

'Study Abroad Program' Offered To VSC Students

The University System of Georgia is to offer a 'Study Abroad Program' this summer according to C. Lee Bradley, Assistant Professor of French at VSC and the VSC Coordinator for the USG-sponsored program.

This program, which carries a potential of fifteen quarter hours credit, in addition to the chance to study in a foreign country will run for a full ten weeks, and will offer at least one week for travel during the quarter. It is stressed, though, that this is primarily a study opportunity, with standards of academic achievement comparable to those of the University System of Georgia. The credit obtained and the grades made during the summer will be reported to the student's home school for recording in his transcript.

Trying to meet the stated purpose of "providing foreign study opportunities for serious

and selected students" the program offers summer language courses in French (Dijon, France) and Spanish (Valencia, Spain), a Classics course is to be held in Rome, Italy, and an Art program will be offered in Cortona, Italy. The cost for the programs from New York to New York is \$1,035 and covers all necessary expenses of the student while in the program.

In general, requirements call for the prospective applicant to have at least a B grade average and Junior status although this requirement can sometimes be waived, according to Mr. Bradley. Students applying for consideration in this unique study program must also submit a statement from a doctor attesting to the good physical condition of the student-applicant and a letter of recommendation from the head of his department.

This special educational program attempts to give the student an in-depth study of his selected area by making use of special opportunities and facilities not available in the country sponsoring the program; and offers insights by both American and foreign professors who specialize in each area. Whenever possible excursions and cocurricular activities are planned in conjunction with the regular classroom work.

As an example of this merging of study and exposure the

ROTC Unit Signs Three Cadets To Scholarships

John R. Wagner, a junior and John W. Mobley, IV and Claude I. Thomas, Jr., both freshmen, have been awarded Air Force ROTC scholarships after having successfully met the requirements for the Professional Officer Course (POC) and for entry into flying training.

Wagner is a cadet captain already enrolled in POC. He calls Newport News, VA his home. His scholarship is in effect as of the first of January for his last five quarters prior to graduation and commissioning as a second lieutenant in the United States Air Force. Mobley and Thompson, both residents of Thomasville, have received scholarships for their remaining eleven quarters of college work. They have already received leadership positions within the General Military (GMC) section of AFROTC. Both are scheduled to become Air Force pilots.

The three cadets were recently placed in national competition for the additional scholarships that were granted by Congress during ROTC legislation prior to the Christmas adjournment. The scholarships were awarded to these cadets on Thursday, 17th February.

Lieutenant Colonel Raymond F. Hamel, AFROTC Detachment Commander at Valdosta State College has stated that he is looking forward to more of the same for additional students who are currently being placed into competition for three year scholarships to become effective during the fall quarter. Three men and one woman are being entered in this national competition. "With the high school students currently competing for four year scholarships, and

planning on being at VSC next fall, our four candidates for three year scholarships, and our three cadets who have successfully achieved this goal I hope that we will have at least 10 cadets on scholarship contracts next year. This will prove beyond a shadow of a doubt, that there is some fine officer material at VSC, and that scholarships are not just a recruiting promise but a distinct reality for VSC cadets."

The establishment of AFROTC scholarships for Detachment 172 at VSC not only recognizes the potential of the cadets selected for this honor, but it serves to identify VSC as a significant source of military leadership. Additional scholarships grants will not only assist the recipients financially but they will also greatly enhance the image of VSC on the national level of scholastic competition.

"These scholarships show the confidence that the Air Force has in the cadets selected, and they also serve as a prod for

cadets to continue to seek greater academic excellence" said Hamel. "My goals are to seek scholarships for all my cadets, male and female, who exhibit the desire to excel as students and Air Force leaders, and to make the Air Force ROTC unit at VSC the best in the nation. Recognition of Cadets Wagner, Mobley and Thompson is just the beginning for attaining these goals."

VSC Students Offered Chance To Hear Dick Gregory Speak

On Monday, February 28, a group of fifty VSC students will be offered a chance to hear noted comedian and lecturer Dick Gregory speak at Albany State College said black student leader Robert Rease.

