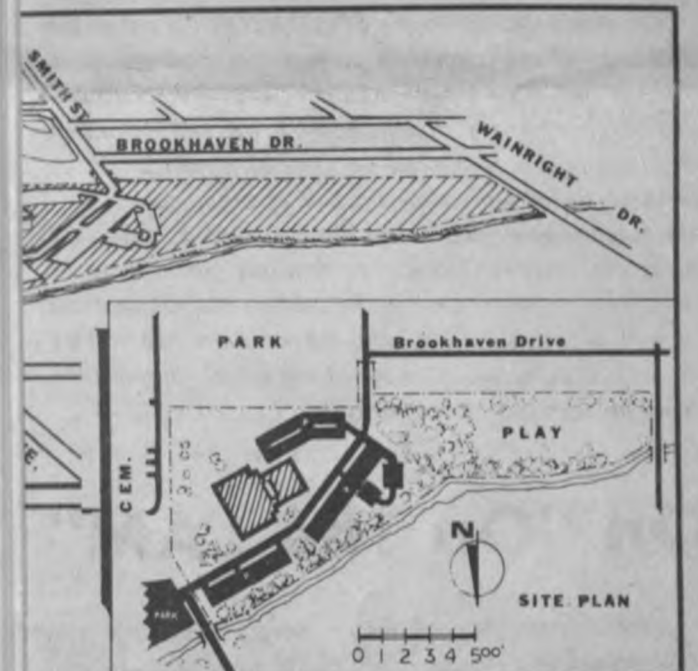
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Although the nation's leaders have indicated concern that the U.S. may lose a considerable amount of its oil imports from Arab countries because of our support of Israel in the current conflict, VSC students have indicated more concern for the moral crisis in the executive branch of government than for the oil shortage.

In this week's SPECTATOR opinion poll, nine VSC students and one professor were questioned as to their thoughts on the U.S. involvement in the Middle East conflict.

The response unanimously opposed direct U.S. engagement through the use of American troops in the war zone.

Dr. Berlin of the Physics and Astronomy department stated that the U.S. should not support Israel with troops.

Referring to the East Asia War, he further commented, "We should support Israel the way the Soviet Union supported North Vietnam. I'd like to see the Soviet Union get bogged down there as the U.S. did in Vietnam."

The consensus of students surveyed was that the U.S. should concentrate on her troubles at home. They cited such problems as the energy crisis, the lack of a Vice President, and Watergate as crucial issues that require immediate action.

Many of the students reflected that the U.S. had already wasted enough money on the Vietnam War. One student, Louie Del Castillo of Waycross, Ga. said, "We definitely should not get involved in the Middle East. We just got through with one war and we don't need another."

Up to this point President Nixon has kept U.S. involvement to a minimum, although he did issue an alert for a portion of the military to be prepared.

The U.S. also arranged for a meeting between Egyptian and Israeli army officers to implement the U.N. cease fire

and planned a convoy of non-military goods to Egypt's Third Army which is trapped east of Suez.

United Nations troops have moved in between the two

opposing armies, but at this moment these include no U.S. servicemen.

The VSC Ambulance, at presstime, is making no trips according to J. P. Hunnicut, chief of Security.

