

#### Valdosta Symphony Orchestra

Dr. James Plondke

The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra began its eighth season November 8 with a sold-out performance of the Brahms Requiem. The concert was repeated in Tifton the next afternoon. A part of the world-wide ret-

rospective of the composer's music in the centenary year of his death, the program featured the largest chorus in the VSO history. Five regional choral groups joined forces to comprise the Valdosta Symphony Chorus. Prominent in the large chorus was the Valdosta State University Concert Choir under the leadership of Dr. David Lee Johnson, who also soloed on the program.

In addition to the Brahms performance, the eighth season's "firsts' include convening the largest orchestra to appear on the Whitehead stage for a performance of Mahler's First Symphony

(May 9), presenting two of the orchestra's own artists as soloists (VSU faculty members, Drs. Elizabeth Goode and Larry Scully, March 14), and the presentation of a "Sweetheart Pops" concert for the community on Valentine's Day (February 14). Also a new venture for the VSO this season was "Candlelight Christmas," an elegant, intimate dinner and concert featuring artistic, traditional, and popular music of the season.

In its eight-year history the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra has attracted world-class soloists to perform with the orchestra. The VSO continues that tradition this season by bringing internationally acclaimed violinist, Sergiu Luca (January 24) and pianist Daniel Pollack (May 9) to campus for performances.

The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra contributes to Valdosta State's expanded role as a regional university for the state of Georgia.

"The VSO plays music, but it reflects the spirit and commitment of the community and area," suggested attorney Wade Coleman, president of the VSO Board of Directors.

"In the entire United States, the professional stature of the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra in a region like our-so distant from major metropolitan area-is highly unusual, perhaps unique", said VSO conductor James Plondke.

The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra is an important component of the academic program of the Department of Music. Its presence at the university allows students to study and perform repertoire central to musical traditions and development. Choral masterworks with orchestra, such as the Brahms Requiem, augment the education of voice students. The concerts provide all music students the opportunity to hear live

performances of musical styles and specific works that are a part of their academic studies. The orchestra also serves the general university student population by offering a cultural icon, the symphony orchestra, for all

to experience.

As a part of its educational outreach, the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra presents a Youth Concert Series. These programs, sponsored by corporations and community service organizations, are offered without charge to school-aged children. This year, the concerts will be attended by more than 6,000 children throughout the region. For many, a symphony concert is a first-time experience. New in the past two seasons has been the "Tunes for Tots" event. This program, designed for children ages 4-7 and their parents, features a hands-on introduction to the instruments provided

by the VSO's principals and a concert by one of the

Valdosta Symphony Youth Orchestras.

The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra also sponsors the South Georgia String Project. This program now includes 18 elementary and middle school string classes. Designed to "seed" school string programs in a region traditionally devoid of such opportunities, the project has expanded five-fold in the past few years. The Valdosta Symphony Youth Orchestra is a tangent program of the South Georgia String Project. Three performance levels appropriate to student experience are offered. The Youth Orchestra presents two major and several community concerts during the school year.

In his fifth season at the helm of the VSO, Conductor and Artistic Director James Plondke came to Valdosta after receiving his Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Plondke holds an appointment as Professor of Music at VSU, and he serves as Director of the South Georgia String Project and Director of the Valdosta Symphony Youth Orchestras.

Plondke recently served as the conductor of the Senior High All-State Orchestra for the Georgia Music Educators Association. The 119-member orchestra represented the finest high school orchestra musicians from in the state of Georgia.

Last June, Plondke began a two-year term on the Board of Directors for the Georgia Music Educators Association, serving as Orchestra Division Chair. In this position, he manages proposed legislation, concerns, and activities relating to orchestra for the state of Georgia. He also plans and organizes the Orchestra Division activities at the state conference held each January.



### 'Candlelight Christmas'

VALDOSTA — The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra introduces a unique Christmas season event, "Candlelight Christmas" Dec. 12-13.

"This program is designed as an elegant evening of holiday tradition and entertainment including an excellent four-course dinner," said VSO conductor James Plondke. "The evening blends the sights, sounds, tastes and smells of the Christmas season."

This first special concert of the orchestra's eighth season begins at 7:30 p.m. in St. John's Catholic Church's Parish Center at 800 Gornto Road. Candlelight will set the mood as concert goers find their reserved table and enjoy the first two courses of dinner, Plondke said.

