

It contains, to the best of my knowledge, each, and every player, who ever batted, or pitched for Valdosta State, and that player's correct, yearly statistics.

Volume II, <u>The Players</u>, contains year-by-year, and career statistics on each player in Valdosta State baseball history, and also includes hitting totals, pitching totals, tournament records, and all the other records that make baseball a statisticians dream.

I want to thank, Steve Roberts, Gene Felts, Bill Thomas, Coach Tommy Thomas, Coach Bill Grant, the 1976 Blazer baseball team, and Dr. Floyd Toth, for their help in the preparation of these volumes. I especially want to say, "thanks," to my wife, Jody, for putting-up with me while I prepared this work.

All the mistakes are mine. That includes—statistical, pictorial, spelling, typing, and characterization. I hope that my grammar, and other English usage is correct. Even if it is not, I assume that you will still get the meaning.

Because of the lack of scorebooks, from the 1955, 1956, 1957, 1958, 1959, and 1961 seasons, statistics from these years are as correct as possible. Please bring to my attention any errors in this text, and I will include corrections when this volume is updated in 1982. I hope that you enjoy reading this book as much as I enjoyed preparing it.

#### IMPORTANT DATES IN VSC BASEBALL HISTORY

1954-- First baseball season ... went 3-2 against JUCO competition. 1955-- First season of "official" intercollegiate competition ... with Walter Cottingham as coach, VSC was 6-5. 1958-- VSC joined the Georgia Conference (GIAC). Gary Colson became coach, as VSC went 10-11. 1960-- Bill Grant became coach, and VSC won the GIAC title (15-5), but had to vacate because of inelgible players. 1962-- Coach Grant finished constructing Rebel Field, and VSC joined the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). 1965-- VSC won their first "official" Georgia Conference championship, and received a bid to NAIA District-25 1968-- Tommy Thomas became coach ... VSC went 15-9 this season. VSC won both the GIAC, and the District-25 tournament ... entered NAIA Area-5 playoffs for the first time ... had the best record in history (27-10). GIAC, and District-25 titles. 1971-- Again, repeated GIAC, and District-25 titles. 1972 -- Won Georgia Conference, and District-25, for the 4th. consecutive year. 1973--Nickname changed from Rebels, to Blazers ... won NAIA District, and Area, and competed in the NAIA World Series for the first time in history ... dropped from GIAC. 1974--Won the newly formed South Atlantic Conference, and the NCAA Regional ... competed in the NCAA World Series ... joined the NCAA. 1975-- received a bid to the NCAA Regional. 1977-- Won the South Atlantic Conference, and hosted the NCAA Regionals ... won the Regionals on a bottom-of-the-ninth, two-run-homer by Craig Viers, to advance to their second appearance at the NCAA World Series.

Valdosta State has had three first-team All-Americans— Gene Felts by the NAIA in both 1972, and 1973; Sam Bowen by the NCAA in 1974; and, Viers by the NCAA in 1977. Also, three Blazers were named second-team, NCAA, All-American— Skip Fite, Steve McDiffict, and Cecil Whitehead (all in 1977).

Valdosta State began its baseball program in 1954, playing a 5-game junior college schedule, winning 3, and losing 2. In 1955, under the prodding of freshman, baseball nut, Emory Mobley, Coach Walter Cottingham made baseball an official sport, by embarking on an 11-game schedule, along with several exhibition games against JC<sup>1</sup>s. The VSC athletic teams (which only included basketball and baseball at this point) received a nickname in the Spring of this year, when the student body voted to adopt the REBEL as their mascot.

This first VSC team suffered from a lack of funds, equipment, and coaching. Mr. Cottingham acknowledged his lack of expertise about the game, and practices were haphazardly held, and organized. Players often had to supply their own bats and balls, and the campus area (where Patterson Hall is now located) where practice was held, was both bumpy and unfit for suitable drills.

Most games were played on the road (a few were held at Pendleton Park, where Valdosta's Class-D team performed), often on 2 and 3 day road-trips. Private cars were used for travel, with Coach Cottingham's station wagon being the least desirable, since the coach had a propensity for often running along the berm of the road. Mobley, when forced to ride with the coach, demanded (and wore) the catcher's equipment; sitting in the back seat, and holding on for dear life. As the wagon began its treacherous trip, Mobley would always yell, "Give it some gas, 'Mad-Man-Muntz'."

The Rebels went 6-5 this first year, beating Piedmont and Oglethorpe three times each, but losing to the more experienced clubs from Georgia Teachers, and North Georgia. Marvin Hatcher (3-2), and Bob McElvey (2-2) handled the majority of the pitching chores, and suffered from both wildness, and shoddy fielding on the part of the team.

Hitting was sufficient, with right-fielder Roy McQuaig (.395), shortstop Gene Gray (.356), and center-fielder Bob Green (.333) leading the way, but against top pitching offered by Teachers and North Georgia, the Rebs suffered, scoring only 12 total runs in their five losses.

These first team members, however, were pioneers for players that would later put Valdosta State on the baseball map. Had these men had the advantages of good coaching, proper equipment and practice facilities, their record would have been much better.






**'56** 

1956 was a "bummer" for VSC baseball. After a successful 6-5 beginning in 1955, the Rebels dropped to 2-8 against senior college competition. The club had Marvin Hatcher back as their ace, but the Columbus, Ga. native suffered from anemic team offense and could only show a 2-5 mark for his efforts.

Left-fielder Dick Smith, who saw limited action, led the hitters with a .400 average, but no regular hit over the prized .300 mark. The loss of stalwarts Roy McQuaig and Noel George helped lead to the team's downfall, and only sophomore center-fielder Ashley Hill (.244), and third-baseman Gene Gray (.279) supplied any offensive power.

Coach Cottingham saw the season begin on a losing note, by dropping two single games to Florida Southern (5-4 and 6-0) in Lakeland. The Rebels did defeat North Georgia 8-1, behind Hatcher's four-hitter, but could win only one of three from Piedmont, while losing two to both Georgia Teachers and North Georgia.

On paper, the 1957 edition of the baseball Rebels appeared as a "sure-fire" winner. Noel George was back (after a year at South Carolina to play football), and would play short. Emory Mobley was at second, and while he was known as "good-field, no-hit," he was tough in the clutch. Gerald Delaney, one of the school's best ever players, was at third, with Johnny Purvis and Joltin' Joe Wilson sharing duties at first. The veteran Ashley Hill was in center, with Dickie Allen in right, and Purvis, Bennie James, and Bob McElvey sharing left.

Behind the plate was super catcher Joe Tarpley. All of this and a dismal: 2-7 record. The Rebels were a good fielding team, with soundness at all positions, but the hitting fell to an all-time low (.216). Even with anemic hitting, the team could have made it, but there was NO pitching; none at all. McElvey (2-2) won the Rebels only two games (beating Piedmont twice), but neither was a gem.

George (.419), and Delaney (.313) led the hitters, while Hill (.240) and Tarpley supplied the power, but VSC's pitching held opponents under six runs in only two games. The schedule was tougher too. Florida Southern was a major power, while Jacksonville, and North Georgia were very respectable small-college teams.

As in previous years the Rebels did fare very well against junior college competition, winning 7 of 10 games. But even these were slugfests, with VSC's hitters faced every contest with outscoring an opponent with superior pitching.

1958 was VSC's first year in the Georgia Conference, and unfortunately of all the early years of Rebel baseball, 1958 has the least information available. The Rebels finished 1-2 in the Conference this season.

1958 was continued disaster for Valdosta State baseball. The loss of Noel George, and Gerald Delaney, plus the sitting-out of Emory Mobley hurt the team immeasureably. Marvin Hatcher (1-1) returned for his final season on the mound, but received little help from Jack Rowe (1-2), and Mike Hampton (0-2).

The team's hitting was its main forte, with all the regulars over the .286 mark. Third-baseman Johnny Purvis (.353), led the club, with Joe Tarpley (.333), Buddy Wilburn (.333), Ben Wood (.308), and Ashley Hill (.308) close behind.

Even a 205 record was remarkable, considering that every opponent scored at least five runs, with three teams going into double didgets. The season; s lone bright spot was a 9-5 win over small-college power Jacksonville, behind Hatcher, aided by the clutch hitting of Purvis and Hill. Stetson, North Georgia, and Mercer brightened their seasons; with convincing wins at the Rebels expense.

This was Coach Cottingham;s final year at the helm of the baseball team, and also marked the school's entrance into the Georgia Intercollegiate Baseball Conference. The conference would expand into basketball in 1959, and encompass other sports in the 1960's. VSC ended 1-2, in the conference, this first year, with strong North Georgia winning the championship.

While Coach Cottingham did not produce winning teams regularly, and was often kidded about his driving, all of his former players would agree that he personified a Christian character. He was deeply religious, and insisted upon fair play, and good sportsmanship. His presence at the head of VSC's athletic program brought praise for the college, from the community and sport opponents alike.

His athletes, like all athletes, however, spawned a great area in regard to philosophy, temperment, and actions. One of the more humorous notes occured on a road-trip in '58. The team was staying together in a barracks arrangement, with chatter among the players, as everyone was preparing for bed. Coach Cottingham, as was his habit, knelt by his bed to say his nightly prayers. One of the players, over the din of his teammates, was attempting to ask the coach a question. After repreated attempts, of which Coach Cottingham was unaware because of his pre-occupation with his prayers, the player blurted out, "Goddamn it Coach, are you listening." Such are baseball players.

The 1958-1959 year in Valdosta State athletic history was a "turning-point" of sorts. The college hired Gary Colson, from near-by Dasher, fresh out of David Lipscomb (Tenn.) College, to coach basketball, and also handle baseball in the Spring. Colson immediately recruited some talented round-ball players, and used them in baseball too.


Colson was not a fantastic baseball coach (his love for basketball superceded everything else), but had some players who knew the game, and he also embarked the Rebels on their best schedule ever. Practices, however, did not radically change from the Cottingham era, as freshman Tommy Thomas recalled: "I remember several days that Coach Colson called practice, and only Joe Tarpley, Emory Mobley, and I were there."

From the basketball Rebs, Colson had "Big" Buck Ethredge (.333 and 6-3 on the hill), shortstop Hansel Faulkner (.317), and outfielders Willard Griffis, and Dewey Hulsey. Senior back-stop Tarpley (.313), and second-baseman Mobley (.250) added college experience to the squad. Ethredge threw three (still a school record, although often tied) shut-outs, as the Rebels ended with a 10-11 slate.

VSC started very slow, losing 8 of their first 10, including four games in the conference (each conference team was to play each other conference team twice, with only the first-game of home-and-home doubleheaders counting as a conference fray). Ethredge then shut-out Berry, and the Rebs eventually finished 6-5 in the GIAC.

Included in the team's wins during the season was a 12-4 thumping of soon-to-be arch-rival West Georgia, and a decision over powerful Jacksonville (4-0), behind an Ethredge whitewashing. The worst loss in the school's history also occurred this year. Mercer won a 24-0 laugher, in a game that saw VSC unable to execute either offensively, or defensively.



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# Grant Is Believer In The Soft Sell pproach To Life

Grant, the 48-year-old athletic director at VSC, takes absolutely no credit for the tremendous success the athletic program has enjoyed. But his co-workers give it all to

A Valdosta native who has always excelled in everything from athletics and girls to charming the fangs off a rattlesnake, Grant takes a back seat to most of the action in the school's athletic department.

It's part of his philosophy.

Some may think it laziness or disinterest on Grant's part that his coaches are left to fend for themselves. But most of them vow they would rather have it that way. And they all insist Grant has always been there when they needed him.

"I call it the soft touch," Grant says. "I don't believe in ordering people around. I believe in asking them in a nice way. And if you do, it'll get done."

Grant's the first to admit that doesn't

always work so well.

"Take Tommy (Thomas, VSC's baseball coach), I can turn anything over to Tommy and it'll get done. Other people ... well, I might have to prod them a little. But always with the soft touch."

The soft touch is the major part of Grant's easy-going attitude. But don't confuse the soft touch with weakness. Once Grant has his mind made up, it's not likely to change

When she first took over the helm of the Lady Blazers, she had a giant's goals with a midget's pocketbook. But when she demanded more equal treatment with the men, Grant put his foot down.

"He stood his ground," Mrs. Worth recalls. "I guess I just had to learn he was the boss. The only time he ever raised his voice to me was when I lost my temper at him. I guess you could say he responded in kind.

"I suppose I had backed him into a corner. But other than that instance, he has never been anything but a perfect gentleman around me. And he didn't seem to hold a grudge because of it."

VSC's coaches have a free hand with their program. And most of them have become super successful because of it.

"Billy believes in giving a coach a certain amount of responsibility and allowing him to work it the way he thinks best," said Dr. Dave Waples, head coach of the cross country Blazers.

"He's there if you need him. If not, he's not there pressuring you every day. It's a lot easier to work under those conditions."

"Billy's not always looking over your shoulder," said Mrs. Worth. "In fact, I guess the thing I like best about working under him is the freedom I have."

Grant got his break when he was young and he has never forgotten it. When he goes looking for a new coach he usually ends up with a young one with unproven talents. And they usually fare quite well.

One of those was Thomas, who Grant watched through high school and college an finally offered a job to even though Thomas didn't plan to go into the coaching

"Billy told me if I ever wanted to come back and coach he would do his darndest to help me," the super successful Thomas recalls.

"He's the kind of guy who will give you anything he has.'

Success has always been associated with Grant. Even in his high school days, Billy was never one to give uup.

'He was a high school All-American in both football and baseball," recalled former Valdosta High School coach Wright

"He was a great competition . . . had all the ability in the world in football and baseball but not much in basketball. Except that he was a scrapper.

"Billy was really too short to be a great basketball player. But he made up for it with his scrapping. He could dribble and shoot with the best of 'em.''

Bazemore judged his stars by the fire in their eyes and Grant, he recalls, had more than anyone else.

"He'd scrap your eyes out in everything from football to marbles to tic-tac-toe, Bazemore said. "That's what made him such a great athlete. On top of everything else he was willing to work for it."

Grant, the quarterback on the VHS team in the late '40s, spent many a Saturday and Sunday throwing passes to his best friend, Sonny Stephenson, when the Wildcats were facing a big game, Bazemore recalled.

And because of it, both of them wound up with football scholarships to Georgia.

There he started one football game for the Bulldogs and promptly broke a bone in his ankle, ending his career.

Grant, who played semi-pro baseball for a short time, can remember only one controversy since taking over the AD job at VSC

It involved another department head who just didn't get along with him. Others say Grant's easy-going attitude let the depart-

In the Fall of 1959, Valdosta State added Bill Grant to its athletic department. Grant was to assume the role of both Athletic Director and baseball coach, releasing Gary Colson to coach just basketball. A familiar sports figure in Valdosta, Grant had been a great high school star in football, basketball, and baseball. making high school All-America in both the former, and latter. At the University of Georgia he had continued success, being both a football and baseball starter, before coming home to join the Valdosta High School athletic staff in 1958.

Bill Grant was (and still is) a winner. He saw a challenge in attempting to build a winning Rebel baseball team, and his first task was to construct a home field. Begging, and borrowing tools and supplies, from area merchants, and with some help from the college's maintenance department, he built a baseball field (it was fully completed for the 1962 season) on VSC's North campus. The field would eventually become one of the top college baseball facilities in the nation.

Grant's next job was to turn a losing program into a winner. "I knew that we had some good athletes on campus, and I went to President (Ralph) Thaxton, and ask who was elgible to play," Grant said. "President Thaxton told me that any VSC student was elgible to play," Grant stated, "and I took this as the rule. I really wasn't aware of any conference rules; plus, we hadn't joined the NAIA as yet."

The above discourse doesn't mean much until you learn more about Coach Grant's 1960 team. Back was Buck Ethredge (who would go 7-1 on the hill, with a 1.26 ERA), along with other 1959 returnees in Tommy Thomas (.354), Willard Griffis (.235), and Hansel Faulkner (.169). Newcomers included the veteran Gerald Delaney (.273), back from the 1957 club; outfielders Johnny McIntyre (.196), Joe Brock (.188), and Sonny Taylor (.174), and first-baseman Steve Chitty (.182).

Three other players, not mentioned above, however, formed the nucleus of the team. Emory Mobley (.182), back for his "fifth season" at second, solidified as strong an infield that VSC has ever presented. Pitching ace Steve Kebler (7-3, 1.93 ERA), fresh from three years of "professional" ball, with Ethredge formed as solid a 1-2 pitching tandum as the Rebels ever had. First-baseman James Jennings (.314), also a former "professional" player, played only the home-games, but hit with tremendous power.

The 1960 team was a strong club throughout, even though they hit only .228 as a squad. The hitting was timely (as Thomas, Jennings, Ethredge, and Delaney hit well in the clutch), the fielding top-notch, and the pitching (1.64 team ERA) as good as any VSC team ever. The Rebels went 15-5 on the year, which also saw a championship 9-2, GIAC mark. Included were two conference wins over West Georgia, on twin shut-outs by Kebler and Ethredge, and 15 wins in the last 17 outings (the Rebels dropped the first three games of their Florida swing).

Of course, VSC did not retain the conference championship. West Georgia squawked the loudest, and the Rebs abdicated the throne, even though they did not officially forfeit any games. Piedmont claimed the title after the Rebel fall.

When VSC needed a baseball field, it was Grant who climbed aboard an old rusty tractor hardly ready for anything but the junk yard and built one.

Today that same Blazer Field is one of the best parks for a school this size in the

country.

"I had taken the cross country team to California one year when someone saw my VSC jacket and said 'Hey Valdosta, say hey to Billy Grant for me," Waples recalls.

"That's the way Billy is. People know him

all over the country."

Although he stays away from the actual team decisions, Grant is always along when one of his teams hits the road to the playoffs of any sort.

From janitor to college president, Grant treats them all alike. And all give him the

same respect.

In Chattanooga, Tenn., one year during post season basketball playoffs, Grant threw a party in his motel room attended by the presidents of the other schools involved.

The next night he struck up a conversation with a student from the school VSC was playing and within minutes had a friend for

life.

The student took several color pictures of the team for Grant and ended up insisting on driving Grant and company across town after the game.

People who know him say Grant has the uncanny ability to set his own feelings aside to keep a cool head in almost anything

The fact was proven several years ago when his wife Marge died of cancer. Sick for several years, she had clung to life with Grant by her side several months longer than doctors felt she would.

At that time Grant rarely talked about the situation. But when he did, it showed a rather

unique outlook.

"We just take each day as it comes," he said, showing all the feeling he had usually kept hidden. "She has her good days and her bad days. We try to make the most of them ail."

Looking back on his wife's death now, Grant recalls the philosophy he used Juring those times.

"It's tough," he admitted. "But things like

that happen to everyone. Just look around. You might feel sad for yourself at times. But go into any hospital and you'll see 100 other cases just like yours."

Grant said knowing what was happening

made the end result easier to accept.

"My wife was a very brave woman," he said. "She knew and we knew what was going to happen. We just didn't know when.

"When things happen suddenly and without warning, I would imagine it takes quite a bit out of you. When you know it is going to happen it's a little different.

"You hate to say 'I'm glad it happened the way it did." But I think it was best for all concerned that she went the way she did... without pain. She never knew exactly what

happened."

Just as Grant was able to keep those feelings suppressed, he is a complete failure at keeping his feelings hidden when he's coaching.

Some say he has a record for being thrown out of baseball games while he was head coach of the Rebels (VSC's old nickname).

Grant recalls them all and blames them on "bad calls by the umpires." One that really stands out in his mind is a trip to Lakeland, Fla., where he was ordered out of the game and the ballpark as well.

The action was avenged when the team bus was parked in a nearby orange grove and players filled it with oranges before leaving

for Valdosta, some say.

Ask anyone on Grant's staff and they'll agree with him that his greatest strongpoint is his ability to get along with people.

Ask them his greatest weakness and they'll hem and haw — despite the fact that they sometimes gripe about being given too much freedom.

"I don't like being indoors," admits Grant, trying to criticize himself. "I don't like teaching in a classroom. And I guess it usually shows when I do."

Waples is the only staff member who would venture a guess into Grant's weaknesses. He says its a matter of organization. Not that Grant doesn't have any, He just doesn't like it.

"I just don't think Billy likes to be an organized as he has to be," Waples said. "Don't get me wrong. He is organizaed. I just don't think he likes it."

May be. But the VSC uthletic program's track record sure doesn't show it.



The 1361 season was as dismal as the 1960 campaign had been exciting. Coach Grant's troops dipped to an 8-15 log, and stood at 3-14 at one point in the year. Gone were super-mound-study Buck Ethredge, and Steve Kebler, and the team ERA balooned to 4.14.

Hitting wise, only catcher lommy Thomas (.313) supplied any consistency, while the team average hovered at the .230 mark. The squad could only manage 18 extra-base-hits, and eight of these (four each) belonged to freshmen Joe Dixon (3b), and Angelo DeVivo (ss).

Team fielding was haphazard, and led to the demise of frosh pitchers, Mike Perry (3-6), and Herman Hudson (2-5), who were forced to pitch all of the "big" games. Cultural shock caught Coach Grant's young team early, as they dropped three games each to major powers Vanderbilt, and Florida Southern.

Wins over Jacksonville, Erskine, and Mercer salvaged some pride for the Rebels in their first 17 encounters, but they were eliminated from Georgia Conference contention early, with double-dip losses to both North Georgia and Piedmont. VSC rallied in the late season to finish 5-5 in the league.

Hope ran high for a great 1962 season, as Coach Grant counted on veterans Tommy Thomas, Angelo DeVivo, and Steve Chitty to steady a host of bright young recruits. Thomas (.343) led the team in hitting for the third consecutive year (a school record), while DeVivo (.324) hit with power, and played super defense at third.

Chitty (.152) had a bad year at the dish, but formed with new, short-stop Bobby Speck (.333) a top double-death combination. But besides catcher Joe George (.302), and centerfielder Johnny McIntyre (.284), the Rebels could muster little other offense. A so-so batting average of .254, was more than off-set by a lack of power (only two team HR's, and 17 total extra-base knocks), and a pitching staff that just did not develop.

Florida Southern and David Lipscomb bopped the Rebs to an early 0-4 chart, and the club could only recover to a 9-9 season log. Sophomore pitchers, Herman Hudson (4-2), and Mike Perry (3-3), were augmented by newcomers Wally Summers (2-3), and Kermit Hunnicutt (0-1) on the hill, but a team ERA of 3.35 demonstrated a lack of clutch hurling.

Even with the poor start, a lack of power, and questionable pitching, VSC had a chance for its first-ever (official) Georgia Conference title. The team stood 4-0 in the loop (9-7 over-all), going into the last regular season games (at home) against league leader West Georgia. A two-game sweep would give the Rebels the crown.

"The best laid plans of mice and men..." The Braves (as they would unfortunately do in subsequent years) swept both games to win the championship. On May 18, West Georgia grabbed an 8-4 win, as Perry and Hudson saw them erupt for four runs in the third, and three in the fourth. VSC was held to six hits.

The next day, the Carrolltonites overcame an early 4-1 Reb lead, exploding for four runs in the seventh against Summers, on their way to a 6-4 decision. Fittingly, Thomas, playing his last game of a super career, went 3x4 for the hometowners.



1963 was the year of the 'wreck.' Although you might assume that the Rebels 4-8 record that year was the 'wreck,' a far more serious happening curtailed the season, and left coach Bill Grant thanking his lucky stars that no one was seriously injured.

VSC began the year on an encouraging note, as sophomore, right-hander Herman Hudson beat Stetson 7-5, but from there everything went downhill. The team dropped its next five games, before the "wreck" came along. On a trip to Mercer, the team, traveling in two athletic vans, was 10-miles South of Cordele, when the steering rod on the back van broke.

Coach Grant saw in his rear-view mirrow, the other van rolling-over-and-over on the road. He, of course, thought the worst, but except for a hip injury to pitcher Robert Hand (0-1), and a shoulder seperation to outfielder Bud Bridges (.200), and assorted cuts and bruises, no one was seriously injured. The team didn't continue to Mercer, but unfortunately traveled to Florida State, the next week, with a trimmed-down squad, and absorbed a 14-0 blasting.

Bad luck continued as second-baseman Rusty Deavours (.273) was lost for the season with a broken finger, and freshman infielder-pitcher, Tommy Johnson (1-3) developed arm trouble. VSC finished their shortened season with a small-in-number team, and ended 2-2 in the GIAC.

Warner Webb (.318) was the only hitter over the .300 mark, while Angelo DeVivo (.295) came close. The team batting average was .235, with a gigantic 6.11 team ERA. Perhaps it is fortunate, from a winning standpoint, that several games had to be cancelled.



VSC ended 10-10 in 1964, finishing with a 4-6 Georgia Conference mark. A lack of hitting (the team batting mark was a miserable .232), and fielding led to a late-season downfall, after an early 4-2 won-lost log.

The Rebels were able to end at the .500 mark only because of superb pitching, which saw a final team ERA of 1.45 (a school record, and 4th. best in the nation in '64). Southpaw, Mike Perry posted a 5-2 record, with a nation-leading 0.78 ERA, and was backed by Ray Peters (3-4, 1.58 ERA), and the veteran Herman Hudson (2-4, 1.96 ERA). VSC sandwiched two-game sweeps of Florida Presbyterian and Stetson around losses to tough Florida Southern, on their Southern trip, but were brought back to earth, as they dropped a two-game series to Erskine at Rebel Field.

Perry, Peters, and Hudson held opponents down in the run-department (giving up only 60-total runs all year), but got plate support from only Dennis Fike (.328), and Buddy Bush (.270). The Rebs scored more than 5-runs in only six-games all season.

Perry deserves special mention, not only because of his NAIA best ERA, but because he emerged as VSC baseball's first big star, against forminable opposition. He allowed only six earned-runs in 69 innings, and struck-out 62 hitters, issuing only 30 walks. With a little more team offense, he would surely have been named to the All-American team.


