before. Select a sunny spot that has a well-drained fertile soil. You may need to lighten your soil by thoroughly spading or plowing and adding organic matter such as ground pine bark, compost, leaf mold, peat moss, or well-rotted sawdust. As with most garden plants, petunias will be more successful if the ground or soil is thoroughly prepared for seeding or transplanting. Remember, dwarf varieties need to be spaced six inches apart. Give your petunias plenty of soil moisture and nutrients and watch them produce a burst of color during early summer.

Former Coach HJHS ass't head

Ralph Council, former assistant football coach at Lowndes High, last night was appointed assistant principal at Hahira Junior High School by the Lowndes school board. While the vote was unanimous, board members, at the suggestion of Supt. A. B. "Sonny" Martin, went into executive session to discuss the appointment. Council has recently been employed outside the school system. He replaces William Sears, who was named principal of the school when W. S. Shehan retired. Several employees were hired by the board. The hiring of Council was put before the board, along with the other names, by Martin in the form of a recommendation. There was a short silence and then Dr. Richard Winston

leaned across the table and asked Martin: "Sonny, are you sure that's your recommendation?" After Martin repeated his position the board went into executive session. In other action the board agreed to let a motel owner place a large billboard sign on school property to prevent him from putting it on a piece of land he owns just a few yards from Lowndes High. Martin and some board members have been negotiating with Jimmy Rogers, Valdosta developer, in an effort to keep the sign from going up near the school. A polite but fire Rogers appeared at the board meeting Monday night, accompanied by his lawyer and told the board he wanted to put his sign up "now."

After spending a lengthy period of time looking at an aerial map of the grounds, another tack was taken. Rogers, his lawyer, Martin and the entire board trooped out into the darkness and walked around school grounds to find a spot for the sign. After more talk, it was agreed that lawyers for both sides would prepare a document to be signed giving Rogers the right to erect the sign on school board property. But the battle of the signs was not over. Comes now Dr. Russell Acree, late for the meeting and eager to know what happened on the sign question. Martin outlined what he thought the two sides had agreed upon but that raised more questions from some board members. In other action the school board: -- Learned that Lowndes High is second on the list nationally to get an Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps program and Martin said it should be available by fall. -- Mapped plans to try and secure more than \$200,000 in operational funds for the Individually Prescribed Instruction program, to make up for lost federal funds. -- Agreed to join the Georgia School Boards Association after holding out for 30 days due to what board members felt was an exorbitant increase in dues. -- Approved several changes in the system including going to a minimum of 300 quarter hours for graduation and also allowing a student to graduate after 11 quarters provided all required subjects have been completed. -- Decided to work on the budget at the next meeting which will be held at a different time to prevent overlapping Lowndes High graduation exercises. Delayed action on a steering committee suggestion to alter