The concert begins promptly at 8 p.m., and segments will alternate with dinner courses. In preserving the evening's intimate character, 30 VSO members will form a Chamber Orchestra, Plondke said.

During the first two sections, music will include works composed on Christmas themes and traditional carols arranged for a Chamber Orchestra. Among them will be Corelli's famed "Christmas Concerto," Plondke said.

"The final movement is a musical picture of the nativity," Plondke said. "The work is among the most famous Christmas works from the Baroque period of music."

Concerto soloists include principals Nina Lutz and Patricia Nulte on violins, Steven Taylor on cello and Larry Scully on harpsichord. The group will also perform Leroy Anderson's "Suite of Carols" which is arranged for a string orchestra. The suite includes "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear," "O, Little Town of Bethlehem," "Bring a Torch, Jeannette, Isabella," and the "Wassail Song."

As diners enjoy the meal's first course, they will be serenaded by the VSU Chamber Choir with madrigals and carols. Under the direction of Dr. David Lee Johnson, their repertoire includes "Fum, Fum, Fum," "Carol of the Bells" and "Angels We Have Heard on High."

"The Chamber Choir's portion of the program will be enjoyable holiday music, easy listening for the audience of diners," Johnson said.

Ottorino Respighi's "Adoration of the Magi" leads off the next portion of the evening's music. Also during this part will be "Fantasia on What Child is This" by Ralph Vaughan Williams and "Stille Nact" (Silent Night), arranged by Chip Davis of Mannheim Steamroller fame. The portion ends with a singalong and Choir and Orchestra combining for Handel's "For Unto

## **Symphony orchestrating 'Romantic Traditions'**

VALDOSTA — The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra will present the Second Subscription Concert of the 1997-98 season at 8:15 p.m., Saturday, Jan. 24 in Whitehead Auditorium on the Valdosta State University campus.

The concert program has been entitled "Romantic Traditions."

"The program centers around musical styles and character which were at the fore of composition in the middle of the nineteenth century," said James Plondke, VSO conductor. "These romantic traditions' form a core of the music for the symphony orchestra and are very popular styles among concert audiences."

The audience will recognize numerous melodies and themes during the course of the evening because each of the selections is a staple of the concert repertoire and because the modern mass media has made extensive use of this music for years.

The program will feature the internationally renowned violinist, Sergiu Luca, as soloist with the orchestra. Luca will perform the "Violin Concerto in G Minor" by the romantic composer, Max Bruch. The concerto is beloved by both violinists and audiences because of its virtuoso display and beautiful expressive melodies.

The Romanian-born violinist enjoys a rich and diverse career which has taken him all over the world. He has given recitals with leading pianists and performed concertos with many of the world's great orchestras and conductors. He maintains an active chamber music eschedule and has founded and led three highly-regarded chamber music ensembles. He has many acclaimed recordings to his credit including a recent recording of the Dvorak Concerto with the St. Louis Symphony. In the midst of his active concert and recording career, Luca also finds time to serve as Artist-in-Residence at the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University in Houston, Texas.

"Mr. Luca's playing is very expressive, but at the same time also very clean and precise," Plondke said. "This is a style to which most violinists aspire. Perhaps this is why he has been called 'a fiddler's fiddler in the press."

This will be Luca's first appearance with the Valdosta Symphony. He will also present a master class for VSU students and faculty during his stay in Valdosta.

Saturday's concert will open with "Les Preludes" by Franz Liszt. The work is called a "symphonic poem" by the composer because the music describes a narrative which the composer took from romantic poetry of the age. The music portrays the joys of love and nature and travails of life as "preludes" to the unknown

of the hereafter. The music is unusual in its structure and conception and has been a favorite of audiences and "war-horse" of concert programs since its composition in 1854.

Following intermission, the VSO will perform the "Italian Symphony" of Felix Mendelssohn. This work is a "travelogue" in music. The German composer Mendelssohn was inspired to compose the symphony during an extended tour of Italy. The composer describes the sunny, vigorous character of the land and people in rapid-fire outer movements.

"These movements are extremely difficult for the musicians of the orchestra," noted Plondke

From Example in the last movement, Mendelssohn employed two Italian folk dance rhythms, a "saltarello" or jumping dance and a "tarantella" or tarantula (spider) dance. These rhythms generate a driving, energy-packed finale for the symphony and the VSO's concert evening.

