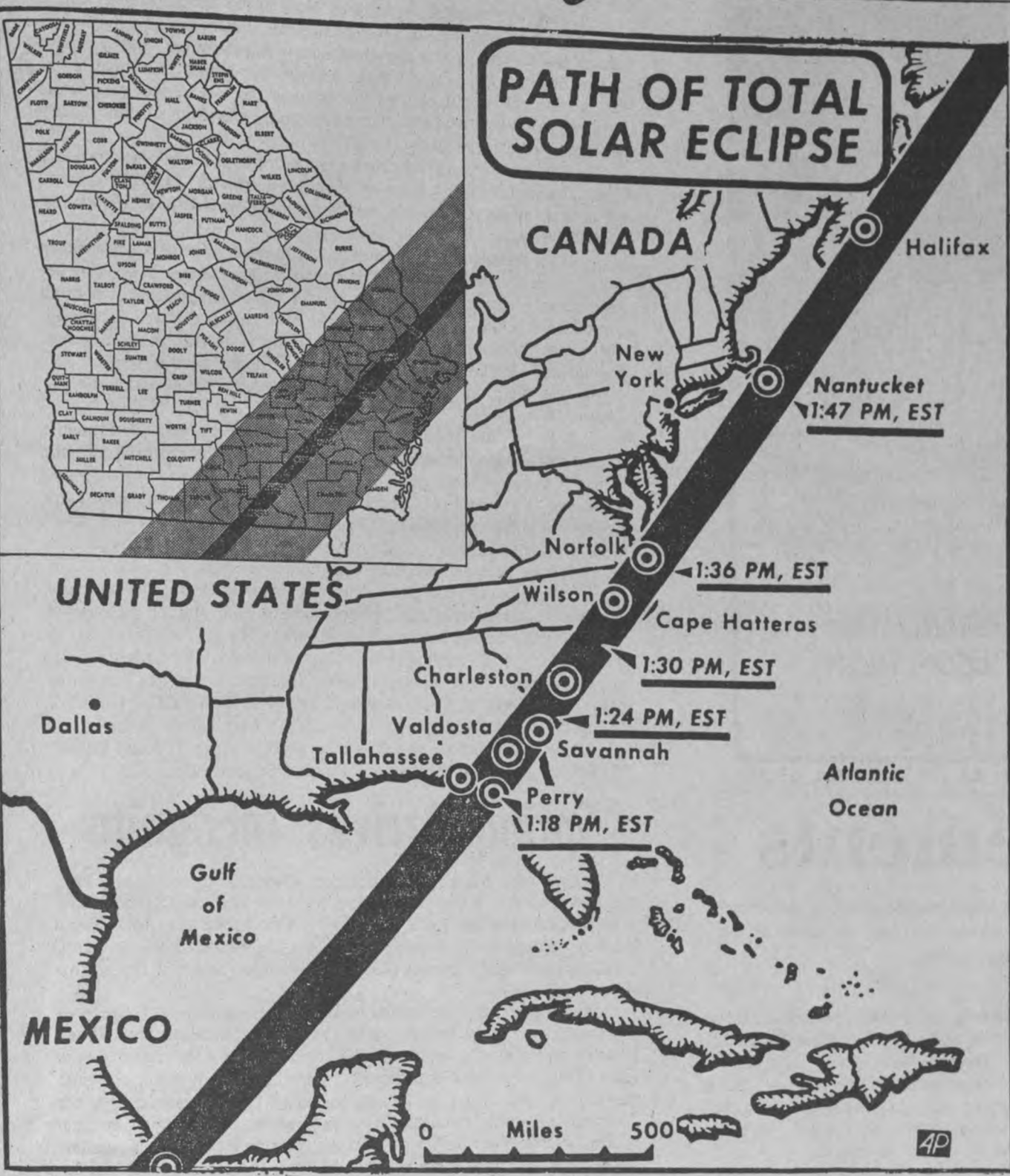

Eclipse Brings International Recognition To Valdosta

If you happen to be on campus the Saturday of March 7, smile. You might be on television.

CBS-TV cameras will be located on the front campus, providing viewers with a cross section of observers, serious and casual astronomers from different geographical locations, VSC students and faculty and Valdosta residents. In addition, CBS is reporting the eclipse from other locations in the path of totality (the 85 mile wide shadow of the moon which will race at 1500 miles per hour across the earth as the moon slips in front of the sun). The eclipse will reach Valdosta at 1:19 pm and last approximately two minutes.