"A block of fifty seats will be reserved for VSC students at the Gregory lecture," Rease reported "and the Black Student League in conjunction with the SGA will be providing transportation for the crowd there and back." At least two cars will accompany the bus which has been chartered to handle the transportation problem, and the group is to leave the Hopper Hall parking lot around 7:30 a.m. to enable interested students to make the 9:30 a.m. lecture. All students interested in attending the lecture by this popular black activist are to contact the SGA office prior to Monday Morning and sign up for the trip. "Seats will be given on a first come first serve basis" said Rease.

The group is expected to arrive in Albany not later than 9:30 and return to Valdosta by Monday afternoon.

VSC Greeks Join In 1972 Valdosta Heart Fund Drive

Utilizing the slogan "Beat the Big One" the Greek organizations of Valdosta State College are joining together in a concerted effort to collect money for the Valdosta-Lowndes County Heart Fund Drive.

Mr. Frank Steel, retired vice-president of Southern Railway, has worked vigorously coordinating promotional efforts for the campaign which extends through this week and culminates on Sunday, February 27, 1972. Miss Leigh Pendleton and Mr. Ray Chitty are directing efforts for the VSC Panhellenic Association and Interfraternity

Council, respectively. There will be participation by all seven fraternities and five sororities giving a working labor force of over 550 Valdosta State men and women.

Although several organizations have already started combing shopping centers, the most directed time of collection will be this Sunday from 2 til 6 p.m. When asked how the city would be sectioned Mr. Chitty remarked "Valdosta will be divided into twelve areas. We are expecting a 100% turnout by the Greeks and we hope to reach

New Library Designed For Efficiency

"The new VSC library has been designed to offer a more convenient, relaxed and efficient atmosphere for individual students and groups of students," according to Miss Thera Hambrick, director of the Library. "There will be a more general arrangement of books and carrels."

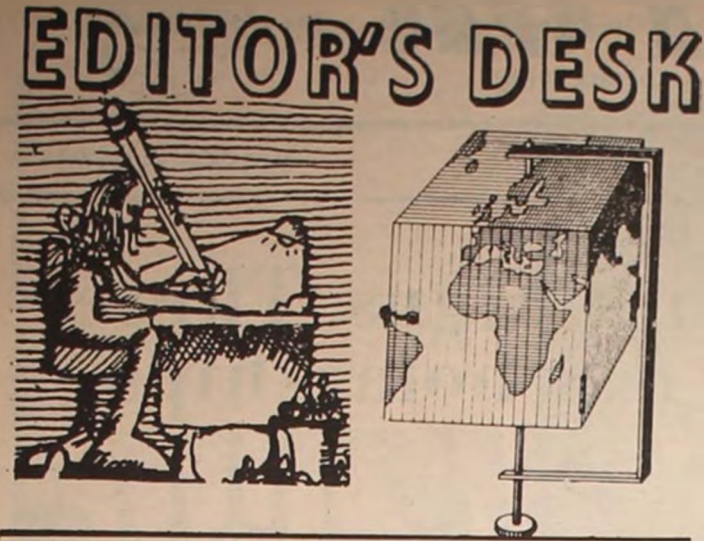
In the present library one main aisle leads to all specific areas. In the new building, students will go directly from the main lobby to designated areas. This system will provide less distraction in the study areas.

In addition to the 604 individual carrels, 10 group study rooms will be provided. Eight are on the upper floor and two are on the lower. These will accommodate more groups than the three study rooms now in use in the old facility. Availability for use will be on a first-come first-serve basis.

Study lounges are located on the Northwest corners of each floor. Each area has individual, table and lounge seating for 64 students, coat racks, rest rooms, and pay telephones. "These attractive informal areas provide readers a more relaxed atmosphere," said Miss Hambrick, pointing out that the present library has no study lounge."

One meeting room in the new library will seat 72 individuals.

In an era of environmental health, health foods and mental health it's only natural that there should be Health Music.

Music often has been used as a means toward health. For more than twenty years psychologists have used music as a tool in treatment of mentally handicapped patients. Opera is well-known for its Mad Scenes. And many songs—from Deutschland Über Alles to On, Wisconsin—have provoked an emotional reaction in their listeners. But now music is changing its tune.

