Symphony Guild celebrates record season

VALDOSTA — Valdosta Symphony Guild recently celebrated record attendance of 2,346 for 2012-13 youth orchestra programs at the annual luncheon.

During the Valdosta Country Club event, eight new members were introduced and recently elected officers were installed, with retiring President Patricia Vigerstol handing over the baton to Marian Belanger, 2013-14 season president.

The luncheon celebrated the Guild's successful fundraising efforts for 2012-13.

In her speech, Vigerstol outlined the fact that youth concerts this season had a record attendance of 1,926 and that attendance at all Guild-supported youth programs during the year was 2,346. This demonstrates just how many young people in Valdosta and surrounding communities are touched by the Guild youth programs.

Vigerstol presented the Guild's annual gift to the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra in the amount of \$50,000. Those present to accept were John Crawford, University Advancement vice president and CEO of VSU Foundation; Dr. John Gaston, College of the Arts dean; Dr. Doug Farwell, interim head, VSU Music Department, and executive director of the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra; and Dr. Howard Hsu, music director of the

Vigerstol also presented a check to the Valdosta Symphony Guild Endowment Fund in the amount of \$10,000 which was established this year to benefit the orchestra in the future.

The Guild then honored and thanked Gaston, retiring dean of the College of the Arts, for his excellent commitment and support over the years.

In her first remarks, newly installed President Marian Belanger gave a preview of the upcoming season for the Guild and the Orchestra and outlined programs, events and fundraisers planned for the year.

Belanger said, "The VSO will begin the new season with a schedule of exciting and unique concerts. We will experience a wide spectrum of music from the avant garde 'APPS' to the traditional 'Amadeus."

This is a reference to two of the orchestra's five scheduled concerts for the 2013-14 season: the U.S. premiere of Ned Mc-Gowan's inspired Concerto for iPad, with Keiko Shichijo as soloist and Tchaikovsky's magnificent Fifth Symphony, with Shannon Lowe as soloist.

Belanger thanked the Guild for their hard work and support and ended the luncheon with the presentation of a gift of appreciation to Vigerstol.





VALDOSTA — Through music, the South Georgia String Project has broadened horizons for many regional youngsters. Now, with international students assisting in its programs, the project can give youngsters insight into other cultures and the world.

The South Georgia String Project offers students the opportunity to learn how to read music and play a stringed instrument, while providing these music lessons at affordable rates.

Partnered by VSU Music and the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra, the South Georgia String Project is part of a rare program as a member of the American String Teachers Association National String Project Consortium. The South Georgia String Project is one of only a few dozen such programs throughout the United States.

New sessions begin Monday, Sept. 9, with registration till available.

Lauren Burns directs the South Georgia String Project. She will be joined by a new conductor for the Valdosta Symphony Youth Orchestra.

Charles Jeong is from South Korea. Since moving from Seoul, he has been in the States for five years. In addition to Valdosta, Jeong has spent time in California, Washington State, and Chattanooga, Tenn.

There are also three teachers from Brazil, three from Honduras, and one from Ecuador, as well as VSU students from Georgia and Florida, Burns says.

Valdosta Symphony opens with an iPad Concerto

VALDOSTA — The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra plans to turn people's perceptions of what they expect from an orchestra on its head this coming week.

People often consider an orchestra to be a group of musicians playing ancient, classical music, on traditional, non-electric instrument. Though far more musically appealing than that sentence sounds, it is the basic truth of a symphony orches-

Enter the husband-and-wife team of composer Ned McGowan and soloist Keiko Shichijo . Shichijo will perform the U.S. premiere of McGowan's Concerto for iPad and Orchestra Saturday night with the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra.

That's right. The cutting edge technology of the tablet leads the timeless music of the orchestra. Meanwhile, McGowan's work imbues modern technology with a soul

While it may sound novel, composers have long taken advantage of technological advances, McGowan says.

"Electronics and computers have a long history and future in music among composers," he says

However, with exception of a few chamber pieces, "it is quite scarce in the classical/new music scenes," McGowan says of his iPad concerto. But he was inspired by the possibilities.

"The aspect that excited me to compose for the iPad was its combination of visible gestures with many new possibilities to create music within Apps," he


As for what audiences can expect, McGowan says, "You can expect the soloist to play the iPad in front of the orchestra, just as if it was a piano or violin concerto. Also, throughout the performance, there are projections on a large screen behind the orchestra of the iPad being played and its screen output so that the audience can see what the soloist sees—'a peek inside the kitchen, so to speak."

