liams will be the speaker at the graduation exercise.

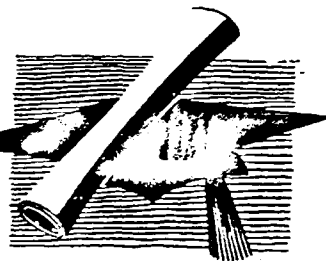

Fulbright Scholarships Available

Fulbright scholarships for graduate study or pre-doctoral research in 32 countries will be available to over 800 graduate students for the 1962-63 academic year, it was announced by the Institute of International Education which administers the program for the Department of State.

In addition to the Fulbright Scholarships, awards for graduate study in Latin America under the Inter-American Cultural Convention and for graduate study in Ireland under the Scholarship

Exchange Program between the U. S. and Ireland will also be offered for 1962-63. Applications for these programs will be available on May 15, 1961.

There are two types of grants study abroad under the Fulbright program. Complete Fulbright grants provide maintenance, travel, tuition and books for one academic year. Countries participating in this program include Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Luxembourg, Brazil, Burma, Chile, China (Republic

of), Denmark, Ecuador, Finland, France, Germany (Federal Republic of), Greece, Iceland, India, Iran, Italy, Japan, Korea, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Pakistan, Peru, Philippines, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Turkey, United Arab Republic, United Kingdom (and overseas territories). Fulbright Travel Grants to supplement maintenance and tuition scholarships from other sources are also available to American students receiving awards for study and / or research in universities in Austria, Denmark, France, Germany, Iceland, Israel, Italy and the Netherlands. The terms of the awards to Ireland are the same as for the Fulbright grants.

The Inter-American Cultural Convention awards cover transportation, tuition and partial-to-full maintenance. Participating Latin-American countries are Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru and Venezuela.

General eligibility requirements for all categories of awards are:

1. U. S. citizenship at time of application;
2. a bachelor's degree or its equivalent;
3. knowledge of the language of the host country sufficient to carry out the proposed study project and to communicate with the people of the country;
4. good health. In addition, a good academic record and demonstrated capacity for independent study are also necessary. Preference is given to applicants under 35 years of age who have not previously lived or studied abroad.

Applications for scholarships for 1962-63 will be accepted until November 1, 1961. Requests for applications must be postmarked by October 15. Interested students who are enrolled at a college or university should consult their campus Fulbright Program Advisers. Others may write to the Information and Counseling Division, Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York 21, N. Y. or to any of IIE's regional offices.

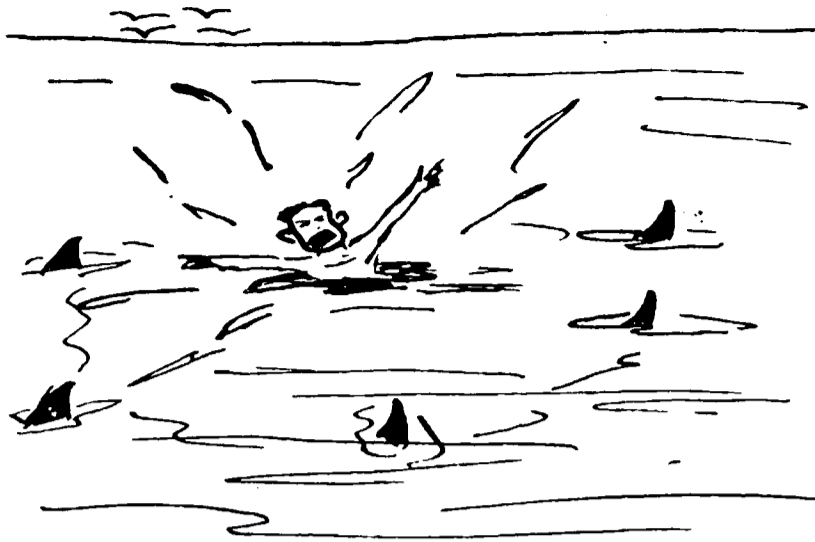

Maurice Whiddon began work at Talmadge Memorial Hospital in Augusta on April 1. He will enter the Medical College of Georgia in September, 1961.

The Math-Science Club and the Math-Science Seminar held a joint meeting on April 12 in Jere Pound Hall on North Campus at 8 p.m. Dr. E. Earl Royals, Professor of Chemistry at Emory University, spoke on "The Theoretical Approach in Organic Chemistry".

Officers of the Math-Science Club elected for the academic year 1961-62 are: Hugh McIntyre, president; Barbara Langley, vice-president; Melanie Boone, secretary; Emily Moore, treasurer; Wanda Thrift, reporter-historian.

Donald Dial (VSC, 1960) visited the campus recently. He is teaching Chemistry and Mathematics in the Manor High School. Because of his high score in biology on the National Teachers Examination, the State Department of Education notified him that he is eligible for the six year study program under the Grants-in-Aid for In-Service Study.

Joe Montgomery has been notified that he is to report to Lackland AFB, San Antonio, Texas on June 3 to enter Officer's Training School.