Approximately forty CBS-TV representatives have been assigned to VSC, the major domestic remote location. Microwave towers have been installed at Langdale Hall, a recently completed five-story residence hall for women.

Barry Jagoda of CBS News special events is at VSC to produce a 60-minute live program centering on the VSC campus.

"CBS is very anxious to broad-

cast what is happening on campus the day of the eclipse," according to Jagoda. "We certainly have no objection to students being in the area of the cameras as long as they don't interfere with the amateur and professional scientists."

Also on campus are Don McGraw, network operations engineer, and Vincent E. Rocco, microwave and RF communications system manager.

Dr. Raymond Hunter, head of the VSC Physics Department, is coordinating all observation plans in Valdosta. In addition to handling correspondence from various individual groups across the United States, Dr. Hunter is handling details for required facilities of the 20,000-member Astronomical League, which designated Valdosta as its prime viewing site several months ago.

Registration starts on Friday at Mathis Municipal Auditorium, at which time assigned viewers will receive their specified locations, identification badges, and various instructions.

Good locations for VSC students to view the eclipse include the student

parking lot, North Campus, and the VSC baseball field.

Caution must be exercised in observing the eclipse. Permanent incurable eye damage will ensue if one views the eclipse with unprotected eyes.

The reason for the danger is basically the same reason why people can get sunburned at the beach on a cloudy day. Both visible and invisible radiation from the sun can inflict a painless tiny burn on the retina of the human eye and produce as has happened in the past-a permanent blind spot in the center of the viewing area.

Two main laymen methods can be used in order to view the eclipse safely. The first is an indirect way by using a pinhole projector, e.g. a shoebox, to cast the sun's shadow on some appropriate background.

The only safe direct method-excluding expensive optical equipment-involves photographic film. A roll of black and white film is unrolled and completely exposed in the sun. Then the film is developed to give a dark negative that passes almost no light. It is imperative that the film be folded over to form a double thickness.

Referendum Ballot

The following referendum shall be voted on March 10:

Be it submitted for the consideration of the student body of Valdosta State College the following referendum which shall constitute the expression of opinion of said student body, and which shall direct the Student Activities Fee Budget Committee to act in accordance with said opinion.

Please indicate your preference from among the following by placing a check mark beside the option of your choice:

- I: That the present Student Activities Fee of \$12 be abolished and that there be instituted in its stead the following: a new Student Activities Fee of \$8, from which no funds shall be allotted to the Athletic Department; and a new Athletic Fee of \$4, which shall be designated for expenditure solely by the Athletic Department.
- II: That in no one annual Student Activities Fee Budget shall greater than one-third of the total of said budget be allotted for expenditure by the Athletic Department.
- III: That the Student Activities Fee Budget Committee shall allot no monies whatsoever for the granting of Athletic Scholarships.
- IV: That the present system for allotting monies for the granting of Athletic Scholarships be continued and maintained, until such time as other sources of revenues for such purpose can be found.

The results of this referendum shall be tabulated by the Secretary of the Student Government Association for presentation to the Student Activities Fee Budget Committee. Said results shall be binding upon the Student Activities Fee Budget Committee and shall be recognized as such by said committee in its deliberations on the question of Athletic Scholarships at Valdosta State College.

Trevor-Roper Lectures March 25, 26

Hugh Trevor-Roper, Regius Professor of Modern History at Oxford University,

will speak on "Hitler After 25 Years" in Whitehead Auditorium at 8 pm on March 25th. The following day he will give an informal talk on Sir Walter Scott at 10:15 am in the Little Theatre. Both meeting places are in the Fine Arts Building. The lectures are sponsored by the History and English Departments, in cooperation with the Ford Foundation's three-year Master's Program.

A first-ranking scholar, Trevor Roper has also had varied practical experience. During World War II he served as an intelligence officer and was commissioned by the British Government to establish the facts about Hitler's fate. One of his best known publications is "The Last Days of Hitler." "He has tremendous versatility in his range of subjects," said Dr. Gabard, professor of history at VSC. Other publications by Trevor-Roper include "Archbishop Laud," "The Rise of Christian Europe," "The Crisis of the Seventeenth Century" and "The Philby Affair."

He is also a frequent contributor of articles on literature, history, and current events to prestigious periodicals.

Born on the Scottish border in Northumberland, the speaker was educated at Charterhouse School and at Christ Church, Oxford, where he took first class degrees in Greek and Roman Literature and in Modern History.

