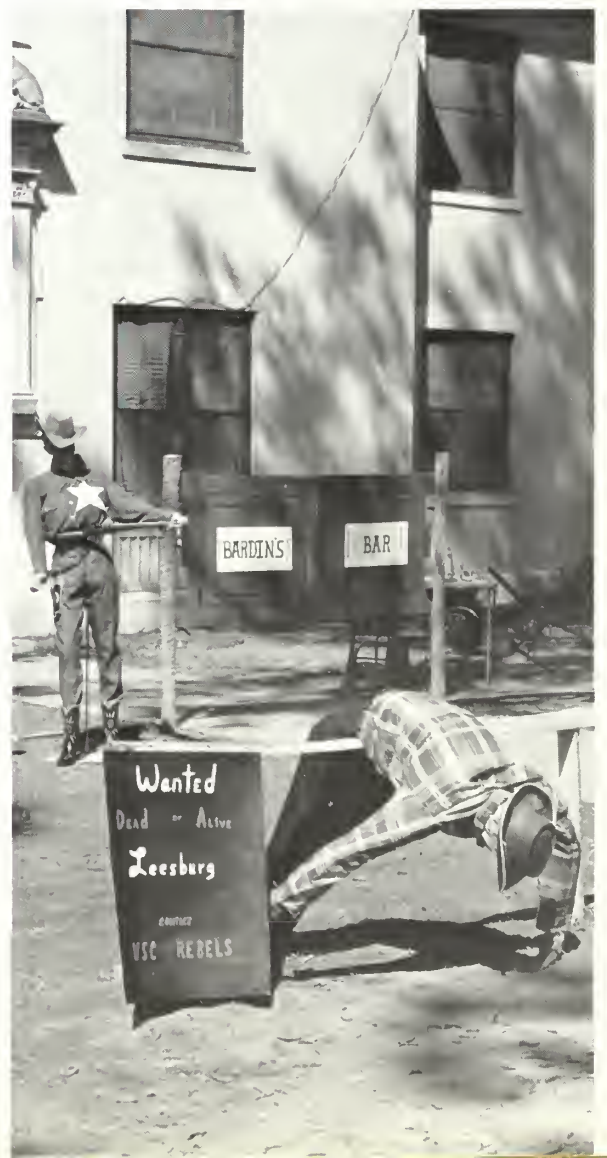

These awards are presented on the basis of leadership qualities.

Others receiving awards were Roger Rampley, of Valdosta, an art award for creative achievement in painting; Creig Kelly, of Moultrie, an art award for creative achievement in ceramics; Jimmie Ray Norton, of Valdosta, a biology award; Charles L. Simpson, of Moultrie, the local CPA's award to the graduating senior with the highest standing in accounting; Dwight Reuel Norris, of Statesboro, the Wall Street Journal Student Achievement Award, presented to the graduating senior in Business Ad-

ministration-Economics who has attained the highest level of academic achievement.

A 19-year old mathematics major at VSC, Carolyn Ritchie is a member of Sigma Alpha Chi, a member of the band and the physics club at VSC. She is a graduate of Seminole County High School, Donalsonville, Ga.

The outstanding graduating physics major is Roger Ray Whitfield, of Whigham. The physics achievement award for freshman physics went to Aram Mekjian, of Jackson Heights, N.Y.

The outstanding psychology student is Jonathan McDonald, of Brunswick.

Outstanding junior college speech major is Steve Seyfried, of Valdosta, and the outstanding senior college speech major is Elaine Snipes, of Sylvester.

The American Association of University Professors award, presented to the Junior who has the highest scholastic average and who will complete her four years of undergraduate work at VSC, went to Betty Beasley Rich, of Adel.

VSC Growth Continues As New Buildings Rise

With new buildings in planning or construction stages all over the campus, ceremonies this year marked the official breaking of ground for two new residence halls for women. Three story, 200-bed Georgia Hall was first, and is now two-thirds completed. In June, the shoveling of dirt formally started construction of John Wesley Langdale Hall, VSC's first highrise. A five story, 500-bed hall, Langdale was named for a pioneer south Georgia settler and buisness leader, and the shovel was handled by his son Judge Harley Langdale, Sr., and grandson John W. Langdale, Chairman of the Board of Regents. Langdale Hall will eventually go to 10 floors, standing tall in the center of the VSC campus.