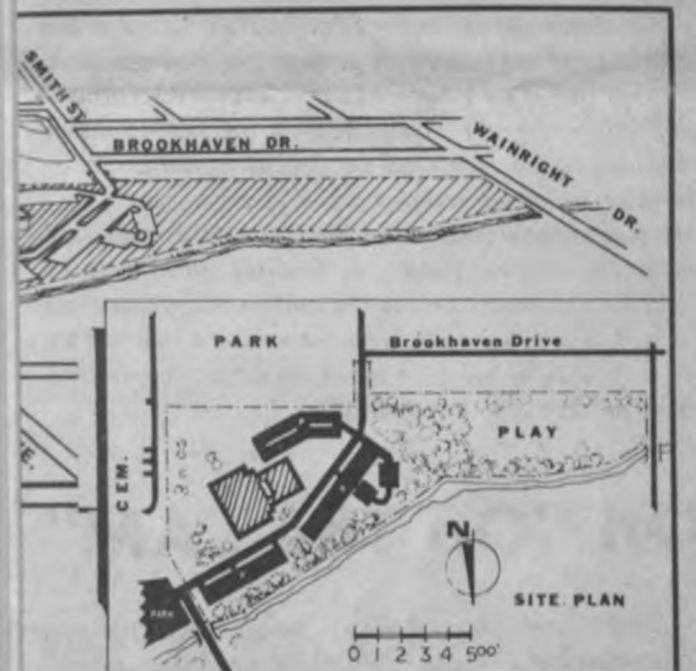

Mr. Brooks went on to say that there are about 30 other schools that are operating with the same type vehicle.

### Power to the SGA

With the condition of the U.S. government rapidly deteriorating, it seems appropriate to offer a few comments on the situation at hand with the student Government Association at Valdosta State.

In the past, the SGA has had the reputation of being a do-nothing organization. This reputation stems from the fact that the SGA really has very little actual governing power.

All bills from the Senate are referred directly to the Student Affairs Committee. This committee is headed by the Dean of Students and includes several faculty members and administrative heads.

Student Affairs either gives the bill a favorable response or turns it down. In most cases the bill dies in this committee.

If however, it should pass this stage, the bill advances to the specialized committee which handles the particular subject of the bill such as Food Services. Should it pass this committee, it moves on to either the Academic or Administrative Council to be voted upon by the members.

It is easy to see why not many Senate bills ever get acted upon by the administration. The system is too complex and has too many rungs on the ladder. Unfortunately, the SGA is always on the bottom.

Neil Joiner, a senior business major from Unadilla, Ga., is President of the SGA this year. He is an extremely dedicated leader who feels that the SGA has tremendous potential. As of yet, Joiner has not really developed that potential, if it ever existed.

Robert Pittman is Joiner's right hand man in the Vice President's slot. Pittman is more liberal minded than his superior but lacks the tact to carry out his ideas, some of which are worthy of merit. His chief concern is to preside over the Senate.

Bebe Berry and Sammy Middleton are the other top SGA officials. Miss Berry was elected Secretary last week in a special election after Jill Pendley resigned. She has had experience in the student government as a Senator from Georgia Hall. Middleton is the SGA Comptroller. He manages the SGA budget. Neither of these positions requires a great amount of effort, and both of these people are capable.

The SGA Book Exchange is the major accomplishment of the Joiner Administration to date. The Exchange was obtained only after a long hassle with the college administration over where it would be located, the cost of books, and how it would affect the college bookstore.

Another strongpoint of the SGA this quarter is that all Senators will now receive \$25 per quarter for their services. At the present time, no criteria has been set up for a minimum amount of time a Senator has to put in each week. This will have to be resolved in the future.

A joint Senate-Cabinet brainstorming session last week resulted in several possible ideas for bills. Hopefully the SGA will keep on plugging away with the limited power they do have.

Perhaps one day, the administration will see fit to give them some real power.

### A Message

Last week, I wrote an article concerning the legality of the campus ambulance service. The article was not originated by me, but by a concerned individual. This individual was concerned that one day a student was going to get hurt or die in the school ambulance. At this point, I began my investigation.

Since the publication of last week's SPECTATOR, I have been bombarded by complaints from members of the VSC administration. Gentlemen: the article I wrote was based on facts from the Georgia Code of Ambulance Regulations. I at no time was trying to hurt the college or the students. Any clear-minded individual that looks at the school ambulance knows that it is neither safe nor adequately equipped. First of all, the ambulance is dirty, and it also has no first aid equipment and no oxygen.

I have been accused of "screwing the students over." This was said because students now have to pay a \$25.00 fee for using an ambulance from the South Georgia Medical Center. Most students have insurance- this will pay for ambulance service. I think I have done the students a service. An ambulance from downtown can arrive faster than the school ambulance, and it can certainly do a more effective job.