Professor Trevor-Roper is a fellow of the British Academy and the China Academy and is an honorary foreign mem-

ber of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

An expert on Sir Walter Scott, the lecturer owns a house in Scotland which was built by Scott and is the house where Scott wrote his first novel, "The

Pirate."

"Professor Trevor-Roper is one of the outstanding lecturers and scholars of the 20th Century," according to Dr. Gabard. "He is able to make men and events of the past come alive for the average person, and is engaged in numerous provocative debates with fellow scholars on historical interpretations," he added.

REFERENDUM OFFERS FOUR ALTERNATIVES

A referendum concerning Athletic budgeting at VSC will be held Tuesday, March 10. Sponsored by the Student Government, referendum voting will take place in the Student Union from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The results of the referendum shall be tabulated by the Secretary of the SGA to be presented to the Student Activities Budget Committee. The results shall be binding on that committee in its deliberations on the question of Athletic Scholarships at VSC.

One of the alternatives on this refer-

endum proposes the maintenance of the status quo, that is, that the funds for athletic scholarships shall continue to be allotted from the Student Activities

Fee Budget, with no stipulations as to the amount of funds that may be so allotted by the Student Activities Fee Budget Committee.

A second alternative on this referendum suggests that the status quo be maintained with one quite major change: that the Student Activities Fee Budget Committee be permitted to

grant no more than one-third of the total of any annual Student Activities Fee Budget to the Athletic Department.

This alternative would maintain, on a percentage basis, the present level of apportionment; if, however, the Athletic Department desired to increase or expand their athletic scholarship program they would be forced to cut expenditures in other areas, or if they desired to increase their services, or if the cost of their operating expenses increased, they would be forced to cut expenditures for athletic scholarships.

A third alternative proffered is that the Student Activities Fee Budget Committee be permitted to allot no monies

whatsoever destined for athletic scholarships. This may either force the Athletic Department into raising the needed money for athletic scholarships in some other way, such as charging admission fees to students for athletic events, or it may force the elimination of the athletic scholarship program altogether.

The ramifications of this alternative are most serious, as not only are the various athletic teams, such as the bas-

ketball team, widely recognized for their excellence, but they also provide a solid base for a strong school spirit, the importance of which cannot be minimized.

The final alternative offered for the student's consideration would abolish the present \$12.00 Student Activities Fee and institute in its stead a new Student Activities Fee of \$8.00 and an Athletic Fee of \$4.00. At the present budgetary level, this would increase the budget of the Athletic Department by approximately \$5,700.

Although this proposal is similar in some respects to the second alternative, under this proposal the Athletic Department would have a concrete idea of just how much money is at their disposal. At present, they are forced to grant athletic scholarships without such knowledge; this is at best an awkward position.

On March 10, the students of Valdosta State College will be asked to indicate their preference from among the preceding alternatives. Their decision will be of great import, not only for themselves but also for future students.

Dr. Mustpub Bares Chest On English Dept. Budget

The recent controversy surrounding the Athletic Budget referendum has caused comment in many quarters.

One vocal member of the English Department has reacted vehemently. Dr. Phineas D. Mustpub was quoted as saying "If the students can question athletic funds they can question English Department funds. We could be in serious trouble. Already we have a shortage of uniforms for our English majors and many are complaining about the absence of an English Dept. Pep Band. If we had more funds we might be able to recruit up north. Who knows, we could sweep the GIAC poetry Contest in a few years."

Dr. Mustpub continued, "Our teams lack the stature of Georgia State or Emory, but we're scrappers. Right now we can hold our own in the Modern Novel and Eighteenth Century Dramas, but in Poetry we need more iambic in our pentameter and more funds could make it possible. We have one of the fastest potential novelist in the conference, but our coaching staff is shorthanded. If Valdosta State is ever to become a power in English Department competition we must have more funds because funds can create school spirit and school spirit can build this institution into a major power." Dr. Mustpub plans to oppose the reduction of Athletic Funds as a precautionary measure.