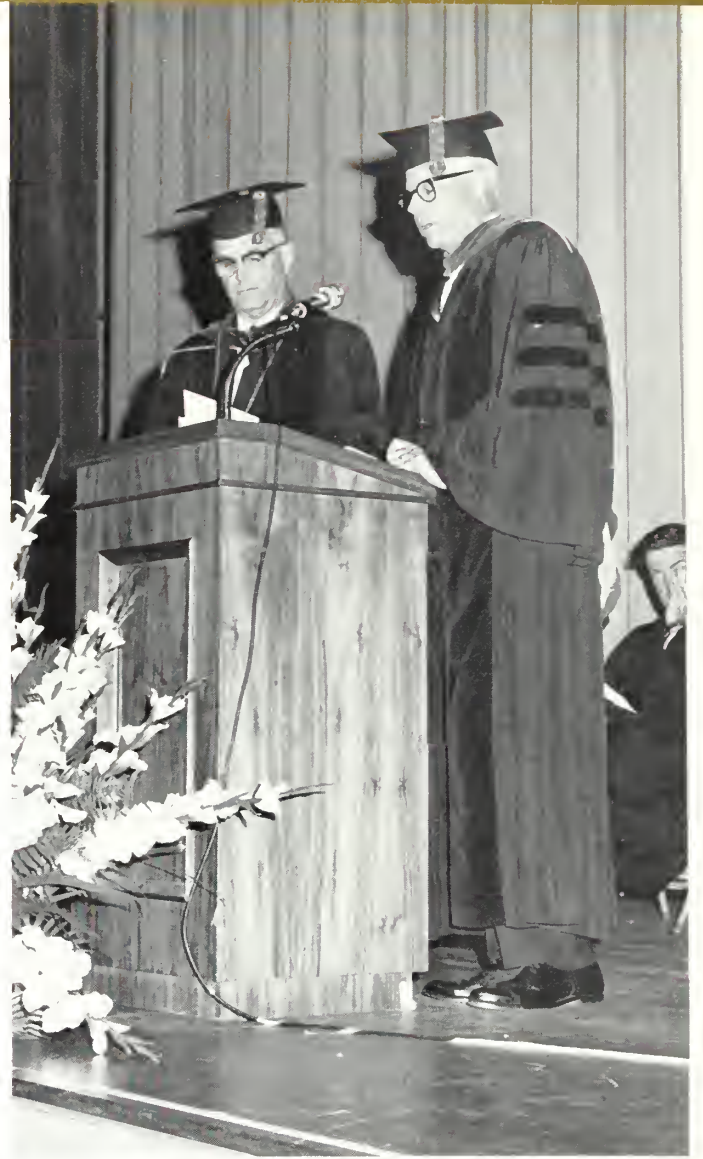
First Annual Event Attracts Many Parents

Rebels Win District 25 NAIA Championship

The 1967-68 edition of the Valdosta State College Basketball Rebels won their second consecutive District 25 National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics championship, their third consecutive Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship and their seventh G.I.A.C. title in eight years.

Consequently, the Rebs made their second coveted trip to Kansas City, Mo., to compete for national honors. Along the way, the "Fabulous Five Horsemen of the Hardwood" amassed a 23-10 won-loss record.

The Rebel attack was paced by returning letterman Bryan Phillips, of Marietta, who was named third team All-America in the N.A.I.A. for his performance at forward; Forward Mike Terry, of Hammond, Indiana, who was named to the All-G.I.A.C. team; Guard Ron Fortner, of Gary, Indiana, who also

was named to the All-G.I.A.C. squad; and Guard Bob Lamphier, of Crown Point, Indiana.

Sophomores Robert McKenney, of Marietta, and John Trimnell, of Columbus, Indiana, also contributed much to the success of the Rebels.

Leading scorers for the Rebs were Mike Terry with a season-high total 571 points, followed by Bryan Phillips with 470 and Ron Fortner with 401.

At Kansas City in March, the Rebels, representing District 25 of the N.A.I.A., were defeated by Central State University of Ohio, 60-53, the eventual winner of the national small college championship.

The Rebels lose four starters via graduation from the 1967-68 Rebel squad. In conclusion, it was a fine year for the Rebels on the national scene and they were a source of much joy and pride to Rebel boosters.

