



Mr. White Ordained in Impressive Services at Valdosta Church Sunday

On Sunday, April 29, Mr. Clifton H. White, L. S. will be ordained to the Deaconate at Christ Episcopal Church, Valdosta, by the Rev. Middleton S. Barnwell, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of Georgia.

Mr. White, who holds the A. B. and M. A. degrees from Emory University, has been a member of the Georgia State Woman's College since 1941 in the Departments of Art and Music.

Before coming to Valdosta, Mr. White has served as Loy Reader at the Cathedral of St. Philip in Atlanta, where he was a member of the Knights of St. Philip. Having begun his preparation for the ministry in 1936, he continued his academic training in post graduate studies at the University of Chicago, during the summer months in which he was not teaching at Emory. Moving to Valdosta to join G. S. W. C. faculty, he was licensed Loy Reader at Christ Church and has continued in that office since. Admitted as Postulant in 1943, he was enrolled a Concedote for Holy Orders on April 18, 1944, and completed his cononical examinations for the Deaconate in March of this year. Upon his

Ordination, he is expected to continue his duties at the college and at the church.

As this is the first such service to be held in the local church, it is expected that a number of visitors and out-of-town guests will be on hand for the occasion.

W.S.S.F. Campaign To Get Under Way This Week

A campaign for the World Student Service Fund at G.S.W.C., will begin April 30, and continue through May 4. Each student, faculty member, and each club will be canvassed. Beginning Monday at breakfast every student will be expected to bring a penny to every meal up to the end of the Campaign. Small boxes will be placed on each table with a list of odd rules. If you do not abide by these rules, you will be expected to drop a penny in the box. The chapel program Wednesday will be about the W. S.S.F., and on Friday night a stunt program will be put on. Each class will present a stunt, the class having the best one to receive a prize. The admission will be 25 cents.

What is the W. S. S. F.? The W.S.S.F. is an educational and fund raising organization which operates primarily in the colleges, universities, preparatory schools, and theological seminaries of the United States in order to raise money for world student relief. Its help goes to students and faculty who are victims of war in all parts of the world. It is an independent agency, no longer a part of the National War Fund.

Other colleges have been contributing from \$1.50 to \$6.00 per person. Students at G.S.W.C. will be asked to give at least \$1.00. It is up to us, the students, to meet the goal both here and for the United States.

Expected to join the committee are Dr. S. V. Sanford, Chancellor of the University System, Regent Edward R. Jerger, from the District Central Office at Thomasville, Mr. W. J. Sayward, and Logan Architects who have handled the architecture of the college since its beginning, fifteen General Assembly members from this section of Georgia, and representatives of the press.

The day's program will start at 11 o'clock in the morning, at which time the committee and other invited guests will be conducted on a tour of the campus by twenty of the college students. At 1:15 o'clock the visitors will have lunch in the college dining hall.

At two o'clock, the group will assemble in the conference room of the administration building, where they will compile their studies and proposals.

S. G. A. and Why We Live Under It

Last week our recently elected President of S. G. A. went to Winthrop College in Rockhill, South Carolina to a meeting of representatives from other colleges. These girls all stood for the same thing, a government, on their campus, devised, and run by the students themselves in cooperation with the Faculty of each institution. All were seeking the same answer, "What is Student Government." It is brought up not only once a year, but almost once a day.

In the constitution of our own Student Government Association, the purpose of such a government is defined as an association to develop not only a sense of honesty, but a sense of responsibility in each student which will result in self-confidence; base all campus activities on democratic principles so that a strong central government may be achieved through the integration of individual self-government; encourage and provide opportunities for the development of leadership among the students; and promote a practical government that will carry over into a Democratic life.

A sense of honesty, a sense of responsibility, a sense of leadership. It seems we have heard these terms before. They have been given us over and over again as prerequisites to life in general, if we are to meet the terms of the world. Then, we should consider them more fully.

A sense of honesty, may mean, perhaps, telling on your friend, and not breaking rules yourself, but this is not all it includes. In college life, you have an opportunity to judge people, actions, and motives. It is important that you judge them correctly, with an open, honest mind, seeking reasons instead of underlying, selfish motives, and finding the truth instead of accepting falsehoods.

It is there that the sense of responsibility comes. Without the truth, no person should judge actions or surface appearances of any other person. Speak of people, meaning organizations as well. Therefore, the responsibility of judging what is right and wrong lies on your shoulders, and can only be seen through the truth.

Leadership sense requires and is based upon combination of the other two, honesty and responsibility. But leadership has also as prerequisite ability to follow, to have faith in those at now lead you, and follow the right principles of the right people.

These are what make not only a good S.G.A. but a good citizen later. It is something to think out at the beginning of a new Student Government Year.

I.R.C. Collects Clothes for Needy War Victims

The I.R.C. is undertaking to collect clothing for the needy. This is in connection with the United National Clothing collection for 150,000,000 lbs. of clothes, shoes, and bedding which will be sponsored throughout the nation until April 30. Henry Kaiser, chairman of the drive, stated in the New York Times that it was Mr. Roosevelt's report to Congress on the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration that first made the nation conscious of the need for clothing overseas. He quoted a letter from the former president written on Jan. 27, as follows:

"My recent report on the UNRRA revealed that as many war victims have died from exposure and lack of adequate clothing as have died from starvation. This problem of securing clothing for war relief needs ranks high in urgency. I feel assured that this appeal will receive the traditionally generous response of the American people."

The lives of suffering men, women and children in war torn areas depend on the contribution to this drive. Every bit helps someone in need.