Tickets for the concert may be

obtained at ArtSouth, 906 Slater St., or by calling 333-2150.

"Tickets are also available the evening of the performance," said Dr. Tayloe Harding, VSO executive director. "Even if the concert appears to be sold-out, generous patrons and subscribers who are out-of-town will often make their unused seats available for sale to benefit the orchestra. In this way virtually everyone can be accommodated."

Saturday's concert will be repeated on Sunday afternoon in Douglas. The VSO is being presented by the Coffee Alliance for the Arts as part of their Arts Series.

"We are always delighted to perform in other South Georgia communities," Plondke said. "In this way, we are able to meet our mission of cultural enhancement for the entire region — an important part of our charge from Valdosta State University. The VSO association with the Coffee Alliance for the Arts and the city of Douglas has been an excellent relationship in our joint quest to promote symphonic music."



# Valdosta Symphony to perform Nov. 8

VALDOSTA — The Valdosta Symphony Orchestra will present its first subscription concert of the 1997-98 season at 8:15 p.m. Saturday in Whitehead Auditorium on the campus of Valdosta State University.

The featured work on the program will be a performance of "A German Requiem" by Johannes Brahms. This year is the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the death of the great romantic composer. Orchestras worldwide have placed a special emphasis on Brahms's music. The VSO performance is a part of that international celebration.

"A German Requiem' is the pinnacle achievement in works for chorus from the 19th century," said James Plondke, VSO conductor. "The work is an oratorio on biblical texts chosen by the composer. It is intended to be a universal statement of consolation for the living, rather than a liturgy for the dead."

The Valdosta Symphony Chorus will be 210 voices strong for Saturday's concert. This is the largest chorus ever assembled for a VSO concert, Plondke said. Five choral groups from the region have been rehearsing the masterwork since August and will join forces to form the Valdosta Symphony Chorus. The VSU Concert Choir, under the direction of David Lee Johnson, is the largest choral organization represented in the Valdosta Symphony Chorus. Johnson is professor of music at VSU. Selected outstanding vocalists from the community and area comprise the Valdosta Symphony Community Chorus. Vocalists from area churches, VSU faculty members, and other singing musicians from as far away as Madison, Fla., make up this group. Dr. Johnson also conducts this chorus. Tifton has contributed two choral organizations. The Abraham Baldwin College Concert Chorus is under the direction of Professor Wayne Jones. Jones is professor of music at Abraham Baldwin. He will appear as a soloist with the VSO later this

season. The Tifton Choral Society, a community chorus, is under the leadership of Renee Fuller. Fuller is a music and chorus teacher in Alapaha. The Valdosta Choral Guild is the fifth and newest contributor to the Valdosta Symphony Chorus. The Guild is under the direction of Tony and Carla Carroll. Mr. Carroll is minister of music at Perimeter Road Baptist Church in Valdosta. Mrs. Carroll is director of choruses at Valdosta High School.

"I am delighted that we have so many excellent vocalists from a wide area of our region," Plondke said. "This contributes to the universal quality of the work and is a wonderful musical 'gift' by these performers to our community."

Saturday's program is also being repeated in Tifton Sunday afternoon as a part of Abraham Baldwin College's prestigious Stafford Arts series.

Soloists for the Brahms "Requiem" will be Sharon Searles, soprano, and David Lee Johnson, baritone. Ms. Searles has appeared as recitalist and concert artist throughout the U.S. and Great Britain. She has appeared as an artistic ambassador for the U.S., performing extensively in India and Pakistan. Johnson has appeared frequently with the VSO. His solo performances include appearances with the Atlanta, Jackson, Macon and Rome symphony orchestras as well as operatic roles with opera companies throughout the Southeast.

Saturday's Valdosta Symphony Orchestra concert will open with Mozart's Symphony No. 41 in C Major, nicknamed the "Jupiter" symphony.

"It is the last symphony that Mozart composed and is perhaps his most familiar," noted Plondke.

Ticket reservations for the Nov. 8 concert can be made by calling ArtSouth at 333-2150. A limited number of season tickets for the VSO's eighth season are also still available.







Many of the shops will offer special gift items such as travel baskets for children and usable gifts for newborns.



