Library Discussed at Sigma Alpha Chi

Miss Lillian Patterson, head librarian at VSC, disclosed some interesting facts about our Alma Mater at the January meeting of the Sigma Alpha Chi. Most students don't know that the college's first library was housed in Converse Hall, then the only building on the campus. It consisted of several hundred books from the personal library of the President, Richard Holmes Powell. The portrait which hung in the reading room was Dr. Powell. When West Hall was opened, the library was on the second floor in what is now the lounge and bookstore. As the number of volumes increased, the library ran over into the dome and the two rooms on each side of it.

The library was moved into the present building in August of 1940 and the building was dedicated in March of 1941 by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt. Last May the number of volumes was recorded as 31,371 which did not include the unbound magazines.

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FROM THE EDITOR'S NOTES

(EDITOR'S NOTE—The following editorial appeared in a previous issue of the Canopy Junior. Due to Circumstances beyond our control the article was unable to be read Thus we are running it again for the benefit of those people who are concerned with this situation.)

I would like to explain a controversy that has arisen on our lovely campus. This has to do with the affiliation of the fraternities. I would like to say that there is no national fraternity on the campus at VSC. Let me repeat that. There is no national fraternity at VSC. Therefore they are following the instructions of the Board of Regents that there be no national fraternities. Also let me say that only one of the local groups has tried to go national. They tried to establish a chapter of a national fraternity. Thus in compliance with the instructions of the Regents they were not allowed to go national.

Now the other fraternity has tried for something else. I have heard some people ask why did one frat get turned down and the other did not get turned down. Well to put it in a nutshell, they did not try for the same thing. The one that was successful in their actions is not a chapter of a national frat. They are what you call a colony. Colonization is a period in which the local chapter builds themselves up to the requirements of the national frat. There are some very strict requirements for a local group to go national. The VSC boys are only asking some one who knows something about frats to help them. It is like me having trouble with my math and going over to the high school and getting a teacher to help me. This period of colonization will last until the frat is able to be a national frat and, now get this, the Board of Regents approve of fraternities at VSC. It may be four or five years from now but when that time comes this VSC frat is going national with no trouble. And just why will they have no trouble? Because they will know something about it.

The national fraternity that is going to help this group is going to send representatives down to show them the ropes. A few days ago even the national vice-president came down. That just shows how interested they are. If any of you are interested

in knowing the requirements of this big frat ask any of the members. You will be surprised.

Incidentally let me say something about the way our boys went about it. First they asked the national Frat if it would be possible to colonize. The large group replied that their Grand Council had unanimously approved it. Also they said that it depended on the approval of the college administration. With due course it was approved by Dr. Thaxton. At that time, if you will recall, Dr. Brown of the University of Georgia Board of Regents, was at VSC. The local group also received his approval. Only and only after this permission was granted did the local public publically announce that it had affiliated with a national frat. I am very hopeful that this elongated statement will clear up any doubt concerning this situation. If not please contact any member of this group.—The Editor.

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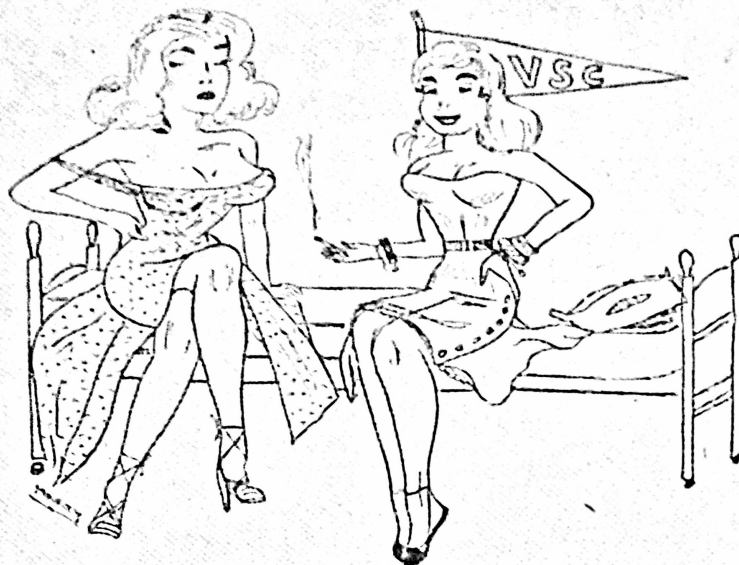

