Petersburg Sept 8th 1862

Dear Pa,

I have just returned from Yellow Sulfur Springs with my health much improved and intend starting for my [Regiment] tomorrow (the 9th). Hence you may see that my health, indeed that I am not hurt not being in the fights at Cedar Run, Manassas, and Germantown is again as good as ever. I have not heard from the [Regiment since it left Richmond expect through [PAGE TORN] Harding whom I saw in Lynchburg on last Saturday (6th). [?] has been very sick with the bilious fever but is again tolerably well.

At the battle of Cedar Run our brigade was not in the fight proper, but was under fire for some time and when ordered to the right to flank the enemy, before they got in position the Yankees had fled. Jackson and Longstreet have entered Maryland up about Edwards Ferry. And Hill's division is said to be [conferring?] lower down so in one week I expect to be in Maryland and perhaps by the 1st Oct[tober] in Washington or Baltimore [PAGE TORN] [prospects?] are brightening every day and I [PAGE TORN] that we shall...
