


26 - John Vunovich - First Base




27 - Tom Roszell - Left Field







1981 Outlook

As Coach Tommy Thomas prepares his 14th squad for a 57-game schedule, he is in his words 'curiously optimistic.' He is curious because much of the nucleus of the 1981 Blazers will consist of new faces,

especially on the all-important pitching staff.

Graduation and the major league draft claimed the top five pitchers in last year's rotation. Those five arms were responsible for 38 of the Blazers' 45 wins in 1980 and obviously will be sorely missed. The only returnees to the staff are senior David Raffensberger (2-0, 3.76) and sophomore Wayne Fugett (3-0, 4.39), who each worked 26 innings last season.

Thomas went to junior colleges in search of pitching help and recruited eight pitchers to bolster his 1981 staff. Joining Raffensberger and Fugett on the hill will be JC transfers Julio Navarro (Valencia, Fla.), Leroy "Snake" Dixon and Dennis Rich (Brewton Parker, Ga.), Andy Keating (Gulf Coast, Fla.), Bob Policastro (Indian River, Fla.), Bud Drew (South Georgia), Jim Rodi (Cochise, Ariz.) and Mark Schanback (Cumberland, Tenn.).

"It's a brand new, inexperienced staff, and it's the key to our season,"

Thomas said.

Thomas expects to have an adequate defensive team which has the potential to be especially strong in the outfield. And he predicts a "good offensive team...not overpowering, but productive."

The cast includes a blend of returning players and newcomers from

various junior college teams.

Back for his second year behind the plate is Seo Torres (.312, 47 RBI). Rounding out the infield will be returnees John Vunovich (.266) at first base, Mickey Taylor (.274) at second, all-American Joe Mederos (.404) at short, and Mark Powell (.244) at third. Vunovich and Taylor were platooned last season and Powell saw limited playing time.

The starting outfield will have Richie Johnson (Indian River) in center, and the trio of Bobby Roche (Middle Georgia), Tom Roszell (.373) and John Keigher (.272) dividing time in left and right field with the one not playing

defense often filling the designated hitter assignment.

Infield depth will be supplied by sophomore Tim Russell, freshman Greg Waits and redshirt Jeff Soss, who also is a backup catcher. Other catchers are Lenny Guida (Hillsborough, Fla.) and freshman Pat Estep.

Reserve outfielders will be Jay McDonough (.200) and freshman Casey

Fetherolf.

Scouting the Opponents

It's an attractive but rugged 57-game schedule the Blazers embark on March 1. The slate features 37 home games (22 under the lights) and includes Division I powers Florida State (51-12), Clemson (38-21), Georgia (33-12), Georgia Southern (38-21) and Florida (40-16).

Other Division I opponents include Louisville (38-21), Mercer (31-18),

Jacksonville (23-33) and Evansville (7-37).

A tough battle for the South Atlantic Conference title is shaping up. The defending champion Blazers must play Columbus (26-10), Armstrong State (22-20) and Augusta (12-25) on the road. Only West Georgia (32-9) comes to Blazer Field.

Coming to town during the 26-game March homestand will be old rivals Rose-Hulman (16-12), Charleston (8-18), Fort Valley State (14-9), St. Xavier

(40-27) and Illinois Benedictine (26-20).

Valdosta State's homecoming has been shifted to the spring this year and the annual Alumni game will be played on Saturday, April 11 at noon. Georgia is the homecoming opponent on Friday night, April 10.

Other late season foes will be Flagler (26-15), Florida A&M and Georgia

Southwestern (32-18).