Valdosta State College is a small college. I can easily realize that any amount of adverse publicity can do a small institution a great deal of damage. However, if a student were injured by the college ambulance service, serious legal repercussions could result.

You also mentioned that "Greyhound and Trailways bus lines and Southern Airways see continued service as in the past with no interruption of schedule; however, Sing Oil Company forces a one to two cent hike in the price of gas.

I would like to know why Amtrak, which serves this city with passenger train service, was not mentioned in your article as an alternate source for going home Christmas?

The service is dependable, and

a trip on a train is about the most relaxing way to travel these days.

I might also point out that "railroads in terms of pollution emissions enable them to move more with less fuel than most competing modes."

Also "A comparison of passenger fatalities to passenger miles from 1961 through 1970 shows train travel to have been twice as safe as air travel and bus travel and 23 times as safe as traveling by private automobile."

Train travel is generally cheaper than traveling by any of the above methods except possible bus travel.

I urge you to correct this error not only for the SPECTATOR but for America's Railroads who desperately need the business!

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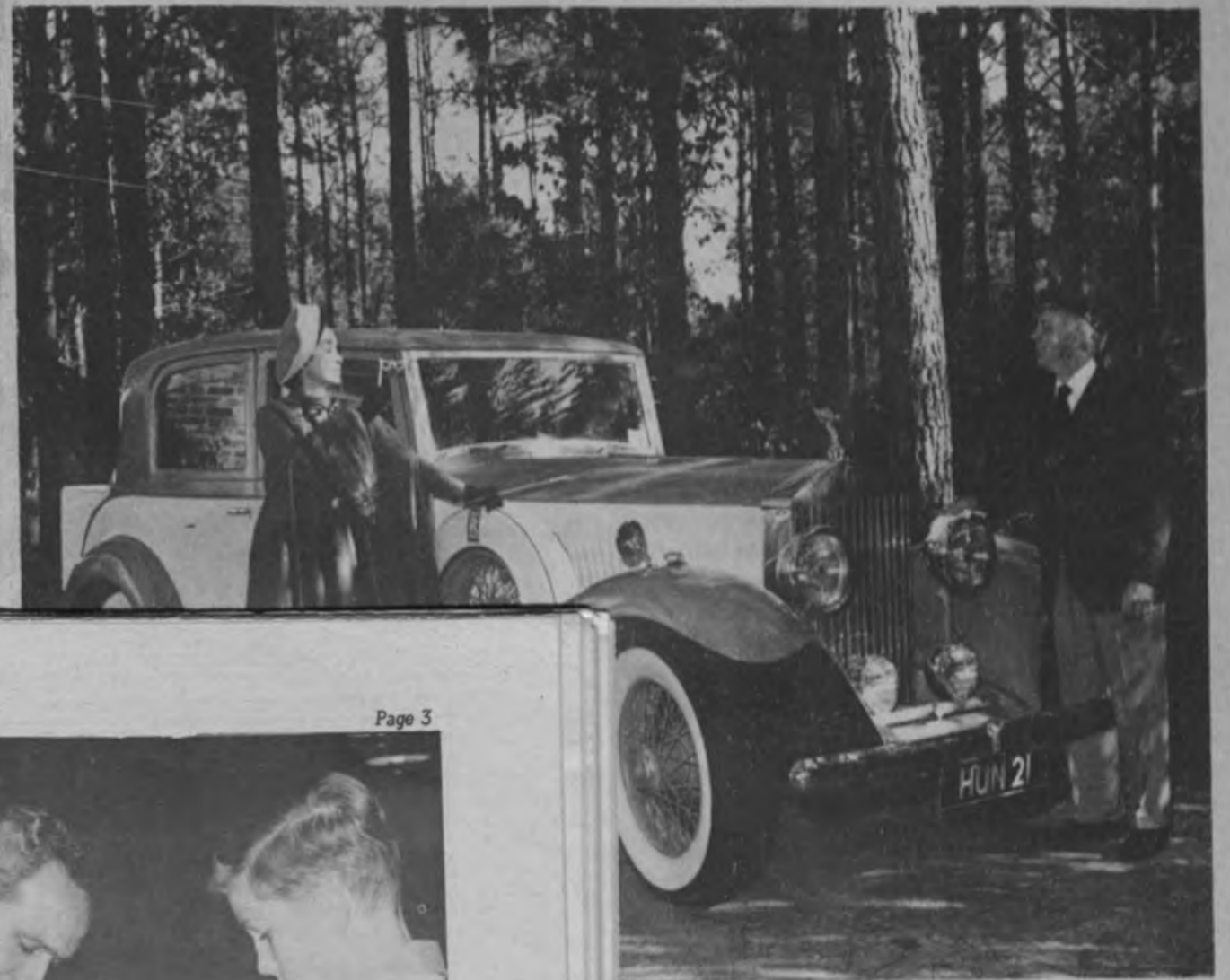
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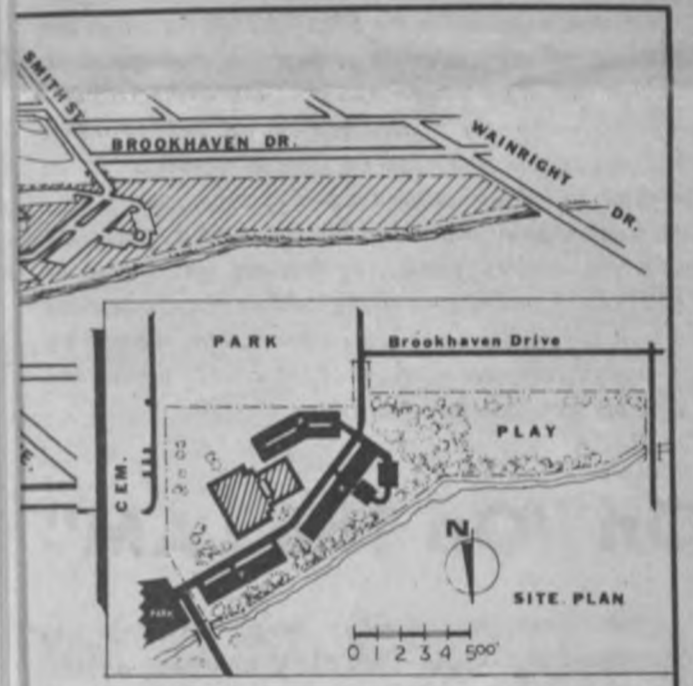