1965 was the championship year that Coach Grant had waited for, for so long. Everything was there; power hitting (even though the team average hovered near .250) with 54 extra-base-hits; air-tight fielding (fifth best percentage in the nation); and, superb pitching (2.53 team ERA); all of which added to an 18-11 record.

Veteran hurlers, Mike Perry (7-2, 2.10 ERA), and Ray Peters (4-5, 3.05 ERA) were augmented by freshman, flame-thrower Ron Fortner (6-4, 2.24 ERA), and together struck-out 210 in 242-innings. Old adversaries Florida Southern and West Georgia were beaten, as the Rebs played their best schedule, and won their most games ever.


Shortstop Tommy Johnson, in limited playing time, hit .375, with Peters at .333, and thirdsacker Lindy Evans at .310. The Rebel outfield of Ben Bates (.255), Bob Lamphier (.247), Dennis Fike (.191), and Robert Creel (.154) didn't hit for average, but made the big defensive play when needed.

VSC was only 5-5 after ten games, but had recorded split-series with toughies Florida Southern, Stetson, and David Lipscomb, dropping two to nationally-ranked Carson-Newman, but bopping Berry twice. The Rebs rolled to an 8-2 Georgia Conference mark, tying for the crown with West Georgia. VSC beat the Braves 1-0 in a play-off, and entered their first ever NAIA District tournament (see tournament resume).

Even though the Rebels lost two straight to Georgia Southern in the tourney, this was the best year, to that point, in the school's history. Perry, for the second straight season, received local NAIA honors, and along with Angelo DeVivo (.222) finished distinguished 4-year careers.


Oh! What a year it could have been. 15-9 certainly isn't bad, but a second consecutive Georgia Conference title was in the offing, and the Rebels simply blew it, dropping their last four games, including three in the conference.

VSC beat some biggies this season, defeating Georgia Tech three times, The Citadel twice, and splitting a two-game-set with nationally ranked Florida Southern. But they really had problems in the GIAC, being upset by Berry 1-0, and Oglethorpe 3-2, besides being shut-out twice by hated West Georgia, 5-0 and 1-0. After the glories of '65, a 3-4 league mark was the result.

Hitting was the problem. The team sunk to a .237 average, while scoring only two-runs in their crucial, final three conference games. First-baseman Dennis Fike (.345), and catcher Zack Wade (.325) were the only regulars to hit over .235. Outfielder Tommy Hutcherson (.344) saw only limited duty.

Pitching, on the other hand, was great. Coach Grant had returnee Ron Fortner (4-3, 2.38 ERA) to lead three, top freshman recruits. Righthander Eddie Fisher (8-2, 0.85 ERA) led the nation in earned-run-average, while "Steady Eddie" Middleton (1-1, 1.06 ERA), and southpaw Danny Petrovich (2-3, 2.67 ERA) pitched like veterans.

Fisher, particularly drew praise, as the Federalsburg, Md., product maintained his composure through a record breaking mound season. "The Fish" shut-out Florida Southern and Mercer, and recorded other wins over Stetson, Georgia Tech, Oglethorpe, Erskine, The Citadel, and Berry. He lost to West Georgia 1-0, on an unearned run, and gave up only one earned-run in a 5-3 set-back to Jacksonville.





The writing was on the wall in 1967, when sophomore, pitching sensation, Eddie Fisher developed arm problems and went 1-3, on the year. The Rebels ended 14-16, with a 4-5 Georgia Conference mark, and saw a fine beginning end in failure.

Most disconcerting of all was VSC's embarassing record against Armstrong State and Georgia Southwestern. Both these schools had just been made senior colleges (from junior college status) for the 1966-1967 year, and the Rebs dropped four of six games versus these teams, including a 13-2 pasting from ASC's Pirates.

Without Fisher, the burden fell-upon Ron Fortner (4-5, 2.12 ERA), Eddie Middleton (4-2, 3.26 ERA), and Danny Petrovich (3-2, 2.55 ERA), but an enlarged schedule and inconsistent relief work hurt the team performance. Of course, hitting was the major problem, a burden that seemed to plague the Rebs year-afteryear.

The team hit .250, but with NO power. Claude Speck (.349) was the team leader in the offensive department, while also stealing a school record 31-bases. Ben Bates (.345) and catcher Zack Wade (.306) were the only other consistent hitters. Behind Fortner, Petrovich, and Middleton, VSC won 7 of their first 10, including biggies over David Lipscomb (twice), St. Louis (twice), and Georgia Tech, but faded fast, and recorded their first debit year since 1963.

Pitching kept the Rebs afloat, but pitchers are a strange breed. Coach Bill Grant seemed to always develop the good pitcher (even though hitting was always a minus), and used unusual methods to keep them on the straight and narrow. During the 1967 season, 'Big Eddie' Middleton was throwing a fine game, with the one exception that the down-in-the-line-up hitters (6-7-8-9), were seeing change-ups, and slow curves, rather than his main forte-- the fast ball.

Coach Grant told Eddie two different times, "throw the hard one." Against the 120-pound, number-9 hitter (who had drilled a single, on a slow-curve, the first time up), Ed began with a slow-change (ball-1). "Lean-back and throw it," Grant yelled. The next pitch was another change, which was drilled foul, into the left-field corner. Coach Grant bolted to the mound, and told Middleton, in no uncertain terms, "throw nothing but fast balls to this goof."

Eddie's next pitch was a slow curve, which was hit like a bullet between second and short, for a single. Coach Grant sprinted to the mound, and grabbed the ball held in Middleton's outstretched hand (he knew that he was gone), but instead of calling for a relief pitcher, Grant (twice) placed his foot squarely between Ed's anterior cheeks, as the big, sophomore attempted to make it safely to the dugout. Eddie had been literally kicked out of the game by his coach. Part of Middleton's problems, the remainder of his career, rested on the fact that he seldom used the change, and slow curve.

This was to be Coach Grant's last season as baseball coach, as his Athletic Director duties, and the call of golf coach (and golf) beckoned. His presence made VSC's athletic program, and of course, to this day he continues to lead the state's best program.











Two weeks before the opener of the the 1968 season, head coach Bill Grant, handed the team over to his newly hired assistant, Tommy Thomas. Thomas was no stranger to VSC baseball, having been the top catcher in the school's history (1959-1962), while leading the team in hitting his final three seasons.

What the Rebel baseball team lost in Coach Grant was a fun-loving, yet stearn, taskmaster, whose players knew that thin-line between being on the good and/or bad side of their coach. What they got in Coach Thomas was one of the finest baseball minds around, who had an affection for long-practicing and detail; but, whose "good-guy" nature saw the best in people, seldom their faults.

What Thomas inherited was a group of experienced hell-raisers, who celebrated win, or lose, and whose behaviors had been dictated by the mood of their former coach. Thomas would have some problems in regard to various decisions because the flamboyant Grant had used a strong approach, while Coach "T" would sometimes waver.

The Rebels of 1968 were strong in hitting (a record .279 team average), pitching (2.45 team ERA), and fielding (.960). On April 27, after two big wins over Jacksonville four days earlier, VSC rolled into Carrollton to battle West Georgia for the conference lead. Coach Thomas described the day as "Black Saturday," as the home-team won 5-0, and 2-1 decisions. Petrovich lost the opener, while Fisher (a last minute choice over Fortner) lost the heart-breaking, 10-inning, nite-cap, as the Rebs garnered only 10-hits in the doubleheader.

Fortner did not bother to show for the last three games, as Georgia South-western and Jacksonville (twice) solidified the team's decline. Even with the late season debacle, Petrovich was close to being named All-American, as he nabbed NAIA honorable-mention honors.







Coach Tommy Thomas' second edition was one of the finest clubs in the school's history, bolstered mainly by the hitting of first-sacker Craig Courtney (.394) and shortstop Jack Toole (.303), and the pitching of returnees Eddie Fisher (11-0, 1.29 ERA), and Danny Petrovich (9-3, 1.98 ERA).

The Rebels went 27-10, which included the college's second-ever Georgia Conference championship (9-1 in the league), and first ever NAIA District-25 title. In their first NAIA Area-5 appearance, VSC had the misfortune to have the first game forfieted to eventual national champion William Carey (see tournament resume), and then lost to a fine Carson-Newman crew.

Blasting to a 13-2 start (including a 4-0 mark on their opening Florida trip), the team saw Courtney have an unbelievable year. The big, East Gary, Ind., native set school records in almost all offensive categories (his batting average mark still stands), and carried the team in game after game. The Rebs hit only .260, but accounted for 88 extra-base-hits, including 20 circuit-clouts.

Both Petrovich and Fisher were very effective, but received help from only relievers Rusty Simpson (2-2, 1.93 ERA), and Eddie Middleton (2-0, 3.60 ERA), as a third starter could not be found. Even though he was behind 5-4 when the William Carey game was ended, Fisher had a fantastic year. The Federalsburg, Md., senior, was in the nation's top-3 in both earned-run-average, and most victories, and finished his career with a 24-8 record.



1970 was one of those years where the team looked so-so on paper, and turned out so-so. A 25-16 record (11-1 in the Georgia Conference) belies the fact that VSC's victories came against weaker clubs, while the known teams edged the Febels.

Seniors Spence Kiser (.313), Steve Crawford (.301), and Bill Baggett (.293) led the hitters, with sophomore catcher Steve Rominger (.289), and shortstop Bobby Tripp (.292) giving some help. Team fielding was erractic (.945), while the pitching (2.22 ERA for the team) was generally good, with freshman Steve Sorgius (7-3, 1.26 ERA), and sophomores Rusty Simpson (8-3, 2.35 ERA), and Leroy Purdy (5-6, 2.46 ERA) carrying the bulk of the load. The staff threw seven shutouts, gave up one-run in 10-games, and two-runs in four others.

The team hit .275, and had 90 extra-base-hits, with the majority of these coming from the bats of the above-mentioned hitters, along with Larry Hysler (.271), and Harry 'Moose' Jones (.241). The Rebels were at the point where they completely dominated the Georgia Conference (even though they split with West Georgia) and NAIA District-25, but were unable to compete very successfully with most of the highly regarded non-conference foes that Coach Thomas scheduled.

VSC gct a bad start, going 1-2 on their Florida swing, before returning home and dropping four games (two each) to Miami (0.), and Pembroke State. The Rebs also lost twice each to rivals Erskine, Jacksonville, and Georgia Southern throughout the year; but did drop independent Mercer in two single frays.





### 1971 RESUME VALDOSTA STATE REBELS


Valdosta State won their third consecutive Georgia Conference champion-ship in 1971, going 8-2 in the loop, but slipping to an overall 24-18 log. The Rebels attacked their most ambitious schedule ever, and suddenly were 1-6, after losing to Florida State (who finished second in the NCAA's), dropping four games on their Southern swing, and coming home to losses to Ohioans, Cincinnati and Bowling Green.

VSC came back strong, beating Pembroke State twice, defeating Mercer, and splitting with nationally ranked Rollins. Locally, persistent Armstrong State split a double-header, while old nemisis West Georgia also maneuvered a stand-off. Columbus, only in its second year as a 4-year school, tagged itself the District favorite by blasting the Rebs twice, 11-8 and 7-3. Home games were won over both Georgia Southern and Jacksonville, while both the Eagles and Dolphins recipricated on the road.

The NAIA District-25 tournament was a classic (see tournament section), as the Rebels eliminated both Columbus (in their park), and conference rival Shorter. Again, however, the Area play-offs proved to big a hurdle, as VSC lost close ones to David Lipscomb (4-1), and the State College of Arkansas (2-1).

Team statistics were not impressive, with a .253 average, and a 3.11 ERA. Sophomore second-sacker Bobby Tripp (.319) led the hitters, with only Moose Jones (.306), Craig Courtney (.279, after a year's lay-off), and frosh Gene Felts (.275) providing any punch. Leroy Purdy (6-4, 1.48 ERA), Rusty Simpson (6-4, 2.46 ERA), and JC transfer Ronald Bennett (6-2, 2.64 ERA) pitched very steady, but had problems in some of the big games.

Ron Nasworthy (3-5, 6.50 ERA) threw bee-bee's, but had control problems, while frosh Dan Chadwick (2-1, 0.75 ERA), won the season's biggest game in dropping Shorter, 2-1, in the District finale. Although the season ended on a losing note, a veteran team would return for the 1972 campaign, including a top-notch infield.

### Capture District Crown Kebels



The Valdosta State College Rebels, down by one game in the District 25 double elimination tournament, came back and shot down the Shorter Hawks, 10-2 and 2-1. The pair of triumphs enabled the Rebels to capture the District 25 baseball championship for the third consecutive year. Valdosta, which had never played Shorter during the regular season, had to be content as co-champions of the Georgia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference along with the Hawks, since both possessed identical records.

As district champs, Valdosta State has earned the right to play in the Area 5 playoffs which got underway yesterday. The Area 5 competition is also a double elimination tournament. The other three teams involved in the tourney are: David Lipscomb College (38-12),



### 1972 RESUME VALDOSTA STATE REBELS

The 1972 season began rather slow, with the Rebels 3-4 after seven games, and 5-5 after ten. But then Gene Felts took over. The big, Lakeland, Ga., centerfielder led the Rebels to 13 straight wins, including a 14-2 rout of Florida State, a 9-5 win over Georgia Southern, and twin 4-2 nods against West Georgia.

Felts (.368) hit 13-homers on the year, and led the team in every offensive category, including 50-RBI's, and 28 extra-base-hits. He received adequate support from Bobby Tripp (.327), Craig Courtney (.325), Eddie Cowart (.322), and Frank Sumner (.315), and also got five round-trippers from catcher Steve Rominger.

Pitching wise, the team had a 2.88 ERA (compared to a record .292 team batting average), and were led by senior hurlers Ronald Bennett (8-4, 2.14 ERA), Rusty Simpson (7-2, 2.45 ERA), and Leroy Purdy (6-4, 3.09 ERA). Relief was a big problem, although Marty LeFiles went 1-0 (0.53 ERA) in 17-innings pitched.

The Rebels easily won the Georgia Conference again (the fourth consecutive year), with a 7-1 record, including two pressure-packed wins over rival Shorter. For the first time in the school's history, and against a tough schedule, VSC became a legitimate small-college power, by achieving a 28-15 record, including the NAIA District title, and runner-up in the Area. Shoddy fielding cost the Rebs their best-ever chance to go to the Nationals, although Area champion David Lipscomb (an 8-3 victor over VSC) did finish second in the nation.

Coach Tommy Thomas did a great coaching job, and his players responded well, in many crucial situations. Thomas grabbed both Conference, and District Coachof-the-Year honors (for the third time), while Felts became the first, first-team All-American in the school's history (in any sport). Gene had the type of super year (against good opponents) that very few players ever experience, and the NAIA recognized this in making its award.





### 1973 RESUME VALDOSTA STATE BLAZERS

Coach Thomas faced a rebuilding year in 1973, having lost many front-line players, including the 1969 freshman crew that had carried the Rebels to four consecutive Georgia Conference championships, four consecutive NAIA District titles, and four consecutive NAIA Area appearances.

Besides losing some top-talent, VSC became an independent for the first time since 1957, dropping from the GIAC to join the newly formed South Atlantic Conference, which would begin operation in 1974. Also, the team would campaign under a new nickname, as the school became the Blazers (dropping the Rebel tag), to pacify a few black students on the Valdosta State campus. Although the nickname change would cause no problems, Thomas knew that without the incentive of a conference chase, and with the addition of a host of rookies, it might be a long year; so what did he do-- he initially scheduled 54 regular season games (by far a school record), which sounded absurd under the circumstances.

But "T.T." knew what he was doing. He justified the extended season by recruiting some top talent, that would provide VSC with their best record in history (43-14), including a third place (tie) finish in the school's first ever visit to the NAIA World Series. The Blazers sped to VSC's best ever start (at times 8-0, 13-1, and 18-2), which included wins over Kentucky, and Bowling Green, and a two-game sweep of Georgia. In their first 20-outings, only Florida State (3-2), and Lewis (1-0, with All-American Tom Brennan besting Sam Bowen in a classic match-up) could beat Valdosta State. VSC then dropped 8 of 18, in a mid-season slump, but rebounded to win 12-straight, including the team's fifth consecutive NAIA District title.

The Blazers went into the NAIA Area feeling confident with their 38-10 record, and three game District sweep, although defending champion David Lips-comb (40-8), and Birmingham Southern (38-6) stood in their way. After sweeping past the State College of Arkansas 11-0, Jerome Register (.305) etched his name forever in the VSC memory book, with a clutch throw and hit (see the tournament section for greater detail), to top Lipscomb 1-0.

Bowen pitched the second game of the finals, after a 10-8 loss to Southern, a superb 2-0, 17 strike-out, win over the Alabamians to send the team skyward to the long dreamed of NAIA World Series, in Phoenix, Ariz. Two catastrophies, some bad luck, and a ridiculous call, or two, ended VSC's Sun Valley stay prematurely (with a 2-2 National's record), but it was a great year, and one which saw many honors passed to both Coach Thomas, and individual members of the team.

The Blazers had some luck (which every successful club needs) during the year, but for the most-part it was talent that made the season. Gene Felts (.368) again led the hitters (although his home run production fell to four), and he was named first-team NAIA All-American for the second consecutive year. Centerfielder Bowen (who was barely steered away from Georgia Southern, out of Brunswick JC) was voted the team's MVP, although he hit only .266, but with 23 extra-base-hits, and 7 homers. Sam also was 3-2 (1.10 ERA) on the hill, including a one-hitter against Malone in the Nationals.

Register didn't claim an outfield berth until ten games into the season, but the strong, sppedy, Valdosta native was Mr. Clutch in most situations. With Bowen, and Felts, he helped form on of the nation's best outfields. Although Jerome was a surprize, the biggest shocker of all was Steve "Goofy" Jones (.300) at first. Goofy did the job all year, and hit .500 in the Nationals (a position record that

still stands). Frank Sumner (.274) provided leadership behind the plate, while the keystone combo of Terry Fields (.223), and Bobby Tripp (.277) was more than adequate. Tripp got off to a terrible start, but recovered in time to receive honorable mention All-American honors.

Part of the reason Bowen received his MVP honors was because of the pitchers votes, who unanimously saluted his major league defense. But even with the team's great outfield, the pitching was much more than expected. Coach Thomas picked up journeyman, right-hander Pat Arnett (8-4, 1.99 ERA), and the veteran transfer (North Florida JC, and Stetson) responded, pitching the majority of the "big" games. Nicknamed "The Old Man," Arnett had long since ruined his arm (by foolhardedly throwing semi-pro, double, and triple-headers) by over pitching. However, he survived with a variety of pitches, including a smooth, oily "spitter," which he used to perfection. Arnett was one of the few college pitchers who needed an oil change every few days, and rumor has it, that he carried a concealed dip stick. He was also the master of the quick pitch.

Augmenting Pat, was freshman Lee Daney (8-6, 2.12 ERA), an Air Force veteran, who threw hard, and was 5-0, at one time during the year. Daney, however, was unable to get along with the majority of the team, and was also plagued with a beautiful wife, who drew looks, smirks, and routine, male conversation from the Blazers. These facts, along with Arnett being awarded the Best Pitcher award (on a team vote), made Lee decide to not accompany the team to Phoenix, and possibly lost VSC a national title.

Relief ace Marty LeFiles (8-0, 2.36 ERA), did not start a game, but pitched brilliantly all year, including a 10.2-inning stint in the District, and a big win over Grand Canyon in Phoenix. Senior Andy Hassell (7-1, 1.54 ERA), and junior Dan Chadwick (6-0, 1.94 ERA) pitched against some weaker opponents, but still added immeasureably to the team's success. Delane Dacus (0-1, 1.78 ERA), and Rick Bowers (3-0, 1.57 ERA) also pitched well, mainly in relief. Bowers, however, broke curfew in Phoenix (it's always a woman), and was lost to the team in the Nationals.

You always remember your first, and 1973 was Valdosta State's first World Series. Although the hitting was only fair (.272), the pitching was the best in years (1.88 ERA), and that, combined with great spirit, and determination made the Blazers first year, truely one to remember.





## For Thomas, Baseball Isn't Everything

How could anybody dislike Tommy Thomas?

From fans, players and even opposing coaches, the message is always the same ... Thomas is just a hard guy not to get along with.

The nice-guy image of the 36-year-old Valdosta State College head baseball coach is so evident that his

assistant considers it his only flaw.

"If there's anything wrong with Tommy, it's that he's too nice." VSC assistant coach Dave Waples said. "I've been around him for five years, and I haven't found a fault

"He's just a charm to work with. If you can't work with

him, you can't work with anybody."

Almost the exact opposite of the soft-spoken Thomas, Waples admits his sometimes off-color language and fiery temper may have had an adverse effect.

"I may have helped soil Tommy's character," Waples said, "I think he's changed a little over the years, and I

think I've had an influence on that.

He had never been thrown out of a game before I started working with him, and now he's been thrown out of three. What usually happened was that I would set the guy (umpire) up. Then Tommy would say one little thing and the guy blows up.

'And I loved every minute of it."

Thomas admits he has been criticized in the past for not defending his players enough during his 10-year stint as the VSC head coach.

"As I grew up, it was my characteristic of not really getting too hot with the umpires," Thomas said. "The person I got hottest at was myself. I still feel that way. Very few times can you say the result of a game depended on officiating."

Themas' father, Fred, knows only too well how honest

with the officials Tommy has always been.

"He's never been one to raise a lot of hell with the umpires," the elder Thomas, who has watched his son go through every phase of baseball from midget league to college in Valdosta, said.

### A Special Insight

"He puts honesty above anything else in his play. I've seen him miss second base and then go back and touch it when nobody else knew it. I'm just real proud of him."

Although players are usually a hard lot to satisfy as far as coaches go, most of those who have played under Thomas have only good things to say.

"I owe coach Thomas everything," former VSC outfielder Jerome Register said. "He really helped me a lot."

After a mediocre junior college career, Thomas took a chance on Register. The former Lowndes High School standout made the most of the opportunity and became a starting rightfielder, eventually drafted by the pros.

Thomas never had a chance at major league stardom, but did enjoy an outstanding high school career at Valdosta before moving into the VSC starting lineup.

An accident in his senior year at VHS almost ended his

career prematurely.

"He was over in Waycross about the first game of the season," his father said, "and a pitch hit him right on the side of the head. It caused his brain to swell.

"For about three or four months there, he couldn't even talk. His ability to change thoughts into words or deeds was destroyed. As the brain decreased in size, he gradually began to come back.

"It gave me the biggest scare of my life."

But Thomas did survive the accident and played baseball under Gary Colson and Billy Grant at VSC. Grant, now the VSC athletic director, also coached Thomas in high school.

After graduation from VSC with a degree in business administration, Thomas abandoned the athletic field for the first time in his life to work for IBM in Tallahassee, Fla.

"I didn't like the idea of my normally tanned complexion turning white from being in a windowless office in the middle of a building all the day," Thomas said. "So I quit after 10 months."

From the world of big business, Thomas turned to teaching everything from spelling to geography at Morven Junior High School. He got a taste of coaching in Morven and decided that was the direction he ought to set his life in.

Two years later, he had a degree in physical education from Georgia Southern and a coaching job at Wilkinson County (Irwinton).

His relationship with Grant brought him back to Valdosta for a job at VSC in the fall of 1967. Two weeks before baseball season started in the spring, he was named head coach, taking over for Grant.

"The idea was that I would serve as Bill's assistant for two years," Thomas said. "But he just had so much to do, he told me to go ahead and take the team."

Over 300 victories later, Thomas still has it. In fact, his club is playing in the NCAA Division II national tournament this weekend.

And somehow, he has accomplished it all without a wife at his side.

"I'm not against the sacred vow of matrimony or anything," Thomas said. "I still look forward to the day when I may have a wonderful person to live with the rest of my life.

"I guess the reason I haven't gotten married is just a matter of being occupied with all the things I have to do."

Thomas points to his family and his religion as the most

important things in his life.

He still lives at home with his parents and teaches Sunday school at St. John The Evangelist Catholic Church.

"Baseball drives me nuts sometimes, but it's definitely not the most important thing in my life," Thomas said. "But I'm doing what I want to do, and what I like to do best."

### Baseball '73

It has finally ended!!! After scheduling the largest number of games in VSC history (49), the regular season portion of Blazer Baseball 1973 has come to a glorious close.

Along the way the Blazers set all kinds of records including most games played (46), most home games (37), most consecutive home games (24), most vocal assistant coach (Dave Waples), most errors in one inning ("Bird" Bradley 3), and the king of them all, most victories in one season (35). The latter is by far the most impressive of them all.

Although I have been accused all season of being "against" the baseball team, I did my best to portray Blazer Baseball as it really was. It really was a lot of time, effort, and work by the coaches, players, and the fans who sat through all 37 of those home games.

#### Thomas Started It All Back In October

Coach Tommy Thomas started it all back in October with conditioning drills and a review of baseball fundamentals during his annual fall practice. When he could take precious time off from his rigorous schedule as Cross-Country coach Dave Waples fulfilled his duty as VSC's first full time assistant baseball coach.

In late January, the "real" thing began when the pitchers began loosening their arms up in the crisp winter weather. A few days later, the Blazers' resident All American, Gene Felts, and his teammates brought out their bats to start pounding the old horsehide.

On March 16, the '73 season opened with the first of the multitude of home games. Pat Arnett won that first game against Morris Harvey, and the Blazers proceeded to reel off eight straight victories before Bowling Green burst our heroes' balloon with a 2-1 win.

On March 28, the high and mighty Seminoles of Florida State University cruised into town still smarting from the pounding they received here last year. They got their revenge when they put a mark in Arnett's loss column with a 3-2 Seminole victory.

But the Blazer battleship sailed on to five more wins to set the VSC record at an unbelievable 18-2.



