SELIRT Conference Report

The Library Instruction Roundtable of SELA (SELIRT) sponsored a panel discussion on "Evaluating Web Resources" at the Southeastern Library Association - Arkansas Library Association Joint Conference last fall. The panelists included Necia Parker-Gibson (University of Arkansas - Fayetteville), Phillip Jones (Central Arkansas Library District), and Rachel Byrd Shankles (Lakeside, AR High School Library). Each panelist discussed how this perennial issue is handled from their perspective academic, public, and school media settings.

Necia Parker-Gibson led the discussion by describing ABLE, an acronym she uses to help students remember evaluation criteria when analyzing web information. ABLE stands for

A	Appropriate
B	Believable
L	Literate/logical
E	Effective

In order to reach students, Necia compares the Internet to a shopping experience. The Internet is a flea market, where one can always find something though it may take some time. The search engines are analogous to shopping malls; they are gateways to shopping sources, such as department stores. The library and library homepages act more like specialty shops where one can be assured of quality.

The next panelist, Phillip Jones, outlined his observations on teaching evaluation skills with the public library user. Information sources have changed from print to CD-ROM to the Internet; however, evaluation criteria are similar for all resources. He observed that users tend to use only the first 10 articles in a hit list. Methods for teaching evaluation criteria at the Central Arkansas Library System include Internet classes; handouts and bookmarks; posting criteria and providing links on the library homepage; and point-of-use instruction.

Rachel Byrd Shankles, a school media specialist, utilizes blocking software to block inappropriate web sites from students. In teaching evaluation criteria to her students, she finds the need to set limits, including:

- Students can use only two Internet sites for their research
- Web sites must have an established/revision date and link to author
- Web sites should come from .gov and .edu domains
- The Internet is used for educational purposes only; no chatting, e-mail or games

Through a Goals 2000 class, Rachel also works to teach parents about the Internet so that they can guide their child's surfing.

Questions from the audience included details of Internet class offerings from each institution and Internet use policies. In addition to the handouts supplied by panelists, audience members who teach evaluation criteria distributed materials.

Stateside News

Alabama

During the recent legislative session, the Alabama legislature appropriated \$3,000,000 for the Alabama Virtual Library. Libraries and schools funded for direct access to the Alabama Virtual Library (AVL) are constituents of the Alabama Department of Education (public K-12 school systems); Alabama State Department of Postsecondary Education (public two-year colleges); Alabama Commission on Higher Education (colleges and universities which belong to the Network of Alabama Academic Libraries); and the Alabama Public Library Service (public libraries). The AVL Council, charged to implement and manage the Alabama Virtual Library, held its organizational meeting on July 8, 1999. The Council's goal is to provide access to some full text and bibliographic databases before the end of September. For updates, see davisref.samford.edu/alala/avl.htm.



Arkansas

The Central Arkansas Library System (CALs) has received two grants totaling over \$150,000 to increase public access to the Internet and to assist in providing facilities for training area librarians in emerging computer technology. The grants were awarded by the Gates Library Initiative.

The 1999 Arkansas General Assembly approved an Institutional Library Holdings Supplemental Appropriation of \$4,000,000. The legislature and Department of Higher Education earmarked the money for acquisition of materials by state-supported academic libraries.



Florida

Public libraries in Florida will receive approximately \$5 million in grants to purchase computers, Internet access and technical training for libraries in low-income communities, thanks to The Gates Learning Foundation. The foundation, one of two philanthropic foundations created by Bill Gates and his wife Melinda Gates, awarded the grants. Jack Farris, member of the senior executive team for the Foundations, presented the award to Secretary of State Kathryn Harris and Mary Jane Little, president of the Florida Library Association, during the Florida Library Association annual meeting in St. Augustine.

The University of Miami Library, in partnership with Florida International University Library and the Historical Museum of Southern Florida, received a 1998 Library of Congress/Ameritech National Digital Library Grant of \$137,188 for "Reclaiming the Everglades: South Florida's Natural History, 1884-1934." With this support, the three institutions will digitize approximately 10,000 images, letters, documents, and pages of printed text that document the evolution of the Florida Everglades. Upon completion, the partnership will merge a series of separate yet interrelated collections into a single resource for students, scholars, researchers, and other individuals. The grant is one of seven 1998 awards following a peer review process that considered sixty-eight submissions.



The main campus of the Halifax Medical Center in Daytona Beach features a new library devoted to providing easy, one-stop access to cancer information. The Josephine Field Davidson Cancer Resource Library offers a wide variety of materials on cancer and how to best cope with the disease, as a patient, a relative, a friend, or a colleague.

In addition to the collection of print materials, the library maintains a collection of videotapes which may be viewed on-site or borrowed. For more information, contact the library at (904) 254-4000, extension 6872.

Stateside News

The National Film Preservation Foundation (NFPF) has awarded a grant to Emory University to preserve the Yerkes Primate Research Collection. Created in the 1930s, the research films document one of the first scientific centers devoted to the study of primate behavior, psychology and language acquisition using chimpanzees and apes.

