For Senior Membership: Gretchen E. Coleman, James Maxwell, Claudine B. Stone, Joel Wiggs, and Miriam Barnes.

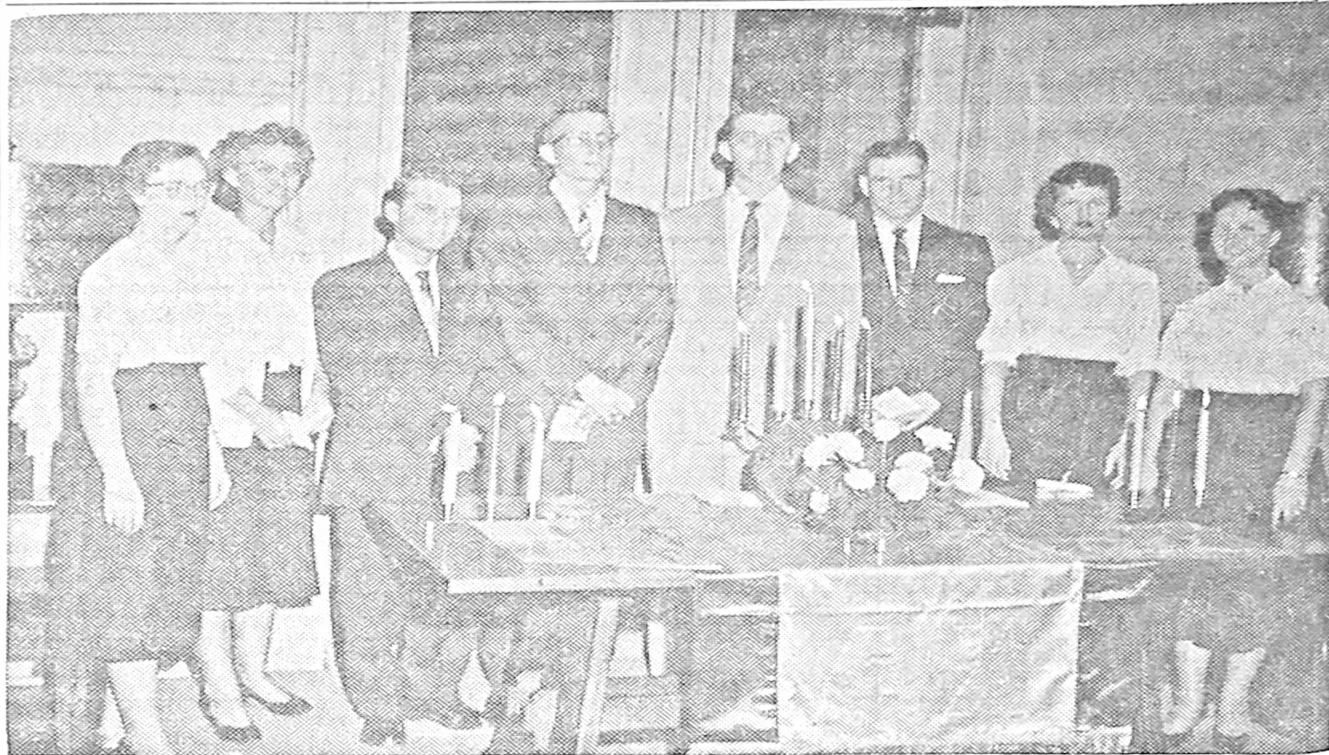
For advancement from Junior to Senior standing: Bennie Ruth Baker, William A. Carter, Glenda Jay Ellis, and Darlene S. Wallace.

Major In Sacred Music Now Offered

Open To All Who Are Interested

It is possible for the first time this year at Valdosta State to major in Sacred music. Heretofore, it has only been possible to major in the applied fields, either in piano, organ, or voice.