Valdosta State College's Blazers nipped Columbus College's Corgars, 4-3 in a 13-inning duel here Friday and with the triumph captured the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) District 25 baseball championship.

The district crown was the fifth in a row for coach Tommy Thomas' Blazers who will carry a 10-game winning streak and a 38-11-1 record with them when they go to Knoxville, Tenn., next week to take part in the NAIA Area 5 playoffs. The area winner will earn a berth in the National NAIA tourney which is slated June 1-5 at Phoenix, Ariz.

Valdosta State needed the minimum of three consecutive victories to emerge on top in the four-team, three-day, double-elimination battle for the district crown. Friday's clincher, however, was an overtime thriller.

Coach Charlie Ragadale's Cougars, who posted a 2-2 mark in the tourney here, has now gone to the sideline for the season with a 27-16 mark.

Before meeting and defeating Columbus in the finals, VSC trimmed the West Georgia College Braves from Carrollten, 12-2, and the Shorter College Hawks from Rome, Ga. 5-2

In yesterday's bout with VSC the Cougars jumped off to an early three-run lead. They combined a triple by Verlin Perry with a Blazer error to score once in the first inning.


Valdosta State made it look easy last week when Coach Tommy Thomas' baseball Blazers swept the NAIA District 25 Tournament in three games.

In VSC's initial outing last Wednesday, Lee Daney throttled West Georgia for his seventh victory against five losses as Valdosta State exploded for a 12-2 win over the Braves from Carrollton.

After six innings, it appeared the Blazers were in for the battle of their lives as West Georgia led 2-1. In the seventh, Steve Jones knocked in the go-ahead run when he pounded out a single to score Frank Sumner and Bobby Tripp.

When the dust cleared at the end of the frame, the hometown crew led 7-2 amd Tripp, Sam Bowen and Jerome Register had rapped out a safety apiece.

In the following inning. All American Gene Felts lofted a 350 blast over the left field fence with Tripp on base to add some insurance runs to the VSC total. Terry Fields added a solo round tripper to two more Blazer runs in the next inning to complete the scoring for the day.

Arnett went the distance on the mound for the Blazers. He

boosted his hill record to 7.2 and lowered his earned run average to 2.09 for the year.

The Blazer defense, a trouble spot all season, turned in a sparkling performance by turning three double plays to wipe out Shorter rallies. VSC's "circus" infield of Bobby Tripp, Terry Fields, Bob White, and Steve Jones all had an outstanding day.

In the hitting department, Jerome Register demonstrated an ability to hit in the clutch when he punched out two hits driving in a pair of runs. Sam Bowen, Terry Fields and "Mr. Reliable"—Gene Felts also picked up one hit apiece.

Lamar Wright, Shorter's pitching ace, hurled his second game in two days in the second half of the afternoon's twin bill, but the strain proved too much as Wright and the Hawks left Valdosta with a 6-0 defeat by Columbus on their record.

Wright had clicked off 17 straight wins including 12 this

season before Chartie Ragsdale's Cougars socked it to him.

With their win, Columbus set the stage for the championship battle last Friday. To win the title, the Cougar nine would have to take two from the homestanding heroes. Needless to say, the order proved to be too big to fill.


It took 13 innings, but when it was all over, Valdosta State had a 4-3 victory and its fifth straight District 25 crown.





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# Bowen Pitches One-Hitter, Valdosta State Wins, 2-0

PHOENIX, Ariz. - Sam Bowen, a junior righthander from Brunswick, tied a National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics record when he pitched a one-hitter to lead Valdosta State to a 2-0 victory over Malone, Ohio, College in the national tournament Saturday.

Bowen's one-hitter also led to another record: The game was completed in one hour, 38

minutes, the shortest game ever in NAIA tournament competition.

Bowen got two runs in the second inning when Jerome Register was safe on a Malone error, Steve Jones sin-gled him to second and Bob White walked to load the bases. Terry Fields then singled to drive in Register and Jones, giving Bowen all the backup he needed.

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# Antelopes crumble to Valdosta, 10-8

Valdosta, Ga., State College's Blazers bombed error-plagued Grand Canyon College out of the 17th annual National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics championship baseball tournament yesterday.

The Georgians (43-13) unleashed a 14-hit attack and made the most of a half-dozen errors by coach Dave Brazell's Antelopes (40-18) to continue advancing through the loser's bracket.

The victory put Valdosta State into a 5 p.m. game tomorrow, but the Blazers' opponent won't be known until the completion of last night's loser's bracket game matching Wisconsin-Oshkosh (27-8) and Phillips University (30-17) of



Enid, Okla., and the meeting between the only two teams still unbeaten in the tourney, United States International University (33-8) of San Diego and Eastern Connecticut State College (30-6).

The 10-8 loss to Valdosta State by Canyon was as nightmarish for the 'Lopes as Saturday's 7-5 loss to Eastern Connecticut. In both games, Canyon led early only to be undone by its own errors. The Antelopes took an early three-run lead over the Blazers, but, just like Saturday night, Brazell could find no pitching to protect the lead and his defense crumbled.

Valdosta got into the lead, 4-3, with a four-run second inning, an error and a key double by Frank Sumner. Canyon then committed three errors in the fourth as the Blazers pushed across two more runs.

The Georgians nailed it down in the eighth on a single by Bobby Tripp, a triple by Gene Felts and an inside-thepark home run by Sam Bowen.

Canyon went into the bottom of the ninth trailing by 10-5. The Antelopes scratched up three runs before reliever Pat Arnett came to get Dennis Coon on a popup and Randy Catalanotte on a strikeout to end the game—and Grand Canyon's season.

Arnett picked up a save which gave the victory to Valdosta's second pitcher of the game Marty Lefiles, now 8-0. Leon Schielke started for Canyon and took the loss, his second in seven decisions.

Canyon had started the tournament—its third appearance under Brazell—with a 12-inning, 3-2 victory over Pembroke, N.C., State Friday.

Valdosta State, figured to be one of the favorites, began Friday with a 4-3 loss to Phillips, but came back Saturday to down Malone, Ohio, College, 2-0, on a one-hitter by Bowen.

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# Blazers Fall For Fourth Place

PHOENIX, Ariz. — A lastinning rally by Eastern Connecticut State's Warriors sent Valdosta State College's Blazers to the sidelines of the NAIA National Baseball Tournament after a 3-2 defeat here Monday.

A desperation rally by the Warriors in the bottom of the ninth, composed of three consecutive singles spelled defeat for VSC in the first game of the semi-finals and sent the Blazers home with the fourth-place trophy.

In the other semi-final game here Monday, United States International University dumped Oshkosh 8-5, leaving USIU and ECS to battle it out for first place today. Since USIU is undefeated in tourney play, anoth-

er game will be needed to decide the national champion Wednesday should ECS win today.

VSC and ECS battled tooth and nail until the bottom of the last frame when first baseman John Bruton, second-bagger Al Haberen, and catcher Micki Redmon teamed up for back-toback singles to break a 2-2 tie.

The Warriors from Willimantic, scored first in the bottom of the second and watched VSC tie it at 1-all in the top of the fifth.

Moving ahead again in the bottom of the sixth, only to be tied for the second time, at 2-all another Blazer rally in the top of the seventh, ECS finally moved ahead for good in the ninth.

The two teams battled a 97 degree heat in the late afternoon sun for a one-hour and 45 minute game.

The victory gave big right-

hander John Caneria a 10-3 record after he fanned a dozen batters and walked one while giving up six hits and two runs. He had just been announced as a second team NAIA All-America winner. His victory boosted the Warriors to a 31-8 record.

Pat Arnett, taking his second loss of the tournament, both of which Thomas said he shouldn't have lost, dropped to an 8-4 record for the year.

He struck out nine batters, walked one and gave up 11 hits while batting in both runs for his team.

Designated hitter for the warriors, Bill Azal, showed why with three hits and one run and an RBI in four times at bat. Among bis laurels were a triple after which he scored the first run.

The triple came in the bottom of the second when he pounded

one over the head of center fielder Sam Bowen. After an out Bruton singled him in.


VSC tied it when first baseman Steve Jones walked and scored on Arnett's single, which bobbled out of the ECS center fielder's hands in the top of the fifth but neither team was through.

In the next frame, Warrior centerfielder Tom Somers doubled and Azal returned to the plate for another hit, which Bowen bobbled, allowing Somers to score.

Tying the game once again in the top of the seventh, VSC's Jerome Register singled, went to third on Jones' double and scored on Arnetle's fielder's choice bunt.

The ninth frame, however, spelled defeat for VSC when after two outs, Keemon finally singled in Bruton.



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#### 1974 RESUME VALDOSTA STATE BLAZERS

It is assumed that after a great year (like the 1973 Blazer season) always leads to a great recruiting advantage for the next campaign. This is not necessiarly so, as Coach Tommy Thomas found after the Phoenix trip. He spent the greater part of the recruiting season attempting to advance through tournaments, and it was the middle of June before he hit the road; and found some top talent already gone.

But Thomas had college baseball's best outfield returning with Gene Felts in left, Sam Bowen in center, and Jerome Register in right. Valdostan Darrell Branam (.326) would be behind the plate, while red-shirts Jeff Greenhalgh (.231, first), and Pete Reeves (.271, short) would man infield positions. He recruited Dan Alford (.189) for second, and Steve Sumner (.286; Frank's cousin, who would share play with returnee Marty Bishop, .271) for third, and that left the big position (pitching) to be tackled.

VSC had lost the heart of its 1973 staff, with the departures of Arnett, and Daney, but returned Marty LeFiles (2-2, 4.50 ERA), Dan Chadwick (3-3, 3.12 ERA), and Rick Bowers (6-0, 0.90 ERA), although much more depth was needed. This was solved, after decision delays, and long recruiting battles, when JC transfers Dan Darden, and Foster Foran, and high schoolers Bill Petty, and Steve McDiffitt decided to join the Blazer fold.

Valdosta State began their quest for another NAIA World Series, and the initial South Atlantic Conference championship, with a twin-bill sweep of Shorter, behind Darden (7-2, 2.20 ERA), and Petty (11-2, 2.02 ERA). But it was not easy, early going, as the Blazers stood 6-5 at one point, before ending with a 35-10, regular season mark. Recruits shined early, as Foran (.405) assumed the DH duties, and had 18 RBI's in 11 games, before being sidelined with a broken wrist, and later for the entire season, with a broken ankle. Petty had the best ever year for a frosh pitcher, and Darden (.368) took over the DH job with much success. McDiffitt (5-1, 3.52 ERA) was rained-out of his first two starts, but later defeated Lewis (NAIA National champs), Georgia Southern (33-2, and ranked 4th. in the nation), and Florida State, to earn his nickname of "The Giant Killer."

Darden gave up his pitching career once he became the designated hitter, and at one point in the season went 25x38. He was also prone to slumps, however, and as he hit it, it seemed the rest of the team followed. Register (.347) had another super year, while Felts (.290) had an off-year, for him. The two-time All-American, senior had 34 RBI's, and 10 doubles, and played great defense. Bowen (.344) became VSC's second, first-team, All-American, as the Brunswick, centerfielder displayed great play all season. His impression helped further the reputation of Blazer baseball, nation wide. At the season's end, all three outfielders were drafted, and signed by professional teams. Of all the nation's colleges, no other school could boast this fact.

The South Atlantic Conference proved no obstacle, as VSC ran up a 16-2 league mark, far ahead of second-place Columbus (12-8). The Blazers 35-10, regular season log was a record. All set to enter the NAIA District tourney, Coach Thomas opted for the NCAA Regional in Lakeland, Fla., where three of the nation's six top-ranked (small college) teams lay in wait.

VSC simply destroyed the opposition in Lakeland, smothering Rollins (13-6), and bombing Eckerd twice (11-4 and 15-3; sandwiched between an 8-5 loss). Bowen got the MVP trophy, and also was given the nod for both centerfielder and pitcher

on the All-Regional tourney team. Both LeFiles and Petty pitched well, while Darden and Greenhalgh, especially, murdered the ball.

In their first trip to Springfield, Ill., and the Division Il World Series, the Blazers were ousted in two straight games. New Orleans blasted a host of VSC pitchers 13-9 (Bowen had 3-hits), and New Haven won a 1-0 squeaker, although Petty pitched a great game. The final log of 38-13 solidified Valdosta State as a legitimate small college power, especially with their NCAA success.

In the old days of baseball, an iron man was a pitcher who was able to pitch back-to back games, or pitch day after day without any rest.

A new "Iron Man" was born at Blazer Field Tuesday when Valdosta State College freshman lefthander Bill Petty picked up both wins in a baseball doubleheader with South Atlantic Conference for Armstrong State College.

Petty, a Grove City, Ohio native, shutout the Purates 8-0 in the first game and pitched 42-3 innings in relief to gam credit for the Blazers' 12-4 triumph in the final game of the twin-bill.

"I didn't get fired until the fourth inning of that second game," Petty said. "I was throwing mostly fastballs, trying to keep them low." Petty is now 8-0 for the year.

"Petty has always had good control," VSC head coach Tommy Thomas said. "Also he's got a real good off speed pitch which he uses very effectively."

Although Petty did the job on the Armstrong nine from the mount, Thomas wasn't about to slight his Blazer offense.

"Today was without a doubt the best hitting day that we've had all year," Thomas said.

Dan Darden slammed the first pitch of the first game into left field for a clean base hit, and the Blazers were on their way.

VSC marked up one more run in the third when catcher Branum runched out his third hit of the day to score Register.


Bowen, Felts, and Darden also collected a trio of hits for the afternoon.

LAKELAND, Fla.—Valdosta State College, which ended the regular season in a critical hitting slump, exploded for 16 hits and two six-run innings here Friday to bury the hardhitting Rollins College Tars, 13-6, in the opening game of the NCAA South Atlantic Region tournament.

The booming bats of Jerome Register, Darrell Branam, Dan Darden, Jeff Greenhalgh, and Dan Alford, brought home 10 of the Blazers' 13 runs and brought VSC out of the recent skid at the plate.

And the big hitting day could not have come at a better time because the Tars would not give up, rapping out 12 hits of their own and cutting an early 7-0 VSC lead to 7.6 in the fifth inning.

The victim of the Rollins rally was freshman rightnander Steve McDiffitt, freshman who couldn't stand prosperity and gave up four runs in the third.

He jumped back into trouble in the fourth and head coach Tommy Thomas called on ace reliever Mariy LeFiles to shut down the rallying Tars.

Except for the fifth, LeFiles was brilliant in relief, He scattered five hits, walked one, and fanned two to pick up his second win of the year.

LeFiles' supporting cast was equally brilliant. Register, Brannam and Darden ripped three hits each and drove in six runs among them. Alford's bases-loaded double drove in runs eight and nine to highlight the big seventh and Greenhalgh knocked in a pair of runs with

the last eight innings, he was backed by sparkling defensive play. Shortstop Pete Reeves saved a run in the seventh by fielding a ground ball to his left and throwing out the runner.

In the eighth, Bowen made a great running catch and doubled a runner off first base with a perfect strike to Greenhalgh to end the inning.

Petty picked up his 11th win of the year against a single loss.

Couch Tommy Thomas was naturally pleased following the comeback victory.

"It's just a great feeling. I'm real proud of the boys for the way they continued to come from behind and win.

"It was just like it has been all year. Although we have struggled, I think this team truly deserves all the good things that have happened so far. "I certainly want to commend Petty for coming back from what was a jolting first inning. # Blazers Bomb Way To NCAA Title

LAKELAND, Fla.— Pitching, which had not played a key role in the South Atlantic Region tournament, finally proved to be the difference here late Sunday afternoon.

The Valdosta State College Blazers had an ace in the fiele, the Eckerd College Tritans didn't, and the result was a iopsided 15-3 Blazer victory for the National Collegiate Athletic Association South Atlantic Region championship.

Eckerd forced a second game Sunday with a comeback 8-5 win over Valdosta State in the double elimination event, but the Tritans exhausted their pitching staff in the process.

The Blazers, who could have ended the tourney early with a wire in the opener, used five pitchers in an effort to stop the rallying Eckerd express. But it was to no avail.


Being forced into a second game for all the marbles, VSC coach Tommy Thomas played his ace and got winning results.

Sam Bowen, a centerfielder by trade but a pitcher on occasion by necessity, was called on to pitch the championship game, and the Brunswick senior responded with an outstanding effort. The stocky righthander went the distance, scattering nine hits, walking seven and striking out eleven. He helped himself with the bat, slamming a two-run homer in the first inning to shake the Blazers to an early 20 lead. Bowen also had a triple and a stolen base, and was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

The easy second game triumph Suriay earned Valdosta State a trip to the NCAA Division II finals in Springfield, Ill., which begin Sunday. The national meet is a six-team, double elimination affair.

The Blazers looked for awhile Sunday like they would end the tournament by midafternoon. After reliever Marty LeFiles bailed VSC starter Bick Bowers out of trouble in the second, Valdosta State built a 5-2 lead and LeFiles was sailing along.

He sailed into the seventh with the three-ran cushion only to see it quickly vanish. After a leadoff single, the Blazers failed to turn a double

play and the mistake was costly. With one out Wayne Politelli doubled for one run, Bill Evers tripled for another and LeFiles was through for the afternoon.

Dan Darden, who had a great tournament as the Blazers' designated hitter, came in to pitch but had no success. His wild pitch allowed the tying run to score. and two walks and a hit batsman later he was replaced by Danny Chadwick.

Chadwick did a good job, getting out of a bases loaded iam to keep the score knotted at five. But Eckerd would not be denied.

1 n the eighth Evers delivered a clutch two-out single to center that scored the go-ahead run and Bob Outwater followed with a single to right, scoring two more runs, icing the win and forcing the second game.

Charles Gordon, who relieved Joe Cipriano in the third inning, picked up the win, holding the big Blazer bats to five hits while striking out six.

The comeback victory was all for naught, however, as the Blazers bombed four Eckerd pitchers for 16 hits which produced the 15 runs in the title match.

The Tritans had already used all their front line hurlers and the exhausted pitching staff simply could not go the last mile.

The Blazers, on the other hand, had Bowen. And he was more than enough.

After Bowen started the offense with his 385-foot blast in the first that also scored Pete Reeves, the VSC bats went to work in earnest in the third. Marty Bishop's tworun double keyed four-run explosion and the Blazers were off and running.

Valdosta State picked up an unearned run in the fifth, then struck for four more markers in the seventh, which included back-to-back triples by Bowen and Gene Felts and a two-run single by Jeff Greenhalgh.

The Blazers continued the merry-go-round in the seventh and eighth frames, picking up two runs in each inning. Consecutive doubles by Branam Darrell - and Greenhalgh did the damage in the seventh while a bases. loaded walk to Bowen and an infield out scored the two eighth inning ruus.



Bowen allowed two harmless runs in the ninth, and when second baseman Vince Musashe grabbed a soft fly ball for the third out a wild celebration erupted.

Thomas, who had saved Bowen for the emergency that arose Sunday, was one of the happiest people here following the clinching victory.

"It's just great to win this thing on our first trip to an NCAA tournament," he said "Right now, I can't single out a lot of individuals. The entire team did it, and the entire team deserves credit for it.

"I definitely think we were the best team here. Our hitting was better than anybody's, and it was a hitters' tournament. These young men certainly deserve this championship.

Four Blazers were named to the all-tournament team. Bowen made it as a pitcher and as the tourney's centerfielder, as well as winning the MVP award. Freshman

pitcher Bill Petty, who fired a 10-hitter to win Saturday's game against Eckerd 11-4, was selected as was first baseman Greenhalgh and

designated hitter Darden.

Greenhalgh was 8 for 16 in the tourney with nine runs batted in while Darden had 8 hits in 11 trips.

### New Haven Stays Alive, Ousts Valdosta State

Not so long ago, the three Rs used to be the big thing around educational institutions.

But the bet here is that all they're talking about at the University of New Haven (Conn.) today are the three Ps - Paglialunga, Pulit and Powers. First baseman Len Paglialunga, starting pitcher John Published reliever Bebby Powers were the three heroes Sunday at Lanphier Park as Coach Frank Vieira's Chargers eliminated Valdosta (Ga.) State from the National Collegiate Division World Series. New Haven, with its back to the wall after losing Saturday, made Valdosta the Series' first casualty by handing the Blazers a 1-0 defeat. It was only the second time Valdosta, which bowed out at 38-13, had been shut out this year.

But the heroes had to get an assist from the law of averages in posting their 25th victory against seven losses.

Just as a New Haven error paved the way for a to California-Irvine Saurday, so a Valdosta error was one of the key factors in sending the Blazers packing

Joe Small, the man who made the error that opened the gates to a four-run Irvine inning Saturday, learned Sunday how it feels to be on the other side of the fence. He opened the bottom of the sixth inning by lacing a grounder off Blazer pitcher Bill Petty's ankle. The ball caromed over to near the third base line before Petty could retrieve it and, when he did, he tossed wildly down the right-field line in a futile attempt to throw out Small Small ended up at third

Petty then got Ed Pikor to ground out and was able to glove Rich Montoni's hot smash back to the box. But Paglialunga, a .398 hitter coming into the tournament, drilled a single to left to score the only run New Haven needed.

"I'll tell you, I've owed him (Pulit) one for awhile now. I relieved him in a game where we were down, 3-1, against Quinnipiac. I gave up a run and we ended up losing by one and that's the only loss he's had this year."

Pulit, 7-1, admitted he was tiring.

"It was probably the best thing that could have happened," Pulit said of Vieira's decision. "I was having some trouble with my curveball not breaking. I was a little tight when the game started, but, once we got going, I figured we were the better team. Our defense did it. They've been great all year. We wouldn't be here without our defense."

"When I go to the mound, they know they're gone," said the self-described "crazy man." "I saw the home run he (Greenhalgh) hit Saturday and, when I saw him hit that long foul off John, I

made up my mind. John did a good job. He went over seven innings and that's all we wanted from him. Sure, he was on the ropes awhile, but he's been on the ropes before and he's a kid who never loses his cool. He just doesn't get shook up out there. If he's not an All-American, I don't know who is. I just thank God for a guy like John Puht."

Paghalunga said he hit a fastball for the game's only run batted in.

"The pitching here is better than what we've seen all year," he admitted. "I just wanted to make contact with the ball. They're not just throwing the ball over here, they're aiming for the corners."

### 1975 RESUME VALDOSTA STATE BLAZERS

After two consecutive National Tournament appearances, 1975 must be considered a "down" year. The Blazers did go 36-17 on the season (the fifth best percentage mark in school history), and received an NCAA Regional bid, but failed to win the South Atlantic Conference (14-4, to winning Columbus' 15-4), and dropped six of their last eight encounters. The loss of Felts, Bowen, and Register proved to big an obstacle to over-come, in VSC's quest for National honors.

Hitting was the major problem (.262 as a team), but even more frustrating was VSC's inability to hit with men-on-base. JC recruit, Dave Taylor (.354) led the team from his short-stop position, while 1974 hero, Dan Darden (.332, and now in centerfield), and returnees Moose Greenhalgh (.291), and Darrell Branam (.274) provided help. Frosh recruit, Craig Viers (from Crown Point, Ind.) hit a solid .284, but no other regular was over the .250 mark.

Pitching-wise, the team had a 2.65 ERA, and was led by Lawrence Clarington (5-1, 1.66 ERA), Bull Giddens (4-2, 1.83 ERA), Tony Ferrera (5-1, 2.33 ERA), and ace-reliever Bill Parsons (5-0, 2.40 ERA). Veteran, sophomores Bill Petty (7-6, 2.94 ERA), and Steve McDiffitt (5-5, 3.24 ERA) pitched the "big" games, and were most often the victims of the lack of clutch hitting.

VSC jumped to a 23-7 mark, including 3-wins over NAIA National champion, Lewis (who won the Nationals in '74, '75, and '76). Darden got all three game winning hits (twice in the bottom-of-the-ninth, and once in the bottom-of-the-eighth), in 8-7, 6-5, and 5-4 decisions. Columbus took the wind out of the Blazer sails by winning a conference twin-bill in Columbus, but the good-guys did get the decision in a fight between the team, and a roudy group of Cougar fans. The record stretched to 29-9, 31-10, and 34-11 before the late season demise began. Included, however, in the late-season losses, were conference set-backs to Columbus and Augusta, that cost VSC the title.

The Blazers returned to the site of their big regional win, in 1974, at Lakeland, Fla., and were promptly eliminated in two straight games (Florida Southern 6-0, and Columbus 5-2). Darden, and Greenhalgh especially had good years, with the "Deacon" having 25 stolen-bases (in 26 attempts), and 25 extra-base-hits, while "Moose" hit 9 homers, and played a superb first-base. Taylor was a great leader, besides hitting for the second-best average ever, by a VSC short-stop.







# Bassett Singles Blazers Past Bears In 12th

In the Valdosta State College baseball brochure, Carlton Bassett is listed as an 18-year-old freshman pitcher from Thomasville who throws right, bats right and for all practical purposes, has no outstanding attributes.

But all that was before Wednesday when he started his first college game ever in right field for VSC, and cracked a pair of hits including the game winner in the bottom of the 12th inning to push the Blazers past Mercer's Bears 7-6.

Most of the slim crowd at Blazer Field had long departed when VSC second baseman Dan Alford looped a long double to right center field to lead off the 12th for Coach Tommy Thomas' Valdosta State nine.

Alford was followed by Bassett, who promptly drilled a single up the middle to score Alford and gain the praise of his teammates and his coach.

"It was a great win for us,"
Thomas said. "Especially
after those two losses
Tuesday to Columbus.
Mercer has a good baseball
team, and I'm real pleased to
beat them.

"I have to single out some individuals like Carlton, of course, who really came through for us in right field and at the plate. He'll get another chance out there for sure."

"Dan Darden made one of the finest catches I've ever seen in center field in the 12th inning. Then there's Bill-Parsons who came on in relief and stopped them from the mound."

