

## **Gerlock Attends Seminars** On European Education

Don E. Gerlock, chairman the Education Department at Valdosta State College, is among 90 educators from the United States and Canada visiting several European cities and participating in the 12th Annual Comparative Educa-tion Society's Seminar and Field Study.
The seminar and field study,

entitled "Contrasts in European Secondary and Higher Education," was conducted in London, Moscow, Prague, East Berlin, and Copenhagen, March

12 through April 2. Dr. Gerlock pointed out that because of the rapid expansion and many new experimental arrangements in higher and secondary education in both the U.S.A. and in Europe, as well as the widespread interest in education under Communism, The Comparative Education Society and The Commission on International Relations in Education of Phi Delta Kappa believe that university and public school administrators and their lay boards will benefit from a series of seminars and field studies designed specifically

for them.
"Previous seminars over the past eleven years have been enthusiastically received by American and Canadian educa-tors," Dr. Gerlock said.

Dr. Gerlock pointed out that the success of the seminars and field studies over the past years has depended upon first-hand contracts with committee members and a large enough delegation to make an all-out

program worthwhile.
"One year prior to the seminars. Dr. Read, director of the seminars, visits the various countries, names committees, and explores a variety of possibilities for programs. Oncothe committee is appointed, it accepts the responsibility for planning and directing the seminars and other activities. Dr. Read has directed socialist delegations of educators on their many visits to the U.S.," Dr. Gerlock said.

Dr. Gerlock departed from New York, March 12. He at-tended sminars at Cambridge University and Reading University in London, the University of Moscow, Charles University, Prague, Humboldt University in East Berlin, and the Uni-versity of Copenhagen. To-morrow he will arrive back in

## Sumerford Visits

fessor of Chemistry at VSC, delivered a series of lectures on the chemistry of medicinal products at Kyoto University, Japan, during the Winter Cuarter. His invitation to join the faculty at Kyoto University re-sulted from a series of trips he, as a representative of an

American drug concern, made in Asia in the early 1960's in search of research products of possible application in the drug field.

On an informal basis, he also taught classes in English conversation designed for Japanese graduate students who were preparing to come to the United States during the coming year to carry out research in gover-mental, academic, and in-dustrial laboratories.

Just before leaving Japan, Dr. Sumerford held a seminar for the research staff of Nipper Shinyahu -- a pharmaceutical manufacturer located in Kyoto.

Dr. Sumerford observed that one of the major things which distinguishes the Japanese as a race is their willingness and capacity to exert a sustained effort to achieve whatever goal is before them. This trait carries one into the classroom, which, coupled with the fact that Kyoto and other imperial universities in Japan accept only one out of some twenty applicants who apply for admission, a very satisfying

situation from the view point of a teacher. The Japanese show great respect for their teachers, whom they sensei, actually rising and bowing when the teacher enters a room. (Dr. Sumerford thought. that the bows were more like a nod the morning the nuclearpowered S.S. Enterprise dropped anchor in Sasebo.)

Dr. Sumerford was able to investigate the criteria by which students are admitted to Japanese universities. He found that the prefectural universities -- corresponding to our state universities -- are less rigid in their requirements for admission, while some of the private universities have admission standards falling somewhere between the imperial and the prefectural institutions.

Dr. Sumerford said he was fortunate to have been invited to Kyoto, called the "Boston of Japan" because of the great number of ancient imperial palaces, Shinto shrines, and Buddhist Temples, none of which was bombed during WWIL.

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




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