### How will the energy crisis affect Valdosta State College?

We hope no great amount of discomfort will be experienced this winter as a result of the energy crisis. If we have a severe winter we might have difficulty getting enough fuel, however, due to our somewhat low priority in fuel allocations.

We have a contract with a company to furnish oil to the College, and hope they will be able to supply our needs. Our central boiler plant operates on natural gas, but during extremely cold weather a switch-over to fuel oil is necessary.

As the heating season approaches, an attempt will be made to maintain a temperature of 72 degrees in our facilities.

Since last May, the College has taken definite steps to reduce our energy demands in cooperation with all state agencies.

### Has the issue of mandatory meal tickets on college campuses ever been tested in the courts?

Yes, this was done in 1971 at Louisiana Polytechnic Institute in the Pratz vs Louisiana Polytechnic Institute case. This decision has become a landmark decision since the final ruling was made by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans.

The Supreme Court gave approval to the decision in the case.

The court refused to hold unconstitutional resolutions of the Board, and college regulations pursuant to the Board's resolutions, which require students to live in dormitories while at Tech."

The legal advisor of the Board of Regents tells me this case has been used as an example, and is still pointed out to judges and lawyers when the issue comes up. It can be seen from the ruling that the individual college has the right to require students to "live and eat their meals in facilities provided by the institution."

Last school year there were at least nine people arrested in connection with drugs on the Valdosta State Campus.