Thomas added he felt his men had a little revenge to get on the Bears after a recent trip to Macon where VSC came back with a loss and a few complaints about the umpires.

There was much arguing both ways Wednesday, but as usual the umpires never reversed their decision.

It was evident from the start of the three and one half hour contest that the Blazers' Lawrence Clarington just did not have the stuff to last on

the mound.

He gave a pretty good indication in the opening frame when he walked four Bears and gave up a double to Greg Engle for a total of three Mercer runs.

Mercer's John Hart didn't have much better luck in the VSC half of the first, allowing five walks, a single to Craig Viers and two Blazer tallies.

The Bears managed another run in the second and Clarington was gone. Tony Ferrera appeared in relief only to take the long walk from the mound himself in the fourth when the Bears woke up for two more runs.

As did Parsons, Robert Yopp had to come on in relief in the fourth for Mercer after Darrell Branam had slammed his fifth homer of the year in the third and VSC had brought in two more runs in the fourth.

Viers' single which plated Darden in the eighth tied things up until the lanky freshman rightfielder did his thing in the 12th.

Darden's diving grab of Bob Mitchell's sinking liner in the top of the 12th could have spurred Bassett's emotions since the ball looked impossible to catch until the speedy Macon native made believers out of everyone.

The now 24-9 Blazers were scheduled to take on Georgia College in Milledgeville today before hitting the road to Augusta Saturday.


#### 1976 RESUME VALDOSTA STATE BLAZERS

Valdosta State blasted to a 9-1 get-away, in the first ten games, including wins over Georgia, Western Kentucky (twice), and Duke. People were saying that the 1976 team would be the best in VSC history. Indeed, on paper, a great year was in the offing. Pitching-wise, the frosh phenoms of 1974 were back (Bill Petty 6-3, 2.14 ERA; and Steve McDiffitt 6-6, 1.94 ERA), along with returnee Bull Giddens (3-6, 3.47 ERA), and JUCO tranfers Richard Sullivan (5-6, 2.29 ERA), and Hodges McLendon (3-3, 3.17 ERA).

The infield was also supposed to be the school's best ever, with Danny Blizzard (.241) at third, Dave Taylor (.240) at short, Skip Fite (.312) at second, and Moose Greenhalgh (.247) at first. Mike Balboni (.151), and Cecil Whitehead (.258) would share the catching duties. In the outfield, Dan Alford (.324) was in left, Craig Viers (.313) in center, while David DeMersseman (.248), and Chuck Beale (.313) alternated in left.

The Blazers dropped a double-header (4-1, and 1-0) to Illinois Benedictine, the day prior to Winter Quarter finals, and never recovered. They ended the year 28-25 (the worst record since 1967), with a humiliating 8-10, South Atlantic Conference mark. For the first-time since 1968 no tournament bid was offered.

The hitting was pathetic (.263), and unlike 1975 where clutch hitting was the problem, the 1976 crew (after the first ten games) was unable to even get men on base. They were shut-out 8 times, and scored above 4-runs only 23-times in 53-games. The pitchers suffered from all this, with Petty, McDiffitt, and Sullivan mostly being the victims. Chuck Beale (3-0, 2.14 ERA), Lawrence Clarington (1-1, 2.18 ERA), and Billy Tyler (1-0, 3.27 ERA) pitched well in relief. The staff would have been even stronger, had fire-balling, southpaw Vic Feist (0-0, 0.00 ERA) recovered from arm surgery.

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### 1977 RESUME VALDOSTA STATE BLAZERS

Sometimes when things look the bleakest, good things happen. Such was the 1977 season, that saw VSC go 47-16, and make their third National Tournament appearance in 5-years. Coming off the disappointing years of 1975 (36-17), and 1976 (28-25), the Blazers had things fall together, and won their second South Athletic Conference title (13-2) since the inception of the League in 1974.

The hitting (.315) was the best in the school's history, although averages in both college, and professional ball were way up. The pitching was good, even though the team ERA of 3.51 was the third highest in VSC history. The higher batting averages, and soaring ERA's were attributed to baseballs stitched in Hiati.

Local-boy, Cecil Whitehead (.373) led the hitters, and had the greatest power year, since Gene Felts (1972). Cecil had 26 extra-base-hits, and broke the record for runs-batted-in (53). He got adequate support from a host of .300 hitters, including Skip Fite (.366), Craig Viers (.348), Ken Smith (.333), Sal Amadeo (.330), Bruce Fowler (.329), David DeMersseman (.326), and Billy Fortenberry (.320). Fortenberry, Amadeo, and Viers formed the best hitting outfield since Felts, Bowen, and Register (1973 and 1974).

Freshman, lefthander Jimmy Wall (8-1, 1.93 ERA), veterans Steve McDiffitt (10-1, 2.50 ERA), Bill Petty (7-2, 3.18 ERA), and Richard Sullivan (9-4, 3.62 ERA) handled the starting chores, while Charlie Beale (2-2, 2.81 ERA) pitched brilliant relief. Frosh Mike Raines (4-0, 6.59 ERA), and lefty, reliever Billy Tyler (3-2, 3.83 ERA) added much depth to the staff.

The Blazers raced to 8-1, and 15-3 marks, and were 20-8 when they began their quest for the SAC crown. They shut-out Armstrong State three-times, blasted West Georgia in a 3-game series (allowing only 3-runs), and beat Southern Tech thrice (allowing only two runs). In Columbus, for a 3-game set, VSC won the Friday contest (10-3), before losing twice the next day (6-5, and 16-7). The Blazers held a 5-0 lead in that first-game, going into the bottom of the eighth, only to be beaten on a tenth-inning homer.

Going into the final series of the season (at Augusta), Valdosta State had to sweep, while West Georgia had to beat Columbus 2 of 3. It happened exactly that way, and gave VSC the right to host the first South Atlantic Conference tournament, as regular season champions. Super, relief pitching by Beale, and a solid-hitting attack won the tourney, and put the NCAA Regionals in Valdosta.


In the SAC tourney, the Blazers blasted Columbus, before splitting with West Georgia (losing 16-8, and winning 8-5) the next day. The last day twin-bill was particularly important to VSC morale, since it was played without Whitehead, whose father had passed-away, the day before (it was the sixteenth, and seventeenth games that Cecil missed in 1977; the first 15 because of a hand injury). Freshman Ken Smith went 5x7, for the day, in Whitehead's position, as the team rallied for Cecil.

The Regionals were a hard-fought affair, as VSC lost to West Georgia in the second-round (4-3, in 10-innings) to put themselves in the losers bracket. They had blasted 20-hits, a day earlier to pound Columbus 18-3 (behind Viers' 7 RBI's, and McDiffitt's pitching), and had to face them again, in a Saturday do-or-die situation. The Blazers won it 4-1, and moved into the finals versus the Braves.

After falling behind 4-0 in the first-inning of the Sunday opener, VSC won a 9-6 decision, and a second game became necessary. Bill Petty pitched a brilliant

game (allowing only two runs; both unearned), and a bottom-of-the-ninth, 2-run homer, by Viers put the Blazers in Springfield (III., and the Nationals), with a 3-2 win. Viers was Regional MVP, going 11x19 at the plate, in five games.


As usual in National Tournaments, VSC lost their first game (2-1, to top-ranked Eckerd), but did fight their way through the losers bracket, beating Shippensburg State (2-1, in 13-innings), and UMo-St. Louis (11-4). They were eliminated in the bottom-of-the-ninth, when UCalif-Riverside scored two-runs, for an 8-7 win. The school's National Tournament(s) record became 4-6 (with 5 of the losses by 1-run), with a 1-6 record as visitors (VSC is 3-0 as the home team).






VSC Catcher Cecil Whitehead Waits For Throw

By MARTIN REGISTER Craig Viers lofted a ninthinning two-run homer over the right field fence here Sunday, lifting Valdosta State College's Blazers to a 3-2 win over West Georgia in the NCAA South Atlantic Regional Division II baseball championship game. Valdosta State had upended the Braves, previously unbeated in the double elimination tourney, 9-6, in a game played earlier in the day, to force the final contest. West Georgia pitcher Brad Campbell had held coach Tommy Thomas's Blazers hitless through two innings after relieving starter Bill Taylor in the seventh frame, before Viers pulled the game out of fire for VSC. Valdosta State collected just four hits, half as many as the Braves of coach Archie White, and committed three errors to none for West Georgia. Blazers' three.

But the Braves made little use of the runners it put on base, stranding seven to the

Viers' shot just cleared the right field corner as West Georgia outfielder Leonard Hartsfield crashed into the fence in a vain effort to avert disaster.

Hartsfield lay stunned for a few moments as the highly partisan crowd roared to its feet.

Bill Petty went the distance on the mound for the Blazers, scattering eight hits effectively in the do-or-die

The victory put the Blazers

among prestigious company. as one of only eight division II teams remaining in the race for the national championship.

The national tourney is to be held in Springfield, Ill., in two weeks.

West Georgia left men on the bases in four of the first five innings, but Valdosta State had difficulty getting men even that far.

Sal Amadeo finally gave the Blazers their first hit, in the fifth inning, with a towering home run to left îield.

But West Georgia answered in the sixth when, aided by two Blazer errors, it scored both its runs.

That's the way things stood, as Taylor and Campbell consistently mowed down VSC's powerful hitters. until Viers' blast, with second baseman Skip Fite on board. decided the outcome.

Viers, as White pointed out later, had attempted to bunt on two previous pitches. "If he had been able to bunt." White said, "this would never had happened."

The Blazer rightfielder. who batted .599 and banged out 15 RBI in the three-day tourney, was chosen its Most Valuable Player by a special all-tournament team committee.

Skip Fite was named to the team as second baseman. while Amadeo was tabbed as its centerfielder, VSC catcher Cecil Whitehead was chosen as the designated hitter, and Petty and teammate Steve McDiffitt were named as pitchers.

West Georgia's towering Dan Logan, who is 6-7 and looks even bigger, was tabbed as the all-tournament first baseman, while fellow Brave Bill Fite was named to the catcher's position.

The fiery ex-paratrooper. older brother of VSC's Skip Fite, was obviously a team leader for the Braves, but his enthusiasm got him into trouble Saturday.

Violently contesting a call at the plate, he was finally ejected from that game.

Third baseman James Brown, shortstop Tommy Harrell and leftfielder Mark Landers were named to the honor team from Columbus College.

Randolph-Macon, the tourney's only team not from the state of Georgia, absorbed two lopsided losses early in the tourney and failed to place a player on the all-tournament team

Thomas, ecstatic over his team's rise from what looked like certain elimination twice in one day, did little to hide his emotions.

"It was really a great win." he said, understating the situation after the second game. "I'm still on a cloud. I'm just thrilled, thrilled for the boys.

"I have to hand it to West Georgia, and to all the teams in this tournament. They worked hard ... but so did we.

"I think its only right that we won, and that we are going to the national tournament. This team had the best season of anyone in the region, so it deserves to go."

White disagreed, "We did allright," he said. "I still think we have the better ballclub, though. Look at the hits. With four hits, there's no way VSC should have won this game.

"But I really hope they (VSC) do well out there at the national tournament."

"Viers was just amazing." Thomas said of his small, gutty outfielder, who tied two school records with five hits and seven RBI in a game, against Columbus on Friday. "and Petty did a great job. especially toward the finish."

"But I could go on and name every player on the team. There are so many people who are in on this, and I'm so happy for all of them ''

Richard Sullivan, who pitched the majority of the final three innings, was credited with a save. Avres took the mound loss for West Georgia.

The Blazers outhit West Georgia, 13-11, in that game. but also committed more errors, four to one.

# It Was A Big Home Run

It wasn't the fabled "shot heard round the world", but to the people involved, it was just as big a home run.

Craig Viers connected for the most important hit of his life at Blazer Field here Sunday when he slapped a 335-foot job just out of the reach of West Georgia rightfielder. Leonard Hartsfield

As Hartsfield dived onto the right field fence, the now suddenly tiny white piece of cork and cowhide landed a tantalizing foot beyond his outstretched glove.

When Hartsfield collapsed in a gutty display of disgust and pain back on the playing field, the hopes of the Braves from Carrollton collapsed with him.

In the other dugout, the red-jerseyed Blazers exhibited unbridled emotion. Their joy was deep rooted since Viers' home run meant a 3-2 VSC win and a trip to Springfield, Ill. for the NCAA Division II national tournament.

As Viers rounded the bases, pushing through teammates on his way from third to home, different thoughts clouded the minds of key individuals in the piece of Valdosta State history unfolding out on the diamond.

"I knew it was gone, but I thought it was going to hook foul," Viers said of only his second home run of the season. "He (VSC head coach Tommy Thomas) had me bunting at first, but after that I was just trying to hit it."

Thomas took off the bunt when Braves' pitcher Brad Campbell got two quick strikes on the Crown Point, Ind. letthander. With that 0-2 count, and teammate Skip Fite waiting in the blocks at first base, Viers smashed any national tournament hopes West Georgia might have entertained.

And Braves' head coach Archie White was entertaining them

"I thought we had them whipped," White said of the 2-1 lead his club had going into the bottom of the ninth inning. "If the guy had laid the ball down like he was supposed to, it might have been different. I wanted him to lay it down.

"I knew they had two righthanders coming up, and I figured Brad would get them. Normally, he (Viers) would have ended up the goat for not bunting, and he winds up the hero.


"But I still think we had the best ballclub. For a ballclub that wasn't even supposed to be here, I thought we did a helluva job."

VSC catcher Cecil Whitehead was following Viers in the batting order and would have come up with one out and Fite on second had the sacrifice bunt worked.

"I was just hoping Craig would do it because I didn't want to come up," Whitehead said. This was the same modest Whitehead who already has more RBI (50) than any player on the team and needs only one more to break 'Gene Felts' alltime record.

From Bill Petty, the VSC pitcher in the game who had seen his teammates commit crucial errors to let in both of West Georgia's runs, there was no comment ... only a physical reaction.

Viers' swing had given new life to Petty's final season in a VSC uniform. He was one of the first to reach the hero of the day and one of the last to stop crowing about it. How fitting it was for he and Steve McDiffitt, the freshmen



sensations back in '74, to trot to the infield together when they were announced to the all-tournament team.

And finally there was Thomas himself.

The man who suffered through a 28-25 season a year ago had a deep grin plastered on his suntanned face and a merry twinkle sunk deep into his eyes behind his glasses.

And he couldn't stop giggling like a schoolgirl headed for her first Sunday School party with a member of the opposite sex.

Accepting congratulatory handshakes from the men and hugs from the women, young and old, the home-grown bachelor took a long time just to soak up the enormity of it all.

"I honestly felt there was a chance to win it," Thomas said. "We had the meat of the order coming up. But a home run was the last thing on my mind."

This reporter reminded Thomas of a similar blast former VSC standout Leroy Purdy had hit many long years ago.

"That was a good one," Thomas agreed, "but this one is better because it is now."

Purdy's home run came in a bottom of the ninth, two-out situation in the NAIA District 25 tournament in Columbus. It sent Valdosta State to the area tournament.

"It is fitting that we should win this tournament," Thomas said. "We had the best season record, we had the best record against the teams in the tournament, and by cracky, our guys deserved it."

Thomas said last week that neither Columbus nor West Georgia should have been invited to the regional because VSC had defeated both for the South Atlantic Conference regular season and tournament titles. As it turned out, the Blazers again proved they were the best team.

As the sun began to set on Blazer Field, Thomas was still around long after the batgirls, fens, major league scouts, Braves and Blazers had left.

What was going through his mind as he gazed onto the now empty field which had been filled with so much excitement only minutes before.

"It's all over," he said. "I know for sure West Georgia's not going to get to bat again."

# Blazers Eye Win In First Round

In 1974, a pair of wild-eyed freshmen with Yankee accents joined the Valdosta State College baseball team.

At the time, nobody expected much out of Bill Petty, a smooth-working lefthander from Grove City, Ohio, or Steve McDiffit, an awkwardlooking New Martinville, W. Va. righthander.

But as the season progressed, the two first-year men, who became fast friends, gained almost as much ink as VSC's famed '74 outfield of Sam Bowen, Gene Felts and Jerome Register.

With the outfield trio, all destined to sign minor league contracts, supplying the offensive power, Petty and MeDiffitt provided the pitching.

Nicknamed the "giant-killer" because of his clutch performances against major college competition, McDiffit gained the starting nod in VSC's first game ever in the NCAA Division II national tournament.

Either Springfield, Ill. wasn't his kind of town or New Orleans University had some Cajun magic working for it, because McDiffitt got shelled in the first three innings.

VSC eventually lost the game 13-9.

The next day, Petty was near perfect against New Haven, Conn. but lost a tough 1-0 decision, and the Blazers headed for home.

Now, it's three years later and Valdosta State is back in Springfield after that same national title it didn't even get a smell of in 1974.

And again, McDiffitt is scheduled to pitch Saturday's 2:45 p.m. (CST) first game against Eckerd (Fla.).

"I'm hoping it will be better this time," McDiffitt said, "but my arm has been hurting me lately. I've been getting some ultrasound on it, but I doubt it will really be

ready."

McDiffitt piled up 10 wins against no defeats this year with the second lowest earned run average (2.29) on the team. Freshman lefthander Jimmy Wall had a 2.10 ERA with a 8-1 record.

Has three extra years of experience turned McDiffitt into a battle-hardened veteran?

"I know I'll still be a little nervous out there, but I think anybody would," he said. "The butterflies will still be there.

"I think this team is better all-round than the one in '74 We had some great players, but we didn't have any pitching."

Petty, who hasn't been designated a tourney starting assignment so far by VSC head coach Tommy Thomas, agrees this year's 45-14 club is better.

"We're a better hitting team," Petty said. "Our outfield was great that year, but the infield wasn't that good.

"I say we'll do all right. I believe we'll play at least four games. The last time, after me and Steve pitched, nobody else was that im-

"Our pitching has been pretty good this year. I think Chuck Beale has made the difference."

Beale, a senior righthander, provided timely relief performances in both the South Atlantic Conference

tournament and the South Atlantic Regional.

Petty, 7-2 with a 3.00 ERA, was also instrumental in the Blazers' success in the tournaments. He was named to the all-regional tourney team along with McDiffitt.

Other members of the team figure winning the first game is the real key in the double elimination national tournament.

"If we win the first game, we'll win it all," second baseman Skip Fite said.

"I think the winner of the first game will go all the way," relief pitcher Billy Tyler said.

"We've got to win the first one," rightfielder Craig Viers echoed. "If you lose the first one, you just have to play too many games."

Not a single Blazer predicted instant success. All seemed confident the team could hit with the best the tourney had to offer, however.

The biggest question mark seemed to be occasional defensive lapses which have gotten the team in trouble more times than one.

In Saturday's first game, New Haven meets Shippensburg (Pa.) State at noon.

After the VSC-Eckerd game, Southern Illinois of Edwardsville takes on the University of Missouri at St. Louis at 6 p.m. At 8:45 p.m., Delta (Miss.) State tangles with the University of California at Riverside.

# Eckerd scratches out 2-1 victory

The usually potent Eckerd College offense managed only three hits, but two of them were opposite-field home runs as the No. 1-ranked Tritons outlasted Valdosta State, 2-1, Saturday in the second game of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division II World Series at Lanphier Park.

The Tritons (32-7) of St. Petersburg, Fla., carried a .339 team batting average into the contest and didn't get their third hit until Joe Westmoreland singled to center in the eighth inning.

But the Blazers (45-15) of Valdosta, Ga., brought a .318 team mark to the park andhad only four hits, including an infield single and a double that caromed off the third-base bag.

The difference was Joe LeFebvre, a left-handed hitter who ripped a first-inning homer over the right-field fence, and Steve Balboni, a right-handed hitter who bombed a seventh-inning homer over the left-field fence.

Both shots were first-pitch deliveries from starter and loser Steve McDiffitt, who suffered his first loss against 10 triumphs.

The winner was sophomore Kerry Freedman (12-1), who in addition to allowing four hits gave up eight walks and uncorked a pasir of wild pitches — one of which sent home Valdosta's only run in the fifth inning after an hour delay because of rain.

But Freedman had it when he needed it, striking out 10 Blazers and escaping bases-loaded jams in the eighth and ninth innings unscathed.

"That's his kind of ball game," Eckerd Coach Bill Livesey said of his young right-hander. He walked the bases loaded in Miami and then struck out the

side. You go with what brung you here," he quipped, "and he brung us here. He'll strand 14 men."

Valdosta didn't strand 14, but the Blazers did leave eight men on base by failing to get the big hit, especially in the late going.

"Lack of the key hit," sighed Valdosta Coach Tom Thomas. "But I think the two pitchers just did an outstanding job. Both teams came in as two of the best-hitting teams in the East, and both were completely shut down, except for their two home runs.

"I think that's an indication of just how much power both guys have who hit the ball. And I think it's an indication of how much speed was on the ball. It may have been over the outside part of the plate, but they (Eckerd) weren't pulling anything off him (McDiffitt) all day."

Livesey noted his young team, which started one senior, three juniors and six sophomores (including the designated hitter), was tight playing in its first World Series.

"But we've got no excuses," Livesey added. "That's the lowest run total I can remember this season. We've been averaging about 9.7 runs per game. We scored 15, six and 11 in the (South Atlantic) regional.

"We're supposed to be the No. 1 school in the state in academics, but we didn't show it today. It seemed like school was out, because we didn't learn anything.

"He (McDiffitt) pitched a very intelligent game, but we enabled him to

pitch an intelligent game. We didn't make the adjustments. The two boys (LeFebvre and Balboni) did; they went to the opposite field. And we had a hit to center. Going to the opposite field and to center is the only way to hit an offspeed, breaking-ball pitcher.

"We had three players adjust, and six who took the day off. But we did play defense."

Eckerd, which committed no errors to three for Valdosta, came up with the fielding gem of the game with the bases full of Blazers in the eighth.

Valdosta's Billy Fortenberry cracked a double that hit the center-field fence on one hop. Freedman retired the next two batters, but got back in hot water by walking Bill Petty and Skip Fite. Then he got Craig Viers to pop up on the first pitch.

The ball drifted foul and headed for the stands, but Eckerd third baseman Randy Kwist, a sophomore as is Le-Febvre and Balboni, raced to the fence in front of his team's dugout and reached over the rail to grab the ball before it could land among his teammates.

Freedman walked Cecil Whitehead, a .388 hitter at the start of the game who had singled his last time up, to begin the minth. A wild pitch put Whitehead at second. But Freedman fanned the next two Blazers before walking two to fill the sacks. The hurler then forced pinchhitter Ken Smith to tap back to the mound to end the threat and the game.

LeFebvre's first-inning blast held up

for Eckerd until the top of the fifth. With a thunderstorm rushing toward the park, Sal Amadeo lined a ball off the third-base bag, and he pulled into second with a leadoff double when left-fielder Pele Eagleson slipped on the turf, which had been dampened by earlier rainfail.

Bruce Folwer's sacrifice bunt pushed Amadeo to third, but with a two-ball, one-strike count on Fortenberry, play was halted as the storm hit, and the field was covered. About an hour later, Fortenberry fanned, but not before a wild pitch had sent Amadeo home with the tying tally. Freedman then ended the inning by striking out Keith Griffin.

Balboni's game-winning blast over the 340-foot sign in left was his 19th homer of the season. LeFebvre's blast was his seventh.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. - The old joke goes that the undertaker is the last guy to let vou down.

Before Saturday, Valdosta (Ga.) State's Blazers figured their hitting would be the last thing to let them down.

But in the NCAA Division II National Baseball tournament here Saturday, the ioke was on the Blazers.

Valdosta State left bases loaded two times and managed but four hits enroute to a 2-1 loss to Eckerd College in the first round of double elimination tournament.

The now 45-15 Blazers battle Shippensburg (Pa.) State in a noon game today in the loser's bracket. Shippensburg lost a 6-1 decision to New Haven, Conn., in another first round game Saturday

In night action, the University of Missouri at St. Louis met Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, and Delta (Miss.) State tangled with the University of California at Riverside.

Batting .318 as a team, not hitting the ball seemed to be the least of the Blazers' worries as they prepared to face the Tritons from St. Petersburg, Fla.

But on a rainy, overcast afternoon at Lamphier Park

here, a lack of hitting proved to be the biggest worry of all.

Eckerd, rated the number one team in the country, didn't swing the bat the way head coach Bill Livesey wanted either. But the Tritons' power boys came through against the VSC pitcher, Steve McDiffitt.

McDiffitt, now 10-1, pitched an almost flawless threehitter. However, two of those hits were long, opposite field home runs by Joe LeFebvre and Steve Balboni.

LeFebvre's line shot zipped out of the park at the 335-foot mark in left field in the first inning.

Balboni, leading the nation in homers with 24, lofted a McDiffitt fastball over the right center fence into an oak tree 345 feet away in the seventh inning.

That drive proved to be the game winner in a contest delayed 67 minutes by rain.

The delay came in the VSC

fifth with centerfielder Sal Amadeo standing on third as a result of a single, the only Triton error, and a sacrifice.

With only one out and Billy Fortenberry at the plate, spectacular streaks of lightning and loud crashes of thunder sent the sparse crowd scurrying under the grandstand and the teams off the field.

The interruption came at a time when Eckerd pitcher Kerry Freedman, now 13-1, seemed to be losing his control and McDiffitt seemed to be finding the groove.

"I didn't feel as strong when I came back, McDiffitt said, "I thought the delay would hurt both pit-chers, but as it turned out, it didn't hurt either one of us.'

the game through the final out in the ninth. In fact, the Blazers loaded the bases in the eighth and the ninth with two out.

"I had a great deal of confidence we could at least tie it up," Thomas said. "I

proceeded to strike out Fortenberry and Keith Griffin for two of his nine strikeouts in the game,

The sophomore right-hander still had trouble getting the ball over the plate, walking eight Blazers on the day.