Barbara Langley has been awarded an Undergraduate Assistantship in Physiology at Florida State University for the summer. She received notice of this appointment on May 1.

Miss Davilene Carter, who received her BS degree with a major in medical technology in June, 1959, has been accepted as a member of the September 1961 class at the Medical College of Georgia.

Dr. Clyde Connell attended the May 5 and 6 meetings of the University Council at Atlanta. While there, he was elected vice-chairman of the University System Committee on Biological Sciences. During the summer, Dr. Connell will continue research on migratory birds in association with Dr. E. P. Odum of the University of Georgia under a grant made to Dr. Odum by the Atomic Energy Commission.

John Corbett, former VSC biology major, visited the campus on May 13. He is a candidate for the BS degree in Clinical Psychology from the University of Georgia in August.

Nan Starling Hill (Mrs. Ashley) who graduated from VSC in June, 1957, and reenrolled for professional training in Medical Technology when it became available in 1958-59 became a registered medical technologist in July, 1959. Since January of this year she has been employed in the laboratory at Pineview

General Hospital.

The chemistry department was awarded a grant of \$2249.50 by the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission for the purchase of additional equipment to be used in teaching radioisotope techniques and applications. Other Southern schools receiving similar grants are North Georgia College, Agnes Scott College, Jacksonville University, the University of Miami, the University of Tennessee, Chattanooga University, Vanderbilt University and Tuskegee Institute.

Mr. Lindauer will be at the University of Tennessee from June 5 to August 5, 1961, where he will be working under Dr. Hilton A. Smith on studies of hydrogen isotopes. This program (Research Participation Program) is sponsored by the National Science Foundation. As previously reported in the Valdosta Times, Mr. Lindauer will be on leave of absence during the 1961-62 academic year, to attend the 5th annual NSF-sponsored Academic Year Institute at Harvard University. He expects to take a number of courses in chemistry and physics at Harvard.

Dr. J. Graham Wall was elected chairman of the University System Committee on Mathematics at a recent meeting of the University System Council.

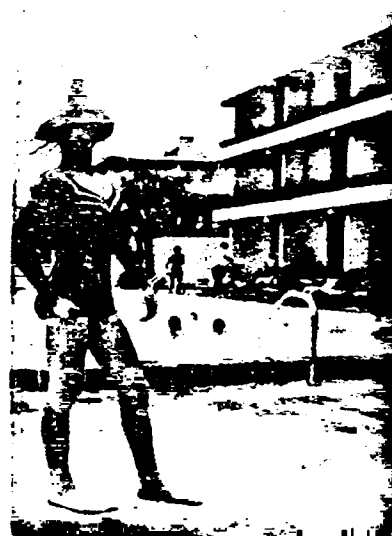

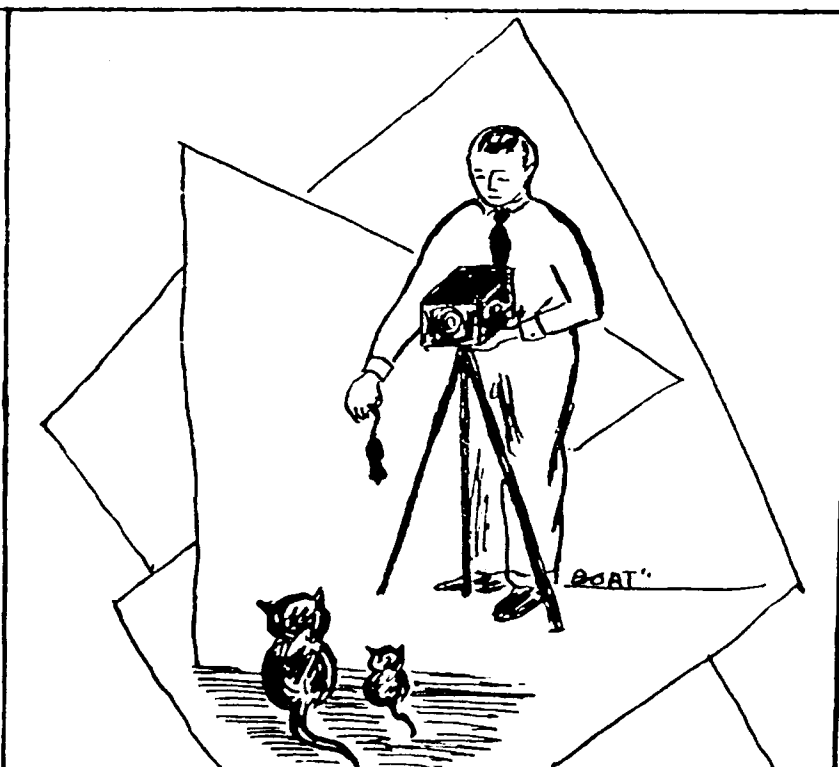

Throughout the previous 1960-61 sport's season, the VSC Rebel teams have proven themselves in basketball, baseball, softball, football and even in a modified form of the olympics.

The greatest single achievement in the sport's field at VSC was taken by the Rebel basketball team when they copped the GIAC Conference Championship under the coaching of Gary Colson. They won twelve straight conference games to capture this title.