Two new songwriters are writing creatively cathartic music as they revel and reveal through musically "meaningful" experiences.

It all began about five years ago with Arthur Janov's controversial Primal Scream therapy. Neurosis, Janov says, is frozen childhood pain. All neuroses are symptoms for releasing that Primal Pain, brought about by unfulfilling childhood experiences relating to parents. He points to a single cure: The neurotic person must dismantle his defense and return to where he made the decisions to act out expectations of others rather than his own feelings. Janov's theory is complex, but, briefly, the Primal patient must re live pain to remove the "curse" in order to understand his neurotic tensions. Naturally, Mother and Father are an integral part of the therapy. The Primal patient is urged to call out his parents and as he does so, the patient often begins screaming long and sorrowful sobs. This is the Primal Scream.

But now, Primal Scream Mothers and Fathers have found their way to the phonograph. Dr. Janov's best-known patient is John Lennon former Beatle. Lennon's latest two albums underscore his therapeutic involvements. In a song called "Mother," he musically writhes in pain screaming: "Mother, you had me, but I never had you/I wanted you, but you didn't want me. . . Good-byeee." He ends the album with a short and snappy song to the tune of Three Blind Mice: "My Mummy's dead/I can't get it through my head/I can't explain/so much pain/my Mummy's dead."

In his album, Lennon has creatively attempted to work out his Mother Thing, yelling at and for her at the beginning of the record . . . putting her to rest forever at the end. There is a blurred photograph of Lennon as a young boy on the album cover.

Dory Previn's music is of the same genre. When her husband Andre Previn, left her for Mia Farrow, Dory's psyche cracked. She was institutionalized. "While I was in the hospital," she said, "I started writing to get some order out of chaos. What I've tried to do is bring the madness out in the open." she's succeeded. Maybe

And she's succeeded. Maybe too well. Her three albums contain more Mad Songs than all opera combined. In one song, she relives her four-month long sanitarium experience. But mostly she sings about her parents.

"Damn you, Mother/how I hate you/you will never know how deep/I must cling till you release me/I could kill you in your sleep/I would smile to watch your life blood creep across your wretched hair yes, of course I love you, Mother/I'll never leave you. . . I swear."

But behind each element of Dory's madness is an element of sadness that passes through the listener's ears and straight to the heart.

This song is dedicated to her father: "The telephone rang/my sister calling/Dad is dead?/When did it happen?/Six a.m. she said/did he ask for me?/What did you say?/Never mind. . . God is kind."

Songs about parents have changed somewhat since the days of "I want a girl, just like the girl. . ."

Health Music affects the listener, too. It's easier to work out our own problems through someone else's efforts. And sing along.

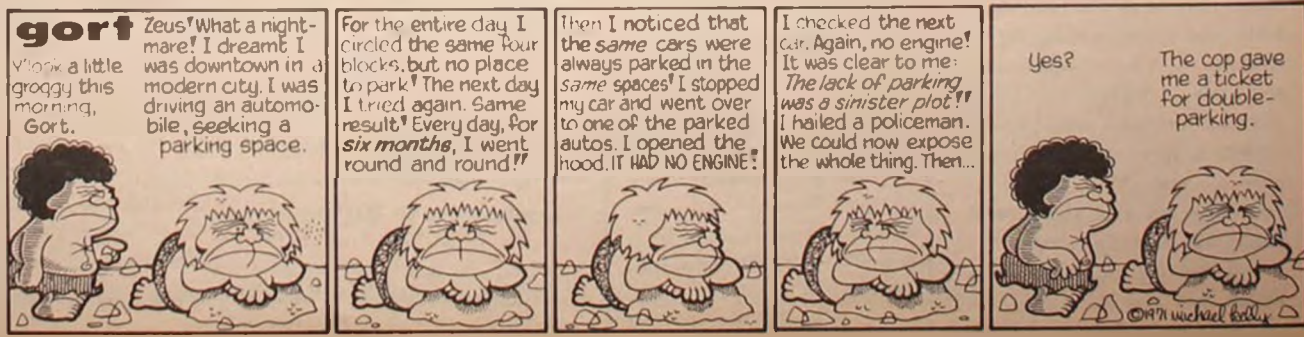

Sisson To Give Recital

An organ recital in memory of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Whitehead is to be presented by Ruth Sisson, assistant professor of organ at Valdosta State College, on February 28 in Whitehead Auditorium. The program, which is scheduled to begin at 8:15 p.m., is open to the public free of charge.