"That's just the way he pitches," Livesey explained. 'He can do that and still beat you." Livesey, who verbally chastised his players throughout the game for not hitting the ball, gave McDiffitt some credit as well.

"He pitched an intelligent ballgame." Livesey said. "But we enabled him to do that. We didn't play intelligently at all. We had two guys who figured him out, and those two hit home runs.

"But I don't want to discredit him. I can't remember when we've been held to less hits and less runs."

Eckerd was the leading scoring team in the nation this year with an average of 9.7 runs a game. The 32-7 Tritons are to meet New Haven at 6 p.m. today.

For Blazer coach Tommy Thomas, losing the first game in a national tournament is nothing new. In both the NAIA tournament in 1973 and this same tournament in 1974, his team lost the first game.

But even being rated as the number four team in the country is not going to help VSC in the slow climb through the losers' bracket.

"I always believe we can win a ballgame," Thomas said, "and I believe we can win tomorrow. But I'm also cognizant of the fact we can lose.

"I'm disappointed, but I'm sure I'm not as disappointed with our hitting as coach Livesey is with his.

"It was just a game bet-ween two good pitchers. McDiffitt pitched a whale of a game, but you have to give credit to their home run hitters, too."

Thomas' team was still in

was very anticipatory of someone getting a hit."

In the eighth, Craig Viers was the man on the spot. Batting in the third slot, Viers was third on the team with a .362 average coming into the game.

But he fouled away the first pitch, and Eckerd third baseman Randy Kwist leaned over the fence and gloved the ball for the final out.

In the ninth, VSC again put runners at every bag with two outs. This time, freshman Ken Smith had the chance to be the hero.

But instead of a run-scoring single, Smith dribbled a weak hopper back to the mound. Freedman knew his work was finally done.

The most exciting and controversial play of the day occurred in the sixth inning. It began when Bill Petty took David DeMersseman's place designated hitter. DeMersseman, a .329 freeswinger, swung at two bad pitches and struck out his first two times up.

Petty replaced him and promptly drew a walk in the sixth. He then tried to go to third on Skip Fite's sacrifice, but got called out by the third base umpire instead.

Not a fan in the stands agreed with the call, but no amount of arguing by Thomas and assistant coach Dave Waples could change the decision.

Waples was particularly upset.

"I told the guy we traveled a thousand miles to get here and then some idiot blows a call like that," Waples said after the game.

"I told him he blew it. And then he turns to Tommy and says, 'I may have blown it.' That really got to me."

Petty was even more sure he was safe.

"I didn't think he (Kwist) was even near me," Petty said. "He was crawling on the ground like a worm."

# Valdosta ousts Shippensburg 2-1

In the first do-or-die situation in the 1977 National Collegiate Athletic Association Division II World Series, Cecil Whitehead did and Shippensburg (Pa.) State died.

Whitehead, the clean-up batter for Valdosta (Ga.) State, delivered a two-out run-scoring single to break up a 1-1 tie and end a 13-inning marathon at Lanphier Park that lasted 3 hours and 12 minutes.

Valdosta, 46-15 over-all and 1-1 in tourney action, will play in today's 2:45 p.m. contest. Shippensburg suffered its second tourney loss and bowed out with a 32-11 record.

For 12 innings, neither team could score. In the top of the 13th, Mike Pokopec's double brought Shippensburg's Mike Elsesser all the way in from first with the go-ahead run.

Pinch-hitter Bobby Tyler began Valdosta's rally in the bottom of the 13th with a single to left. He moved to second after an out as Sal Amadeo stroked a single. Skip Fite then dumped a perfect bunt down the third base line, loading the bases.

It looked like Shippensburg might escape with a victory when Craig Viers hit a nubber in front of the plate. Raider catcher Herb Leslie scooped up the ball and touched home for the force out, then tried for a double play at first.

But the throw was into the dirt and Viers and first baseman J. Paul O'Connor collided. By the time the ball was retrieved, the tying run had scored and Fite was standing on third. White head then sent a shot over second base off tough-luck loser Steve Schaaf, a sophomore who went the distance and tasted defeat for the first time this season in seven decisions.

What was Whitehead's reaction in the on-deck circle when he saw Viers' weak tap?

"I was wondering if I was going to get a chance to bat," replied the Valdosta catcher, who said his objective was to

"just get the bat on the ball."

Of Schaaf, who did not allow an earned run, White-head said, "He was pretty tough. He kept the ball down and away. Considering the number of innings he pitched, he did a heck of a job."

Shippensburg Coach Art Fairchild visited the mound in the 13th, but left Schaaf in.

"I think he wanted me to pitch as long as I could," said Schaaf. "I might have been able to finish the inning and maybe go one more, but I don't know. I usually lose four or five pounds when I pitch, but I probably lost seven or more today. It was pretty hot out there."

Schaaf's assessment of his fatal pitch to Whitehead?

"It was a high slider. I knew I didn't bend over enough when I threw it," he said. "It moved a little, but it came in about belt high. I charted their (Valdosta's) game with Eckerd yesterday and they seemed to have trouble with curves and sliders, so that's mainly what I threw."

Valdosta batted .320 as a team during the regular season, but the Blazers are 17 for .73 (.232) in two games here—which has Coach Tommy Thomas wondering where the offense has gone.

"I've never been so disappointed in our hitting," said Thomas. "You can say we're facing good pitchers, but we've hit good pitchers all year. We hit guys like Larry Jones of Florida State—guys like that who are real prospects.

"But on the other hand, I never expected our pitching to hold up the way it has. Our offense is what got us here. I guess if there's one thing you learn about national tournaments, it's to expect the unexpected.

"Talk to Bill Livesey (Eckerd coach) and he'll tell you about that. He would have given you 100 to one odds his team would get more than three hits last night (in a 2-1 victory over Valdosta). These tournaments just bring out the unexpected."

Jimmy Wall started for the Blazers, worked 10 innings and gave up just six hits and no runs. He got out of jams in the third and fourth innings by picking runners off and was backed by double plays in the first and third.

Chuck Beale followed Wall to the mound and was charged with the Raider run. Richard Sullivan replaced Beale in the 13th and was the beneficiary of the Blazer comeback. After facing only one batter and throwing just four pitches, Sullivan was credited with his eighth victory against three losses.

Despite the lack of offense, Thomas admitted he liked his team's chances with Whitehead at bat and the winning run 90 feet away.

"He's our best hitter," said the coach. "I think he was a unanimous choice as our most valuable player. If I could have picked someone to bat in that spot, it would have been him."

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. - It took four years and 13 innings to do it, but Valdosta (Ga.) State College has finally won a game in the NCAA Division II national baseball tournament.

Still not showing the powerful batting punch that was their trademark all year long, the now 46-15 Blazers crept past Shippensburg (Pa.) State 2-1 in 13 innings here Sunday.

Valdosta State lost its first two games in its only other appearance in this double elimination tourney in 1974. It also dropped a 2-1 decision to number one ranked Eckerd (Fla.) College Saturday.

And for three hours and 10 minutes at Lamphier Park here Sunday, it looked as if the Blazers were about to keep their streak

But a clutch two-out single by sophomore catcher Cecil Whitehead scored Skip Fite with the winning run and vaulted the Blazers into a 2:45 p.m. (CDT) game today against the University of Missouri at St. Louis.

The University of California at Riverside bumped USM-St. Louis 12-0 Sunday in one of two winners' bracket games. In the other, Eckerd bombed New Haven (Conn.) 14-2.

In the other losers' bracket game, Delta (Miss.) State tarned Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville 5-4. Snippensburg and SIU-Edwardsville became the first casualties of the eight-team

In today's other games, Delta State was to take on New Haven at noon and Eckerd was to battle U. Cal.-Riverside at 7:30 p.m. in a contest of unbeatens.

In a somewhat remarkable pitching performance by Shippensburg's sophomore right-hander Steve Shapp, Valdosta State was held scoreless for 12 straight innings in a relatively quiet game on a muggy Sunday afternoon.

The reason for the stillness was that Blazer freshman Jimmy Wall was doing an equally respectable job of silencing the Raider

Wall was finally lifted by VSC head coach Tommy Thomas in the 11th after he had scattered six hits and walked the first batter of the inning.

Shippensburg coach Arthur Fairchild, who tips the scales at well over 300 pounds, never yanked Shapp. That might have been one of the keys to the game.

"I would have lifted him if I didn't have confidence in him." Fairchild explained as he waddled around in front of his dugout after the game. "He was undefeated (6-0), and I thought he could do it."

Shapp admitted he was tired in the final innings.

"I wasn't sure I'd still be in there in the 13th," Shapp said. "I thought I could still throw, but I was a little tired. That's the most I've ever thrown in my life."

Shapp was still two innings away from the all-time tournament record of 15 innings pitched by Tom Badcock of Springfield College against Florida Southern in 1970.

"I usually lose about four or five pounds during a game, but I figure I lost about seven during this one," Shapp said.

It was the worst loss I've ever had to take.

Valdosta State kept knocking on the door in almost every inning, but it took a crucial error to open that door for Whitehead's heroics in the 13th.

The now 32-11 Raiders had picked up the only run of the game in the top of the 13th when cleanup man Mike Pokopec slashed an opposite field double down the left field line to score Mike Elsessor.

Thomas promptly put the hook to reliever Chuck Beale and brought on Richard Sullivan to get the final out.

In the bottom of the 13th, VSC was faced with a now or never situation.

"Before this tournament, we would have been confident of scoring," rightfielder Craig Viers said. "But the way we've been hitting the ball, we just weren't sure."

Thomas, who might have gained some inspiration and wisdom from a visit to Abraham Lincoln's tomb Saturday, inserted Billy Tyler as a pinch hitter to lead off the 13th.

Tyler, who was at a local nightspot until around midnight Saturday, lashed a single to left field. Scott Alvarez came off the

When Viers crashed into the Raider first baseman and the ball rolled foul, Amadeo dashed home with the tying run.

"I just saw the ball rolling around, and I went on my own," Amadeo said. "Craig was running on the wrong side of the foul line so if the ball had hit him he would have been out. I'm glad it did-

So was a merry little band of VSC followers when Whitehead cracked Shapp's second pitch into centerfield to score Fite. Whitehead, who batted a team-leading .388 during the season, was 0-5 in the game until that moment.

"I was thinking I was due," Whitehead said. "He threw me a curve ball, so I should have been ready for it. That's all he threw me all day.'

With the hit, Whitehead broke the all-time VSC runs-batted-in record for a season. Gene Felts set the record with 50 in 1972. Whitehead now has 51.

By the time Whitehead reached first base, he was mobbed by several teammates while Shapp just hung his head in disgust. The only other reaction came from Raider shortstop Mike Elsessor, who flung his glove toward the dugout.

"If I had to pick one man to be up at bat in that situation, it would have been Cecil," Thomas said. "He's our best hitter day in and day out.'

"I still can not believe our hitting has not come around. We faced good pitchers, but there is no way you can tell me that either one of them is any better than several we faced during the season.

'At the same time, our pitching has been much better than I ever thought it would be. Wall did a good job for us, and Beale is always effective for about one time through the batting order."

Wall started the game with stomach pains because he hadn't eaten breakfast.

"It was really hurting there one time," the Jacksonville Fla., left hander said. "But the more I pitched the stronger I got. I felt like I could have thrown some more, but he's the coach.

"I really think he pulled me at about the right time."

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

# Valdosta State snaps slump, with 11-4 win over UMSL

Valdosta (Ga.) State College Coach Tommy Thomas has been worried about his team's lack of offense the last two games.

If you saw the Blazers Monday afternoon, you would have wondered why.

Thomas' club rapped out 12 hits—two of them homers—and put 11 runs on the board before the seventh-inning stretch en route to an 11-4 decision over the University of Missouri at St. Louis in National Collegiate Athletic Association Division II World Series action at Lanphier Park.

The Blazers put it away with a five-run sixth inning in which all of the runs scored on homers. The loss eliminated UMSL with a 30-13 record, while Valdosta State is 2-1 in tourney play and 46-15 over-all.

After Keith Griffin opened the sixth with a single, Bart Shuman followed with an opposite-field homer down the right-field foul line. It was Shuman's first home

"I never hit one in Little League, high school or anyplace else," said the 5-foot-11, 165-pound sophomore shortstop. "I never even thought about hitting one here. I knew it would get over the fence, but I didn't knew if it would stay fair. I've never even hit one in practice before. But I guess I couldn't have picked a better time to do it."

After Brad Brown, the second of three UMSL pitchers, issued two walks sandwiched around two outs, designated hitter Ken Smith proved that wearing No. 13 on the back of your uniform does not necessarily mean bad luck.

Smith drilled a line shot off Brown that cleared the 375foot mark in the power alley in left with ease, making it 11-4.

"It was a fastball, about waist high," commented the freshman D.H., who took some ribbing from his teammates about being the "silent man" of the squad. "I figured it was gone when I hit it."

The game was a seesaw affair in the early going as UMSL led, 2-1, after one, 3-2 after two and the Blazers took the lead with a three-run third, making it 5-3. The scond-inning run by the Rivermen was the result of a solo home to left by second base-man Bobby Bone.

Bone's circuit shot was one of five hit in two games Monday afternoon.

Thomas chose senior lefthander Bill Petty to start against the Rivermen, but the southpaw with a 7-2 record did not last long. He went just 1 2-3 innings, giving way to Richard Sullivan after Bone's homer.

While Petty was unable to silence UMSL's bats, the Rivermen were unable to solve Sullivan. The senior lefthander from Live Oak, Fla., was touched for one run and just three hits in 7 1-3 innings of masterful relief. He struck out nine and walked just one in gaining his second World Series victory. Sullivan was credited with the victory over Shippensburg (Pa.) State Sunday, though he faced just one batter and threw only four pitches.

Was it difficult for Sullivan to pitch under a broiling sun?

"It bothered me a little bit," he said. "When we play down in Valdosta, it's usually 85 degrees or so. But here there's no breeze at all. It's just humid and dead."

Sullivan admitted he had no long-range plans when he entered the game in the second.

"To be honest with you, all I wanted to do was get out of that inning," he said, when asked how long he had hoped to pitch.

"The heat was bothering me at first. We didn't have anything to drink in our dugout. But then we got some Gatorade and the fluids seem to help."

Sullivan was used as a starter most of the season.

"I've just been relieving in the tournaments mostly," he said. "But this was one of my better relief outings. When I'd throw my slider they kept either popping it up or grounding out. It was moving pretty well."

The Blazers took the lead in the third as Skip Fite walked, Craig Viers reached on an infield hit and Cecil Whitehead brought both home with a triple over the center fielder's head. Whitehead then scored the fifth run op a wild pitch.

The Rivermen gave the Georgians a helping hand with three errors—all of which came on pickoff attempts at first base. All three runners eventually scored.

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# Shuman Homer Lights Fuse In VSC Victory

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — Bart Shuman grew up loving the game of baseball, but on a 95-degree Memorial Day afternoon, he grew to love it just a little more.

The 5-foot-11, 165-pound Valdosta, (Ga.) State College shortstop smashed the first home run of his life here Monday to light the fuse in an 11-4 Blazer explosion over the University of Missouri at St. Louis.

The win catapulted the now 47-15 VSC team into the semifinal round of the NCAA Division II World Series at Lamphier Park here against one of the pre-tourney favorites.

At 8:45 p.m. (CDT), tonight, the Blazers take on the University of California at Riverside in a do or die game for both. Riverside lost an 8-2 decision to number one rated Eckerd (Fla.) Monday night.

In the only other game Monday, Delta (Miss.) State eliminated third-ranked New Haven (Conn.) 5-3. Delta State, formerly known only for its national championship women's basketball teams, meets Eckerd at 6 p.m. tonight in the other semifinal.

Only Eckerd remained undefeated in the double-elimination tournament. The Tritons got two more towering home runs from first baseman Steve Balboni Monday night.

The first team All-America selection now has 25 homers for the year and four for the tournament.

But Shuman was perhaps even prouder of his round tripper than the Eckerd slugger will ever be.

"I was just trying to hit it

up the middle," Shuman said.
"That's the first home run
I've ever hit in Little League
or anything.

"I never even hit one in practice."

Shuman had only three extra base hits and a 268 batting average going into the tournament.

Valdosta State designated hitter Ken Smith has hit quite a few homers in practice and before the big freshman's career is over, he's going to have quite a total in regulation games too.

Smith, from Cairo, Ga., clouted a tape measure job over the left-centerfield fence at about the 390-foot mark in the sixth inning.

Smith's third home run of the season came with teammates Skip Fite and Cecil Whitehead aboard. He was greeted with the same wild enthusiasm which accompanied every Balzer home run, but for sheer emotion, he was no match for Shuman.

The little shortstop followed his 330-foot poke every inch of the way over the right field fence. Just as he rounded first base, he saw it was over and leaped three feet in the air with both fists raised in triumph.

Shuman's parents, who made the long trip from Monticello, Fla., had tears in their eyes before their son ever made it to home plate.

VSC head coach Tommy Thomas wan't crying but he admits he never imagined that kind of power from the ninth man in his batting order.

"Never in my wildest dreams did I ever dream Bart would hit a home run," Thomas said. "But this game was exactly typical of the way we have been playing all year."

After hitting .318 as a team coming into this tournament, Thomas wondered where his offense had gone after losing a 2-1 game to Eckerd Saturday and nipping Shippensburg (Pa.) State College 2-1 Sunday in 13 innings

But the Blazers are to need at least that same 12-hit, twohomer attack tonight against Riverside, rated second in the nation.

"To be absolutely honest, I think Riverside is a better ball club than we are," Thomas said. "I also think Eckerd is a little better than we are. I think we're about even with Delta State."

VSC assistant coach Dave Waples interrupted to add he thought the Blazers were better than Delta State.

"I'm not saying we're not going to beat Riverside," Thomas said. "These guys (the Blazers) are winners. They may not play great baseball all the time but they'll find some way to beat you!"

It appeared the route the Blazers were going to take to defeat the Rivermen from St. Louis was just to outhit them.

The now 30-13 St. Louis club shaved three hits and two runs off VSC starting pitcher Bill Petty in the first inning.

After a solo homer by second baseman Bobby Bone in the second, Petty was pointed to the shade. Richard Sullivan came on in relief.

Sullivan, who won Sunday's game despite pitching to only one batter, gave up three hits and one run the rest of the way

"When I started, I felt good," Sullivan, now 9-3, said. "I was tired at the end but I wasn't worried about finishing. I knew we had someone like Chuck Beale who could come in and finish if I couldn't."

Sullivan, who says he's

been having trouble getting strikeouts this year, didn't have any problems Monday. He fanned eight batters and walked only one.

The St. Louis pitching staff couldn't cope with the Blazer bats or VSC athletic director Billy Grant.

Sitting directly above the VSC dugout, Grant was in a perfect position to razz the Rivermen pitchers.

And he did.

In fact, his constant chatter helped provoke two wild pickoff throws allowing Blazer runners to advance from first to third.

VSC scored a run in both the first two innings but went ahead for good in the third when Whitehead scored Fite and Craig Viers on a long triple to centerfield.

Three innings later, Shuman and Smith resorted to the long ball and the Rivermen never recovered.

St. Louis head coach Jim Nix didn't believe it was a case of running out of pitching

"No, I think we had enough pitchers;" he said. "They just didn't come through for us. When you walk people and give up home runs there's not much your defense can do about it."

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# Riverside Tops VSC In Semifinal Round

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — When it came time to fight, Valdosta (Ga.) State College's Blazers were quick to respond.

When it came time to close the door on the University of California at Riverside Highlanders, the Blazers didn't respond quick enough

Valdosta State let a ninth inning lead trickle through its unclenched fists here Tuesday night and lost an 8-7 decision to the second-ranked Riverside club as a result.

The loss was the second for the now 47-16 Blazers in the NCAA Division II Baseball World Series.

Riverside, now 41-19, advances to a 7:30 p.m. (CDT) game tonight against Delta (Miss.) State.

The Statesmen from Cleveland, Miss., pulled one of the shockers of the double elimination tournament when they bumped number-one ranked Eckerd (Fla.) College 8-6 in the only other game Tuesday.

By virtue of being the last team to get a loss, Eckerd gains a spot in Thursday's 7:30 p.m. final game against the Delta-Riverside winner.

VSC was only three outs away from a shot at playing in that game.

Leading 7-6 into the bottom of the ninth, the VSC pitching staff was faced with its

biggest hurdle of the tournament but this time the Blazers didn't clear the jump.

Instead, the Highlanders climbed on VSC's fourth and fifth relievers for two runs and the victory. Those pitchers, Jimmy Wall and Richard Sullivan, had both turned in outstanding mound work in other tournament games.

But as the clock struck midnight, the Blazers knew they had finally struck out.

In the top of the eighth, the Blazers didn't strike out at all. However, they were swinging their fists instead of their bats.

Craig Viers, one of the mildest-mannered members of the team off the field, triggered the bench-clearing melee when he took a swing at Riverside catcher Doug McCulloch.

Viers had just been thrown out at home plate and had crashed into McCulloch in the process. When Viers started walking back twoard the dugout, McCulloch pushed him slightly with his arm.

The VSC junior right-fielder didn't hesitate at all. He turned around and took a wild, left-handed poke at the catcher.

In seconds, the home plate area was filled with the blue uniforms of the Highlanders and the bright red-clad Blazers.

It took eight minutes to restore order and both Viers and McCulloch were ejected.

Earlier in the week, Viers was named a first team All-America selection.

"He pushed me and I just went crazy," Viers said. "He had said something to me earlier. I would have liked to have stayed in and played that other couple of innings but I guess I would do the same thing again."

The fight marked one of several appearances VSC Head Coach Tommy Thomas

and assistant Dave Waples made on the field during the three-hour contest.

In the sixth, Riverside's first team All-America pick, Nate Quarles, hit a dribbler toward VSC first baseman Bruce Fowler. Fowler picked up the ball just inside fair territory and swiped at the speedy Quarles going by.

"I hit him right on the leg," Fowler said. "It wasn't a real hard shot but it wasn't soft either."

Whatever kind of tag it was, it didn't satisfy the first base umpire. He said Quarles was safe.

The Highlanders went on to score three runs in the inning

off Blazer starting pitcher Steve McDiffitt.

"He (the umpire) said he didn't see," Thomas said. "But I'm not blaming the umpires for losing the game.

"We had some real chances to knock in runs and didn't do it"

VSC left 11 men stranded on the bases including all three bags filled in the sixth. In the seventh, VSC loaded the sacks with no outs. The Blazers got only one run out of the situation when Fowler hit into a double play.

Ironically, Fowler had three hits in his other four trips to the plate.

Leftfielder Billy Fortenberry also had three hits and made a spectacular grab of a sinking liner in the third inning.

But games are made up of good times and bad times. and Fortenberry had his bad times too. He slipped down in the eighth and allowed a routine single to get by him.

The tying run scored as a result. In the ninth, he was thrown out at home plate.

"We blew it," the always outspoken Waples said. "We could have won it but we blew it. I still believe we're as good as any team in this tournament."

McDiffitt, who pitched his final game in a VSC uniform, agreed with Waples. He admitted his arm hadn't fully recovered from a tough 2-1 loss to Eckerd Saturday.

"I was getting pretty tired out there," McDiffitt said. "I

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felt all right to start with but I just got weak."

McDiffitt had never pitched with only two days rest before. He was given the starting nod when he told Thomas his arm had never felt any better than it did Monday.

Bill Petty relieved McDiffitt for one batter in the seventh before giving way to Chuck Beale.

The Highlanders left the bases loaded in that frame and only a great running catch by Sal Amadeo on a line shot to center field saved VSC from falling far behind.

Amadeo singled in Fowler with the go ahead run in the top of the ninth and left the future in the arms of the VSC pitchers.

Wall, who pitched to the final batter in the eighth, walked the first man up in the ninth. On a 3-2 count, his

change-up pitch floated over the plate for what he thought was a sure third strike.

But it wasn't.

"That made the difference in the game," I guarantee you," Wall said.

Sullivan, now 9-4, came in and gave up a single to Quarles.

"After that first guy goton, I turned to Leroy (Ken Purdy) and said I didn't like the way it looked," Amadeo said.

It got worse.

With the bases loaded, and only one out, pinch-hitter Eric Show hit a fire ball right back at Sullivan. It bounced off his glove into left field and Quarles bounded home with the winning run.

"It was wild and woolly, wasn't it?" Riverside Head Coach Jack Smitheran said. "I think it was just a matter of who was up last."

Thomas is now picking Eckerd to win it all but Smitheran believes his team isn't out of it.

"I think we can win it," he said. "We have to play tomorrow but I'd rather play than sit around."

And undoubtedly, so would Valdosta State.

Midnight had come and gone by two hours, and the conversation was still flowing freely in room 318 at the Downtowner Motel in Springfield, Ill.

Sprawled on the two s, sitting in one of the clothes-covered chairs or sust pacing the floor endiessly were at one time or another Valdosta State College baseball coach Tommy Thomas, his assistant Dave Waples, Thomas' parents, VSC athletic director Billy Grant and this reporter. A few players and a couple of their fathers trickled in and out, pausing only long enough to add their comments to the single topic of conversation.

That subject was VSC's 8-7 loss to California-Riverside in the NCAA Division II World Series. The eliminating defeat took place just up the street as the clock struck 12 at a now dark Lanphier Park

As is the case with every game, there wasn't a person in the room who didn't have an opinion on how the Blazers might have won it. From the umpires to a lack of clutch hitting, every base was touched upon. Waples iokingly placed the entire blame on Thomas since he lost the coin flip for the right to be the home team the day before. Riverside trailed 7-6 going into the bottom of the ninth, but scored two runs to win it.

Riverside whipped Delta (Miss.) State 5-3 the next night to advance to the final round against number one rated Eckerd (Fla.) College. In that championship game, Riverside grabbed a 4-1 win and the national title.

And VSC was only three outs away from knocking the California team out of the tournament Tuesday night.

