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The Rowan Tree Church 20th Annual Report Hallows 2001 ce - Hallows 2002 ce



This is the 20th year that we have produced an Annual Report. The first one, published shortly after Hallows, 1983, included advice given me by a Priestess whom I admired. As one of my teachers and as the Priestess who conducted my Second and Third Degree Initiations, she had watched closely as I created The Tradition of Lothloriën. She said that it was very important that Lothloriën will survive beyond our lifetimes. Second, she said, to "make certain that those who come into our training are fully aware of how good a system of Wicca this is, how complete it is in the training one must have to complete all three degrees of Initiation. She was particularly impressed with the gentleness of our images and yet with the power they are capable of generating." How interesting to look back and see that today, twenty years later, we continue to hold these goals dear.

And where are we this year? We seem to be living in a different world. As I prepared last year's Annual Report our countries were still recovering from the shocking events of September 11th, a date which altered the course of world events. Political concerns today reflect a struggle between those eager to initiate a war which they believe essential to their goals and those who do not want such a war. A year ago, the wounds of New York and the Pentagon still raw and shrieking with pain, war seemed imminent and military defense against the terrorists was the 'patriotic' response.

Today we face a world in which the prospect of war seems to grow stronger and a harmonious world remains uncertain. World violence once again escalates. The recent terrorist event in Moscow is only a recent example. The Israelis and Palestinians seem no closer to resolving their mutual mayhem and political differences and as I write this on Hallows Day, Israel seems to be moving further to the political right. But the violence humans wage on this planet is not only against each other. The gorilla and elephant herds in Africa continue to be decimated. The oceans are continuing to warm, the precious realms of ice continue to melt and the future is uncertain. An Associated Press article published in today's morning paper reports that studies appearing today in the *Journal Science* indicate that as many as 83% of the plant species of the world in Ecuador are threatened and that 22-47% of "all of the Earth's plant species are in danger of becoming extinct."

For most peoples, uncertainty promotes an environment in which distrust of the unknown and fear of the potential perils brings us face to face with our beliefs. It is this question we must ask ourselves. Do we choose to believe that the goal of humans is to live harmoniously with each other? And do we choose to believe that the goal of humans is to live in balance with other species? Do we choose to believe that treating all species with respect is the only way to live? Certainly those beliefs are reflected

in the values of The Tradition of Lothloriën and in the words of its rituals. Lothloriën is our religion and it holds sacred the realm of plants, of plant devas, of all creatures. In this coming year we must embrace our religion and do our part to educate as many as we can to hold sacred the right to life of all species and bring under control the damaging ways by which the human species seeks to satisfy its own desires at the expense of other species.

This past year was one with some significant accomplishments, among them the culmination of twenty years' work toward full and complete recognition by the IRS as a Church. Our organization is very small and its geographically diverse membership which does not provide for itself a meeting place left the IRS uncertain about our classification. Prior to this final ruling we were considered tax exempt as a religious organization but were not legally perceived as a *church*. Does this affect us in any way legally or financially? Not at all, but it is a quiet, *moral* victory.

When we received the ruling, we were told that one issue we needed to address in written guidelines was, in their words, "the hiring and firing of clergy." As a consequence, this past year was one in which the discussion of standards and ethics predominated and the discussions continue. We have very high standards, but the Goddess reminds us to "keep pure our Highest Ideals."

At the same time we are contemplating ways in which the amount of work which is done might be diminished. For so few volunteers The Rowan Tree Church provides more services than what is reasonable. This coming year we will be looking at many of the ministries and activities within the Church as a whole to see how we might decrease the need for donations and for labor.

As the Wheel turns at Hallows we set aside but do not forget this past year. As we move forward, we look forward to the coming year's most important event: our IXX Annual Retreat. This will be held in Yellowstone National Park, possibly the one place upon our planet where it is easiest to grasp that our planet is very much alive.

It may be difficult for many of you to grasp the realities of love and trust which we do have within The Rowan Tree Church. Certainly we do not all like every character trait in every one else but we greatly look forward to being able to share time together. We urge you to please, make your plans and come join with us.

The Rowan Tree Church is more than an organization which manifests The Tradition of Lothloriën. The Rowan Tree Church is also a spiritual family.

COMMUNICATION FROM THE BOARD

President and Founder

The most rewarding news which came to the Board this year was the letter from the Internal Revenue Service indicating that my work was successful in bringing to The Rowan Tree Church full, legal recognition as a *Church*. We have long held legal status and protection as a religion but our non-traditional structure with Members scattered so far and wide made it difficult to meet the traditional standards.

