The Florida State University School of music will present Verdi's opera "La Traviata" on November 11 at 8:30 p.m. at the Ritz Theatre.

Students will be admitted to this performance for 75¢. Adult tickets are \$1.25. Tickets may be obtained from Mrs. Maddox, secretary to Dr. Thaxton.

The opera will be sung in English and will be done in costumes and with lavish stage sets.

La Traviata (The Castaway) is based on the romance and drama La Dama aux Camelias by Alexandre Dumas, better known in America as CAMILLE. In the opera the demi-mondaine heroine is Violetta Valery and the man whom she loves but gives up because of his father's protests is called Alfred Germont. The libretto is by Piave.

After expenses the money left over from this performance will be used to establish a scholarship in the FSU school of music.

The Civic Music Association announces that students will be admitted free to the other programs they have planned this year by presenting their ID cards. This is the only program of the series that is open to the public, hence the sale of tickets become necessary.

Other programs are: Nov. 23, Giuseppe Campora, Tenor; Jan. 26, The Atlanta Symphony Orchestra; and March 25, Robert Schrade, pianist.

Yes, they do sound harmless but these organizations and many others are Communist Party front organizations. If you joined or even give active or passive support to any of them, you would most likely come under the all-seeing eyes of the FBI.

The point that I am illustrating at this time is that you cannot tell a book by its cover. This applies in college also. Recently, a freshman who is majoring in biology asked why "he" had to be subjected to history.

The answer is simple. If a future biologist doesn't study some history, there eventually may not be any biology left for him to study. Conversely, a historian who neglects biology, may find himself without any one left to create history.

The idea of a well rounded education is essential to a well balanced individual, both emotional and psychological. In this one aspect, we are far ahead of our international rival.

While there is a critical need for specialization in this modern fast moving world, there is also a need for overlapping of understanding between classes, groups and individuals, as well as countries. If each person was highly specialized with no conception of the "outside world", how would a physician explain a minor automobile trouble to a mechanic? I'll leave that one to your imagination!

We must each devote some time to studies outside of our major field in order to be able to communicate with other specialized persons, and moreover to understand them. The subjects that are not in our major fields of interest deserve as much consideration and effort as those which are.

Next time you enter that class that you think is irrelevant, don't make a snap judgement, but try to see how it ties in with your own projected vocation. If a new and difficult course is thought of in this light, you will see that it will be more worthwhile, more interesting, and perhaps even yield a better grade.

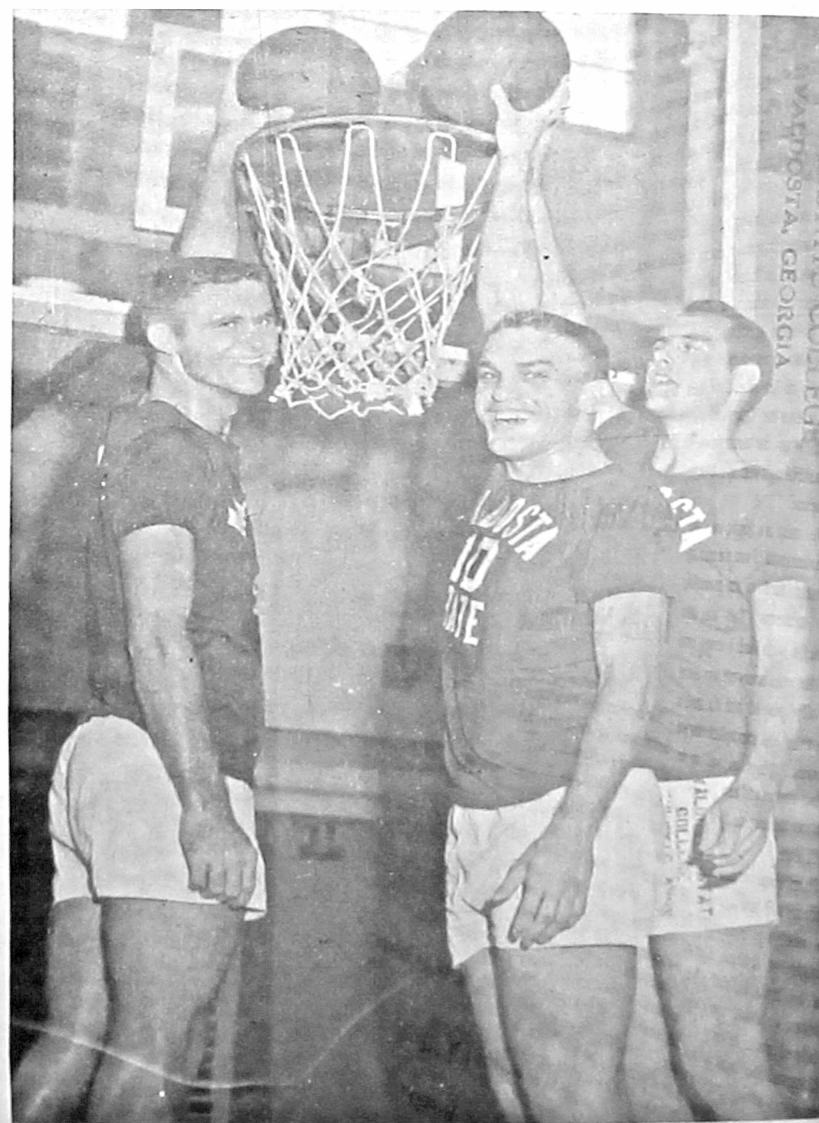