But it just wasn't to be.

That's one of the explanations Thomas gave for the loss and as vague as it sounds, it's one that's hard to disagree with.

Never has it been more evident than in this tournament just how important breaks are in baseball. Valdosta State lost two onerun games and in the Riverside contest as well as a 2-1 loss to Eckerd, the right breaks could have given the Blazers victories.

Never was it shown more clearly than against Eckerd when Craig Viers came up with two outs and the bases loaded. A .362 hitter, no VSC follower would have been surprised if Viers had singled in two runs. But he hit a foul ball which the third baseman caught by leaning way over the fence. If the ball had been six inches further foul, Viers might have come through.

With two men on in the second inning of the Riverside game, VSC shortstop Bart Shuman hit an opposite field line drive to left. If the Riverside leftfielder had been playing

lefthanded-hitting Shuman two steps farther toward center, he never would have caught the ball.

But he wasn't.

But there were breaks the other way too. VSC centerfielder Sal Amadeo caught a screamer which had double written all over it against Riverside. Two men were on at the time. Leftfielder Billy Fortenberry made a diving grab of another ball which might have been an inside the park homer if he had let it get by him.

"Over the course of a season, the breaks will usually even out," Thomas said. "But in a short series like this, a couple of things go against you, and you

Valdosta State left too many men on the bases in both losses. A hit looks impressive in a box score, but that run batted in may be the most important statistic of all. As Thomas knows only too well, the Blazers had their chances to beat Eckerd and Riverside.

Coming up with a clutch single would have made the umpire factor much less noticeable.

When a coach or a team talks about umpires being bad, most people who it was a good one. didn't see the game usually write off the complaints as sour grapes. Undoubtedly, many will do the same when somebody says the umps weren't too good in Springfield.

But in this case, it's not just sour grapes ... it's the truth.

The eight best Division II baseball teams in the nation played under the less than watchful eyes of second-class umpires. They weren't consistent behind the plate, and they missed obvious calls on the basepaths.

Against Eckerd, VSC's Bill Petty slid into third base far ahead of the tag. He was called out. Against Riverside, first baseman Bruce Fowler tagged out a runner who passed right by him going down the line. He was called safe.

Thomas is not the kind of coach who stays on umpires' backs. But in this tournament, he spent more time jawing with the men in blue than he did giving signs to his players.

The umpires didn't take either of the games away from the Blazers. But they did change the momentum and when a team loses two games by one run each, momentum plays an awfully important role.

But the umpires didn't lose the games, the Blazers

And of course, there was thé fight.

More than anything else, everybody wants to hear about the fight. Maybe it's the savage beast which beats deep in the breast-

bone of all of us.

As baseball rhubarbs go,

Viers didn't really start it. He was pushed by the Riverside catcher and didn't take time to talk over the situation. He just started swinging. Both teams were on the field in seconds. A Riverside assistant coach took one of

the worst beatings. There wasn't a Blazer with a scratch on him.

Fighting is not part of baseball, and there's no way one can condone what Viers did. By the same token, there's no way one can justify the Riverside third baseman standing in Viers' way when he was trying to tag up on the same play. Viers had to push him out of the way with both hands to see the catch. The umpire says he never say any interference.

The bitter disappointment of losing the game, the fight, the poor umpiring and the need to be in so much conflict the entire tournament left Thomas feeling utterly dejected in room 318 in the pre-dawn hours Wednesday.

While everyone went over the game again and again, Thomas calmly made plane reservations and packed his bags. He moved about the room talking only when he was spoken to

The usually calm, mild-mannered VSC head coach later explained he felt his team had not represented Valdosta State the way it ought to be represented. He was worried about what kind of image the Blazers would leave with the tournament committee and the people of Springfield.

Hearing that his team's brawl was the first fight ever in the national tournament didn't help his feelings any It was only natural Thomas would have these kind of thoughts because that's the kind of guy he is.

But a couple of weeks from now, it's going to finally hit him that his 1977 Blazers were the fourth best Division II baseball team in the entire United States.

That's one way Valdosta State has never been represented before.

I won't attempt to name the outstanding Blazers of this year, because that would consist of the entire roster. Every man on the team did his job when he was called upon, and he did it to the best of his ability. That's what makes up a team. That's what makes a champion. Blazers, you are a champion in every aspect. Congratulations.

This year's team was announced during the second round of the NCAA Division II world series here Sunday. The team is sponsored by the Worth Sports Co.


Viers hit the ball at a 362 clip during the regular season, South Atlantic Conference Tournament and the South Atlantic Regional Tournament.

He was named most valuable player of the regional after batting over .500 for the five-game series and hitting a dramatic ninthinning home run to send the Blazers to the national tournament here.

For the first time ever, VSC also had three players named to the second team.

Senior secondbaseman Skip Fite, senior pitcher Steve McDiffitt, and sophomore catcher Cecil Whitehead all made the second team.

Fite, from Douglasville, Ga., hit 364 during the year. He led the team in stolen bases with 26 and also broke VSC records for runs scored


South Atlantic Conference member West Georgia had two players on the second team, first baseman Dan Logan and shortstop Barry Evans.



impressive 313-153 record, including eight trips to post-season tournament play. Thomas was named Coach-of-the-Year in the NAIA Area V in 1969 and again in the NCAA South Region in 1974 and 1977. He has the distinction of being the only coach in college history to guide his team to the NAIA World Series one year (1973) and then follow that by taking his team to the NCAA Division II World Series the next. Thomas received his BS degree in physical education from Valdosta State in 1962 and the MST degree from Georgia Southern in 1967.



FIRST-BASE--- CRAIG COURTNEY is undoubtedly the choice here .... The big left-handed hitter had the greatest freshman year (1969) in VSC history, as he hit .394 with 25 extra-base-hits .... After dropping from school for a year, Craig hit .297 (1971) and .325 (1972), leading the Rebels to three tournament years .... Holds (with Spence Kiser) the highest tournament average (.412), and was a great defensive player, holler guy, and leader.

SECOND-BASE--- SKIP FITE hit .341 in his career, made second-team All-America in 1977, and handled his position at all times ..... Fite was the heart of both the 1976 and 1977 teams, and never gave less than 100% ..... His clutch play during the season's tail-end carried the Blazers to the South Atlantic Conference championship in 1977 ..... He kept this up during the conference, regional, and national tournaments ..... Made NCAA National All-Tourney team.

THIRD-BASE--- LARRY MEREDITH is an easy choice in the school's historically weak position .... But Meredith hit .305 in his career, and swung with power (23 extra-base-hits) ..... Was a positive influence on the 1969 tournament team, and had a golden-glove throughout his stay (1968-1969) ..... Made the All-Georgia Conference team in '68, along with hitting a position high of .351, with ten doubles.

SHORT-STOP--- NOEL GEORGE had the misfortune of playing in VSC's early baseball years (1955 and 1957), but still established himself as one of the school's best ever players ..... Hit .333 for his career, including .419 in 1957 ..... Noel was one of Valdosta High's greatest all-around athletes, and played football for both Alabama and South Carolina, besides his Rebel tenure ..... A great fielder, and power hitter.

LEFT-FIELD--- GENE FELTS is one of Valdosta State's all-time great players ..... NAIA All-America in both 1972 and 1973 ..... Holds virtually all VSC's career offensive records, while playing on four tournament teams ..... Providing leadership, Gene hit with power, played great defense, and had a strong, accurate arm ..... With Register and Bowen, formed college baseball's best outfield in both 1973 and 1974 ..... Was always a winner.

CENTER-FIELD-- SAM BOWEN's addition to the 1973 team, put VSC in their first-ever national tournament, which he helped repeat in 1974 .... Was voted the team's M.V.P. both years, and played center-field like a major leaguer .... Was a money ball-player, and made NCAA All-American in 1974 .... Pitched when needed, and won three tournament games, with no losses, and a 1.00 ERA .... Now with the Boston Red Sox.

RIGHT-FIELD--- Four year starter, STEVE CRAWFORD (1967-1970), was blessed with it all .... He had a great arm, and played radar defense, besides hitting .299 for his career .... Played on two tournament teams .... Stole 64 bases in his career, and hit .379 in 1968, and .301 in 1970 .... Could have easily made it as a pitcher, but his bat and defense demanded that he play everyday.

CATCHER--- TOMMY THOMAS, who has coached VSC to a 311-153 record, is the only player to lead the team in batting three years (1960-1962) ..... Hit .317 for his career, with an occassional long ball ..... Thomas was very versatile, as he also played first, and pitched ..... Was gung-ho baseball, and handled pitchers extremely well ..... During his tenure (1959-1962) opponents were held to less stolen bases than any comparable period in VSC history.

DESIGNATED-HITTER--- DAN DARDEN got his chance to hit when Foster Foran was injured in 1974, and responded with a .368 average ..... Went through the toughest part of that season, going 25x38, and hit .667 in the NCAA Regionals ..... Gave-up a great pitching career to play everyday, and is the school's all-time leading hitter (.343) ..... Played a strong center-field in 1975, and made All-South Atlantic Conference.

PITCHER (right) --- EDDIE FISHER was 24-8 in his career, with an astounding 1.48 ERA .. .. Pitched all the big-ones for VSC in his career (1966-1969), and was signed by the Montreal Expos, after making all everything, including honorable-mention All-America .... Blessed with a strong fast-ball, and fine off-speed pitches, only a sore-arm in 1967 stopped "The Fish" for the Rebs .... Went 11-0 in 1969 to set a still existing school mark.


PITCHER (left)--- BILL PETTY promptly stepped in and had the best ever (11-2, 2.02 ERA) year for a VSC freshman .... Holds the majority of career pitching records, including a 31-13 won-loss mark .... Twice made NCAA All-Regional teams, as he set career records for shut-outs (7), appearances (52), and innings pitched (338) ..... Not over-powering, but was a "great" fielder, who knew baseball .... Pitched all the big ones during his four years.




PITCHER (relief)--- MARTY LefILES mistified his teammates, and coaches alike .....

The tall, right-hander appeared not to be able to break-a-pane-of-glass; but all he did was win (11-2) ..... In 1973 he was 8-0, and did not allow a run in the inning in which he was called upon (an amazing feat) ..... He was drilled in batting practice by the team, but "always" set the biggies down ..... Could be called the "Iceman" because he pitched in all the pressure situations, and never faltered.

FIRST-BASE--- JEFF 'Moose' GREENHALGH holds the school record for homers with 21, but also gets the nod for his defense .... Saved innumerable infield throwing errors with his vacume-cleaner glove, and hit most of his home-runs in 'crucial' situations .... Hit only .260 for his career, but had a fantastic 1974 Regional tournament, and was always tough in the clutch ..... Twice All-South Atlantic Conference.

SECOND-BASE--- BOBBY TRIPP was recruited as a short-stop (1970), but played his natural position his last three years (1971-1973) .... Hit .302 for his career, and turned the double-play as well as anyone in VSC history ..... Played on four tournament teams, and was All-Conference, All-District, All-Area, and honorable-mention All-American in his career ..... Had a great glove.

SHORT-STOP--- DAVE TAYLOR had the best year (1975) of any 'modern' VSC short-stop, hitting .354, and leading the team to the NCAA Regionals .... Dave combined both a great pivot, and strong, accurate arm to be 'Mr. Steady' in the infield .... He hit with power, and provided offense, defense, and leadership to the team.

THIRD-BASE--- ANGELO Devivo was the typical VSC baseball player in the early, and mid-1960's, as he was also a starter on the basketball team ..... Angie also played short, and second in his career, which saw him hit .324 in his sophomore year (1962) ..... He was a member of the Rebel's first championship team, and led the team's offense in their first NAIA tourney (1965) appearance.

LEFT-FIELD--- BILL BAGGETT was a big reason that VSC had tournament teams in 1969 and 1970 ..... The big, Lakeland, Fla., righthander hit with power (17 extra-base-hits, and 10 homers), and played strong defense ..... His addition in 1969, augmented the pitching of Eddie Fisher and Dan Petrovich, and led the Rebels to their second-ever Georgia Conference title.

CENTER-FIELD--- CLAUDE SPECK edges out Spence Kiser for this berth ..... Claude played 3B his first year (1969), but his speed and glove made him a natural in center ..... Holds both the year (31), and career (74) stolen base record, and hit a strong .306 for his career ..... Called the "Rabbit," Speck played with desire and intensity.

RIGHT-FIELD--- JEROME REGISTER was a good reason why VSC went to national tournaments in both 1973 and 1974 ..... He hit for .326 in his career, and in the Blazers most important game (to that date - 1973) made a game winning hit, and throw to defeat David Lipscomb in the NAIA Area ..... Sometimes played erractic defense, but always got the job done ..... Made All-South Atlantic Conference, and signed with the Boston Red Sox.

CATCHER--- STEVE ROMINGER gets the nod over Joe Tarpley (1956-1959), and Darrell Branam (1973-1975) .... Selected not for stats (.235 career), but because of the intangables-- spirit, heart, leadership .... Steve was Jim Heagan and Clint Courtney rolled into one .... Led the team to four tournament appearances, and handled pitchers flawlessly.

DESIGNATED-HITTER--- BUCK ETHREDGE was the tallest player (6-7) to ever play for VSC, and combined with his great basketball career, was one of the school's best ever athletes ..... Hit .306 for his career, and was 13-4 on the mound ..... Also played first base, and was sometimes used in the OF for his defense ..... Hit with great power.

PITCHER (right) --- STEVE McDIFFITT threw the best curve-ball in VSC history, and signed with the Pittsburgh Pirates after a 10-1 senior year .... Was 26-13 in his career, including victories over Lewis (NAIA National Champs), Florida State (4-hitter), and Georgia Southern (4th. in the nation) as a freshman (1974) .... Lost many close ones with the weak hitting 1975 and 1976 clubs.

PITCHER (left)--- DAN PETROVICH had a 19-9 career mark, which included a junior year (1968) of 5-1 (1.31 ERA), and a senior year (1969) of 9-3 (1.98 ERA) .... He and Fisher were a feared tandum in their career (1966-1969), as Dan threw with great velocity ..... Developed a fine side-arm curve, which kept hitters off balance .... He threw 113.2 innings in 1969, for a then record .... A smart pitcher.

PITCHER (relief)--- RUSTY SIMPSON was one of the school's most versatile players ever .... Combined his pitching with playing third-base, as a regular .... Was in relief his frosh and sophomore years (1.93, and 2.35 ERA's), and then became a starter, posting a 23-11 career mark (1969-1972) .... Had a fabulous innings-pitched vs walks ratio .... Issued only 7 walks in 77, senior, innings pitched.



# HITTERS

### HOME RUNS The Significant Ones VSC HISTORY

I can personally relate each, and every, home run that I ever hit, from Little League through college, and semi-pro ball. Admitedly they were very few in number, but the point is, I remember. Bud Bridges from the '63 and '64 teams, remembers a line double off the wall at old Pendelton Park, that almost went out, while Rusty Deavours, of the '63 squad, can tell foot-by-foot the flight of a shot he hit off the top of the fence at Florida State.

The home run, or even the near home run, is part of the mystery of baseball-will it happen-- when. Valdosta State hitters have blasted 219 four-baggers (approximately; since the 1955 through 1959 statistics are incomplete), and most probably the 90, or so, Rebel/Blazer sluggers can remember each one.

Below are some home run incidents. Their characterization may be biassed, and somewhat incorrect, but none-the-less they were significant, and are a very vital part of VSC baseball. The circumstances were either personally seen by me, or discussed by Coach Grant, or Coach Thomas.

MOST IMPRESSIVE INNING: Billy Tyler was cut from the 1974 squad, and the Jacksonville, Fla. native transferred to St. John's River JC. Back at VSC in 1976, Tyler made the Blazer team, and was for a short-time, the starting designated hitter. But Tyler was inconsistent at the dish, and lost his starting job.

On April 7, 1976, however, Coach Thomas (who always gives everyone on the club a chance to play) gave Tyler the DH nod, versus Mercer, at Blazer Field. The bottom of the second inning of this game was history for both Tyler and VSC baseball.

Leading off, with the Blazers on top 3-2, Billy hit a one-one pitch over the 367-mark in right-field for a home run. Later in the <u>same</u> inning, Tyler batted again, and blasted a one-two pitch over the 372-mark in left-center, for his second round-tripper. He grounded out, and popped-up in his other two at-bats in the game, as VSC won 11-5. Tyler became a relief-pitcher shortly after this game, and never hit another circuit-clout in his career. His two home-runs in one inning, however, should stand the test of time, and never be "broken" in VSC history.

MOST IMPRESSIVE GAME: See the feature on Gene Felts. Gene hit three in a March 27, 1972 game versus Erskine, to set the VSC record. Only he, Billy Tyler, and Jeff Greenhalgh (in 1976 versus Florida) have ever hit two home runs in a game for Valdosta State.

MOST SURPRIZING: For most VSC players, anytime they hit a home-run was a novelty. Many players have only one career four-bagger. But one home-run in history stands-out, not only because of who hit it, but when, and where it was hit.

Bart Shuman, a sophomore from Monticello, Fla., had played baseball from the time he was 8-years old. Never had he hit a homer-- not in Little League, not even in practice. Thus while playing in one of his most important games ever, Bart hit one. Don't ask him how, and don't expect any of his teammates to be expert witnesses because when it flew out of Lanphier Park, against UMo-St. Louis in the 1977 NCAA World Series (in Springfield, Ill.), everyone was in total shock.

But there it went, down the right-field line, over the 320-mark, in the fifth inning, to give VSC an 8-4 lead, which became an 11-4 win. Not even a 400-foot shot by teammate Ken Smith, later in the same inning, dampened the ultimate in surprizes.

LONGEST by a VSC HITTER at HOME: Jeff 'Moose' Greenhalgh holds the school record for homers, with 21 in his career. His most prestigious blast came against Florida State in a 1975, 8-4 VSC loss. The pre-game ceremonies included the retiring of the jerseys (and numbers) of Blazer All-Americans, Gene Felts (8), and Sam Bowen (14).

In the second inning, Moose hit a shot over the Pine Tree, in the right-field parking lot, which was estimated at 455-feet. As he rounded third, Seminole coach, Woody Woodward (a former major leaguer), yelled to Coach Thomas, "You should retire that guy's jersey; that's one of the longest balls that I've ever seen."

LONGEST by a VSC HITTER: When you are beaten 26-5 (VSC won the first-game 2-1), as the Blazers were in 1977 by Georgia Southern (at Statesboro), your mind tends to easily forget specific happenings. But, in this game, Cecil Whitehead hit a ball that has to be the longest ever by a Valdosta Stater.

The big, right-handed, catcher caught a first-inning fast-ball in his wheel-house, and hit a bullet that cleared the Southern score-board, in left-field, still rising. It went deep into the sparse woods behind the fence, and hit a short pine tree, finally coming to rest. It was estimated at 475 feet.

It appeared that Cecil caught the ball while it stood still, and swung with all his might, catching it perfectly with his big bat. Only myself, Coach Thomas, and seniors Bill Petty and Steve McDiffitt had ever seen a longer one (see below).

LONGEST by an OPPONENT-AWAY: When Gary "Bull" Giddens took his sign in 1976 at Florida State, to face Terry Kennedy, he knew that the Seminole catcher could hit the long ball. What he didn't realize, however, was that Kennedy would set VSC history, on that very next pitch.

Bull got the ball up, and Kennedy swung. The ball rocketed off in a gigantic arc toward center. It not only cleared the fence at the 420-mark, but went over the center-field light standard. To sum this hit up, it was simply a tape-measure shot. Its distance was not estimated, but....

LONGEST by an OPPONENT-HOME: Valdosta State went into the top-of-the-tenth against Albany State in 1974, tied 2-2. With Dan Darden on the mound, I said to the "Deacon" as he left for the hill, "just keep it in the ball park against this quy."

This guy was huge, third-baseman Gregory Wells, a 6-5, 245 pound tackle on the Ram football team. He had previously doubled, and tripled on vicious shots to left. Darden didn't heed my warning. Wells hit his second pitch onto North campus, near the VSC soccer field.

The immensity of this blast was monumental. The ball cleared the "tall" pines in left, and simply disseapeared! It was not even chased by the Blazer managers, but anyone who saw it agreed that a ball had never been hit further in college ball (even Duck Barnes agreed). VSC won 4-3 in the bottom of the tenth on a Vince Musashe hit.

NOTE: Coach Grant says that a Ron Fairey (Erskine), and a Clyde Wright (Carson-Newman) homer (Fairey's was over the center-field wall, while Wright's was in left-center) were the two most impressive that he has ever seen. He did not see Wells'.

I am certain that other homers (both by VSC opponents, and the good-guys) have impressed other people to the point that they would include them above. But I feel safe that the next category includes two home-runs that no one can dispute. But, as in all things, "you just had to be there."

MOST DRAMATIC: In this category there are two, and while the secondmentioned may have been the most important, the former was quite dramatic.

On May 9, 1971, in the first-round of the NAIA District-25 tournament at Columbus, VSC was trailing the hosts 9-6, going into the bottom of the ninth. The Rebels rallied for a run, but with two-out, and men on first and second, the situation looked bleak. Coach Thomas batted pitcher Leroy Purdy for third-baseman Dudley Spruill, in a last gap effort. Purdy responded with a home-run blast that caused complete bedlam, along with the fainting of first-base coach Bob Lingenfelter. The Rebels 10-9 decision helped them to win the tournament.

There is no doubt about the most important/dramatic homer. It came in the bottom of the ninth, in the 1977 NCAA South Atlantic Regional finals, versus West Georgia, at Blazer Field. VSC had beaten the Braves 9-6 in the opener of a do-ordie double-header (VSC had to win two, to go to the Nationals), but trailed 2-1 as the fatal ninth began. While Bill Petty (the Blazer hurler who had seen both runs score on errors) systematically destroyed the equipment house, I left the field, and stood with Mr. Griffin, and Mr. Tyler behind the dugout. A change in luck was needed, and even though VSC had beaten West Georgia in 5 of 7 previous games, it looked as if justice would not prevail.

Lead-off hitter Skip Fite crouched his way to a walk, on four pitches, and Craig Viers came to bat. He fouled-off two pitches on attempted bunts, and then hit a 1-2 pitch over the right-field fence (barely over, and barely fair) for the most important single hit in Valdosta State history. I never saw it, but I (and everyone else) celebrated just the same.

1972 was the type of year for Gene Felts, of which every college baseball player dreams. The Lakeland, Ga., sophomore simply demolished opposition pitching to the tune of a .363 batting average, 50 runs-batted-in, and most amazing of all, 13 home-runs.

To put Felts' round-tripper total in perspective, the Valdosta State record to that point stood at 6, while the NCAA record was 16, and the NAIA record 17. Gene's feat was accomplished in a ball-park, that even by major league standards was big. At the time the left-field line measured 336-feet, the left-center power alley 379-feet, and straight-away-center 400-feet. Other college players, who had the advantage of band-box dimensions (such as at Columbus, and Jacksonville State), could not come close to Gene's total.

The home-runs that Gene hit were not the type that barely fell-over the fence either. They were booming shots, that saw opposition left-fielders simply stand and watch. His most memorable day, of course, was on March 27, versus Erskine. Three times, the swinging-from-the-heels sophomore hit shots deep into the left-field pine trees. In six games from March 27, to April 1, Gene hit 6 home runs, and totaled 11 in a seventeen game span through April 25. After a fifteen game dry-spell, he hit tournament 4-baggers against Columbus (NAIA District), and Birmingham Southern (NAIA Area). No player since, in the history of VSC baseball, has come close to tying, or eclipsing Gene's mark. The ordinary power hitter cannot hit 13 baseball out of VSC's big park, in the course of a season.

## 1965 TOURNAMENTS GEORGIA CONFERENCE & NAIA DISTRICT

May 13, 1965 ... GEORGIA CONFERENCE PLAY-OFF ... Macon, Ga.

The Rebels finished their season on May 3, defeating Piedmont twice (13-3 and 8-2), to tie West Georgia for the Georgia Conference crown, with an 8-2 league mark. Early the next week, while in Rome, Ga. for the Conference Spring Meeting, VSC Coach, Bill Grant received a call from West Georgia mentor, Tom D'Arami. D'Arami said that he had the play-off all set for May 10, in Macon, with West Georgia supplying the umpires (the VSC-West Georgia regular season meeting had been played in Valdosta).

"The hell you've got it set," Grant replied to D'Arami; and a rather salty discourse followed. The final decision was made to hold the game May 13, in Macon, with each team supplying one umpire. The umpires would change assignments after five innings.

Grant nominated Mike Perry (6-1) to pitch, while D'Arami went with his ace, De-Vore (8-1). DeVore had absorbed his only loss of the season to VSC, as the Rebels erupted for 9, first-inning, runs on their way to an 11-2 win. The play-off game was a pitcher's battle all the way with both Perry and DeVore pitching brilliantly. In the bottom of the second, catcher Zack Wade led off with a single, was sacrificed to second by Dennis Fike, and scored on a booming double by centerfielder Ben Bates, to take a 1-0 lead. Bob Lamphier led off the fifth with a triple, for the Rebs, but was left stranded, for VSC's only other threat. Meanwhile, Perry was setting down the Braves in order, with the exception of the first (an error by Tommy Johnson), the fourth (a walk, and a two-out single), and the seventh (a two-out single).

Leading 1-0, the Rebels seemed to clinch the game, when with two-out, and no one on, in the top-of-the-ninth, Snyder hit a routine grounder to Johnson, at short. Tommy threw to Angie DeVivo at first, and the Rebs erupted in celebration. BUT NO, the umpire said that DeVivo's foot had been off the base (this was the ump that the Braves had brought). The Rebels were stunned. That is, all except for Coach Bill Grant, who stood toe-to-toe, chest-to-chest with umpire Wooten. Grant systematically turned the ump's white shirt brown, as the VSC coach objected vehemently, with a chew-of-tobacco in his mouth. Wooten threw Gant out of the game, and when Grant objected, he was thrown out of the stadium.