My discussions with the IRS were fruitful. They also asked us to provide guidelines which would indicate circumstances and procedures by which a clergyperson might be asked to step down or, in a more dramatic turning of the phrase, to be 'fired.' While the concept seems far afield from our present-day reality, we can twice look into our past at times when we have had someone in a position of prominence within the Land of Lothlorien who began to

follow an ethical path other than that of our Tradition.

Along with the ensuing discussions to clarify the position of clergy person within a Community I recommended that the Board examine all positions and functions within the Church and bring some definition to the list. Following the recommendation of the IRS I recalled that we once did have a list of job descriptions for all "community positions" (as they were then called) but this had been completed when I still lived in Minneapolis. And I left Minneapolis 13 years ago. We were long overdue to revisit this project. We now have a "Task List" which helps everyone involved better understand what any volunteer must do as well as providing guidelines for making changes and remembering issues of accountability and responsibility.

The other significant topic before the Board involves finances, that ever-present topic which follows every organization like a shadow. Although the majority of our Church Members may think of the acre of land which was donated to the Church as someone else's responsibility, the reality is that issues of liability affect every Church Member. At present we cannot afford liability insurance. So far we've been lucky but at some point the cost of insurance must be provided by the Church's budget.

It has been, this past year, a great pleasure to work with this Board of Directors. I am currently providing guidance to another small organization, showing them how a Board of Directors is able to function, discuss issues and make decisions even when they are not limited by geographical boundaries. This system of monthly "meetings" (all done by printed material and mail) was first developed many years ago. On a shelf in the storage locker among the archives the date could undoubtedly be determined. I have kept copies of all publications, of all printed reports and Board of Directors' correspondence. I felt at the time that opening the Board to those who did not live in Minneapolis was essential if we were going to manifest Lothlorien as it should be. Our current Board includes wonderful individuals living in California, Colorado, Illinois, Nebraska, Ontario, and Washington.

It is easy to think of the Rowan Tree as "them" and as "there" but the only boundaries which separate you from active involvement are those created of your own life. Not everyone has time nor even inclination, but we are working to be there for you and, should you wish to become involved with us, you will be welcomed.

On behalf of all of those in positions of responsibility, I extend blessings.

THE MYSTERY SCHOOL



Life within The Mystery School is a source of constant wonder. Participating in the excitement of a new Novice Supplicant entering The Mystery School is an inspiration. The other side of this is seeing someone take leave after many joys and tears, many Circles and hours of conversation. "Each of us has our own timing" is from *The Admonition* but even so, this wisdom may not exempt one from a sense of loss when a dear one departs.

Every year within The Mystery School we consult an Oracle through The Tarot Ritual. This year was the 20th time we have embraced this profound Mystery. We were advised to look deep within ourselves, to question our commitment to The Tradition of Lothloriën and to examine our relationship with our goals and our future. And so we have.

Of the new students admitted to The Mystery School, several spread their wings, dipped their pens into the work of the written Book of Shadows and undertook the first steps of the Pathworking within the inner Mysteries of The Tradition of Lothloriën. As happens every year, some discover that their expectations of work within The Mystery School are different than what would best suit their lives and some discover Lothloriën to be a Path to which they wish to continue devoting their spiritual work.

This year is marked by several events. Ron Weroski, who had been on a sabbatical for several years, had begun his recovery and begun to take on responsibilities.

Although it had been hoped that he might be able to resume his duties and fulfill the role of ordained clergyman of Lothloriën, he found that his path to self-empowerment has led him elsewhere. We accepted his resignation and wish him strength and a joyful future as he embarks upon a new direction.

Although unsettled at Ron's departure, we also celebrate the ritual Dedication of a new student, one who has worked hard toward that goal. We extend vigorous congratulations to three Novices each of whom has successfully completed the hard work of the First Ordeal - the first half of the body of work one must accomplish toward one's first Initiation. And, with that goal in mind, we anticipate a First Degree Initiation this coming year. There are many joyful changes taking place.

Through this past year's evolution we find that we are, collectively, more focused and more committed. There is a strong sense of community among the novices and initiates, bonds which continue to evolve and grow. There are many who fantasize about entering The Mystery School, in part because the poetic written Tradition appeals to them. For some it is a desire to be perceived as part of an elite, a way to empower one's self. For some the work within The Mystery School is considered one way to attain credentials and be able to promote one's self as worthy of recognition by one's peers.