The American-Dutch composer has won numerous awards for his music's "rhythmic vitality and surprising forms and are performed regularly in halls and festivals all over the world," according to a short biography provided by the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra.

"A pioneer composer of new directions, he has also written the world's first concerto for Contrabass Flute and Orchestra

and created a new form for projected photography and music, together with Canadian photographer Edward Burtynsky."

This concerto is McGowan's first for iPad.

"Typically, I am a traditional pencil-and-paper type composer working with acoustic instruments. When a violin just draws the bow along the string or a clarinetist plays a note, it just works. There is beauty of sound and human expression," Mc-Gowan says.





VSO concert features Mozart works

VALDOSTA - While Valdosta Symphony Or-chestra audiences may be surprised this weekend to hear a Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart concerto for bassoon, Dr. Shannon Lowe knows the music well.

The VSO's principal bassoonist has been familiar with it since her middle lar with it since her middle school years and she may be the only bassoonist to perform the work at more than 30,000 feet in the air. was on my way back from a
doctoral studies audition at
the Mozart ready to go for the Mozart ready to go for performance — it was one of my audition pieces! The flight attendants saw me carrying an oddly shaped instrument case on my back and got me talking about being a bassoonist. They had never heard a bassoon before, so they insisted that I play for everybody to expose them to the instrument." This weekend, she will be on a more familiar stage as Lowe is the featured soloist for the VSO's "An Evening with Amadeus,"
Which features all Mozart music: Bassoon Concerto



Valdosta show dances into 41st holiday season

VALDOSTA — Only one time, one year since 1972, has Linda C. Chase not presented her local Dance Arts Inc. production of "The Nutcracker."

It was a holiday season in the 1980s, when Mathis City Auditorium was undergoing renovations.

At the time of the absent show, Dance Arts' "Nutcracker" was only about a decade old, which was still long enough for it to have become a local tradition.

"For me, there was definitely something missing, but I think many people felt that way, the performers, the audiences, everywhere that year, there was a feeling that something was missing," Chase has recalled in past interviews.

But this year, the 41st year of the performance playing next weekend, "The Nutcracker" continues what may be the production's newest tradition: The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra returns for the fourth year to provide live music.

Dance Arts originally partnered with the VSO to commemorate Valdosta's sesquicentennial celebration.

The idea of the partnership began in 2009, when the orchestra's Doug Farwell approached Chase about backing the popular holiday dance with live musicians. Such a collaboration makes sense. "The Nutcracker" features the famed classical score by Russian composer Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky.

Making the leap required additional preparations.

Dance Arts traditionally used recorded music, allowing Chase to make all of the calls on moves and more. With the addition of the orchestra under the direction of Conductor Howard Hsu, both Dance Arts and the orchestra have had to collaborate on the production. Even causing a major shift in the rehearsal tradition. In the past, Chase has rehearsed each scene separately. The show never had a full begining-to-end run-through until the opening performance before an audience

With the orchestra participating, the production now has a full rehearsal prior to the opening performance.

Nonetheless, as long-time fans realize, the show remains the

In 1972, Chase put into effect her long-held dream of presenting a full-length production of

ing a full-length production of "The Nutcracker." With help from Dave Christian, then the head of Valdosta's Department of Parks and Recreation, she presented her choreography and students in the first production that same year.

To give a little historical framework, Dance Arts' first "Nutcracker" hit the stage in the weeks after President Richard Nixon was re-elected to his second term, and it was presented months before the term "Watergate" became a household word.

Dance Arts' "Nutcracker" has continued through eight presidents and the popularity of the dance shows no sign of flagging.

Partly, its success rests on the timeless nature of the original work. Russian composer Pjtor Ilyich Tchaikovsky based his score on E.T.A. Hoffmann's story,

"Der Nusscrackern und der MauseKoing," a tale of a young girl's Christmas Eve gift of a nutcracker soldier and her dreams of their adventures.

On Dec. 18, 1892, Tchaikovsky's work as a ballet premiered at the Maryinski Theatre, St. Petersburg, Russia.

Valdosta's "Nutcracker" features the choreography of Chase, who studied dance in the legendary Ballanchine format in New York and highlights the talents of dozens of local residents.



Double timpani work leads Valdosta Symphony concert

VALDOSTA - To discuss the upcoming Valdosta Symphony Orchestra concert featuring composer James Oliverio's "Dynasty Double Timpani Concerto," one may first want to know that the percussion instrument can be correctly spelled either as 'timpani" or "tympani."

A person who plays the impani is a timpanist. Timpani is the only percussion instrument that must be tuned.