With a pinch-runner on first, Perry attempted a pick-off. The ball was thrown wildly, past DeVivo. As the runner rounded second, and headed for third, rightfielder Lamphier attempted to retrieve the ball as it bounced around in foul-territory. D'Arami sent the runner home, as he saw Lamphier's problem. Bob, however, got the ball, relayed it to second-sacker Jack Raley, who threw a strike to catcher Wade. Zack went 10-feet up the line, and hit the on-coming runner with all of his weight, knocking the West Georgian into the air. There was no need for a call, as the Rebels had won their first ever Georgia Conference title. As the players celebrated, Coach Grant was saying a last few words to umpire Wooten, as the man in blue (and brown) left the field. The win boosted the Rebels into the NAIA District-25 championship against independent pick, Georgia Southern.

May 21-22, 1965 ... NAIA DISTRICT 25 ... Statesboro, Ga.

In the NAIA District-25 championship, Valdosta State had the unenviable task of not only defeating one of the nation's top small college baseball teams, but also doing it in Statesboro, Ga. Statesboro had (and to an extent, still has) a reputation for being "homer city" for visiting teams. Until the early 1970's, the same two umpires worked every Southern home game, and were very intimate with Eagle players, and fans alike.

Although the VSC scorebook, from this tournament, makes continued, and pointed reference to the umpiring, the Rebels could just not hit with men-on-base, and also made many critical mental, and physical errors.

In game one, of the two-of-three play-off, Ron Fortner (6-3) took the mound to oppose Pierce (8-2) for Southern. The Rebs tied the game at 1-1, in the third, on hits by Lindy Evans and Tommy Johnson, but neither Dennis Fike, or Ben Bates could deliver, with men on first and second. Evans made errors in the first, and fifth that led to Southern runs, and only a Johnson double in the seventh provided anymore Reb offense. Ron Fortner struck-out 8, but four of his walks eventually led to Southern scores.

The next day was do-or-die for Valdosta State, and the Rebels fought to the end in a 6-4 defeat. Mike Perry (7-1) started for VSC, but was bombed in the second, with two doubles, two walks, and a single accounting for three runs. After two fourth inning errors by Evans, along with two singles, added two more Eagle runs, Ray Peters replaced Perry, and allowed only a lone sixth inning tally.

VSC scored in the seventh on DeVivo's double, and added three runs in the eighth, aided by three walks, and Ben Bates' single. DeVivo led-off the ninth with a single, but was left stranded. The Rebels ended their season with a fine 18-11 mark, and their tournament action paved the way for Valdosta State to become one of the nation's busiest post-season-play teams, during the 1970's.

## 1969 TOURNAMENTS NAIA DISTRICT & NAIA AREA

Valdosta State confidently strode into the NAIA District-25 tourney, owning a 24-9 record, and their second-ever Georgia Conference title. The tournament was a three-team affair, held in Valdosta, and also included Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference champion (SIAC), Florida A&M, and independent power, Mercer.

A&M opened the series by dropping Mercer, 12-7, and on May 22, faced the home-town Rebs. Coach Tommy Thomas elected to throw his senior, ace Eddie Fisher (10-0), although the "Fish" had a painful blister on his right, index finger. The pain became so bad before game-time, that Thomas rushed Fisher to a local M.D., for a pain-killing shot. The shot certainly killed the pain, but it also led Ed to the worst pitched game of his sensational, college career.

Without any feeling in his right-hand, Eddie hit the first two Rattlers that he faced, and quickly found himself behind 6-2, after 2-and-a-half innings. VSC rallied, however, and scored three runs in the bottom-of-the-third, to edge within 6-5. Strangely enough, the Rebels had only one hit through the first three frames, that a double by Craig Courtney, that plated only one run.

While Fisher settled down (eventually striking-out 10), the Rebs rallied to tie it in the sixth (on a Spence Kiser home-run), and go ahead for good (8-6) in the seventh, on a Courtney homer. Singles by Kiser, Courtney, and Bill Baggett in the eighth, sandwiched around Larry Meredith's triple sealed A&M's doom, although the Rattlers scored twice in the ninth, to make the final, 10-8.

The next day, Mercer eliminated Florida A&M, 7-2, and faced VSC, hoping to extend the tourney another day. Danny Petrovich took care of Mercer's aspirations, as he pitched a smooth 9-hitter (striking out 9, and walking only 2), in a 5-2 Rebel trimuph. Courtney, Jack Toole, and Larry Hysler each had two-hits for the "Good Guys," while Petrovich drove in two runs, with a clutch, two-out, fourthinning single. VSC thus qualified for their first-ever NAIA Area-5 tourney, clutching a number-7 national ranking (among small colleges) in their grasp.

Whatever great thoughts Valdosta State had in regard to a possible Area Tournament crown, were quickly squashed in their very first game. The Rebels were matched with tourney co-favorite (along with VSC) William Carey (Miss.), and most observers picked the winner of this game to go all the way. In the opening game of the series in Knoxville, Tenn., Carson-Newman knocked off Ouachita Baptist, and set the stage for the weirdest ending of any VSC game, ever.

Eddie Fisher drew the mound assignment for the Rebs, and although he was hit harder than usual, held a 4-3 lead after six-frames. Carey had solo-homers in the second and fourth, while VSC scored in the first (on an error), third (singles by Larry Meredith, and Bill Baggett), and twice in the fifth (a Fisher two-bagger, and singles by Spence Kiser, and Meredith). All the while, though, the Reb bench was becoming more vocal in regard to the seemingly inconsistent, ball-strike calling of home-plate umpire, Shorty Hatfield.

Hatfield made repeated glances toward the VSC dugout in the middle frames, and in the sixth warned the bench about their "cat-calls." Carey rallied for two runs in the bottom-of-the-seventh (to take a 5-4 lead), on a triple, single, and a walk, but to the Rebels bench, the "good-guys" had been robbed on a call-at-the-plate, plus some "pipe" pitches that were called balls. Again, Hatfield strode to the dugout, this time threatening to "clear-the-bench" if he heard another word.

Craig Courtney led off the Reb eighth with a walk, but when the first pitch to right-fielder Steve Crawford looked low, the bench let Hatfield have it again. The stocky, umpire strode to the VSC dugout, stepped down on the first-step, and threw the entire non-playing (leaving 9-players) team-members out of the game. Hatfield looked each Rebel defiantly in the eye as the player passed him, and not a word was spoken. One of the last players to leave, freshman, Harry "Moose" Jones didn't say a word either, he simply flicked Hatfield's cap off, with his hand. The umpire retaliated by hitting Jones in the shoulder with his mask, and loudly declared the contest a forfeit, in favor of William Carey.

VSC had to play a losers bracket game immediately that day (May 28), and Dan Petrovich pitched a neat 6-hitter, as the Rebs edged Ouachita Baptist, 3-0. Meredith tripled in a first-inning run, four walks forced in a second-inning score, and Petrovich singled in the last tally in the sixth.

Carson-Newman eliminated the Rebels, 4-2, the next day, to end Valdosta State's season at 27-10. Leroy Purdy pitched well, but issued five walks (three of which scored), and only Craig Courtney (2x3) was effective at the dish, as VSC stranded eight runners in crucial situations.

William Carey went on to win both the Area tournament, and also the NAIA National Championship. VSC retained their number-7 ranking in the final poll of the season. What might have been, never was.

Valdosta State (22-13) drew Columbus (26-7) as its first-round opponent in the NAIA District-25 tourney, at Tallahassee, Fla. It was again a three-team affair, with host Florida A&M (21-6) drawing the initial round bye.

The Rebels brushed by Columbus 7-2, as Steve Sorgius pitched a sevenhitter, and was aided by a 10-hit attack. A three-run, second inning outburst, on singles by Harry Jones, Rusty Simpson, Sorgius, and a double by Bobby Tripp, sealed the Cougar doom.

A&M eliminated Columbus in the day's second game, and battled VSC in the last game of the day. The Rebs won a hard fought, 3-2 decision behind the fine hurling of Leroy Purdy, and the bat of Steve Rominger, who had three safeties. Four singles in the second (Tripp, Larry Hysler, Purdy, and Steve Crawford) scored two runs, and a lone tally was added in the seventh, on Spence Kiser's clutch bingo. This game, however, was not played without contraversey. The Rebels were chided by the Rattler fans, given little attention re: arguments by the umpires, and became the brunt of biassed comments by the P.A. announcer.

The host Rattlers took the field the next day (May 22), having to win a double-header. They unfortunately used most of their runs in the first game, as they unleashed a 23-hit attack, in blasting VSC 20-0. Rusty Simpson was behind only 1-0, going into the fifth, but A&M rallied for six-runs, on seven hits, and the rest of the game was never in doubt. The Rebels were also the recipients of rocks thrown by the fans, and several questionable actions by the Rattler players (first-baseman Harry Jones was under a pop-foul, when the batter threw his bat at Jones' legs. Harry, of course, didn't catch the ball; and the umpires made no call).

VSC exploded for six, first-inning runs in the nite-cap, on eight hits, and went onto a 10-1 win. Greg Lee pitched a sparkling 6-hitter, as the Rebs had 15 hits (three each by Spence Kiser, and Bill Baggett). It was VSC's second consecutive District title, and entitled them to a return trip to Knoxville.

Although Valdosta State had won the 1971 Georgia Conference title, they were decided underdogs to both Columbus (26-8), and loop-rival Shorter (19-6), entering the NAIA District-25 tournament. The Rebs were 20-15 on the season, and had shown neither strong pitching, hitting, or defense.

VSC drew host Columbus in the first round, and held a 6-4 lead after 7-innings, behind the relief pitching of Ronald Bennett, and the hitting of Rusty Simpson (3-rbi's), and Craig Courtney (HR, and 2-rbi's). The Cougars, however, erupted for 5-runs in the eighth, off Bennett, and reliever Andy Hassell, and took a 9-6 lead into the bottom-of-the-ninth.

Craig Courtney led the inning off with a walk, and Steve Rominger singled, but two outs later, they were still on the bases (first and third, respectfully). Leftfielder Al Golden then delivered a clutch single, to plate one run, but the situation still looked bleak, as Coach Tommy Thomas batted Leroy Purdy, for short-stop Dudley Spruill. Purdy ran the count to 1-2, and then delivered one of the biggest "clutch" home-runs in VSC history. Leroy hit a long fly ball that easily cleared the centerfield fence (as Columbus' band-box dimensions came back to haunt them), to bring the Rebs back from certain defeat, to a 10-9 win. First-base coach, Bob Lingenfelter fainted in the coaches' box, and the both celebrated, and went to his aid.

The joy didn't last long, however, as the next day, Shorter jolted VSC into the losers bracket, 10-6. Heroes Purdy, and Collier Black (the previous day's winning pitcher), just couldn't hold the Hawks, and hurler David Chester held the Rebels to 5-hits, until the ninth. The loss threw the Rebs into a same day, do-ordie game with Columbus. Ron Nasworthy pitched a great 4-hitter (with relief help from Dan Chadwick), and Bobby Tripp had two rbi's, as Columbus' bubble was burst, 5-3.

VSC had to win two games the next day (May 20), to gain a repeat chance at Knoxville. The Rebels were equal to the task. In the initial game, VSC blasted Shorter 10-2, behind the pitching of Rusty Simpson, and the bats of Gene Felts (HR, and 4-rbi's), and Harry Jones (HR). The second contest was tense from the beginning. Coach Thomas chose Chadwick for the start, and the East Gary, Ind., freshman, pitched an excellent game. He game up an unearned run in the third, and shut-out the Hawks the rest of the way.

The "good-guys" scored in the fourth (a Jones single), and the fifth (an Al Golden triple, and a sacrifice-fly by Terry Fields), and held a 2-1 lead, going into the bottom-of-the-ninth. Valdosta State (23-12) hosted Berry (16-9), Columbus (28-11), and Shorter (25-3), in the 1972 NAIA District-25 tournament. Although the Rebels were seeded number-one, Shorter, behind the hurling of Lamar Wright (10-0), and Vaughn Robbins (5-2), were expected to give VSC all that they could handle.

Wright shut-out Columbus, 5-0, and VSC blasted Berry 10-1, in first-round games. The 'good-guys' waited until the seventh to score, and only after a disputed 'safe' call at third that would have ended the inning. Terry Fields had four hits, and Bobby Tripp had 4-rbi's to lead the Southerners, while Rusty Simpson held Berry to seven-hits.

In the tension-packed winners bracket game, VSC got run-scoring hits in the second and third, from Fields, and Craig Courtney, and an eighth-inning, two-run homer from pitcher, Ronald Bennett, to drop the Hawks, 4-1. Columbus won two straight in the losers bracket, dropping Berry 11-0, and edging Shorter, 9-7, to advance to the finals.

It took two games, but the Rebs won their fourth consecutive District title. After bowing to the Cougars, 5-3, in the first game of the twin-bill, VSC came back to win the finale, 6-2. In the Area Tournament, Valdosta State got close to the elusive dream of attending the NAIA World Series, but fell short. The Rebels were dumped 7-4, in the first-round, by Birmingham Southern, but battled their way through the losers bracket, by eliminating Ouachita Baptist 13-0, and Southern, 8-2. David Lipscomb, who would go onto finish second in the Nationals (for the second straight year), bopped the Rebs 8-3, in the finals.

Southern put VSC away in the opener, as they grouped 5-hits around a Terry Fields error (one of three in the game), in the fifth, for five runs. Pitcher Ronald Bennett (8-3) led to his own downfall, with unusual wildness, and got hitting support from only Frank Sumner (3x5), and Craig Courtney (2x4).

Leroy Purdy pitched a shut-out, two-hitter (striking-out 8), later that day, keeping the "good-guys" in the tourney. Every Rebel got a hit, as the Ouachita pitching was unable to stop the surge. The next day, Rusty Simpson got revenge upon Birmingham Southern (8-2), as Craig Courtney had two-hits (including a triple), and Gene Felts homered. The win sent VSC to the finals against undefeated Lips-comb.

No longer a member of the Georgia Conference, the newly named Valdosta State "Blazers" entered the NAIA District-25 tourney, as the hosts, with a sparkling 35-11 mark. Shorter (28-4) was seen to be the strongest opposition, while nemesis Columbus (29-11; but beaten 3 of 4 by VSC during the season), and West Georgia (24-11) could cause trouble.

The Blazers breezed through the tournament, although each game was frought with pressure. In the first-round, VSC waited until the seventh to blast West Georgia, behind the eight-hit, hurling of Lee Daney. "Goofy" Jones and Gene Felts had three hits, while Felts, and short-stop Terry Fields homered.

Shorter was looking for revenge from past Valdosta State indignities, as the new Georgia Conference champs sent undefeated Vaughn Robbins to the mound, in the winners bracket game the following day (May 17). VSC ace, Pat Arnett, however, had other ideas, and aided by Jerome Register's hitting, and the great defense of Sam Bowen, set the Hawks down, 5-2. The game was tense from start to finish, as dug-out players from both teams seldom took a seat.

VSC faced Columbus in the finals. The Cougars had fought their way through the losers bracket (wins over West Georgia 9-7, and Shorter 6-0), after an initial round loss to Shorter, 2-1. It took 13-innings, but VSC out-lasted a good Cougar effort, 4-3, to advance to elusive, Knoxville for the fifth straight year.

Starter, Andy Hassell was the victim of some sharp Columbus hitting, and some shoddy Blazer defense. He exited in favor of Marty LeFiles, in the third, down 1-0. LeFiles pitched 10.2-innings of great relief, as VSC rallied behind Gene Felts, tourney record, 5-hits, for a 4-3 win. Bowen's shot off the third-sackers leg scored Bobby Tripp with the winning score.

Valdosta State entered their fifth consecutive Area tournament at Knoxville, with the most confidence since 1969. They also got a break when they drew the State College of Arkansas in the first-round; that meant that tourney co-favorites, Birmingham Southern and David Lipscomb had to meet early.

The Blazers brushed by the Bears, 11-0, as Lee Daney pitched a strong 3-hitter, and got 18-hits from his teammates. Included was Frank Sumner's first home-run of the season, and two deep triples by Sam Bowen. Lipscomb beat Southern 7-4, to set the stage for one of the most important games in VSC history.

Coach Thomas sent "ace" Pat Arnett to the mound, while the Bisons opted for freshman, flame-thrower Bo McLaughlin (now with the Houston Astros). The game was a classic, as McLaughlin set down VSC with the fast-ball, and Arnett used the quick-pitch and the spitter to stay in contention. The only scoring threat by either team came in the sixth, when Lipscomb got a single to right, with men on first, and second, with two out. Right-fielder Jerome Register loped-in, fielded the ball on the run, and threw a strike to catcher Sumner. Plate umpire Shorty Hatfield (yes, the infamous Hatfield of '69) hesitated on the bang-bang call, to let the dust clear. When he thrust his fist in the air, the entire Bison bench exploded in indignation.

Going into the bottom-of-the-ninth, the score remained 0-0. With one-out, All-American Gene Felts singled, but was forced at second by Sam Bowen. Coach Thomas called time-out, and talked to Sam. Everyone in the ball-park knew that the Brunswick, Ga., super-star was going. On the first pitch to Jerome Register (the next hitter), Bowen headed to second. Dennis, the Lipscomb catcher, moved to throw, and Register simply tipped him in the back of his catcher's helmet, with his bat. The throw bounced behind the pitcher's mound, and Bowen was easily safe. Dennis, and Bison coach, Ken Dugan, argued violently with umpire Hatfield, but the veteran man-in-blue, said "play-ball." Jerome slammed a high drive toward center, on the next delivery, and when the ball caromed off the 415-mark, the Blazers erupted in joy. The hit had clutch written all over it, in the dramatic 1-0 win.

Southern ousted Lipscomb that evening, and prepared to meet the Blazers, the next day, for a trip to Phoenix, Ariz., and the NAIA Nationals. It appeared early, that VSC would end the suspense in the first game, as Daney was rolling along with a 3-1 lead, going into the fifth. Pitching with only a day's rest, Lee suddenly got wild, and ace-reliever, Marty LeFiles came to the rescue. Unfortunately, Marty gave up two quick singles, and made an error on an attempted pick-off (it was the first time that anyone scored off LeFiles, in the inning that he relieved, all year).

Southern battered three other VSC hurlers in the late innings, and won 10-8. Gene Felts, and Register hit homers in an aborted ninth-inning comeback, but the Blazers had to depend on a second game victory to carry them skyward. The second game was scheduled for 30-minutes later, but it appeared that rain may end the tourney, as the sky became very dark. If the second game was rained-out, Southern would be declared champions, by virtue of its 3-1 mark, as compared to VSC's 2-1 log.

Sam Bowen took the hill for VSC, as the dark clouds rolled-in, and served

notice as to his ability, by striking-out the side, in the first. While Sam was mowing down the opponents (10 in the first-4-innings, and 17 over-all), VSC just couldn't mount an offense. It took a triple by Bowen in the sixth (he later scored on a wild-pitch), to give the game its final 2-0 score, and the Blazers their first-ever National tournament trip.

A side-light to the great win, was Frank Sumner's constant conversation with the home-plate umpire. Frank related, in glowing terms, the attributes of VSC's four, beautiful bat-girls, and promised the ump an invitation to the post-game celebration party, if the Blazers won. Did it do any good-- in the seventh, with two-out, and a man on first, Bowen threw a fast ball (on a 2-2 count) that missed, outside, by six-inches. "Strike-three," the umpire yelled, saying to Frank, as the stocky, catcher headed for the dug-out, "He wouldn't have hit it anyway."

The trip to Phoenix, and the NAIA World Series, marked the first time that a Valdosta State baseball team ever flew, to a game. It also marked the first time in the school's history that a player refused to make a trip. Pitching ace, Lee Daney gave a solid "no," because he felt that he wasn't appreciated by his teammates, and also the school wouldn't pick-up the tab for his wife's trip. His absense might have cost the Blazers the National championship.

It left VSC with only Arnett, as a solid starter; Marty LeFiles as the only true reliever, and would force Bowen to throw immediately after the team's first loss. Coach Thomas had planned to pitch Daney against opening opponent, Phillips, come back with Arnett (probably against U.S. International; formerly California Western), and hopefully throw Sam under the arcs, in the winners bracket final.

Phillips threw a wrench into the Blazer plans, as they won a 4-3, cliff-hanger, in the first-round. Arnett pitched a fine game, but was victimized by erractic infield play, as Steve Jones made two errors (and a run-scoring mental mistake), and Terry Fields bombed a double-steal throw, to give the Haymakers an early 3-0 margin. Jones made up for his two RKI's (runs-kicked-in), with two RBI's, while Gene Felts added two hits. Felts also threw a strike to the plate in the ninth, after the third consecutive single off Arnett (after two were out), but the runner was ruled safe, to throw the Blazers into the losers bracket.

Bowen got the nod the next day, and simply overwhelmed Malone, with a one-hitter, in a 2-0 win. The only hit off Sam was a one-hopper back to him, toward the left-side of the mound. He slipped, however, on the freshly watered sod, fell down, and couldn't throw. Terry Field delivered a bases-loaded, two-out single, in the second, for the Blazers only offense.

Hometown Grand Canyon, was the next opponent, and VSC won a 10-8 thriller, but not after some anxious moments. Starter Andy Hassell saw catcher Frank Sumner drop a major-league pop-up, in the first, and took a quick shower. Marty LeFiles came in relief, and pitched five strong innings (to gain the win; his eighth of the year, against no losses), but exited in favor of Dan Chadwick in the sixth. Chadwick stayed until the ninth, but the "Old-Man," Pat Arnett, had to be called upon, in the ninth, with the bases loaded, and no one out. Pat put out the fire, and VSC advanced to the semi-finals. An inside-the-park homer by Bowen, 3-hits by Felts (including 3-rbi's), and Bobby Tripp sparked the win.

USIU remained undefeated, as they ripped UWis-Oshkosk, in the other semi, and VSC met Eastern Connecticut for the right to meet the Westerners. Coach Thomas went with his ace, Arnett, while Eastern threw John Caneria (who had, like Arnett, pitched in two previous games). Caneria pitched a brilliant game, striking out 12, but Pat pitched equally great. Eastern scored in the second, when a rising-line-drive was lost in the sun, by Bowen. In the sixth (after VSC had tied it on a Steve Jones double), a two-out, routine, ground-ball hit a pebble, and bounced over Tripp's head, at second, for a 2-1 Eastern lead.

The Blazers rallied on an Arnett hit in the seventh, and saw a great chance to go ahead stolen, in the eighth, as Felts was called-out at first, on a sure hit to deep short. Eastern won it in the bottom-of-the-ninth, on three consecutive singles, after two were out. VSC ended the season with a sparkling 43-14 record.



### 1974 TOURNAMENTS NCAA REGIONAL & NCAA WORLD SERIES

After Valdosta State had won the first-ever South Atlantic Conference title (16-2), and rolled-up the best record in the school's history (35-10), the Blazers were immediately given the number-one seed in the NAIA District-25 tournament. The tourney was to be held in Rome, Ga., with Shorter as host, and also included Columbus, and Georgia Southwestern.

But 1974 was VSC's first year in the NCAA (they were actually dual; belonging to both the NAIA and NCAA), and while they were not ranked in the NCAA poll, they did hold the number-two ranking in the NAIA voting. The Blazers had attracted national attention with victories over Georgia Southern and Florida State, and the NCAA selection committee was attempting to find "another" team to fit into the South Atlantic Regional, along with Florida Southern (ranked-2), Eckerd (ranked-5), and Rollins (ranked-6). Last year these three teams had been joined by UMd-Baltimore, but that foreigner had been less than impressive, dropping two straight games by lopsided margins.

Once the NCAA committee had ascertained that Sam Bowen was elgible for NCAA post-season competition (Sam would have been inelgible for 1973 participation, had VSC been in the NCAA), a bid was offered to the Blazers. Coach Tommy Thomas, and Athletic Director Bill Grant, decided to accept, and VSC was headed for Lakeland, Fla., rather than Rome.

The Lakeland tourney excuded the same kind of "class" that the NAIA World Series had in 1973 (NAIA District and Area tournaments seemed rather dingy). The field was major league, the practice facilities great, and the air brimming with enthusiasm. But VSC had a problem-- hitting. The Blazers had been in a horrendous slump, at the tail end of the season, and as they prepared to meet Rollins, this was on everyone's mind.

Coach Thomas nominated freshman, phenom, Steve McDiffitt to face the Tars, and the New Martinsville, W.Va., native was given an early 7-0 lead by his teammates. But prosperity was to much for McDiffitt to handle, as Rollins exploded for four, third-inning scores, to narrow the margin. Coach Thomas called upon "old faithful," Marty LeFiles, and the senior, reliever held the Tars at bay, as VSC erupted for a 13-6 win. The Blazers blasted 16-hits, including three by Dan Darden, Jerome Register, and Darrell Branam; but none was more important than a seventh-inning double by Dan Alford, that sparked a 6-run, uprising, to put the game out of reach.

Eckerd upset Florida Southern in the other first-round game, and the two underdogs met in the winners bracket final. Bill Petty (10-1) got the nod for VSC, but was promptly nailed for four, first-inning runs. Wildness, and infield hits, that seemed to have eyes, were his undoing. Coach Thomas, stuck with him, however, and Petty threw goose-eggs for the remainder of the game. Runs were VSC's problem, and it wasn't until the seventh that the Blazers unloaded, taking a 5-4 lead. A six-run eight, put the Tritons away for good, and VSC had an 11-4 win. The hitting, once unleashed, was remarkable. The "good-guys" showered the Detroit Tigers, spring training site with extra-base-hits, the likes of which this NCAA Regional had never seen. Darden, Register, and Gene Felts blasted 3-hits each, in the 13-hit attack.