The reality, however, is that the Path of Lothloriën is one which is a life-long journey leading to a deep and profound wisdom. If we count the work which lies before us in many lives, it is a Wiccan path toward enlightenment, yet our love for our planet and our sense of duty toward our fellow creatures (plant, creature, mineral and human) is one we hope will bring us back again to Mother Earth in service to Her and Her children. We believe that it is a good thing we have many lives in which to become perfect.

The Bardic Path

We expect a little dust and clutter as the Bardic Path undergoes renovation. This will be a major reworking of the work required of a student. It was perhaps 15 years ago that a wise Bard and I discussed the creation of the Bardic path as a complement to the academic studies which lead to ordination. When the 'program' had been completed I was slightly unsettled to see that little had been changed other than the addition of creative exercises to the academic assignments. The new changes will allow a student to become a Bard in the true sense. To those who are part of the Church Membership, you will probably see none of the dust and construction and a new student in the Bardic Program will see only what is new. For those of us in the inner circle of laborers it is very exciting and very profound but, like all 'trees,' it will take time.

Work is under way, at the recommendation of the IRS, to answer their question of what guidelines we offer regarding the "hiring and firing of clergy." In a small organization, one which requires exceptionally demanding ethics, this has not been a great concern in past years. We are, however, clarifying the responsibilities and ethics of Second Degree Initiates (our clergy) and it has proven to be a most valuable process. This has become the work of providing information about expectations which are complimentary to the Highest Ideals and consistent with the ethics and practices of The Tradition of Lothloriën.

We know, historically, that there have already been times when someone who was loved and trusted took a different fork in the road. Twice those decisions involved the use of illegal substances. If we are pragmatic, we know that we cannot guarantee the actions of any future Initiate and are now looking at guidelines for the Book of Shadows which will further shape the future of Lothloriën for the coming centuries. This is very important work and is presently in the hands of the Council of Elder(s).

That project, which included asking the Board of Directors for their opinions, has led to other evaluations which will benefit students and will also enhance the manifestation of Lothloriën for all Church Members.

The Council of Elder(s) is now working to improve the Orals which are taken prior to each level of Initiation. Examples of this include questions which evaluate:

community service and awareness of Church publications and history. We feel that it is important for an Initiate to not only be a role model of the spiritual 'knowledge' but to also be a role model as a 'citizen' of Lothlorien.

It is incomprehensible for me to sit back and realize that I have been working for the future of Lothlorien for over 25 years. I know that I have more work to do before it is my privilege to become compost. The work is not always fun, but it does always lead to growth, to further wisdom, and it brings the most comforting sense of fulfillment.

My work is not yet done yet you have my assurance that I will continue this work.

The Land Fund is mandated by our Book of Legislation, accumulating monies which will eventually be used to purchase an acreage of sacred land within the reaches of the Upper Mississippi.

The Land Fund is supported by Member donations, by a percentage of ritual and book sales.

In addition to the money in the checking account, in July 1999 we began to place these holdings into Certificates of Deposit. The total invested is \$7,551.67. To date this money has earned \$766.87 in interest.

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The Subscription Library

The Subscription Library is always slowly and carefully expanding. New books, donated primarily by The Unicorn and The Hermit's Grove, have been added to the library catalog. Great news is that Suzanne T. has joined the ranks of the volunteers September 30th and began helping in the library on an every-other-Monday basis.

The card catalog project is currently in storage. Local use determines the need for a card catalog and we had neither a volunteer nor do we have space for the card files. Library use by local Members is low despite our having tried "library days" when Members could look through the shelves and check out books. We may try this again in the coming year.

Work on compiling synopses of the books continues, although at present the synopses are being written more slowly than new titles are being added to the library. And yet it is a worthy project, the work being done is something which does not have to provide immediate gratification but which can bear fruit further down the path.

The Subscription Library continues to be under-utilized. Few Members have any idea of the wide range of titles which are available, including a large number of out-of-print books... The interior of the Beyerls' home is dominated by the library. It covers three walls in the main temple (front room), much of the hallway and one wall in the classroom. Painting behind the shelves began last year and will take another year before it's completed, as Rev. Paul is working to paint the interior of their cottage in his free time. We are hoping to have assistance this year in keeping the shelving and the books cleaned.

It is essential to any organization which seeks to provide education for future generations to maintain a worthwhile library. Today, upon the first steps of the 21st century, we live in a golden age in which most homes in North America contain an abundance of books. I believe there must be more titles in print world-wide today than at any previous time. Will this continue? It is unlikely given the unwillingness of most humans upon this globe to make the essential changes which might preserve life for so many species.