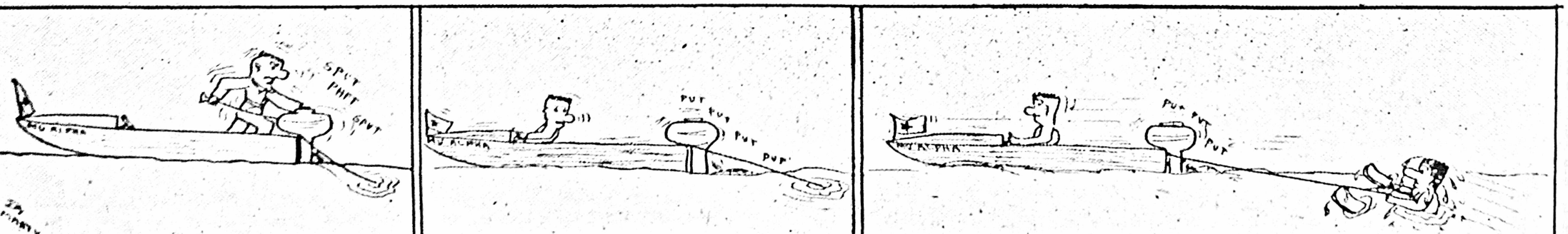

Man Personality of the Month

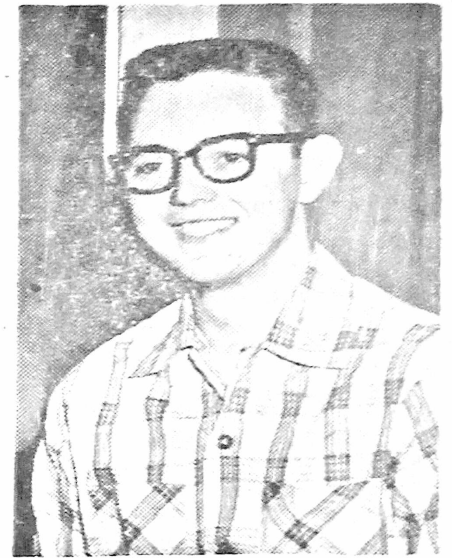
If of late you've heard some exciting whispers, it may have been about the up and coming campus cavalier, Bill Jackson.

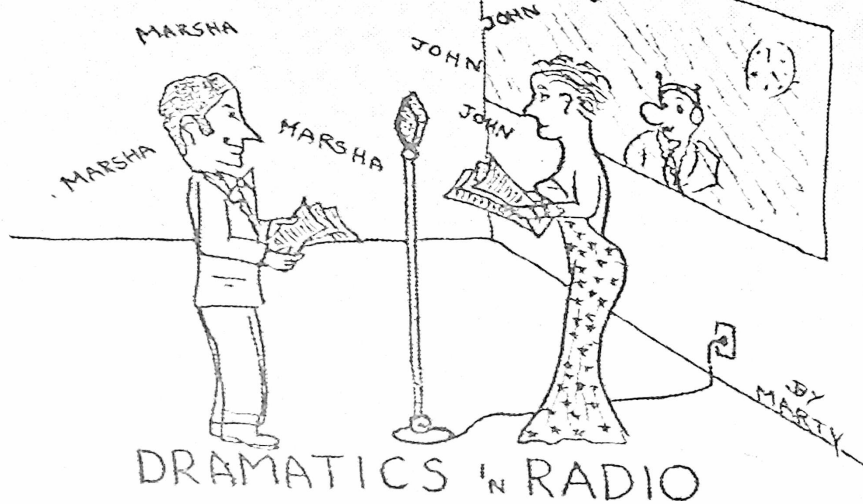
As for girls, he thinks they're — "well—uh—wonderful. I like 'em especially if they know what to do at the right time and where to do it."

The seniors were taken on a tour of Valdosta on the college bus Saturday afternoon. The tour included the outlying districts of Valdosta and Moody Air Force Base.

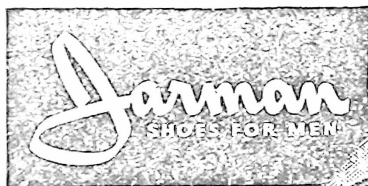

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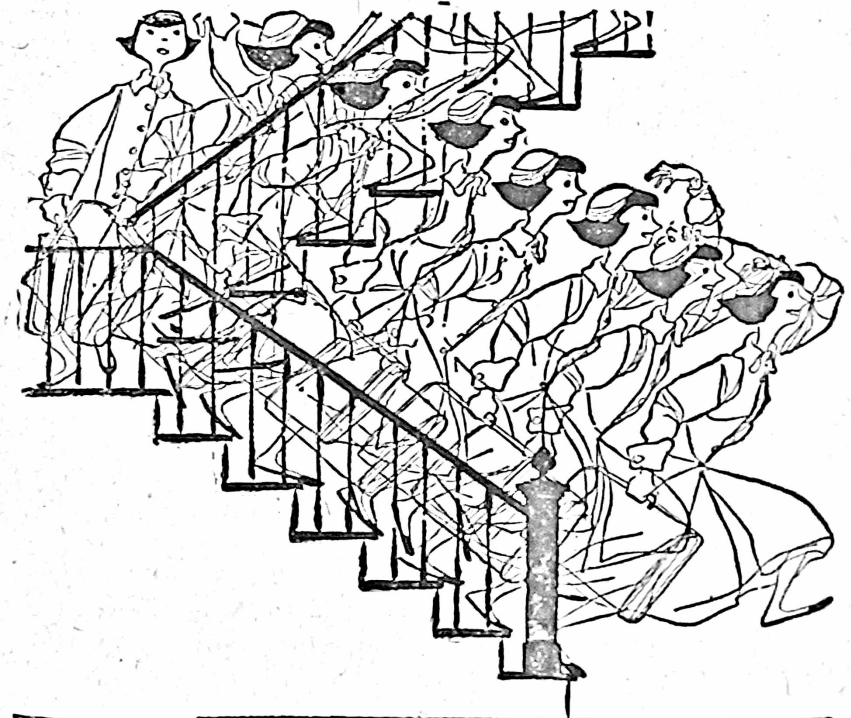
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PEEPING THRU
