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Made In The U.S.A.

In one stunning image recognized around the world, the Statue of Liberty says "America." Conceived by Frenchman Edouard René Lefeure de Laboulaye as a monument to American independence, the Lady has become a symbol of freedom and pride that citizens have taken into their hearts. French sculptor, Frédérick-August Bartholdi spent 15 years turning Laboulaye's idea into reality. In 1886, after teasing Americans with glimpses of her arm and torch, Bartholdi unveiled the Statue of Liberty.

One-hundred years later, after having a 31-million dollar face-lift, the Lady was unveiled once more. In a time when America's pride was at it's highest, the celebration of Liberty's birthday and relighting of her torch provided the final great gasp for a nation whose stature was being challenged elsewhere. Americans had become targets for terrorists abroad. The destruction of the Challenger space shuttle and fiery deaths of her 7 crewmembers had grounded America's venture into space. Blue-collar workers watched helplessly as their livelihoods disappeared, and they faced changes that would leave them asking, "Where do I fit in?"

In 1984, rock megastar Bruce Springsteen became the blue-collar troubadour with the release of his album **Born In The U.S.A.** His carefully written songs have been compared to letters from home, as he articulates the hopes and fears of an entire generation and class of people. In the case of the title cut **Born In The U.S.A.**, Springsteen creates an anthem about a guy who gets drafted, sent to Vietnam, then to prison and various other raw deals, but still he remains a "cool rockin" Daddy in the U.S.A."

In response to the blue-collar workers' question of "Where do I fit in?" Frank Beaver, professor of communications at the University of Michigan, states "We are moving into an uncertain zone; we just aren't quite sure where we are now. The patriotic symbols and the upbeat movies, they help us cope with the uncertainty."

Sylvester Stallone, in his **Rocky** movie series gives us a hero in Rocky Balboa. In a time when we need heros, Rocky lets us know that despite seemingly insurmountable odds, there is still hope for victory. It is possible for the underdog to come out on top. For over 200 years the underdog has been winning in this country. As our American Constitution celebrates its bicentennial anniversary this year we are reminded how a small group of underdogs rose up against an oppressive English rule to become one of the mightiest nations in the world.

So, with all of this in mind there is still the question of "Where do I fit in?" Ask yourself this question and then take a look at the people around you. What do you see? You see individuals from all walks of life. Some are rich, some are poor, but most live somewhere inbetween. In our American "melting pot" it is customary to shake hands when we meet people. Remember that the next time you meet someone for the first time. Remember, and be proud to be a "cool rockin' Daddy in the U.S.A."

Classic Americana

Of the many types of jeans sold on today's market, only one deserves to be called a classic. These jeans are the oldest and the best-selling. They are the kind that shrink-to-fit, have a button fly and riveted pockets. They are, of course Levi's 501 Blues.

The Levi's legend begins in 1880, when a Bavarian immigrant named Levi Strauss created the world's first pair of jeans--almost by accident. If things had gone as planned, Levi's would be tents and not jeans.

Like thousands of people during his time, Levi Strauss made his way west to the California coast. But, unlike most of these settlers, Levi intended to make his fortune, not by panning for gold, but by selling dry goods to the miners.

Upon his arrival to the gold country Strauss was greeted with words that would shape history: "Should have brought pants. Pants don't wear worth a hoot up in the diggin's."

Strauss listened well, and took his rolls of brown tent canvas, from amongst his wares, to a tailor who made them into pants. Strauss called these pants by their lot number, 501. The 501's (or as his customers preferred to call them "Those pants of Levi's") were an instant hit with the miners because of their durability.

When Strauss ran out of canvas, he switched to a tough cotton fabric loomed in Nimes, France. This new material was one of the strongest known, and was called "serge de Nimes", which Americans soon shortened to "denim".

Back in the 1880's it was an innovative idea, making pants out of tent material. Levi Strauss rose to a challenge and carved a niche for himself in American culture. But even Strauss might be surprised to find that his newfangled idea is still alive and looking pretty much the same even after more than 125 years.

Evangelist Disrupts Campus

While Exercising Constitutional Rights




"Amazing Grace, How Sweet The Sound ...

The Constitutional rights which guarantee the Freedom of Speech and the Freedom of Religion came under fire during the week of February 9-13 as the controversial campus evangelist Jim Gilles brought his ministry to the VSC Campus. Gilles, who spoke on campus during the previous year, has preached on 210 campuses in 42 states. Gilles' sermons have provoked angered students to attack him on many of those campuses. In fact, he was struck by a riled student on the first day of his visit in February of 1986. Gilles, who was "saved" during a Van Halen concert a number of years ago, infuriates students by calling them "whores" "whoremongers" and "perverts".

Student reactions to Brother Jim were mixed. Some thought he was a professional comedian. Others assumed that he had been hired by the Campus Activities Board. Some students went as far as calling Gilles a false prophet spoken of in the **Bible**.

Shouts of disgust echoed from the crowd as Christians, whose faith and beliefs were being tested, asked such questions as "Who gives you the right to judge us?" "What gives you the right to condemn us all to Hell?"

Regardless of whether or not he was right or wrong, the **U.S. Constitution** allowed Gilles to say the things he did, and to get away with it. The Freedom of Speech as well as the Freedom of Religion, among other rights, are shared by every citizen in this country. In some countries outbursts such as Brother Jim's would not be tolerated. Individuals making such bold comments would be reprimanded by the government. It is refreshing to know that in America one can speak one's mind freely and openly with no fear of being jailed for having beliefs which differ from that of the government or another individual. It was also comforting to witness VSC students, and in some cases faculty members, exercising their rights as they challenged Brother Jim on various points of interest. What is even more fascinating is the knowledge that as our **Constitution** celebrates its 200th birthday, it is stronger today than it ever was.