Harding's music compositions have been performed throughout the United States, Canada and six continents. He completed his master's degree and doctoral work at Northwestern University.



### Season Finale!

Saturday evening, May 1<sup>st</sup> marks the subscription finale for the VSO's ninth season. The title of the program is "German Dramatic Heritage." Each work to be performed is a symphonic work, but has a close connection to the operatic stage. The orchestra affectionately calls this the "Three (German) W's" concert: "Weber, Wolfgang, and Wagner." (A German "W" is pronounced with a deep, resonant "V" sound.)

Soloist, Isabella Lippi

Our guest soloist for this program is the young, nationally respected violinist, Isabella Lippi. The St Louis Post-Dispatch has called her "A standout, even among virtuosos." Ms. Lippi soloed with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at age 10. She broke into national prominence at age 21 by winning the St. Louis Symphony Young Artist Competition. Since then, she has been a favorite soloist of renowned conductor Leonard Slatkin, music director of the National Symphony and former Music Director of the St. Louis Symphony. Her international appearances have taken her to Europe, Latin America, and Japan. Ms. Lippi will perform the last of Mozart exquisite concertos for violin, Concerto No. 5 in A Major. Mozart's passion was for the operatic stage. His 'singing' melodies, balanced phrasing, and dramatic contrast of themes are all operatic traits which are characteristic of this concerto.

Wagner's Ring



This music is a famous *tour de force* for the orchestra. (The VSO musicians are hopeful of having a large and enthusiastic audience.) Saturday, November 6<sup>th</sup> is the second subscription concert of the Tenth Anniversary Season. The concert begins at 8:15 in Whitehead Auditorium. The program title is "The Three B's." The concert will feature a work of each of the three famous German master composers, represented by the phrase: Bach, Beethoven, and Brahms.

Each program of the anniversary season features a retrospective look at the orchestra's ten-year history. Next Saturday's program will mark the return performance of **violinist Stephanie Chase**. She has been a featured soloist with the VSO on two previous occasions in 1993 and 1997. We are excited about her return appearance with young American **cellist Bion Tsang**. Together, they will perform Brahms glorious Double Concerto in A Minor.

The Brahms *Double* is a rare work in the repertoire—a romantic concerto for more than one soloist. The soloists must work together as well as with the orchestra. This is apparent from the outset of the concerto, which begins after the briefest of orchestral introductions with an extensive cadenza for the soloists.

March 18th "Hollywood Pops"

The VSO has presented a "Pops" program in each of its last three seasons. This year's program will be **Saturday evening**, **March 18 at 8:15 in Whitehead Auditorium.** Music from the films will be featured in this Hollywood Pops program entitled "Saturday Night at the Movies." The program has something for everyone and at least one promises to be your favorite. "Hits" from 16 different movies will be performed.

As with past programs, the orchestra will follow the model of the famed Boston Pops with three segments of music and two intermissions. And within this tradition, the first segment will be devoted to "light classics." The orchestra will perform Aaron Copland's Suite from the 1948 film classic *The Red Pony*. The movie based on the John Steinbeck novelette of the same name starred Robert Mitchum as "Billy-Buck." The music accompanies various vignettes in the story of the ten-year-old boy, Jody, and his growing up on a California ranch. *The Red Pony* is designed by Steinbeck to be a children's tale, but with insights into the characters and the role of family, friends, the trials of everyday life and relationships. The music captures a sense of these meanings, as well as a sense of the youthful energy of the character Jody.

Copland's score is filled with the characteristic "Americana" harmonies the folk-like melodies for which Copland has received so much renown. The music has a definite "western" atmosphere about it. This year marks the celebration of **the 100**<sup>th</sup> **anniversary of Copland's birth**. The VSO is especially pleased to present the work in our anniversary season.

Saturday evening, there will be two intermissions—a chance to engage in lively conversation and partake of a Hollywood treat in the lobby. After each intermission, the orchestra will continue with music from the movies. Each of the selections has been carefully selected to represent a special view of the film score. There will be music featuring the foremost of Hollywood composers: Richard Rodgers (by way of Broadway), Max Steiner, Henry Mancini, James Horner, Elmer Bernstein, Ernest Gold, and, of course, John Williams. There will be adaptations for movies and original film scores. There will be music made famous by Hollywood and music that made Hollywood famous. There will be old and new "Hollywood epics." There will be old and new movies with a "Georgia connection." While war movies—one of Hollywood's most enduring subjects—may not immediately come to mind as a source of music, but many memorable tunes have come from these films. The concert will contrast both old and new war movie selections. (And within the "old" war movies, marches will be contrasted with jazzy song.) For an appreciative audience, there may be a traditional "Pops" concert encore.