The "Baby Rebels" or junior varsity also proved their ability to become top basketball players during the season, by winning second place in the Ouitman Invitational Tournament. Coach Colson then divided the team into two individual teams which entered the GCI Invitational Tournament and walked off with a first and second place win by a score of 108-106 in a double overtime. Another team, dominated by freshmen, then represented the college in the Mud Swamp Invitational Tournament and took a third place victory.

Valdosta State College's baseball Rebels closed out their 1961 season on a victory note by sweeping a doubleheader from Berry College 2-0 and 7-3.

The double triumph boosted the overall record of coach Billy Grant's Rebel to 8-15. They closed out with a 5-5 GIAC chart.

Four baseball players from VSC were included in the conference All-Star selections. Tommy Thomas and Joe Dixon were tapped for first string All-Conference; Mike Perry and Angie Devivo gained honorable mention.

The VSC Netters are now due to play North Georgia for the GIAC Conference, but North Georgia has balked at the proposal claiming that the VSC Netters have not played enough conference games. VSC has a 12-2 overall record and a 8-0 conference mark. North Georgia also has a perfect GIAC mark. A decision has not yet been reached on the matter.

Bucky Anderson and Bernie Brown gained All-Conference honors in tennis for VSC in both singles and doubles.

In Intramural playoffs Dorm team stormed forth and captured the basketball and football titles. In football Dorm was victorious over Town, 7-6, leaving Town and TEKE in a second place tie. Dorm then defeated TEKE, 76-68, for the basketball championship. Town team edged by the TEKES, 8-7, to cope the softball title.

Captains of these winning teams throughout the year were Nick Nordone for Dorm in football; Joe Dixon for Dorm in basketball; and Emory Mobley for Town in softball.

Berry was slated to play another match, but forfeited so it could make an early start for home. So coach Gary Colson's Rebels got credit for a pair of Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conferences victories.

Yesterday's match marked the close of regular season play for the Rebs. They finished with a 12-2 overall record and an 8-0 conference mark.

Baseball Rebs Win Two Over Ber

A double triumph for the baseball Rebels closed out their 1961 season with a sweeping doubleheader from Berry College, 2-0 and 7-3.

This victory boosted the overall record of Coach Billy Grant's Rebels to 8-15. They closed out with a 5-5 Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference chart.

While the VSC nine started out slowly this year, it finished with a spurt of five triumphs in its last six starts.

In the opening game, VSC blanked Berry behind a four-hit pitching of Mike Perry. Kelly Raulerson's sacrifice fly accounted for one of the Rebels' runs in the second inning and Angie Devivo drove in another with a timely single in the third.

In the second game, VSC overcame Berry's early 2-1 lead with a three-run outburst in the third

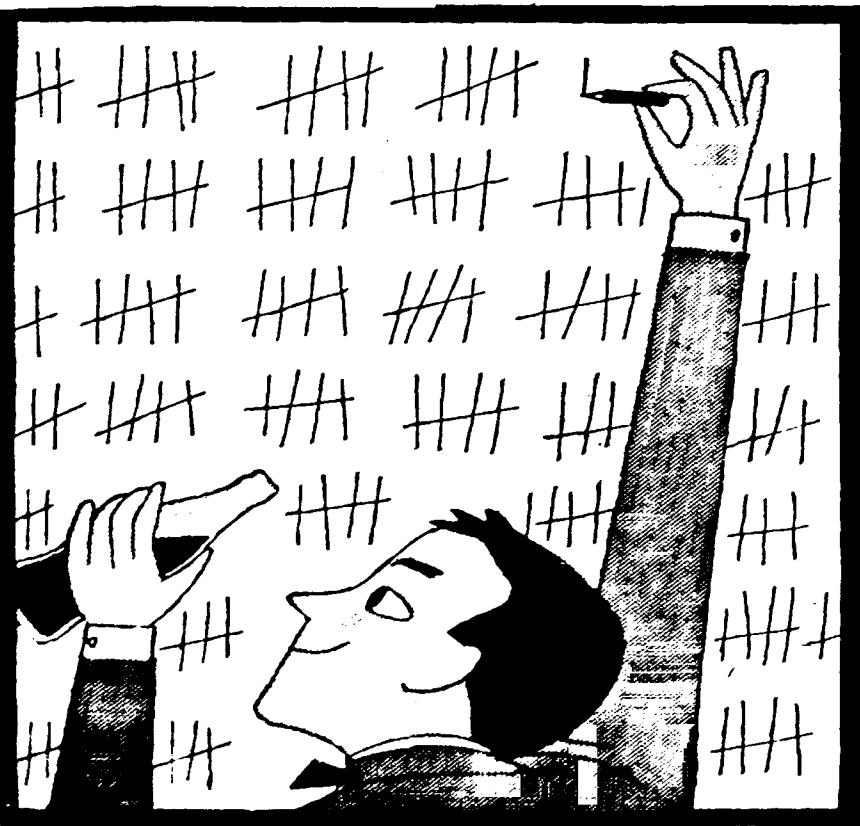
