Here at VSC, as elsewhere, no two people are alike, yet no two people are totally different.


















Each individual has his own method of expressing himself to others. Some use dance, others song and still others just what they say or the expression on their faces. And of course photographers have a method all their own?!

Individual Faculty Members



Professor Barker was born in Brooklyn, New York, but grew up in Birmingham, Alabama where he was a police officer for seven years. He is married and has two sons (Ages nine and six). While a police officer in Birmingham Professor Barker received 12 Letters of Commendation and won The Kiwanis "Safe City Award" for the capture of two robbers in the act. Barker attended Jefferson State Junior College, and Samford University while he was a police officer. After graduating Cum Laude from Samford, Barker was awarded a Doctoral Fellowship in Sociology at Mississippi State University. Barker is currently A.B.D. at Mississippi State and is presently writing his Doctoral Dissertation. Professor Barker is a member of the American Society of Criminology and The National Council on Crime and Delinquency and four honor societies (Alpha Kappa Delta, Delta Tau Kappa, Phi Alpha Theta, and Pi Gamma Mu). He also has published one book and three articles on police corruption and presented papers at the last three meetings of The American Society of Criminology. In addition to Professor Barker's scholarly pursuits he is an avid (bordering on obsession) fisherman. He and his nine year old son can be found any Friday or Saturday at Brown's Pond in search of the "Hang" Bass.

Thomas Barker — Sociology Criminal Justice

I am an assistant professor of Biology and am also a registered nurse. I moved to Valdosta in August, 1963, from Johnstown, Pennsylvania. I became the first woman in Valdosta to be elected to the Valdosta City Council, having been elected in February 1972, and reelected in 1974. I was honored by fellow council members by being named Mayor Pro-tem of Valdosta. A strong concern for environmental problems has prompted me to be the prime mover for a tree protective ordinance which is now being tested in the courts.

With my husband, H. Bernard Bechtel, I am a member of the National Wildlife Federation, the Audubon Society, Jacksonville Zoological Society and Philadelphia Zoological Society. My husband and I have a pronounced interest in herpetology, the study of reptiles and amphibians, which is evidenced in two outlets: photography of reptiles and amphibians and capture breeding of snakes with particular emphasis on the study of mutants.

One of the most influential people in my life has been Senator Bobby Kennedy.


I feel that the key to support for exceptional children is public education.




What? — Me? — in the PINE CONE? Wow! Golly! GEE WHIZ!

Richard Seager Political Science



Phi Mu's won the volleyball and basketball championships. The highlights of the year were the Pink Carnation Ball, cook outs with alumni and Parents Day.