# O'Conor's stunning with Valdosta Symphony Orchestra

VALDOSTA — Internationally renowned pianist John O'-Conor lived up to his reputation as one of the world's premier classical pianists this past weekend, when he appeared as a guest performer with the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra.
O'Conor traveled to Valdosta from his home in Dublin, Ire-

land, to perform Brahms' Piano Concerto No. 1 during the second half of the symphony's Saturday night performance. O'-Conor's solo work on the piano was exquisitely powerful, with the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra providing beautiful support to O'Conor's piano work.

O'Conor is best known throughout the U.S. for his defining recordings of Beethoven's sonata cycle and four volumes of Mozart's piano concertos. The Beethoven sonatas, especially, received rave reviews throughout the U.S. and Europe

While O'Conor's Brahms selection was beautifully performed, it was almost a shame that he could not have played some of the folk tunes from his native Ireland that he so deftly handles on his latest recording, "My Ireland," which is available through the amazon.com Internet site.

"My Ireland" features 16 songs, including such traditional Irish fare as "Come Back To Erin," "Danny Boy" and "I'll Take You Home Again Kathleen." O'Conor performs them with verve, melancholy and humor.

Some of O'Conor's sense of musical fun was on display during Saturday night's performance, when he returned for an unscheduled encore after a resounding standing ovation from the Valdosta audience. He played a short piece of Mozart, which O'Conor told the audience he believes Wolfgang Amadeus intended as a joke, since it was composed to be played with only one finger. O'Conor delighted the audience with this bit of fun following the movements of Brahms before accepting another standing ovation and exiting Valdosta State University Fine Arts Center's Whitehead Auditorium stage.

It was a fine evening for the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra, which displayed the range of its formidable talent by performing Brahms' tragic, yet transcending, Piano Concerto No. 1, to


#### William Purvis

William Purvis is one of the most distinguished American musicians in the world today. He maintains an extremely active and multifaceted career in the United States and abroad. Many of his activities are centered in the New York and New Haven areas where, in addition to his concert career, he also serves on the brass and chamber music faculties of Yale University, the Julliard School, and the University of New York at Stony Brook. It is at this latter university where he also conducts the university orchestra. Mr. Purvis is renowned as a chamber musician. He is a member of the New York Woodwind Quintet and has appeared at many of the world's great music festivals, including Tanglewood, Norfolk, Chamber Music Northwest, Mostly Mozart, Aston magna, Salzburg, Schleswig-Holstein, Kuhmo, Hong Kong, Båstad, Kitakyushu, and the Academy of the Nederlands Jeugd. He is a regular member of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, the Orchestra of St. Luke's, and the renowned Orpheus Chamber Orchestra. It is with this last orchestra that he has recorded the Mozart 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Horn Concertos on the Deutsche grammaphon label.

#### The "French" Horn

The horn is commonly referred to as the "French horn" in English-speaking countries. (The French call the horn "cor" with no reference to France!) The term was probably adopted in England because French composers were among the earliest composers to use the horn in artistic music, for example opera. Most present-day players refer to the instrument simply as "the horn." The modern horn was developed primarily in Germany.

The horn is essentially a long tube which increases in diameter from the mouthpiece to the bell. The tube is coiled several times to make it possible to hold. The player sets the air in the tube to vibrating by buzzing his/her lips. The valves on the horn divert the air stream into additional tubing. The more valves depressed, the longer the tube. Before the middle of the nineteenth century, horns had no valves. Therefore, a player was limited in the number of notes which could be played, to those in the tube's harmonic series—widely spaced in the lower reaches of the instrument, becoming a scale only in the highest register. A change of key was accomplished by exchange of "crooks" and was only typically done between works or movements. Horn players of the past and present develop great skill in playing in the higher parts of the register.

The physics of the instrument account for what we recognize as typical horn-like figures and passages, "horn calls." They are often fanfare-like and outline the notes of a chord. Only with the addition of valves, did the instrument become chromatic—able to produce every note throughout its range.