The concert, the second of a record breaking series of four, was sponsored by the Campus Activities Board.




Student Volunteers Help Make Concerts A Reality

Negotiations Approved For Purchase of Brookwood Plaza

It looks as if VSC's Campus is growing. Final negotiations have been approved by the Board of Regents for VSC to lease Brookwood Plaza, with the option to purchase the 128,000 square foot facility.

This additional space will be used to accommodate many crowded departments on campus. It is planned that the library will be expanded by moving the Media Services and the South Georgia Archives to the plaza. This will provide more room for shelving new books for library expansion.

Brookwood Plaza also holds potential for more lab space. It is expected that the number of labs for the engineering program will triple, or even quadruple in the coming years.

Also, the College Union will be expanded in order to allow for more access to college groups. The expanded Union will also provide greater access and parking to off-campus students

















Cavan Leads Blazers To First Winning Season

Valdosta State Football turned the corner toward success in 1986 as the five-year-old program, under the direction of an almost entirely new coaching staff, bullied its way to a 9- Σ record and a place among the elite of Division II football.


Head Coach Mike Cavan, who assumed control of a program which had turned three consecutive 5-6 campaigns, brought in an enthusiastic and knowledgeable staff which turned a solid group of players in the right direction.

The Blazers started quickly with a surprising 17-0 shutout over Fort Valley State, dropped a heartbreaking 10-7 decision to Central Florida, then rolled up impressive Gulf South Conference wins over Jacksonville State and UT-Martin. Only a 45-10 setback blemished the remainder of the schedule as the Blazers defeated their final six opponents to finish 9-2 overall and 7-2 in the GSC.

The fairy tale season had a troubled ending, however, when the NCAA selection committee bypassed the Blazers for one of the eight spots in the national playoffs. Nonetheless, in final rankings Valdosta State was voted 8th in the nation by the Football News and 12th in the nation by the NCAA poll.

Individually, linebacker extraordinaire Jessie Tuggle was named the league's defensive player of the year, and sensational flanker Randy Fisher was selected freshman of the year. Other Blazers named to the all-conference team were Dallis Smith, Terry Mallory, James Gibson, R. D. Swain, and Keith Reddings.

Tuggle, who completed a brilliant four-year career, was further honored by being named to two all-American teams, Kodak and the Football News.


















VSC finished third in the regular season GSC race, and the season ended in the first round of the conference tournament when the Lady Blazers dropped a 77-72 decision at Livingston.





Three Lady Blazers, Fincher, Moore, and Machelle Petrey, were named to the League's all-academic team.









































WVVS-FM


Interfraternity Council

Apathy Killed The Milestones

I read a sign once that said "I used to be apathetic. Now I just don't care!" How tragic, I thought. How could anyone be so insensitive? The more I thought about it, the more I came to realize that "I don't care" could easily be the motto for VSC.

For example, how many people, students and faculty members, support VSC's athletic teams? Admittedly attendance goes up during a winning season, but when it comes right down to dollars and cents, how many students get their money's worth out of paying quarterly athletics fees?

Similarly, what about support for the weekly activities sponsored by the Campus Activities Board? How many times has the C.A.B. held a recreational activity such as a Monopoly tournament, or volleyball match, only to have no one turn up to participate? During 1987 the C.A.B. sponsored no less than four "Happy Hours" in the Blazer Café. On each occasion only a handful of students attended. The shame of it all is that a lot of time and money (provided by Student Activities Fees) went into providing top-of-the-line entertainment for everyone's enjoyment. For the most part, the Tuesday night "Happy Hours" were wasted efforts. Very few people attended, and as a result the chances of bringing such talent back to our campus looks rather dim. In a time where budgets are being trimmed, departments are held more accountable for expenditures.

So too, it is apathy which has **murdered** the **Milestones**. I say murdered because the yearbook's demise was a deliberate, calculated measure. I know, because for two years as editor I witnessed all the signs of homicide. I observed apathy on behalf of the students at VSC as only 450 students, out of a total population that exceeds 6000, had their pictures taken for the 1986-1987 **Milestones**.

I also witnessed indifference on behalf of the administration when I pleaded to have the "yearbook seminar" organized into a class with a regular meeting time, and an instructor. I was told that as editor it was my responsibility to take care of any troubles facing the Milestones, and that any such reorganization, although it was supported, would be "a lot of trouble" because there was a lack of classroom space and instructors to teach such a course.

I could go on and on, but now that the end has come for the Milestones I would like to thank the small group of dedicated individuals who have made this final issue of the Milestones possible: Thanks go out to Joseph and Barbara Miller for all the wonderful sports photos. Also to Brian Duke and John Trotter for the photographic assistance. A very special thank you goes out to Dina Hale, who was the only section editor who did not let me down. When I needed something done I could always count on Dina not to miss a deadline. Thanks to Mr. Bill Baker of Walsworth publishing who gave me the motivation I needed when the yearbook started falling apart, and turned into a one-man-show.

As I close out this section let me encourage the students at VSC to push for the re-activation of the Milestones. The Milestones, as well as The Spectator, Odradek, and WVVS are funded by your Student Activities Fees. Let the people in charge of your money know how you want it to be spent. It is your right to do so. And if you agree that there should be no yearbook, then that is an opinion which I respect.