Timpani have a tonal interaction with other instruments that differs from other percussions.

Good things to know but not necessary to enjoy the rare treat of seeing and hearing two timpanists perform one of only two pieces ever composed for double timpani.

Valdosta Symphony's "Voyage of the Imagination" concert this weekend features VSO principal

timpanist David Morris with guest artist Atlanta Symphony principal timpanist Mark Yancich.

"There are only two double timpani concerti in existence," Morris says. "Another one was written 10 years ago by the American composer Philip Glass. Mark and I played that concerto with Macon Symphony and the Albany Symphony. Jim Oliverio, the composer of the Dynasty double concerto that we are playing here, wrote an

encore for us for the Glass. That encore actually became the third movement of the Dynasty Concerto."

Not only is a double timpani composition rare, so is the performance of these pieces.

Morris, Yancich, and Yancich's brother, Paul, are the only timpanists in the world to have performed both the Glass and the Oliverio compositions. The Oliverio piece was

composed specifically for the Yancich brothers, the only brothers in the world to hold principal timpanist positions in two major orchestras simultaneously.

During a 35-year period, Morris and Mark Yancich have collaborated many times. Together, they rehearsed the Oliverio work on three occasions last fall with former VSO conductor and founder Robert Welch coaching the timpanists. They have performed together on the Glass composition on several occasions as well as the VSO performance of the Sonata for Two Pianos and Percussion. Morris sits in for Yancich occasionally as substitute timpanist and has worked as second timpanist with him with the Atlanta Symphony. They performed together on the Grammy Awardwinning recording of the Berlioz Requiem.

For the Oliverio concerto, audiences can expect to hear more than just two timpanists "drumming around."

The timpani are complemented by the subtle interaction of two harps throughout the concerto.

'Following a very dramatic timpani-like first movement, the second movement is a beautiful Debussy-like movement that explores textures between the timpani and harps and passes the primary melodic material to the timpani. This is an interesting feature, because timpani rarely get to play the melodies. The third movement is without the orchestra, so the timpanists play a solo duet that involves chord progressions and melodies that stand on their own with no orchestral support. The fourth movement starts off with a nostalgic horn call recalling and revering all our musical ancestors who have developed our art form to the present day. The last movement is a real tour de force for both players interacting with the orchestra, culminating in two short cadenzas that are exciting and entertaining."

For Morris, the timpani has long been exciting and entertaining.

As a fifth-grader, David Morris began playing drums. After hearing the Beatles, he created a homemade drum set from boxes. His parents finally bought him a drum set a few years later when Morris was a high school sophomore. As a junior, he joined the school band to learn to read music. He played concert percussion and with the school jazz band. He still describes the drum set as his "original love."

In college, Morris' teacher was an orchestral player. Morris traded the drum set for melodic percussion and the snare

drum. "When I saw the timpani, I gravitated there because it was the closest to the drum set of the percussion family," he says. "When playing timpani in an orchestra, I still feel like the drummer in a big band, to some degree. Once I had lessons on timpani, I was hooked and it became my primary interest, professionally. The timpani speak to me because of their structural function in orchestra music.'

In addition to the Oliverio work, the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra will perform Liadov's "The Enchanted Lake," Strauss' "Der Rosenkavalier Concert Suite," Respighi's "Fountains of Rome."



I was born in Odessa, Texas, and grew up in New Orleans, Louisiana. I started playing the trumpet in seventh grade, but it wasn't until my junior year of college that I decided to try to become a professional musician. (I had gone to college to major in physics.) I came to VSU in 1986 and played in the VSO from its inception in 1990 until 2013. My "after dinner" interests include languages, history, and sciences.

Some of my favorite works in the orchestral repertoire are those by Mozart, Brahms, Stravinsky, and Prokofiev. Some of the pieces I have most enjoyed playing are Mahler's Symphony No. 2, Stravinsky's Pulcinella and Petrushka Suites, and Janacek's Sinfonietta (with the VSO), and Mahler's Symphony No. 6 and Bartok's Concerto for Orchestra (at the Cincinnati College-Conservatory). Other cherished experiences were playing in Dunc's Honkey Tonks Dixieland band in New Orleans and playing in the first all-college band at Disneyworld.

Taken as a whole my most memorable musical experience by far has been my tenure with the VSO. To play principal trumpet in an orchestra of musicians and human beings of the caliber of those of the VSO is a privilege granted to very few people. With every VSO concert Titletown USA wins a championship of a different kind, and I am very proud to have contributed to that tradition.