This year, the NFPF awarded seventeen grants for the preservation of films in ten states. The other recipient in the Southeast is the University of South Carolina's Newsfilm Archives; newsreel excerpts of early women aviators will be preserved with the grant's support.



Louisiana

After three years, the expansion and renovation of the State Library of Louisiana's building has been completed. More than 50,000 square feet were added to the existing 90,000 square foot building, increasing seating space for library users and stack space in the general and special collections. A new entrance and landscaping reflect the incorporation of the State Library into the Capitol Complex Master Plan. The nearly \$9 million project was the first major renovation for the structure, which was built in 1958.

The building was officially dedicated in a ceremony on March 30, 1999.



South Carolina

The University of South Carolina in Columbia has established The Joseph Heller Archive. The Archive documents the detailed crafting of six major books in extraordinary detail, showing the creative interaction between one of America's most distinguished contemporary novelists and the publishing process. Over 150,000 pages of notes, outlines, research drafts, edited typescripts, proofs, correspondence, and reviews are included in the holdings. Highlights include the first handwritten 100-page draft for *Something Happened*; manuscript and edited typescript from Heller's dramatization of *Catch-22*; five early screen collaborations dating from the

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1950s; and file boxes of the distinctive index cards Heller used to plot his novel *God Forbid* (later retitled *God Knows*). Additional information is available at www.sc.edu/library/spcoll/amlit/heller.html.



The Thomas Cooper Library, University of South Carolina, has risen to 52nd place in the 1997-98 Association of Research Libraries (ARL) membership criteria index. ARL members represent the largest and most prestigious college, university and public libraries in the United States and Canada.

The index is based on five quantitative data elements including number of volumes held; gross number of volumes added; number of current serial subscriptions; total library expenditures; and total number of professional and support staff.

Rising from 54th place to 52nd, University of South Carolina now tops Notre Dame, SUNY-Buffalo, Connecticut, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Louisiana State, Brown, Tennessee, Purdue, MIT, Ohio, and Florida State.



Tennessee

The Special Collections Department of the McWhorter Library, University of Memphis, has acquired the personal and professional papers of Dr. Benjamin Hooks of Memphis. The materials document Dr. Hooks' early days as a lawyer working to overthrow Jim Crow in Memphis, to his tenure as head of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), his service as a Federal judge, and his tenure as the first African American member of the Federal Communications Commission. Virginia



Mainstream Loudon, the grassroots organization which fought in support of their First Amendment rights regarding free access to Internet resources in the public library, has been named winner of the 1999 John Phillip Immroth Memorial Award for Intellectual Freedom. The award is presented annually by the Intellectual Freedom Round Table of the American Library Association.

The Immroth Award Committee recognizes the great efforts of Mainstream Loudon and members of the Loudon community in supporting freedom of access to Internet resources. "Mainstream Loudon stands as a model to the rest of the country in showing how a group of concerned citizens can organize themselves and their community to fight in support of their First Amendment rights", said Immroth Committee Chair Tom Budlong.

The Immroth Award, which includes a citation and \$500, was presented at the ALA Annual Conference in New Orleans.



West Virginia

Marshall University's new John Deaver Drinko Library opened last October. Heralded by Governor Cecil Underwood as "the centerpiece of a \$75 million investment in computers, telecommunications equipment and fiberoptic transmission lines that promises to make Marshall one of the most technologically sophisticated universities in the country", the 4-story facility houses University Libraries, Computing Services, Telecommunications, the Center for Instructional Technology, and the Office of Information Technology. The building is organized around dynamic, integrative themes.

Services include collection access, user education, extension services, information delivery, electronic services, CD-ROM indexes, multimedia copiers and scanners, and a help desk. During the 1998 Southeastern Library Association - Arkansas Library Association Joint Conference the Paraprofessional Roundtable (PART) held a business meeting which included a brainstorming session. As a result, PART developed three strategies for the 1998-2000 biennium:

1. Increase membership.
2. Increase visibility and public relations. This effort will include establishment of a column in newsletter issues of The Southeastern Librarian and organized outreach to the paraprofessional organizations within each SELA member state.
3. Establish a "moving program" to be titled, "PART ON THE MOVE". PART will research and create a program which will include a script, displays, brochures and perhaps a video. The program will be available upon request to state organizations for use as a stand-alone program. The program will be developed so that a borrowing state association can provide its own facilitator or a PART-furnished speaker can present the program. PART hopes to have this project in place in time for the next SELA conference schedule.

At the conclusion of the business meeting, Donna Washko from the University of Central Arkansas was elected Chair of PART for 1998-2000.

During the conference, PART also sponsored "You Can Lead Your Staff to Water...", presented by Sherryl Robinson. The program explored the concept that leadership in the library includes motivation, direction, encouragement and empowerment for staff.