Mr. Webster Teague of the music department pointed out that two courses in church music will be offered. Church Music Literature is the first of these to be offered. It is the study of historical development of sacred choral forms from the early Christian era to the present. Also included will be a study of the mass, oratorio, cantata, motet, anthem and the hymn through recorded and live performances. It will be offered during the coming Spring quarter. The second course, Church Music Administration, pertains to the local Church. That is, the development of the music program, organizing music for the worship service, and the organization of the multiple choir system. This course will be taught during the succeeding Spring quarter. The courses will then be taught during alternating quarters respectively.

This program is open to anyone desiring knowledge in Church music or to anyone who desires to work full or part time in the music program of the Church.

How Mature Are You?

"When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child; but when I became a man, I put away childish things." These words written by Paul nearly 2000 years ago in his first letter to the Corinthians, are one of the greatest calls to maturity in the history of mankind.

As Dr. Harry A. Overstreet puts it (in his book *The Mature Mind*), "The business of man is to mature: to mature psychologically as well as physically, to mature along the line of what is unique in him and what he healthily shares with all his fellows, and to continue the maturing process throughout his life." He goes on to define a mature person as "one who sees with his own eyes, thinks with his own brain, and creates with his own ingenuity and his own sense of values."

We students here at V. S. C. are on the threshold of physical maturity (and some have crossed it). But how near are we to psychological maturity? Do we see for ourselves or think for ourselves? Do we do anything creative that reflects ourselves as individuals? Or do we allow others to tell us what to see and what to think, and live on the creations of others?

From birth the child is dependent for survival and intellectual growth upon the society in which he lives (How mature is OUR society?). The mind of a child cannot comprehend the huge, complex world in which he lives. He is self-centered, the axis of his small universe. Everything in this small universe has been put there solely for his pleasure. But as he grows older the child is taught that the world belongs to other people too. However, some people fail to mature beyond the self-centered stage. These people are among the most dangerous in the world. A child instinctively lashes out at any injury, whether real or imaginary, but his small body is too weak to inflict great damage. An immature adult will still lash out, but with all the power of an adult body, capable of conveying much bodily harm. Respected as a "mature" person his opinion carries much more weight than a child's, no matter how immature his opinion may be.

A mature person can do one thing the child cannot do — think analytically! He can analyze himself, his society, and the world in which he lives. He can discover his place in the world, or make one. He challenges all ideas, no

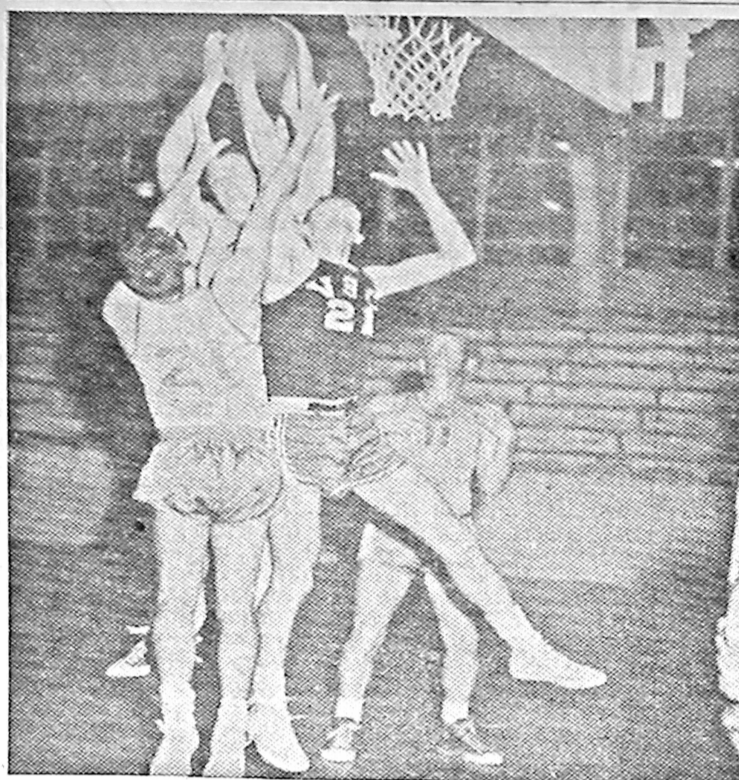