Howell Discusses March 10 Athletic Referendum

In the February 19 edition of the Campus Canopy, as President of the Student Government Association and as required by the Student Activity Budget Committee, I stated the four alternatives with which the students have been presented for a decision on the "athletic referendum." It was not the intention of the Budget Committee to motivate student opinion and neither has there been any such intention by the Student Senate. But, just because no one, except the coaches, openly expressed their opinion in the matter is no reason for students to act in an unjust and ignorant manner. As stated before, the reason for the Budget Committee to conduct a referendum was to merely determine student opinion. After all, it is your money. You pay it each quarter, and up until this year,

I am sure you wondered where it was spent and who spent it. Now, not only do you know how your activities fee is spent, (that is, if you took the time to review the budget in a previous edition of the Canopy), you have a chance to determine how the money is to be spent. Many of us came to VSC because of the school spirit generated by a good basketball team and were even further encouraged to come when we heard the academic standards were just as high. Not very often in the history of a college will you find a similar situation. There are many more students who would come to VSC if we offered a major in physical Education. This proposed new major will probably become a reality if the Board of Regents approve the allocation of funds for the new gymnasium (actually a physical education facility).

But just suppose the student body votes to abolish the payment of student activities fees to the Athletic Department to be used for scholarships. One of the immediate results will be the loss of any type of recruitment program for athletes, which destroys the potential and future of the basketball team. Without a good basketball team, the school will no longer need a new physical education facility, and without the new P.E. facility, the expansion of the P.E. Department to include a major in physical education is highly improbable.

As you can see, this is no small-time issue. Do you want to be the al-

umnus that would not even support its own school's athletic program. This is your chance to express yourself in a situation that has a direct bearing on the future of Valdosta State College. Discussions on this subject will be held in

the form of a "Forum" next Monday night at 8 pm in the Student Center. The next day, Tuesday, March 10, the polls will be open from 9 to 4 in the Student Center. Vote! Charlie Howell, SGA President

RECORD REVIEW

"Yes" (Atlantic SD 8243)
Yes, the name of the group and the album is one of England's latest exports. This is a fine group; their sound seems to be a mix of several of the most currently popular approaches, notably Crosby, Stills, and Nash (vocally) and Vanilla Fudge (instrumentally). Unlike the Fudge, they have developed a sense of style, taste, and subtlety, and even if a bit familiar-sounding, the record is pleasurable. Their version of the Byrd's "I See You" and the Beatles' "Every Little Thing" are especially nice.

The entire album is excellently done: brisk fuzzy leads, whirling bass, a bit of the Beatles vocally, a touch of Wes Montgomery in the guitar solos-a definitive album. The only trouble is that there are hosts of other bands, American and British, who are into the same bag with equal facility and taste. The excitement of true innovation is

missing-which may not be a valid criticism, since most rock is folk music anyway, but that's what makes albums like this one so much less arresting than many others.

"Let It Be," The Beatles (Apple)

Well, the boys have done it again. "Let It Be," their newest single, is a "can't miss." At first it strikes you as a cross between "Yesterday" and "Hey Jude," but closer listening proves it can stand on its own. This is one more feather in the Beatles' cap, who have shown consistently that they are not only genuine musicians, but uncomparable creators of music.

"Let It Be" is Paul McCartney at one of his best performances. Sometimes he gets a bit sweet or slick, but here all his musical guts come through.

George's guitar solo amplified through an organ heslie is simply, but aptly, beautiful. Watch this one move fast.

Dear Editor,

President Martin's discussion on February 2 with the students of VSC on the topic of the use, or abuse, of drugs opened a Pandora's box of questions and problems that must be answered and solved.

By the way of general observation, I would estimate that approximately 10% of the student body are "heads." This is a rather conservative estimate, and the actual number of those students who smoke, "grass" or hash, but who do not drop acid, represents a much larger percentage of the student body. The use of such drugs and hallucinogens on the VSC campus is perhaps far more widespread than President Martin realizes.

In the course of his discussion, President Martin indicated that it is the "pusher" about whom he is most concerned. Nobody is forced to buy drugs they do so only if they want to do so. If such immediate sources were eliminated, other sources would be found. Thus to identify the local "pushers" and take disciplinary action against them is no solution at all.

I would further suggest that college age persons know the difference between right and wrong, and that they have at least some knowledge of the advantages and disadvantages of drug use. Although there is much dispute even among scientists on the effects of drug use, maybe a reasoned and forthright program of drug education should be considered by President Martin.

The magnitude and importance of the questions raised, and the problems posed, by President Martin's discussion are not ones that may be quickly or

summarily answered. In the absence of any overt follow-up by the Administration, however, I would suggest that President Martin should give most serious consideration to this question of drug use on the VSC campus, for it is perhaps the most urgent problem with which he is faced.