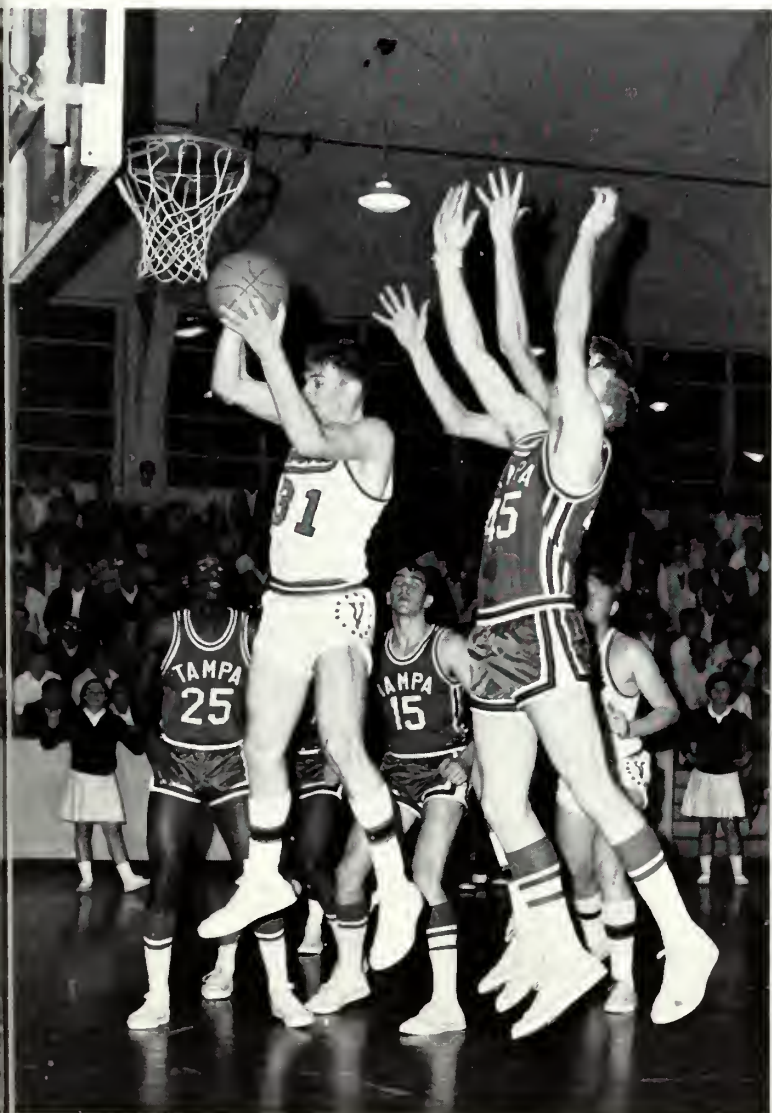

Paced by the 26 points scoring performance of Bryan Phillips, the Rebels defeated Emory and Henry Wasps, of Emory, Va., 87—67.