It is our belief that our library is a treasure, one which may be valued beyond your belief when future generations study and research all of the subjects needed in order to become the future Bards and Mentors of our beloved Tradition of Lothlorien.

The "really big news" this past year has been having Jason Hauser arrive to begin training as the Assistant General Manager. It was not until mid-September that a workable printer able to handle some of the tasks was able to be arranged. As we moved into Autumn, we are now looking at a winter schedule so that Jason can take on some of the work which has, for many years, been mine to do (often by default).

Although Jason's presence will make a great difference, another volunteer or two would be helpful. We do not have anyone to bind the spiral-bound books and keep them stocked and this would be a useful task.

This past year it became necessary to replace the Secretary's computer. This is the only computer which the Church owns (the other two are provided by Rev. Paul personally and through The Hermit's Grove which is a separate organization, both legally and financially).

Last year our total computer expense (for minor maintenance, program upgrades and the like) was \$179.26. As any organization would quickly note, this is a very

small amount and not very realist. Because your Church operates on less than a shoe string this year reality came to visit. The Secretary had been using Rev. Paul's old computer, one so old it had not been possible to replace the printer when it died. That computer was nine years old - neolithic in computer years. How hard did reality knock when it came to visit? The cost this year was \$1,359.34. The sticker shock could be avoided in the future if your Rowan Tree had a better base of support and could set aside \$30.00 a month into a computer budget but, alas, much of the time it just barely gets its bills paid. A small organization like this is usually hard-pressed when it comes to meeting expenses yet, just like the government, there is always a desire for an increase in services, particularly those which arrive at no cost to the participants. Meanwhile, the budget is turning increasingly red.

As you can tell, the most difficult aspect of this position is simply getting the bills paid and encouraging the Board to help the Members understand the "so below" aspects of Rowan Tree reality. And so, how have things gone and how will they this coming year? I am, generally, managing, pun in hand.

Prisoner Outreach Program

The Prisoner Outreach Program has grown and has once reached its capacity of 30 but quickly dropped back down into the mid-20s where it seems to stay. We average 27 prisoners.

Those prisoners who remain with the program consistently report that it has made a significant change in their lives. This year we began to see the first prisoners released. Of these a couple have sought Membership in The Rowan Tree Church. When space permits, brief excerpts are included in *The Rowan Tree News*. This past year we saw some prisoners step forward and make financial donations well beyond the average. Several made significant

donations which totalled just over sixty dollars toward the cost of replacing the computer. In addition, over \$75.00 was donated to guarantee that the costs incurred by the Prisoner Outreach Program so not create any burden upon the Church's general budget. With the prisoners demonstrating this degree of responsibility, we can report that this year the program has been self-supporting in costs.

The printing for the stamp barter materials (rituals and books which have been reformatted and condensed so as to take as few pages as possible) continues to be done at my desk, holding the cost significantly lower than having it done at a professional service, although it adds to the wear and tear of the laser printer. Recently Jason began processing incoming requests for information to which we respond by sending a flyer.

THE HERMIT'S GROVE

Although there are changes such as the evolution of the gardens and the property which comprises The Hermit's Grove, there are few within The Hermit's Grove as an organization. Jason Hauser's goal is to become an assistant director but at present his primary work has been for The Rowan Tree Church and his "Grove" time has been spent attending classes, working in the gardens and learning how to assist with filling the occasional mail order. And the latter work has been a great blessing. Jason has brought exuberance and a willingness to work hard in the gardens. During the summer months his schedule allowed him many days to learn his way around the many beds and the devas were blessed with his spirit.

The gardens have seen wonderful expansion. In previous years we often spent time putting in a new garden, spading up the old turf and knocking loose the rich soil. The sod heads to the compost mound and the remaining soil is turned deep. By this year there were no longer any places for new gardens but there remained stretches of grass. Ever narrowing, mowing no longer took so many hours, but now we've set out sights on the finish. It is quite possible to visualize how the gardens will look when the only grass areas are the few which will remain: the Dancing Circle, the grass along our neighbor's yard, and the grass in front of the house which will remain until after the city runs a sewer line to which we'll connect.

As the gardens expand and the pattern of the paths to walk has grown more profound. Those who come here for spiritual renewal find walking the paths a healing experience. The Stone Circle has become a place where we now have a number of glass (paperweight-style so as to survive the elements) and brass unicorns providing healing for the soul. We continue to add stones from many places around the world so that the Stone Circle allows us to contribute to world unity and peace.

The gardens are 'heaven' for us. But there is still the reality of the nuts and bolts and of paying bills.