The Whiteheads, for many years neighbors, friends and benefactors of VSC gave the college \$80,000, 42-rank custom-made Moeller concert pipe organ in 1970. Mrs. Whitehead died this January. Mr. Whitehead, in 1971.

The auditorium which houses the organ was dedicated in April, 1970 as a memorial to the donor's parents Mr. and Mrs. W. Q. Whitehead of Emanuel County.

A year and a half in the making the organ was designed to fit the stage of Whitehead Auditorium, as well as the two rooms to the left and right of the stage as planned by the architect of the VSC Fine Arts Building.

To be featured in Miss Sisson's recital on Monday are selections from the Baroque era through the present day:

Boehm, Bach, Charles M. Widor, Erkki Salmenhaara, Sigfrid Karg-Elert, Jean Langlais and Leo Sowerby.

Also to be featured is a work by Flor Peeters, the contemporary Belgian composer who appeared in concert at VSC in November.

Miss Sisson joined the VSC music department in 1970.

A graduate of Oberlin Conservatory in Ohio, she received the master of music degree from Florida State University where she has also done doctoral work.

Prior to coming to Valdosta State, Miss Sisson served as full time organist and director of music for large churches at Manchester, N. H., St. Petersburg, Fla., and Thomasville, Ga. During the past year Miss Sisson has appeared in concert at VSC, Thomasville and Troy State University in Alabama.

ODK To Sponsor Bloodtyping

In an effort to stimulate interest in the Valdosta State College Blood Bank, Delta Kappa, a national honor society for men, will sponsor blood typing this Monday, February 28th, in the Faculty Lounge from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m.

A medical team from South Georgia Medical Center will administer the sampling to all students and faculty. If one already knows his type, he is urged to stop by the faculty lounge and leave this information with the representative.

Clifton Young, a member of the Valdosta State ODK chapter, stated "I believe that the program will be beneficial to all participants because of the great service provided." The only requirement for membership in the VSC Blood Bank is that each

registrant donate one pint per year.

There are several noteworthy benefits to be derived from membership. For example, if at anytime a member needs blood he will be free to draw from the VSC account the amount he needs. On the other hand, a non-member may pay as much as \$15 per pint. Although a non-member may draw from the VSC account, he is also required to replenish the stock at the ratio of two pints for every one borrowed.

Although the typing is Monday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., students and faculty can donate at their leisure. Needless to add, ODK does not receive any monetary reward for their efforts. The money that would ordinarily be received by the

donor will go toward improving medical facilities on the Valdosta State campus. Bubba Baggs and Terry Johnson are credited with developing the by laws of the blood bank that will serve as guidelines for its operation.

The direction of the Bank can best be summarized in Mr. Young's comment, "This endeavor is being done by and for the VSC college community. Its success depends on the amount of participation by this community."

Any members of Omicron Delta Kappa can answer questions relevant to the Blood Bank. Also, the South Georgia Medical team will be on campus Monday the 28th from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. to record blood types and secure samplings.

Transferring from Indiana State University following his freshman year Roger Fleetwood immediately established himself as 'Mr. Hustle' of the VSC Rebels. Next Tuesday night the curtain comes down on the Roger Fleetwood regular season show and another chapter of VSC basketball will be history. Appropriately rated Co-Captain of the Rebel squad for the 1971-72 basketball season the Nashville Indiana native feels that the goal of greatest importance for the VSC Rebs this year is "to make the playoffs and represent Valdosta State as best as possible."

