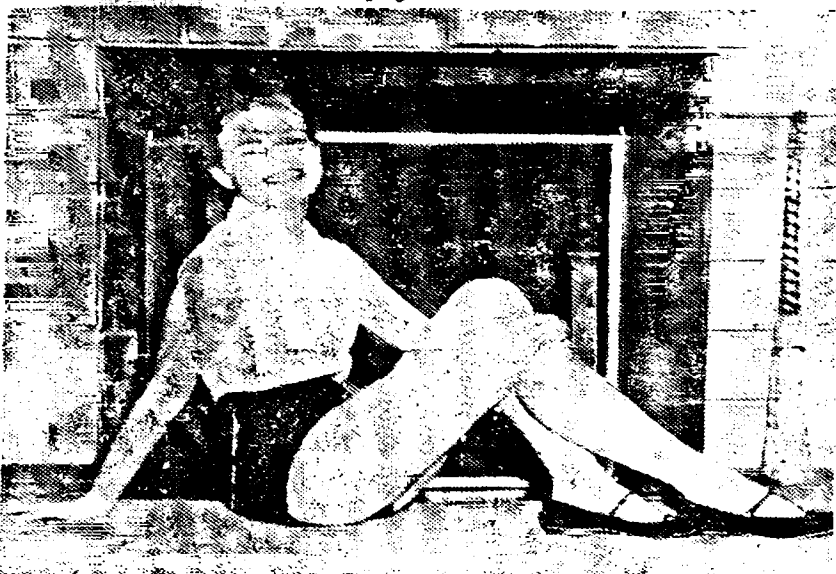

## V. S. C. Needs Good Stage

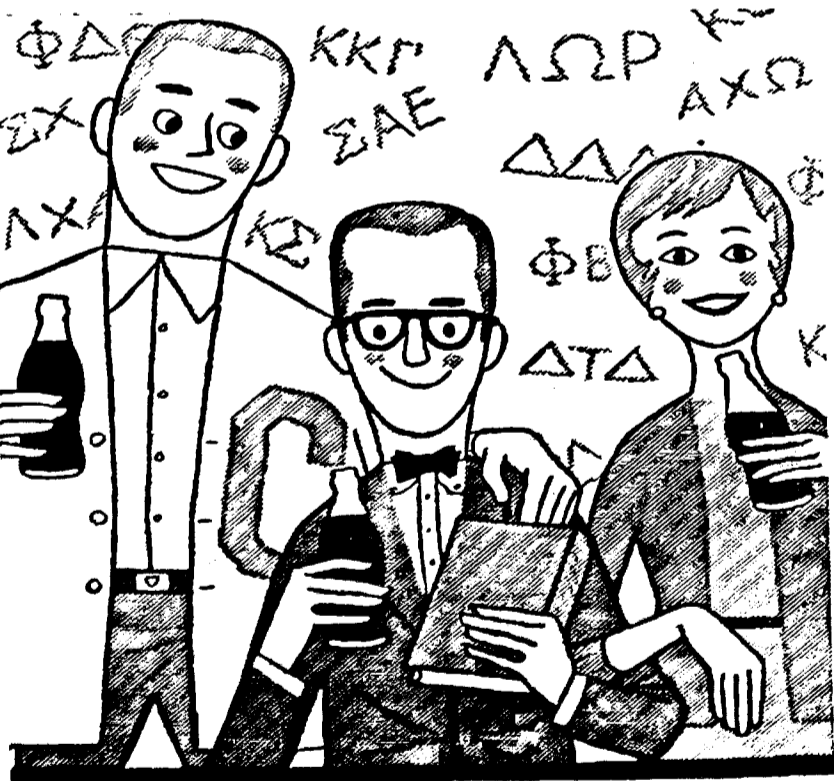

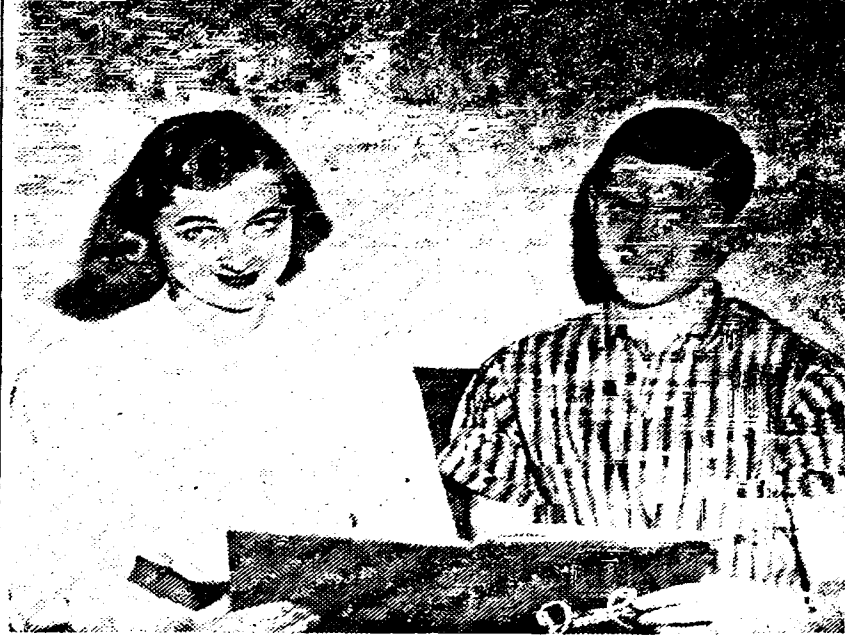