Alasdair Neale is Music Director of the Sun Valley Summer Symphony (SVSS), Music Director of the Marin Symphony, and Principal Guest Conductor of The San Francisco Conservatory of Music. nineteen years as Music Director of the SVSS, Mr. Neale has propelled this festival to national status: it is now the largest privately funded free admission symphony America. Among the many celebrated guest artists that Mr. Neale has brought to this festival are: Emanuel Ax, Joshua Bell, Christine Brewer, Nathan Gunn, Horacio

Gutierrez, Thomas Hampson, Lynn Harrell, Midori, Itzhak Perlman, Gil Jean-Yves Thibaudet, Deborah Voigt, Frederica von Stade, Yuja Wang and the Mormon Tabernacle Choir.

Mr. Neale's appointment with the Marin Symphony followed 12 years as Associate Conductor of the San Francisco Symphony and Music Director of the San Francisco Symphony Youth Orchestra. During that time he conducted both orchestras in hundreds of critically acclaimed concerts both here and abroad. In 1999, he substituted for an ailing Michael Tilson Thomas, conducting the San Francisco Symphony in widely praised performances of Mahler's Fifth Symphony in Germany. Under Mr. Neale's direction, the Youth Orchestra became one of the finest young ensembles in the world, receiving consistent rave reviews performances in San Francisco, as well as on tour in Amsterdam, Leipzig, Moscow, St. Petersburg, Madrid, Paris, Prague, Dublin, Copenhagen, and Vienna.

Meet the VSO:

This is the latest of a series of interviews with members of the VSO. Meet Paul Campiglia, the VSO's Principal Percussionist and percussion instructor at VSU.

Q. Why did you know you wanted to be a professional musician?

A. I grew up in a very musical home. My mom taught piano and would sing in church and community groups. She was also a Girl Scout leader. My dad was not the best singer in church... but could be the loudest (Joyful noise). He loved all kinds of music and helped me experience it all from Joplin to Wagner and "Danny Boy" to "Take Five." He loved Opera! We had an old Victrola and he would put on 78 rpms to share Wagner. His favorite radio shows were A Prairie Home Companion and A Friday with Frank Sinatra...that tells you something! I guess I was just around music all of the time. I grew up in South Jersey so the Philadelphia Orchestra was a 25 minute train ride away and I experienced many jazz and world music performances at the African-American Museum in Philly as well.

Q. How did you start playing your instrument?

A. I think it was Right – Left... just kidding – NOT. I started with guitar and clarinet, but was introduced to many great drummers through music in the late 70's and 80's (Neil Peart, Phil Collins and Bill Bruford). A friend of mine named Chris Champaglia (yep, that's the spelling) gave me a pair of sticks and Al Ipri's phone number. Al taught me about the great drum educators such as Charlie Wilcoxon and George Lawrence Stone! Things really continued to build from his inspiration, and even when I started studying music on the college level I kept taking private lessons with him.

Q. Where are you from?

A. I was raised in Voorhees, NJ but was born in Philly. My folks grew up in South Philadelphia and my mom's doctor was there. When my mom went into labor my dad escorted her to our Red

Volkswagen Bus (I was the last of 6) and drove her into center city Philadelphia!!

Q. When did you join VSU and the VSO?

A. I have been teaching and performing here since January of 1994. Almost 20 years now.

Q. Who are your favorite composers and what are your favorite works?

A. Bartok Sonata for Two Pianos and Percussion and Prokofiev Alexander Nevsky. I have to give a shout out to Gabes (Peter Gabriel) as well with Genesis and as a solo artist.

Q. What works are on your "must perform" list that you have never played?


A. Maybe I will not comment here... I've played *lonization* three times and *L'Histoire du soldat* twice!!

Q. What was your favorite musical experience?

A. Meeting jazz drumming legend Joe Morello...and his seeingeye dog!

Q. What do you like to do when you are away from the stage? A. Spend time with family and attend their activities...mostly sporting events! And OF COURSE – Practice...





Howard's favorite recordings:

Prokofiev: Muti/Philadelphia - It has been years since I heard this recording (I had it on a cassette...), but I clearly remember a performance of blazing power and stunning playing to match.

Prokofiev: Slatkin/St. Louis - This work has long been a specialty of Slatkin's, and this recording informed the world that St. Louis had a world-class orchestra. On a weekend that Slatkin was guest conducting in San Francisco, he dropped in one morning and conducted the youth orchestra in rehearsals of the Prokofiev. What a fantastic experience it was for me to hear him work through this piece - I don't think those kids realized how lucky they were!










