According to a survey made by University of Nebraska professors, the age group having the least regard for speed laws was 16-25. Drivers under 26 were responsible for 36 per cent of the speed law violations. Fifty er cent of the total violators were under 30 years of age.

Make sure that your lights are operating efficiently before driving at night. Remember that the speed limit in Georgia falls from 60 miles per hour to 55 when darkness arrives. If it
is necessary for you to walk at night, wear clothing of a light color.

Several weeks ago a student here at VSC was treated at the general hospital for injuries received in an accident that occurred returning to the Main Campus from the North Campus during a rain. Since the car in which she was riding crashed into the rear of a car in front, this accident might have been avoided if the driver had been alert or if there had been better visibility. So
keep your windshield wiper and brakes in serviccable condition. Keep your fog lights on during rainy or foggy weather