Rollins eliminated Southern, and then Eckerd stopped Rollins, to make it a Blazer-Triton final. VSC had to win one, to advance to Springfield, Ill., and the NCAA World Series. In the opener, Darden, Steve Sumner, and Branam helped the Blazer cause, behind the fine, relief work of Lefiles, as VSC spurted to a 5-2 lead after six-frames. Poor defense, and ineffective relief (LeFiles exited after he too, contributed an error), let Eckerd tie the game in the seventh, and win an 8-5 decision, with three, eighth-inning runs.

Coach Thomas had but one decision to make, in the finals, and that was actually already made-- throw Sam Bowen. Sam did not relish pitching, but always agreed to do so, for the good of the team. Ralph Starling would assume and outfield slot, which meant designated-hilter, Darden (8x12 in the tourney) would not play. Also, Thomas inserted Marty Bishop at third, in place of Steve Sumner (4x11, .364). Sumner and Bishop had shared playing time throughout the regular season, and Thomas felt that it was Marty's turn.

Of the three line-up changes, Bowen's was the most significant. The fire-balling, righty simply over-powered Eckerd, as VSC blasted to a convincing 15-3 win. The Tritons felt confident, although they had no front-line pitching; it was their feeling that VSC had no pitching at all left. Bowen solved that mystery, as he threw two-fast balls, and an off-the-table-curve to the first Eckerd hitter, for a "K." In the bottom-of-the-first, Pete Reeves walked, and Sam hit a 410-foot shot to left, for a 2-0 lead, and VSC was on its way.

The game was tense, however, because it was for all the marbles. Leading 7-1, in the sixth, Bowen and Gene Felts hit back-to-back triples, and Darrell Branam and Moose Greenhalgh blasted back-to-back doubles, and VSC coasted home. Vince Musashe caught the last-out, and the Blazers celebrated their first-ever NCAA success. Their hitting had been sensational-- 54-hits that produced, 44-runs. Seven regulars hit over .300 in the tournament, and the team hit .375 (a school record). Bowen had the distinction of being named All-Tournament outfielder, pitcher, and Most-Valuable-Player.

In the middle of the 8-5 loss to Eckerd, a St. Petersburg, Fla. newspaperman said to Steve Roberts, "Just think; those two teams are killing themselves trying to get to Springfield, Ill.; what a joke." The significance of that statement hit home, when VSC journeyed to Lincoln's capitol city. If you think Southern Air Lines is frightening, try Ozark. You actually step down to get on the plane. Once the team got in Springfield, they found they were staying in a Lutheran Seminary. Trying to keep them happy there was Coach Thomas' first problem-- he wasn't successful, as the team moved to a \$100-a-day (for the entire group) all you can sleep, motel. The rooms were about as big as a small suitcase.

To complicate the problems, the team had no transportation, and eating (or finding a place to eat) was a thrill-a-minute. The most important thing for Thomas, however, was to keep the Blazer hitting edge, and he found the practice facilities completely inadequate. VSC was assigned to a Little League field, and an hour before their first-game, Darrell Branam hit a batting-practice screamer back at Thomas. The veteran coach made a great stop, but it was in an area of his body that "smarts" a bit. The diagnosis by one of Springfield's eminent M.D.'s was that Thomas was suffering from a bad case of the "swollen nuts." (We all guessed that).

VSC was matched against another Southern power, New Orleans, in the first-round, and Thomas went with McDiffitt (he didn't actually say McDiffitt, but just nodded in pain, when the pitcher's name was mentioned). The freshman just didn't have it, and VSC was behind 3-0, after one. Bowen hit a three-run triple in the second, but Steve hit the pines, after New Orleans erupted for five-runs in the fourth. Moose Greenhalgh's homer brought VSC within one, at 8-7, in the fifth, but the Blazer relievers couldn't hold the Privateers, and VSC fell to a final 13-9 count. Bowen had three-hits, and Jerome Register two.

Coach Thomas was recovered enough to take the coaching lines, for the next day's (June 2) game, and nominated Bill Petty for the start. Petty pitched a great game against losers bracket opponent, New Haven, but got no offensive support in a 1-0 loss. Only Bowen provided any punch (2-hits) as the Blazers left the bases loaded twice, and men on second-and-third once. Very strong UCalif-Irvine won the

Nationals, beating New Orleans in the finals. The Blazers, however, were rated second in the final NCAA National poll, conducted just prior to the tourney.

VSC ended the year with an impressive 38-13 mark, and Sam Bowen was named first-team, NCAA All-American. Coach Thomas recovered too, but still has a fear of white objects, that fly swiftly toward his body.



### 1975 TOURNAMENT

Valdosta State hit a late regular season slump, that cost the South Atlantic Conference championship, and the "slump" lasted into the NCAA Regionals. The Blazers were rated tenth-in-the-nation, going into the South Atlantic Regional, but the field had to be extended to a six-team affair, to accommodate conference champion Columbus, VSC, the three Florida regulars (Rollins, Southern, and Eckerd), and Lynchburg (Va.).

The Blazers drew Florida Southern, under the arcs, and were soundly thrashed 6-0. Starter Bill Petty, and reliever Bill Parsons, gave-up only six hits, but four were for extra bases. The Blazers were held to six-scattered safties, and never threatened.

The tournament ended the next day, as rival Columbus, behind Mike Franklin's grand-slam, off McDiffitt, beat VSC, 5-2. The "good-guys" left base runners stranded all day, as the season seemed to flash-by in that one nine-inning encounter. The Blazers finished the year with a 36-17 record, but came up short, as they failed to win a tournament for the first time since 1968.

### 1977 TOURNAMENTS NCAA REGIONAL & NCAA WORLD SERIES

The 1977 team had to fight for everything that they got, and the South Atlantic Regional tournament was no different. After wresting the South Atlantic Conference championship away from Columbus, on the last day of the regular season, VSC had to hit there way to the South Atlantic Conference tournament title, over West Georgia. The Blazers entered NCAA action with a fine 41-13 mark.

Besides the "good-guys," Columbus, West Georgia, and Randolph-Macon (Va.) made their way to Blazer Field for the series. '77 was to be the first year of eight-regions in NCAA Division II baseball, and the new South Atlantic Region excluded Florida, and contained the states of Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia. Most teams in the region were NAIA affiliated, and it was difficult to find quality opponents outside the SAC. Thus while VSC coach, Tommy Thomas objected to the presence of rivals Columbus, and West Georgia in the tourney, their records indicated that they deserved the honor.

What disturbed Thomas was that this would be the third chance that the Braves and Cougars had to dis-lodge VSC. And to complicate matters, the NCAA National Office rated Randolph-Macon second in the tourney, which meant that VSC would meet Columbus in the first round. As it turned out, the Virginia school was battered by West Georgia 12-5, and Columbus 12-1, in the first two rounds.

And speak of battering; the Blazers bombed Columbus 18-3, in that first game, behind a 20-hit attack, and the spirited pitching of Steve McDiffitt. Sal Amadeo had four hits, but was out-done by Craig Viers, as the Crown Point, Ind., outfielder had 5-hits, and a school record tying 7-rbi's. VSC jumped to a 12-0 lead after five-and-a-half innings, and the rout was on.

The Blazers moved confidently into the winners bracket, against West Georgia, and were promptly shocked 4-3, in 10-innings. Brad Campbell pitched a great game for the Braves, but was matched by Richard Sullivan, until the tenth (one pitch, that a 2-run homer, kept Sully from the win). Richard had been given new life in the bottom-of-the-ninth, by a clutch RBI single off the bat of Ken Smith, but got into tenth inning trouble. Enter hero (from the SAC tourney), reliever Chuck Beale, who promptly game up a run-scoring hit. VSC couldn't rally in the bottom of the inning, and were faced with beating Columbus for the fourth time, in six tries.

Blazer bats lay silent until the seventh, against the Cougars (who led 1-0). Four Columbus errors, three VSC hits, and a walk produced four runs and a "good-guy" win (4-1). Freshman Jimmy Wall pitched well, and got great ninth-inning help from Beale, to send VSC to the finals.

Valdosta State had to defeat West Georgia twice on Sunday (May 15), and a large, enthusiastic, home-town crowd was on hand to see if it could be pulled off. It almost wasn't given a chance, as the first-game, VSC starter, Dale Leach, allowed four first-inning runs, and was in constant trouble, before being relieved by Beale, in the fourth. Charlie, with help from Sullivan in the seventh, held West Georgia at bay, while Amadeo (4-hits), and Viers combined for 6-rbi's (three each), in a tense 9-6 win.

The veteran Bill Petty was waiting in the wings to throw the finale, and a gem was needed, "for justice to be served." Petty threw the gem, but some other heroics were needed to over-come the splendid mound work of Brave hurlers Bill Taylor, and Campbell. VSC scored first, in the fifth, as Amadeo ripped a Taylor pitch, 385 feet, over the left-field fence, for a 1-0 lead. Petty gave up his only walk, with two-out in the sixth, and disaster struck. The next Brave batter hit a single down the left-field line, which outfielder Billy Fortenberry let get

by him. Fortenberry slipped as he ran to the fence, and caught his foot in the bottom chain-link. One run-scored, and the hitter ended on third. On the next pitch, the Brave batter hit a slow, routine roller to first-baseman Bruce Fowler. Fowler charged and the ball hit his glove, caroming off, for an error, and another run scored. No more damage resulted, but VSC was down 2-0, and Taylor was sporting a fine two hitter.

When Taylor gave VSC its third hit in the seventh, West Georgia coach, Archie White brought in Campbell, and the righty squashed the threat. Petty put the Braves down in the eighth and ninth, but it appeared that the damage was done. The Blazers entered the bottom-of-the-ninth with hope, and confidence, but the probability was not there.

Skip Fite was the first hitter, and he crouched low, "over the plate," and Campbell threw him four, consecutive balls. "Could it be done; It certainly deserved to be, since VSC had defeated West Georgia in five, of seven previous meetings." Craig Viers was the next Blazer batter, and playing the percentages, Coach Thomas had him bunt. Viers fouled off the first attempt, took a ball, and then fouled off another try. With Cecil Whitehead on deck, players were now hoping that Craig just wouldn't hit into a double-death.

What he did do, stands out in VSC memories; much like your first---- milk shake. He hit a beautiful two-run homer. It was barely fair, and barely over the fence, but it did the job. To say absolute bedlam erupted would be to put it quite mildly. The recipient of the 3-2 win, Petty, may have been the happiest person at the scene, but that would be contested by several hundred players, fans, and coaches.

Viers went 11x19 in the tourney, with 13-rbi's, and was a unanimous choice for Regional MVP. Whitehead, Amadeo, Fite, Petty, and McDiffitt joined him on the team. It was much like 1974; a hell of a fight to go to Springfield, Ill.

Valdosta State ended fourth in the final National Poll, but had the misfortune to be matched with number-1 Eckerd, in the first-round of the Nationals. Pairings are made years in advance, thus it was chance that matched two of the country's top rated clubs. It was not chance, however, that saw seven All-Americans on the field, in Joe Lefebre (centerfield), Steve Balboni (first-base), Kerry Freedman (pitcher) of Eckerd (all first-team), and Craig Viers (first-team), Steve McDiffitt, Cecil Whitehead, and Skip Fite (all second-team) of VSC.

Coach Thomas went with his ace (McDiffitt, 10-0), and Eckerd, mentor Bill Livsley countered with his ace (Freedman, 11-0). As expected, the game was a classic pitcher's match-up. VSC got four hits (entering the game with a .318 team average), and Eckerd got three (with a .332 team average). Although Freedman pitched a crafty contest, McDiffitt was superior, as he pitched one of the finest tournament games in VSC history. The only problem for the good-guys was that they got beat, 2-1. Two of the Triton's hits were homers (by Lefebre and Balboni), and no Blazer hit produced a run.

Freedman was cunningly wild, and VSC was a swinging team. Sal Amadeo doubled in the fifth, went to third on an out, and after a 45-minute rain delay, scored on a wild pitch, for the Blazers only tally. Not that VSC didn't have other chances. In the eighth, Craig Viers came to bat, with two out and the bases loaded. Freedman had thrown seven, consecutive balls, and although Coach Thomas was aware of the wildness, he hesitated in giving the veteran, All-American the "take." Viers swung at the first pitch (it was high and outside), and fouled it to the left-side, where the Eckerd third-sacker reached into the stands, and caught it for the third out.

In the ninth, the Blazers again loaded the sacks, but Ken Smith hit a one-

hopper back to Freedman, and VSC suddenly found themselves in the losers bracket.

An added footnote, has to be added; that in regard to the umpiring. The ball and strike calls were pathetic both ways, and an inning ending "out-call" against Bill Petty, defies all imagination. The Nationals is supposed to be a class event, but more dignified, and competent callers could be found in the Knights of Georgia at 3:00 AM.

VSC's next opponent was Shippensburg State (Pa.), who had looked very weak in dropping an earlier 6-1 decision to New Haven. That "weak" observation certainly didn't hold true in the Blazer game, however. The teams battled through 12-scoreless innings before Shippensburg broke the drought with a run in the 13th. The score came off reliever Chuck Beale, who had replaced starter, Jimmy Wall in the 11th. Wall pitched well, using a great pick-off moves to get himself out of trouble in three separate innings.

In the bottom-of-the-thirteenth, Billy Tyler (who had spent considerable time in a Springfield massage parlor, the night before) led-off with a pinch-hit single, and the Blazers loaded the bases, with one out. Craig Viers stepped-up and promptly hit a two-foot squibber, which Leslie (the Shippensburg catcher) scooped-up, but rather than stepping on the plate, he moved several steps up the third-base line, toward pinch-runner Chico Alvarez. When Leslie regained his senses, he did step on the plate, and attempted to throw Viers out, for an apparently easy double-death.

But two things happened: 1) when Viers hit the ball, the seam broke (it must have been an extremely weak seam), and Leslie's index finger got caught inside the hide, which made an accurate throw difficult, and (2) Viers ran to first on the infield grass, and bowled over the first-baseman, as he neared first (great job of umpiring). Sal Amadeo scored from second, and Cecil Whitehead then ripped a single up the middle, for the winning run. Reliever Richard Sullivan picked-up the win, after delivering one pitch in the top-of-the-thirteenth.

VSC clobbered UMo-St. Louis the next day (May 30), 11-4, behind the fine relief pitching of Sullivan (who relieved an unusually shakey Bill Petty), and the home-run bats of Ken Smith and Bart Shuman. BART SHUMAN ... Yes, Bart Shuman. The "littlegoof," out of Monticello, Fla., hit his first homer ever; YES, EVER, in the fifth, to extend their lead to 8-4. Smith later homered in the same inning, with two on, to provide the final margin.

The Blazers were now one of the final four, and drew UC-Riverside, after the Highlanders had dropped the winners bracket final, 8-2, to Eckerd. Again, the game was a classic; and again, VSC came up short; this time 8-7. Coach Thomas came back with McDiffitt (after two days rest), and the senior, 4-year letterman, was the victim of both questionable calls, and horrible defense.

In the bottom-of-the-sixth, with two-out, and VSC on top, 3-2, a Riverside hitter, bounced a routine grounder to first-sacker Bruce Fowler. Fowler fielded the ball, and tagged the runner. Simple-- not quite. Both the home-plate, and first-base umpires claimed that they were calling the ball fair (it was four-feet fair), and weren't looking for the tag. Their verdict-- safe. The next hitter popped a towering fly toward center, and Amadeo circled once to often, as it dropped for a double. Viers then came dashing in on a line drive to right, but the ball went over his head scoring two runs. McDiffitt then threw a wild pitch (the score shot to 5-3), and issued a walk. Enter Bill Petty, who struck the next Riverside hitter out on three pitches, but the third-strike got away from Cecil Whitehead, and Coach Thomas replaced Petty (with hind-sight, a crucial move), with Beale, to face a right-hander.

Beale's first pitch was rocketed to left-center, with double written all over

it. Somehow, someway, Amadeo made a stabbing, lunging catch, to end the inning. VSC battled back, behind Fowler, and Billy Fortenberry (3-hits each), to take a 6-5 lead into the bottom-of-the-eighth. With Jimmy Wall, now on the hill, and two out, and a man on first, a routine single was hit to left. Fortenberry charged the ball; slipped, and it got past him to the fence, and the game was tied 6-6.

In the ninth, the Blazers scored, as the Riverside second-sacker mis-played a ground-ball off the bat of Sal Amadeo, with the bases loaded. Going to the bottom-of-the-ninth, VSC held a precarious 7-6 lead. The game was lost on the first Highlander hitter. Wall threw a 2-2, change-up, right down the pipe, but the hitter ducked it, and the batter eventually walked (just an example of the great preparation of the Springfield Baseball Committee re: the quality of umps). Two hits scored a run, and Richard Sullivan came into pitch. He walked the first hitter intentionally, and the next batter hit a shot off his glove, and VSC was dead.

While Riverside coach, Jack Smitheran (twice on Arizona State National Championship teams; and an assistant coach with two other ASU National Champions) said the game was the greatest with which he had ever been associated; the reactions of the Blazer players cannot be recored (at least not in a family volumn). The loss left VSC a 4th. place national finish (the best since a third-place NAIA tie, in 1973), and the respect of all their opponents; especially Riverside, which went on to win the championship.

Skip Fite made the All-Tournament team, and five Blazer hitters were among the top-12 in the series; Fite (.417), Fowler (.385), Shuman (.333), Smith (.333), and Whitehead (.313). Wall also was among the top-3 pitchers with a 0.90 ERA.

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

by him. Fortenberry slipped as he ran to the fence, and caught his foot in the bottom chain-link. One run-scored, and the hitter ended on third. On the next pitch, the Brave batter hit a slow, routine roller to first-baseman Bruce Fowler. Fowler charged and the ball hit his glove, caroming off, for an error, and another run scored. No more damage resulted, but VSC was down 2-0, and Taylor was sporting a fine two hitter.

When Taylor gave VSC its third hit in the seventh, West Georgia coach, Archie White brought in Campbell, and the righty squashed the threat. Petty put the Braves down in the eighth and ninth, but it appeared that the damage was done. The Blazers entered the bottom-of-the-ninth with hope, and confidence, but the probability was not there.

Skip fite was the first hitter, and he crouched low, "over the plate," and Campbell threw him four, consecutive balls. "Could it be done; It certainly deserved to be, since VSC had defeated West Georgia in five, of seven previous meetings." Craig Viers was the next Blazer batter, and playing the percentages, Coach Thomas had him bunt. Viers fouled off the first attempt, took a ball, and then fouled off another try. With Cecil Whitehead on deck, players were now hoping that Craig just wouldn't hit into a double-death.

What he did do, stands out in VSC memories; much like your first---- milk shake. He hit a beautiful two-run homer. It was barely fair, and barely over the fence, but it did the job. To say absolute bedlam erupted would be to put it quite mildly. The recipient of the 3-2 win, Petty, may have been the happiest person at the scene, but that would be contested by several hundred players, fans, and coaches.

Viers went 11x19 in the tourney, with 13-rbi's, and was a unanimous choice for Regional MVP. Whitehead, Amadeo, Fite, Petty, and McDiffitt joined him on the team. It was much like 1974; a hell of a fight to go to Springfield, Ill.

Valdosta State ended fourth in the final National Poll, but had the misfortune to be matched with number-1 Eckerd, in the first-round of the Nationals. Pairings are made years in advance, thus it was chance that matched two of the country's top rated clubs. It was not chance, however, that saw seven All-Americans on the field, in Joe Lefebre (centerfield), Steve Balboni (first-base), Kerry Freedman (pitcher) of Eckerd (all first-team), and Craig Viers (first-team), Steve McDiffitt, Cecil Whitehead, and Skip Fite (all second-team) of VSC.

Coach Thomas went with his ace (McDiffitt, 10-0), and Eckerd, mentor Bill Livsley countered with his ace (Freedman, 11-0). As expected, the game was a classic pitcher's match-up. VSC got four hits (entering the game with a .318 team average), and Eckerd got three (with a .332 team average). Although Freedman pitched a crafty contest, McDiffitt was superior, as he pitched one of the finest tournament games in VSC history. The only problem for the good-guys was that they got beat, 2-1. Two of the Triton's hits were homers (by Lefebre and Balboni), and no Blazer hit produced a run.

Freedman was cunningly wild, and VSC was a swinging team. Sal Amadeo doubled in the fifth, went to third on an out, and after a \$5-minute rain delay, scored on a wild pitch, for the Blazers only tally. Not that VSC didn't have other chances. In the eighth, Craig Viers came to bat, with two out and the bases loaded. Freedman had thrown seven, consecutive balls, and although Coach Thomas was aware of the wildness, he hesitated in giving the veteran, All-American the "take." Viers swung at the first pitch (it was high and outside), and fouled it to the left-side, where the Eckerd third-sacker reached into the stands, and caught it for the third out.

In the ninth, the Blazers again loaded the sacks, but Ken Smith hit a one-

hopper back to Freedman, and VSC suddenly found themselves in the losers bracket.

An added footnote, has to be added; that in regard to the umpiring. The ball and strike calls were pathetic both ways, and an inning ending "out-call" against Bill Petty, defies all imagination. The Nationals is supposed to be a class event, but more dignified, and competent callers could be found in the Knights of Georgia at 3:00 AM.

VSC's next opponent was Shippensburg State (Pa.), who had looked very weak in dropping an earlier 6-1 decision to New Haven. That "weak" observation certainly didn't hold true in the Blazer game, however. The teams battled through 12-scoreless innings before Shippensburg broke the drought with a run in the 13th. The score came off reliever Chuck Beale, who had replaced starter, Jimmy Wall in the 11th. Wall pitched well, using a great pick-off moves to get himself out of trouble in three separate innings.

In the bottom-of-the-thirteenth, Billy Tyler (who had spent considerable time in a Springfield massage parlor, the night before) led-off with a pinch-hit single, and the Blazers loaded the bases, with one out. Craig Viers stepped-up and promptly hit a two-foot squibber, which Leslie (the Shippensburg catcher) scooped-up, but rather than stepping on the plate, he moved several steps up the third-base line, toward pinch-runner Chico Alvarez. When Leslie regained his senses, he did step on the plate, and attempted to throw Viers out, for an apparently easy double-death.

But two things happened: 1) when Viers hit the ball, the seam broke (it must have been an extremely weak seam), and Leslie's index finger got caught inside the hide, which made an accurate throw difficult, and (2) Viers ran to first on the infield grass, and bowled over the first-baseman, as he neared first (great job of umpiring). Sal Amadeo scored from second, and Cecil Whitehead then ripped a single up the middle, for the winning run. Reliever Richard Sullivan picked-up the win, after delivering one pitch in the top-of-the-thirteenth.

VSC clobbered UMo-St. Louis the next day (May 30), 11-4, behind the fine relief pitching of Sullivan (who relieved an unusually shakey Bill Petty), and the home-run bats of Ken Smith and Bart Shuman. BART SHUMAN ... Yes, Bart Shuman. The "littlegoof," out of Monticello, Fla., hit his first homer ever; YES, EVER, in the fifth, to extend their lead to 8-4. Smith later homered in the same inning, with two on, to provide the final margin.

The Blazers were now one of the final four, and drew UC-Riverside, after the Highlanders had dropped the winners bracket final, 8-2, to Eckerd. Again, the game was a classic; and again, VSC came up short; this time 8-7. Coach Thomas came back with McDiffitt (after two days rest), and the senior, 4-year letterman, was the victim of both questionable calls, and horrible defense.

In the bottom-of-the-sixth, with two-out, and VSC on top, 3-2, a Riverside hitter, bounced a routine grounder to first-sacker Bruce Fowler. Fowler fielded the ball, and tagged the runner. Simple-- not quite. Both the home-plate, and first-base umpires claimed that they were calling the ball fair (it was four-feet fair), and weren't looking for the tag. Their verdict-- safe. The next hitter popped a towering fly toward center, and Amadeo circled once to often, as it dropped for a double. Viers then came dashing in on a line drive to right, but the ball went over his head scoring two runs. McDiffitt then threw a wild pitch (the score shot to 5-3), and issued a walk. Enter Bill Petty, who struck the next Riverside hitter out on three pitches, but the third-strike got away from Cecil Whitehead, and Coach Thomas replaced Petty (with hind-sight, a crucial move), with Beale, to face a right-hander.

Beale's first pitch was rocketed to left-center, with double written all over

it. Somehow, someway, Amadeo made a stabbing, lunging catch, to end the inning. VSC battled back, behind Fowler, and Billy Fortenberry (3-hits each), to take a 6-5 lead into the bottom-of-the-eighth. With Jimmy Wall, now on the hill, and two out, and a man on first, a routine single was hit to left. Fortenberry charged the ball; slipped, and it got past him to the fence, and the game was tied 6-6.

In the ninth, the Blazers scored, as the Riverside second-sacker mis-played a ground-ball off the bat of Sal Amadeo, with the bases loaded. Going to the bottom-of-the-ninth, VSC held a precarious 7-6 lead. The game was lost on the first Highlander hitter. Wall threw a 2-2, change-up, right down the pipe, but the hitter ducked it, and the batter eventually walked (just an example of the great preperation of the Springfield Baseball Committee re: the quality of umps). Two hits scored a run, and Richard Sullivan came into pitch. He walked the first hitter intentionally, and the next batter hit a shot off his glove, and VSC was dead.

While Riverside coach, Jack Smitheran (twice on Arizona State National Championship teams; and an assistant coach with two other ASU National Champions) said the game was the greatest with which he had ever been associated; the reactions of the Blazer players cannot be recored (at least not in a family volumn). The loss left VSC a 4th. place national finish (the best since a third-place NAIA tie, in 1973), and the respect of all their opponents; especially Riverside, which went on to win the championship.

Skip Fite made the All-Tournament team, and five Blazer hitters were among the top-12 in the series; Fite (.417), Fowler (.385), Shuman (.333), Smith (.333), and Whitehead (.313). Wall also was among the top-3 pitchers with a 0.90 ERA.