This year the drugs are not a visible though possibly just as wide spread. Dean Bond, Dean of Students and the Chairman of VSC's Drug Abuse Committee commented,

"It does not seem to be an issue among the students at the present time."

"There have been no arrests so far this (school) year but I feel certain that there are drugs on campus."

A check with Jimmy Johnson, editor of the University of Georgia's newspaper, "The Red and Black," revealed the drug situation more prevalent but just as dormant an issue at Georgia.

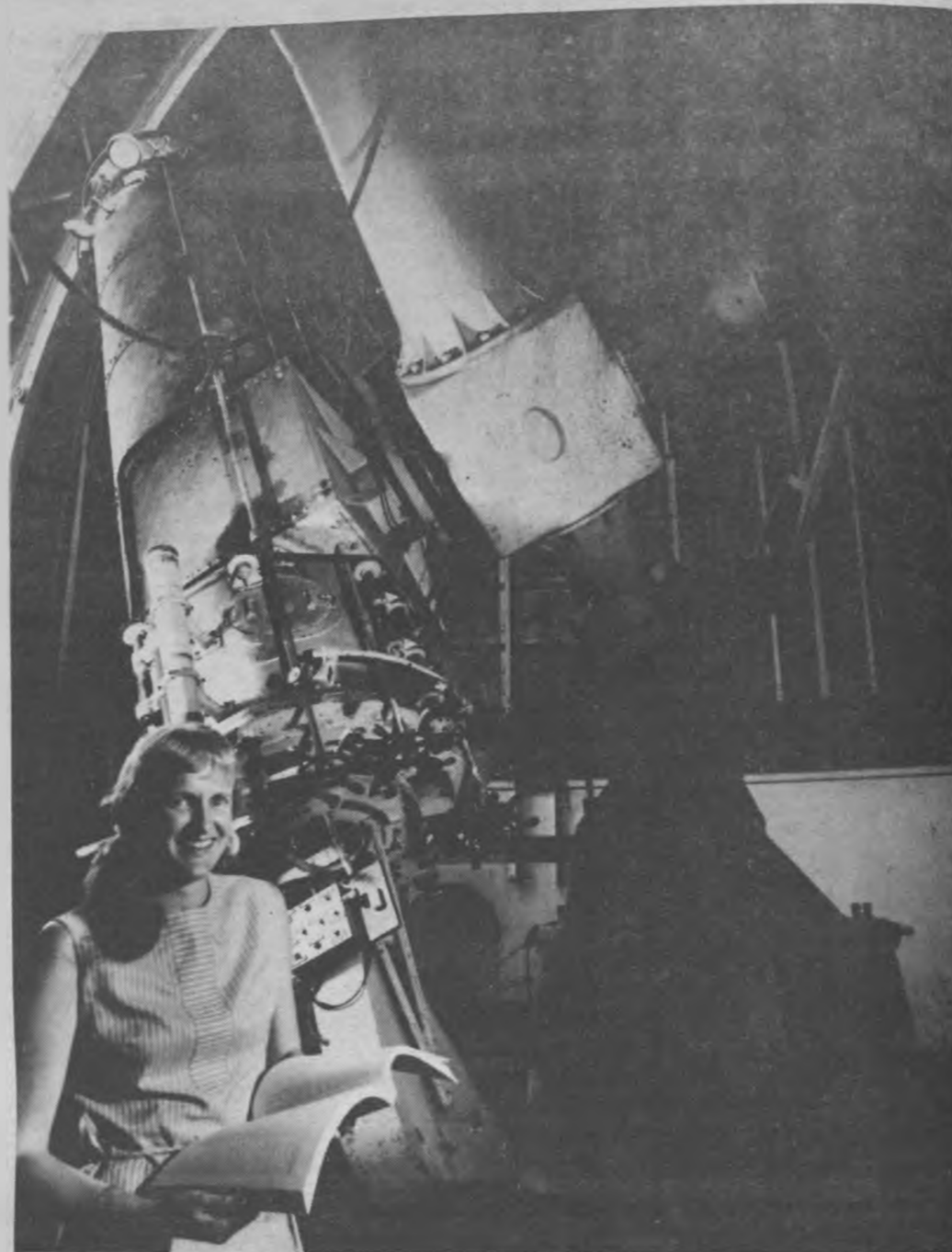
"Drugs are still in use here. There is a lot of stuff floating

around. I'd say drugs are very prevalent, but I don't think it is hard drugs. Well over half of the students have experimented with marijuana."