Fleetwood has demonstrated throughout his past three seasons a specific design for dedication to the VSC basketball program. It would not be an understatement to say that his athletic role at VSC has been similar to that of John Havlic's role with the Boston Celtics—always ready to play an inspired game. When playing Fleetwood illustrates a burning spirit of desire to win and remain supreme.

As is common knowledge it is all too easy for a scholarship ball player to become complacent. Such a lackadaisical attitude is hardly the case of Captain Fleetwood. This season has been Roger's first on a full scholarship; and yet, he is enjoying his most productive year.

Although Roger is nearly 1500 points away from the all time VSC scoring record, he nevertheless is unmatched in his capacity to inspire to lead and of course to hustle. A typical Fleetwood play occurred last Saturday night in the Homecoming clash against LaGrange College. With only minutes left in the game and coupled with an unruly crowd standing and shouting and creating a very tense atmosphere, the poised Mr. Fleetwood shot from the top of the key to tie the game; and from there directed the offense and rallied the troops to their most exciting victory this year.

Next Tuesday night's contest with Oglethorpe will mark not only the termination of the Rebs' home season, but will also be recorded as the end of an era for Co-Captain Roger Fleetwood, VSC's "Mr. Hustle."

SOFTBALL: A REALITY

As of four weeks ago, any hope of playing intramural softball this spring look particularly dim. Several VSC administrators have informed this office of recent actions that now make the possibility of spring a reality.

Bob Sutton, President of the SGA, spoke at a recent Forward VSC committee meeting and alerted the committee members of the students' desires. Dean Andrew Bond, VSC Dean of Student Affairs, related that he has been given assurance by the city of Valdosta that VSC students would be able to use their facility if the fields now under construction on North Campus were not completed. Dr. Jay Arnold, Head of the VSC Physical Education Department, expressed hope that the North Campus fields would be furnished in time for the current softball season. A look to the future was also given by the P. E. head, "We hope to have the work on the North Campus softball fields completed by the Spring season. Over the summer these fields will receive close attention because we are planning to utilize them as intramural football fields next fall quarter. In addition to the two new facilities, we will continue to use the other field on North Campus; thus, there will be an overall improvement in our P. E. and intramural programs."

It is the belief here that the concern given this matter has proven a definite plus for the VSC sports situation, and hopefully, such concern will continue.

"And they had a ball," said Miss Wells, a soft-spoken, brown-eyed brunette who serves as graduate assistant to Director of Student Activities Ken Ferrell.

"We decided to schedule the Weekend on Campus at the same time as our third annual High School Bowl, which ran all day Saturday."

Remember the popular GE College Bowl, emceed by Allen Ludden and canceled several seasons ago? Teams of whizz kids from campuses across the nation competed with as much fervor as football teams. And, like football games, the College Bowl programs were aired on Saturday.

"Our VSC team was on the list to compete in the GE College Bowl when they canceled the show," Miss Wells

said. "About three years ago, we decided high school students might get as much fun out of such competition as we had, we initiated our annual High School Bowl."

The Lowndes High School team won last week's competition. Other schools competing were Jefferson County High School of Monticello, Atkinson County High School of Pearson, Thomasville High School and Central High School of Thomasville, Cairo High School,

Valdosta High School, Cook County High School of Adel, Turner County High School of Ashburn, Moultrie High School and Hamilton County High School of Jasper, Florida.

"The visiting students were eager to watch their teams compete, and some of the teams had quite large cheering sections," said Miss Wells.

"The competitions, done by double elimination, were going on all day long in all the meeting rooms of the College Union. But we planned plenty of other activities for the visitors, in case

their team was eliminated from the competition or if their school wasn't competing.

There were campus tours on an individual basis "because that's how you live on a campus," she said.

A number of colleges have revived the College Bowl idea on their own without benefit of TV cameras, according to Miss Wells, and the VSC team is currently in competition with Berry College.

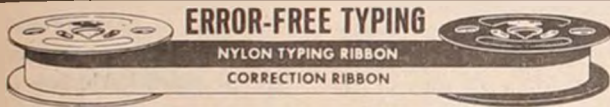
After the championship round, we all went to the dining hall for a banquet and the awards presentation," she said.