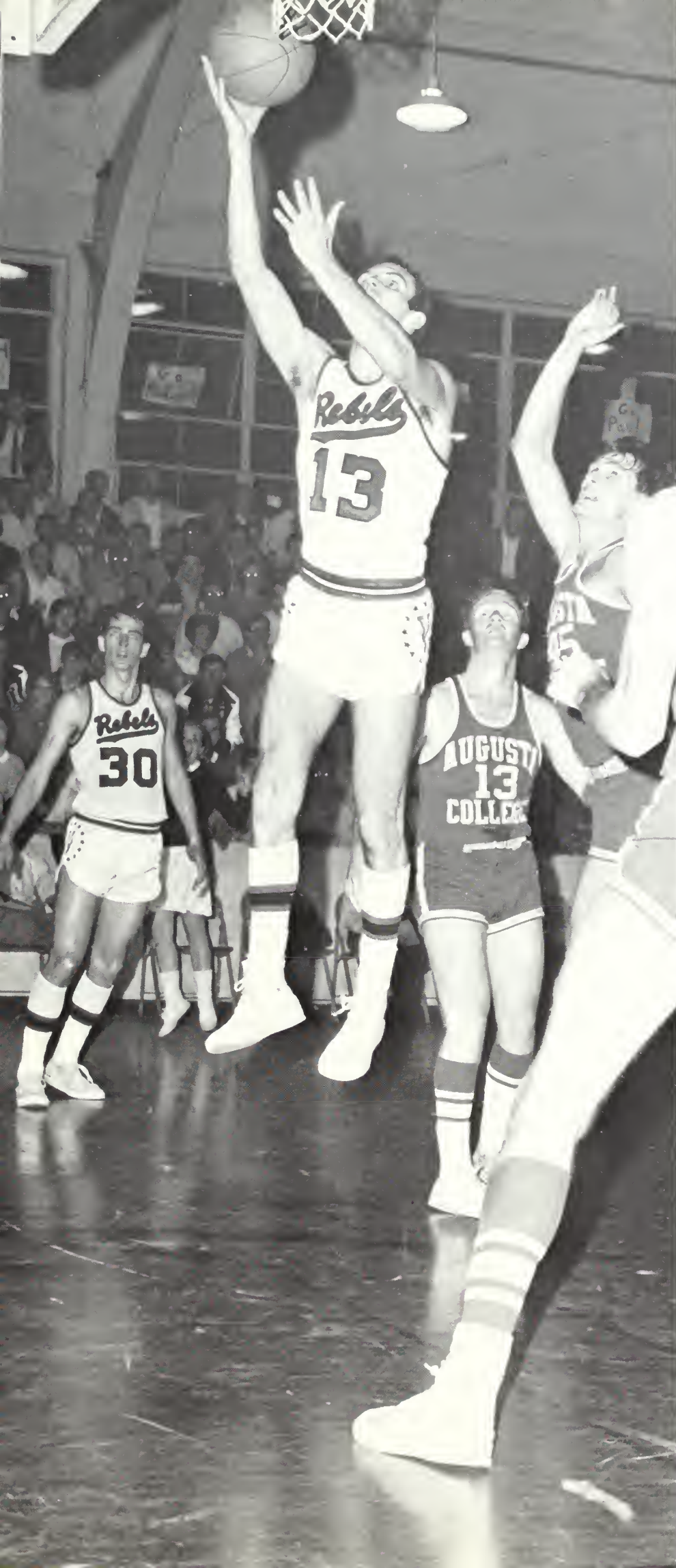

The Rebels had to stage a second-half rally to down stubborn LaGrange College, 66—56. Mike Terry and Bryan Phillips provided the scoring punch for the Rebs with 22 and 20 points respectively.

Robert McKenney garnered 22 rebounds and played a fine defensive game, blocking 10 shots. McKenney contributed 11 points to the Rebs' scoring parade.

VSC vs. GEORGIA SOUTHWESTERN COLLEGE

The Rebs produced a balanced scoring attack as they downed conference opponent Georgia Southwestern College, 78—62. Four Rebs scored in double figures. Point men for VSC were Terry with 17, Fortner, 15, and reserves Dale Croft and Paul O'Brien with 14 and 12 respectively.

VSC vs. GEORGIA SOUTHERN

A capacity crowd of more than 2,000 fans saw the Rebs avenge an earlier-season loss by downing the Georgia Southern Eagles, 68—48. Bob Lamphier, last-minute starter for the Rebs, provided the victory spark with 22 markers against the Eagles.

VSC vs. AUGUSTA COLLEGE

The Rebels defeated Augusta College, 84—56, in the second game of a best-two-out-of-three playoff series to determine the District 25 champion of the N.A.I.A. Top scorer for the Rebs was Ron Fortner with 21 markers. Phillips scored 19, Terry added 14, and Lamphier connected for 11 clutch points. Earlier in the week, the Rebs had set the stage for the grand finale by taking a hard-fought 60—55 victory in the Jaguars' den in Augusta.

VSC vs. WESTMAR (IOWA) COLLEGE

In the opening round of the national tournament in Kansas City, the Rebels downed the Westmar College Eagles, of LeMars, Iowa, 62—57. All-conference guard Ron Fortner was the high point man for the Rebs with 18 markers, 14 coming in the first half. Robert McKenney added 16 markers for the Rebels.

VSC vs. CENTRAL STATE UNIVERSITY, OF OHIO

In the second round of tournament play, the Rebs took it on the chin, 60—53, from the Marauders, the eventual winners of the national small college championship. Against the Marauders, three Rebs tied for team scoring honors with 10 points each. They were Bryan Phillips, Mike Terry and Ron Fortner.