Awareness of the drug problem, if there is on at VSC, and at all other schools, has diminished because of Watergate and the tapes, the crisis in the Middle East and Southeast Asia, the energy crisis and food prices, the fall of Vice President Agnew and the definite loss of confidence in President Nixon.

Editor Johnson stated that parking tickets were more of an issue at the University of Georgia than drugs.

Dean Bond stated that counseling is available in the East Wing of Powell Annex for persons with a drug problem.

### Internationally Recognized Astronomer to Visit VSC

Dr. Anne Cowley, internationally recognized authority in stellar spectroscopy, is to be visiting lecturer to the department of Physics and Astronomy at Valdosta State College on November 5-6, according to Dr. Dennis Marks, director of the VSC planetarium and observatory.

Her VSC engagement is part of

the Program of Visiting Professors in Astronomy of the American Astronomical Society.

Dr. Cowley will give a lecture on "The Observational Evidence for Black Holes" at 3:30 p.m. on Monday, November 5.

Black holes are regions of space that have folded in on themselves, Dr. Marks explained.

"They are predicted by Einstein's theory of general

relativity and now we have the evidence that they really do exist."

The talk will be on a non-technical level and is open to the public, free of charge, Dr. Marks stressed.

At 11:15 a.m. on Tuesday, November 6, Dr. Cowley will give a technical colloquium on "Symbiotic Stars" for VSC physics and astronomy students and faculty.

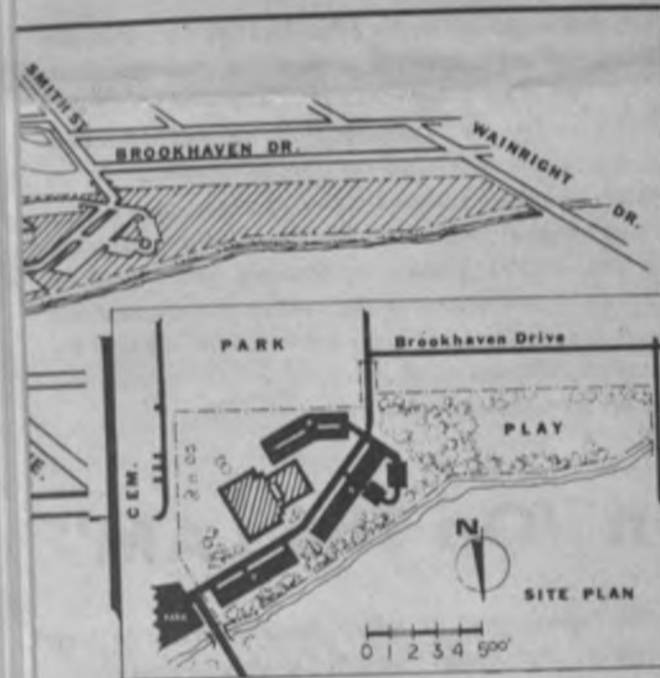

### Charley Trippi-All America

A little over a week ago the 1973-74 athletic year at Valdosta State began with a Blazer banquet.

The purpose of the banquet was not only to honor last year's many athletic achievements, but also to generate financial support and increase fan interest for the coming seasons. To do this, one of the biggest names in football history, Charley Trippi, was brought here as the guest speaker.

Although the banquet was a success with over 250 people in attendance, I feel many more students would have been present if they had known more about Trippi's illustrious career.

Charley Trippi knew nothing but honors during his career, and they began when he made All-State at Pittston (Pennsylvania) High School.

