


YOUR EDITOR WRITES

Ten yours ago, other GSWC had existed for twenty-one years without an official newspaper, the Campus Canopy was originated. Through the diligent work and offent of our president, Dr. Frank R. Reade, and with the aid of interested students and faculty members, the Canopy was organized. The main policy of the paper was, and still is, to reflect student opinion. Since that time every editor has atempted to uphold this policy, but the maintenance of this policy depends upon the interest and the help of the students.

Plans were made then, and by every editor since, to have a space for publishing student letters, but the paucity of these letters is appalling. Students have chosen, it seems, to discuss their ideas behind closed doors and in private bull sessions, rather than to present them to the student body. This is the wrong thing to do. 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