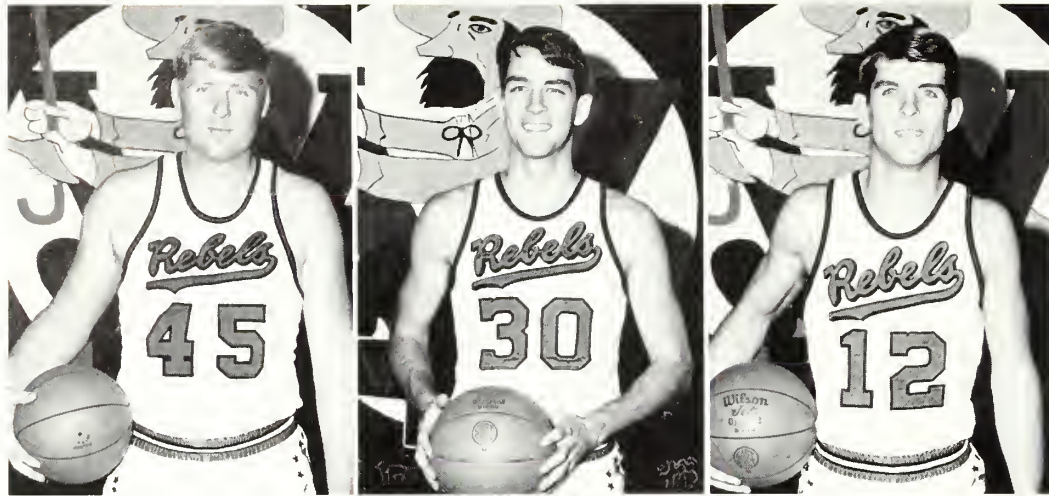

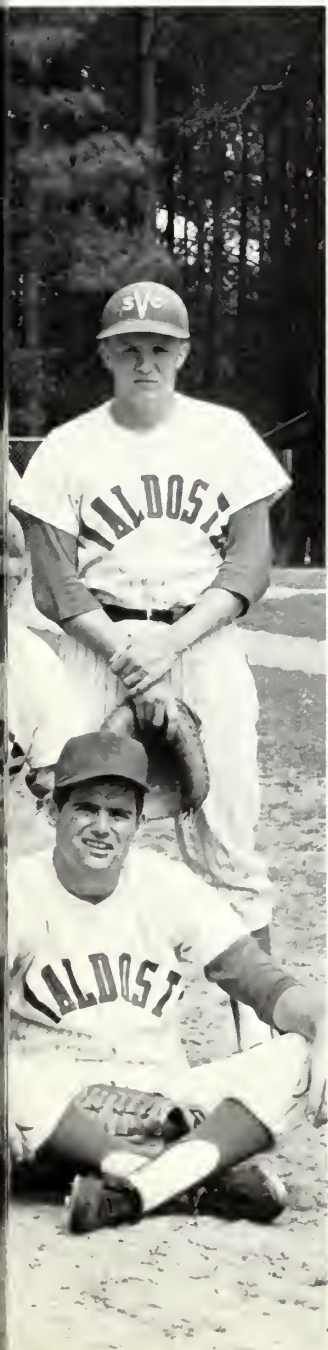

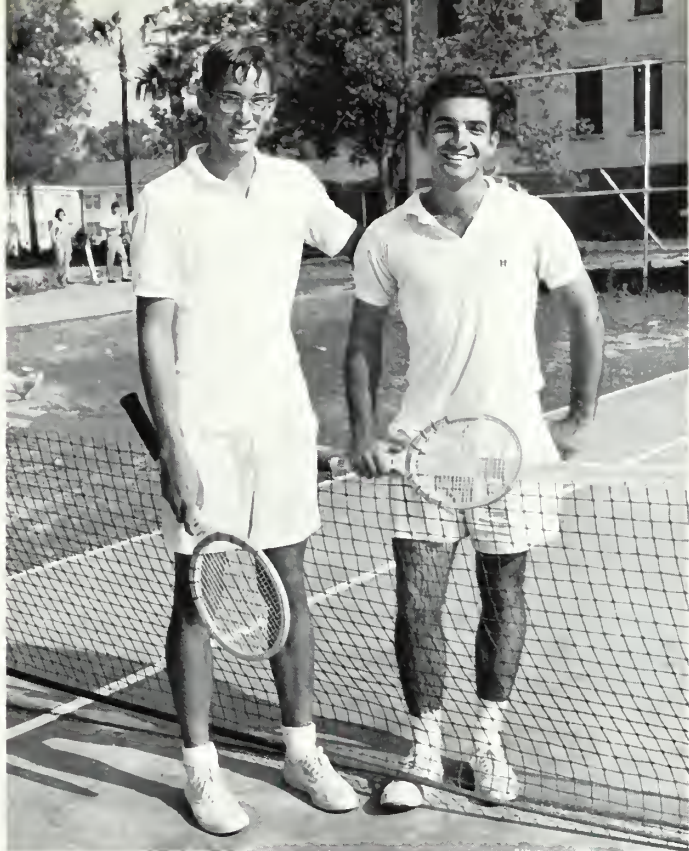
11—3 Season Record Nets Third in G.I.A.C.