However, Trippi was considered too small to play college football by most schools. The University of Georgia finally agreed to take him, and both profitted immediately. Georgia and Trippi went to the Rose Bowl in 1942 and won.

This is still regarded by Trippi as his greatest thrill in football, despite all the awards, honors, and title games that have followed.

Then came three years in the Air Corps. When he returned to Georgia in the middle of the 1945 season, Trippi helped the team make a strong finish and was named the MVP in the College All Star Game.

The next year Trippi led Georgia to its first and only undefeated season and a Sugar Bowl victory. He was named All American this year.

After graduating from Georgia, Trippi batted .334 for the Atlanta Crackers baseball team. A choice between pro baseball and football had to be made, and Trippi chose football.

Trippi signed with the old Chicago Cardinals. He was the final addition to what has come to be known as the Cardinal's "dream backfield". They won the Western Division title and met the Philadelphia Eagles on icy Comiskey Park for the championship.

In the first period, Trippi broke a 44 yard touchdown and later scored again on a 75 yard punt return. He gained 206 yards on 14 carries to establish a title game high. His 102 yards on 2 punt returns set another record.

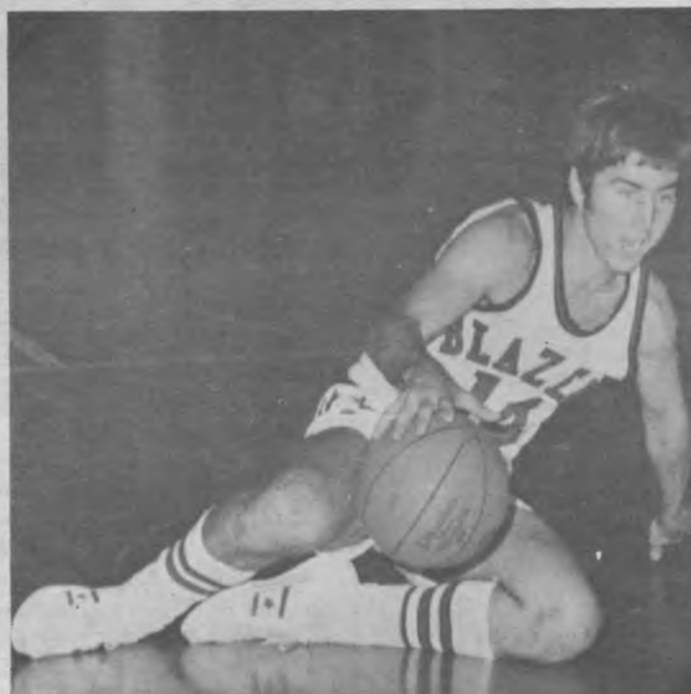
Charley Trippi could do it all-run, pass, kick, and receive. Jim Thorpe once called Trippi the finest player he had ever seen. Trippi played eight years of pro ball before an injury sidelined him permanently in 1955. In 1968 he was named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Speaking to Trippi before the banquet, it was evident he is still very interested in football and sports in general. He feels that today's players are not nearly as tough or dedicated as when he played.

He cited Bob Waterfird and Sammy Baugh as the best players in his era, and felt that no player today could match them in skill and dedication. He also said he feels fan popularity is at its peak now. However, he indicated he felt that further expansion in pro football would hurt both college and professional popularity.

Charley Trippi, All American, gave his listeners a glimpse into the past and an insight into today's sports scene.

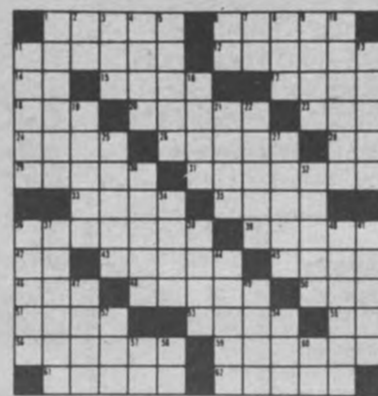