The Hermit's Grove has experienced some financial pressure in its goal of assisting your Church. In 2001 the Hermit's Grove spent \$3200.00 to replace the computer I use (the used one I acquired as a gift two years prior simply died of old age) and handle all of the software upgrades, in addition to other maintenance work. For Rowan Tree Members who may think otherwise, none of that cost was borne by the church even though perhaps half of the work done on the computer is church-related. At the time I avoided panic and managed to get it paid for, believing that was the end of major computer expense for the time being.

This year, the unexpected death of the computer in the classroom meant an additional \$1100.00 and then another thousand dollars because my laser printer wore out (you

cannot imagine how hard these small computer systems and printers must work for all of us!). Rather than shutting everything down for ten days, I bought a replacement printer and the afflicted Hewlett Packard was sent to the clinic. It returned, quite rejuvenated, \$200.00 and ten days later and offers a promising future. The Mystery School had indicated that the Tower Card was this year's pattern. It did turn up in computer land for us, but such things can be managed.

Cost saving meant mailing the *Grove Gazette* only twice. This is the bulk mailing sent to the 450 people on the Washington State (mostly Puget Sound) mailing list to promote events and classes for both the Rowan Tree Church and Hermit's Grove. It was also necessary to raise prices for our bulk herbs, for the 'herb shop' is far too effective as a not-for-profit enterprise. Prices are set low enough that even now we're pretty much just breaking even.

Enrollment in the Master Herbalist program has expanded. The program is advanced, comparable to college-level work and more work and challenging than many new students expect, despite our attempts to explain the challenge.

This year's Garden Intern program was a success. We had nine students sign up in March and April, and four completed the program. And this autumn I will be offering a course which looks at the Mysteries of astrology. This is not chart-reading work nor the nature of horoscopes, but is astrology as understood by mystics, alchemists and those who use astrology to understand the nature of divinity. This course is offered once every six or seven years.

The herbal monographs - nearly 200 of them, had their most current revision completed this summer. It's a huge task, one which can only be worked by someone who has completed the Master Herbalist program. The next round of revisions will begin later this autumn, and include appending new information found in such texts as *Native American Ethnobotany*, *Rational Phytotherapy*, and contemporary books on Chinese herbal pharmacology and Ayurvedic medicine.

Back to the business aspects of The Hermit's Grove. Where does The Hermit's Grove find its income? It is all directly related to my professional work. Every penny generated from the classes I teach (including those at the Community Colleges), from herb sales, subscriptions to *The Hermit's Lantern*, books sold, etc. goes directly into The Hermit's Grove. My work has provided The Hermit's Grove with about \$20,000 a year (before expenses). And, as a nonprofit organization, the expenses require nearly every dollar of income, including the money spent to keep books like *A Wiccan Bardo, Revisited* in print (which required \$2500.00 this summer), purchasing the herbs which are sold, etc.

The mission of The Hermit's Grove is to provide the resources and educational needs which are required by those seeking credentials within The Mystery School of Lothlorien. In addition to studying the Mysteries of Lothlorien, additional knowledge requires the study of gem magick, astrology, tarot and other studies, not the least of which is one's relationship with the Goddess through the earth, the soil, the gardens and the healing herbes.

Although my work with The Hermit's Grove is to produce income, my greater work is to engender knowledge. Those working toward Ordination will, in future years, walk the pattern of paths among the gardens. It is along these paths, within certain trees, shared by certain herbal species, sung by certain fruits, that much of the unspoken wisdom of Lothlorien and much of the Oral Tradition of the history of Lothlorien is being held sacred for future generations.

Send us a stone. We'll happily send you one which the gardens have held sacred for thousands of years since the last passing glacier dropped behind some of her collection. The gardens are a manifestation of Lothlorien just as are our Books of Shadows. You can create a physical bond to the ritual magick of the Dancing Circle and Stone Circles.

Dir of the Hermit's Grove I'm learning how to not only care for the acre and third of land but am also getting a sense of the scope and variety of classes that are taught through The Hermit's Grove. I've had great fun learning and working with the interns which met on every Saturday for the Garden Intern Program, and am working towards taking over more responsibility in being able to guide the interns in their Garden activities. There is also an ongoing Master Herbalist discussion class that meets weekly. It's been great to talk to the individuals who have completed the course. I have also had the pleasure to attend a garden party at one of the Master Herbalist's home and appreciate the wonder that she has created there. I've learned so much already about taking care of plants in general as well as the specific species that inhabit The Hermit's Grove.
