

On the next page is a letter written by the brothers of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity in reply to a Campus Canopy editorial which objected to their public use of an objectional cheer.

The letter states that the fraternity was unjustly and irresponsibly discredited, that the fraternity as a whole was falsely accused, and that the chant contains no profane reference to God's name. It also calls for the Canopy to print a retraction on the charges made.

First, we will admit that the editorial in the Nov. 30 Canopy could have been written in a less offensive manner. However, we cannot retract the charges because they are true. We do not deny that the cheer - as it is written - contains no greatly offensive words.

The Sig Eps have admitted that members of SPE, as members of the fraternity, and in a group containing only members of the fraternity have substituted the word "God" for words which were supposed to be used. Their contention is that these words are used by individuals and are not the responsibility of the fraternity as a whole. We realize that most of the brothers are not guilty of the charge; yet, the fraternity is responsible for the actions of its members when they are in a group as Sig Eps.

Cheers are good; they add to fellowship and spirit. But fellows can'tyou find one less offensive? While the cheer is not offensive to many people, it is offensive to many others. The SPE's should respect the feelings of these.

The Christmas season is upon us. It is a time to lay aside petty feuds and differences of opinion. Let's let friendship and love abide; let peace reign.

Some have asked who writes the unsigned editorials that are customarily placed in the lefthand column of this page. Most newspapers carry unsigned editorials in a similar position. 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John Spooner Speaks At Student Assembly

"The Russian people are a friendly people, and they don't want war", stated John I. Spooner, member of the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia and board chairman of agriculture. Mr. Spooner was guest speaker at assembly on Wednesday, Dec. 5.

Mr. Spooner is from Donalsonville and is a graduate of the University of Georgia. He holds a degree in agriculture.

He was among a group who took a 21 day trip to the Soviet Union last spring. During the stay in the Soviet Union the group was allowed complete freedom with one stipulation: they were not allowed to take pictures inside Lenin's tomb or the airport.

Spooner judges the Soviets to be 20 or 30 years behind the U. S. in agriculture. Despite the rich soil, the growing season is short, there is little rainfall, there is a lack of both technical knowledge and of incentive.

However, Spooner said, the Soviets rank far above the U. S. in the moral standards of the people and in the unlimited education program.

Spooner showed some of the

700 slides which he took while in Russia. Among these were Krushchev's home, the Greek Orthodox church inside the Kremlin, and a Russian department store. Pictures of various landmarks in Moscow were shown also.

The people are supplied with the necessities of life but they do not know luxury. According to Spooner, the Soviet people are friendly but somewhat expressionless; they do not seem happy nor do they appear unhappy.


The Rebels grabbed the lead 6-4 early in the game and were never again seriously challenged. By intermission the score had increased to 39-27.




