## Via Metabolism

It is odd how we never realize exactly what we have in the way of interesting experiments until we notice that someone else or some other school has taken up the torch, so to speak.

In the last issuie of The Coloninade, weekly publication of the Woman's College at Milledgeville, an article appeared on the metabolism tests being conducted by the health department in connection with a university program. The Colonnade stated that the object of the tests was to correlate the results in energy output with academic work of the students. The article continued with this statement: The test should prove extremely interesting since it is the first of the kind to be conducted in the university system."

Dr. Marian Farbar, head of the health department on this campus, began a similar experiment in October. She, however, is doing it as a personal problemgiving time, tabulation and use of equip ment, to 121 Freshmen at her own expense. The experiment will close December 16, according to Dr. Farbar. She hopes to correlate the metabolic percentage rate with the homoglobin percentage, food intoxication, acne occurrences, and I.Q. Her paper on Thyro-Pathoies will score the results and draw the conclusions for the test.

Dr. Farbar has been with our Health Department for three years, and is the only woman physician in the University System who heads a department of this kind. Her aid to the students is inval. sable, and her intense interest and continuous study of the "Causation of Discases" should prove equally invaluable eases" should prove
to medical science.
