Corso To Head Pi Kappa Phi

The First Methodist Church of Valdosta was the site for the formal initiation of the Beta Tau Chapter into the national fraternity of Pi Kappa Phi. The initiation team was headed by Brother Paul Perry and associate brothers from Beta Eta Chapter at Florida State University. Thomas J. Wesley, District President of Pi Kappa Phi was the Installing Officer. A total of sixteen brothers and six alumni were initiated.

Dr. Keighton To Speak At Math-Science Meet

Dr. Walter B. Keighton, professor of chemistry and chairman of the Department of Chemistry at Swarthmore College at Swarthmore, Pennsylvania, will address the February meeting of the Math-Science Club on February 11, 1959. The meeting will be held on the North Campus and will be followed by a tour of the recently completed quantitative analysis laboratory. Refreshments will be served.

Dr. Keighton, who is sponsored by the American Chemical Society's "Visiting Program", received the Bachelor's degree from Swarthmore College and the doctor's degree from Princeton. A member of the Swarthmore faculty since 1931, he has also worked in industry and for the government, including work in chemical hydrology for the U. S. Geological Survey.

In his address to the Math-Science Club, Dr. Keighton will speak on "Fresh Water from Salt



Water." His discussion will include some proposed methods of recovering fresh water from saline water, some of the difficulties involved, and the economics of such methods.

Interested members of the faculty and student body are invited to attend.

Tau Kappa Epsilon began its formal installation of the national fraternities 150th chapter on Friday evening, January 16, 1959. The installation began with the arrival of the Province Hegemon and two members of the installing team from Furman University and six members from Georgia Tech. The chief installing officer, Dr. R. C. Williams, arrived by plane at 8:05 Saturday morning to set the ceremonies underway. The local group was initiated as ZETA NU CHAPTER of TAU KAPPA EPSILON.

Formally known as Mu Alpha, the fraternity was instituted in November of 1952 as the first Greek letter group on campus. The brothers of Mu became affiliated with TKE in 1955. The brothers had been working on plans for becoming a National Chapter from that time to the present.

The local colony started out the 1957-58 school year with four brothers and built the group up to what it is today.

Fall quarter of this year, found all of the brothers deeply instilled in work on the petition. A complete history of the college and the local group had to be included. Pictures of the campus and buildings were also requested to be added to the information.

On Thursday night all brothers were given a quiz on TKE history and traditions by the field-representative, Marvin King. Before any of the brothers could be initiated they had to pass this test with a grade of 80 or more.

Seventeen brothers were installed as charter members of ZETA NU Chapter. The Canopy staff salutes the slate of organizations at Valdosta State and issues forth this one challenge. "Never be content, but press forward to larger and better rewards."

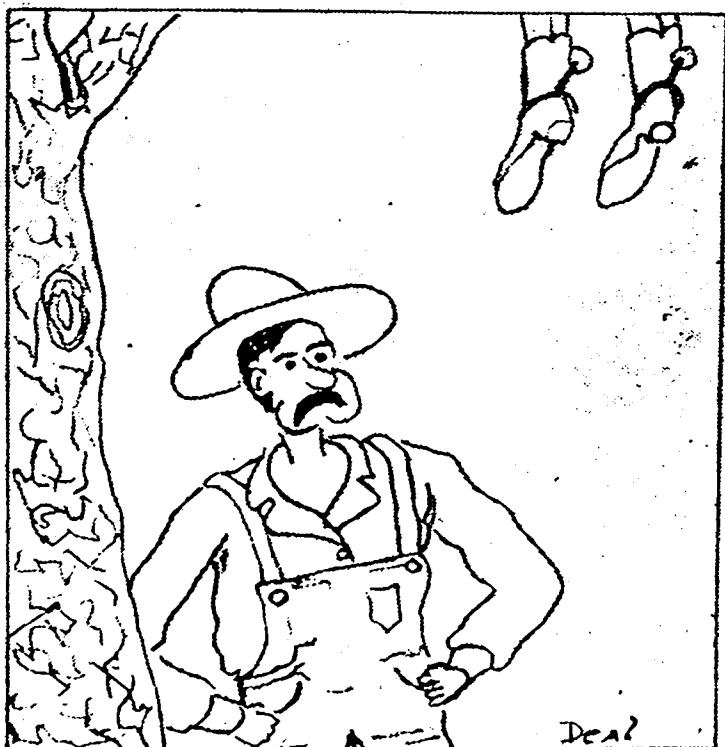
ON U. S. GOVT

When the last buzzer rang for the game to be over, everyone piled out yelling and shouting. We decided that basketball is quite a fascinating experience and we resolved not to miss another game.

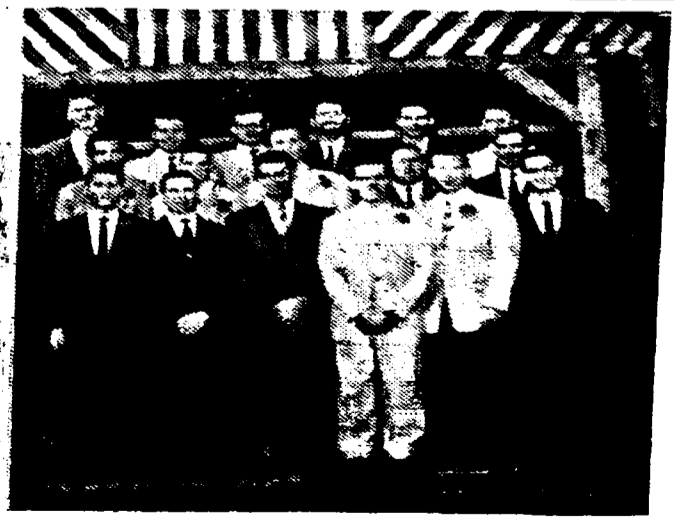

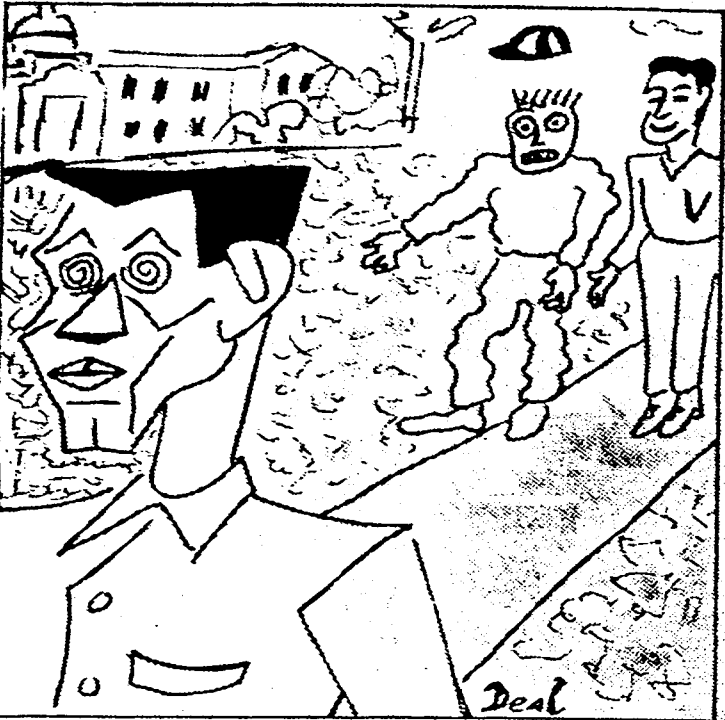
