Miss Esther A. Oldt, teacher of voice at Antioch College, was a guest on campus for four days last week. She arrived on Sunday, and besides her scheduled appearances, she spoke frequently to individual groups while she was here. On Monday at Assembly period Miss Oldt spoke to a special called assembly of students and faculty. At this time she spoke on "Techniques of Everyday Speech." She emphasized the fact that we judge others by their voices, and that we should strive to improve ours. She listed two things in the process of improving speech habits; first, learning to listen and notice how the voice affects others, and second, finding out how the voice habits came to be what they are. On Wednesday, again at Assembly period, Miss Oldt presented a program of music and speech for the student body and faculty. The first group on the program consisted of a group of Chinese Mother Goose Rhymes by Bainbridge Crist. The songs in this group were: "Lady Bug," "Mouse," "Of What Use Is a Girl?"
