There is growing unease among the dozens of out of town newsmen as they compete for snippets of information about Mrs. Brown and the progress of her pregnancy. Their worry is shared by local reporters on the Oldham Evening Chronicle (which claims, apparently correctly, to have broken the **MumMAM** story, having reported April 20 that the world's first test tube baby would be born in July).

If Steptoe-Edwards are cut in on the syndication money. it is not thought they will collect it themselves, but that it will go to the charitable trust which they set up five years ago to further their work in helping childless couples. Mr. Owen told a reporter in april: "The money floods in after he's (Steptoe) been on a lecture tour abroad. Steptoe said: "People have an idealistic view of medicine. Steptoe has said in the pastthat he'd like to see a **heighthermastrability** established for the sole purpose of studying human reproduction. Such a center would examine sterilization, contraception, conception and the pioneering field of test tube babies.