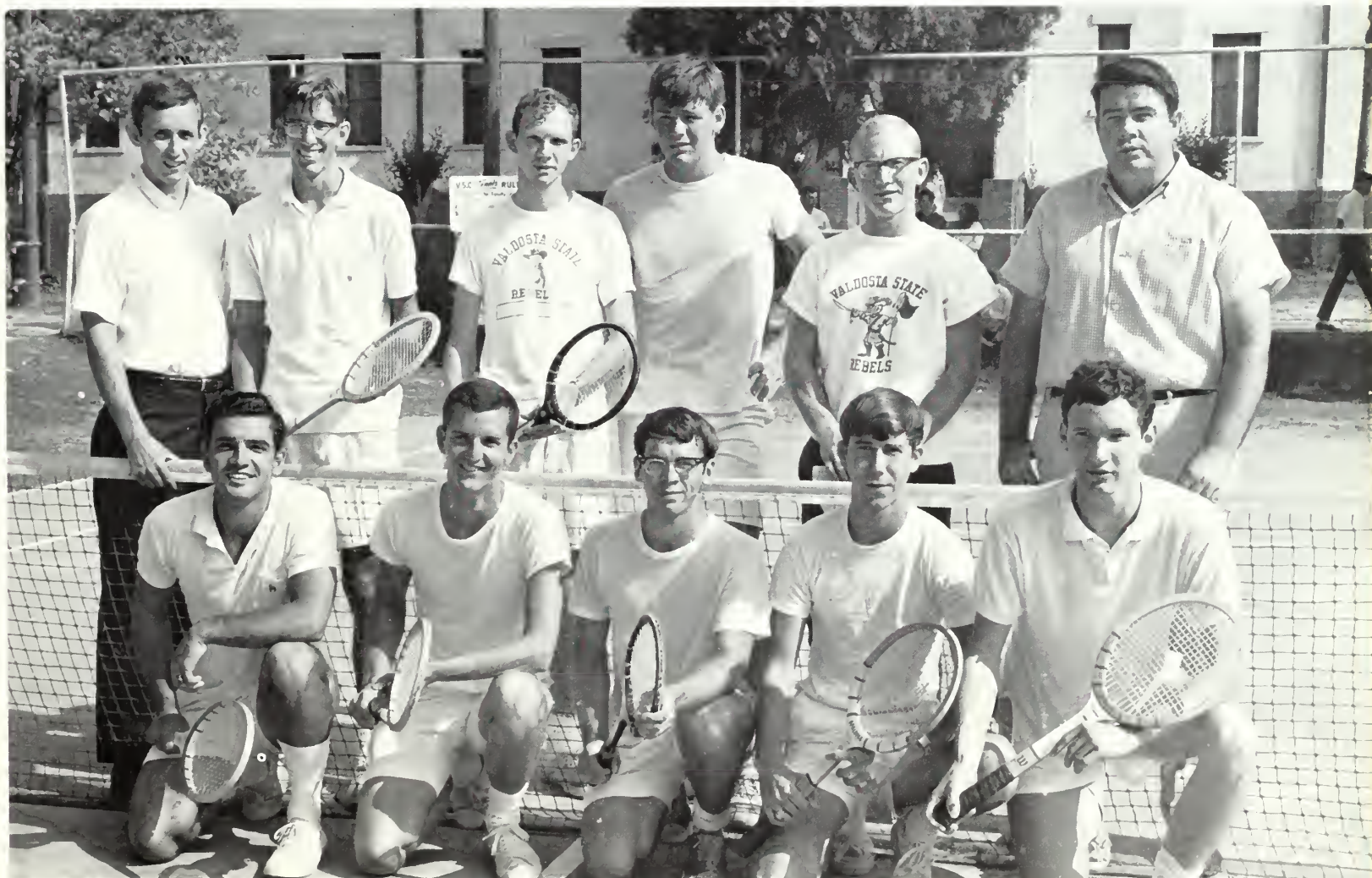

In addition to the excellent undergraduate degree program, the College, this year, inaugurated the Master of Arts Degree program with a major in history.

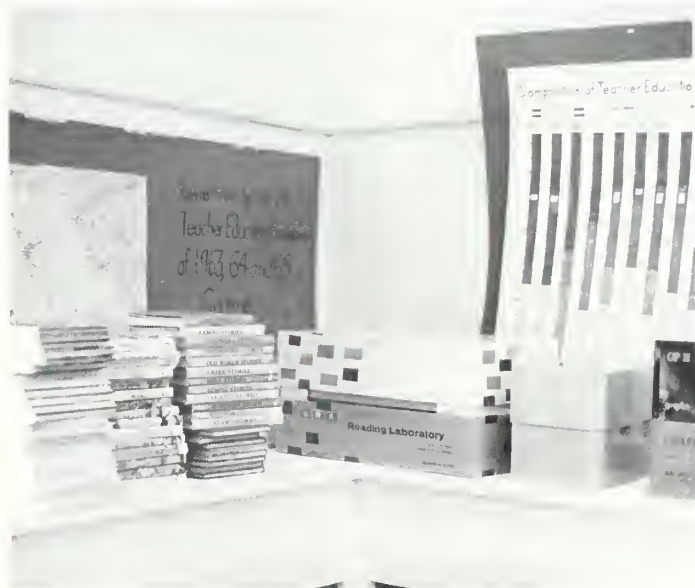

Education Courses Help the Teaching Technique

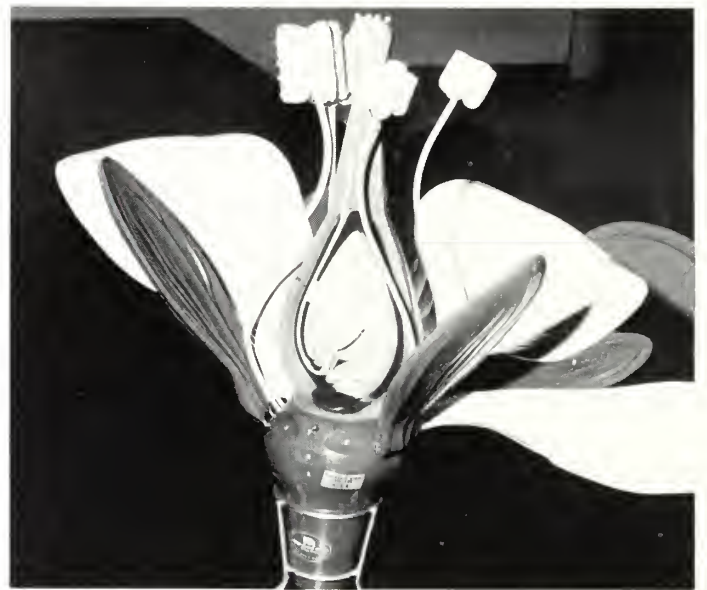
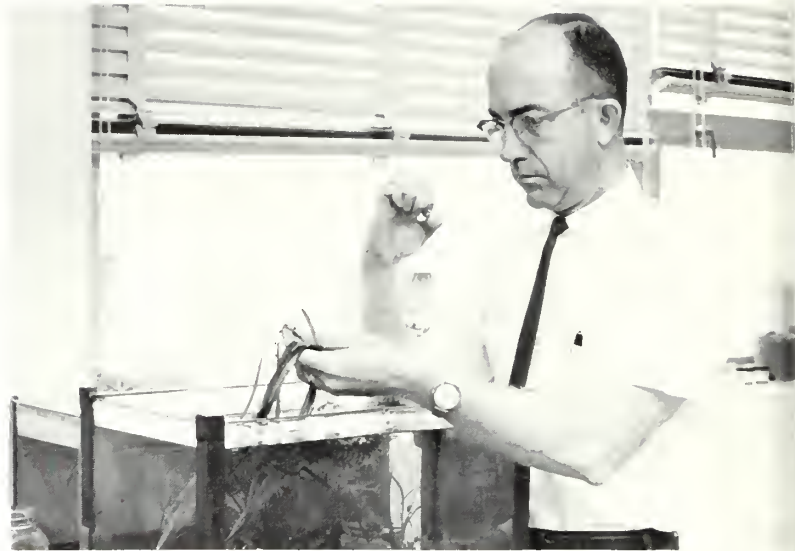
