Since this van is not an ambulance, any individual needing emergency assistance should call 244-4000 for an ambulance. If it is not an emergency, the security department will assist students and transfer to the Infirmary of the South Georgia Medical Center. The Security Mobile Number is 244-9891.

The SPECTATOR would like to remind students that an ambulance from the South Georgia Medical Center cost \$25.00, so don't call for one unless it is necessary.

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



Professor James G. Connell, Jr., of the Modern Foreign Language Department is one of the newest Ph. D.'s on campus and also one of the busiest since his recent appointment to the position of administrative assistant to the Vice-President.

His new duties include secretary to the Academic Council, providing liason with numerous committees, working on the modular schedule project, and working on grants and fellowships.

Connell is also involved in coordinating the college's efforts to achieve the University System's goals to provide greater participation in college life for minority groups.

"VSC has made great strides toward equal opportunity since our enrollment is about 10% black. We are actively working to increase the number of blacks on our faculty."

Connell's most time-consuming project to date has been the complete revision of the college catalogue for 1974- 1975.

"At present, bids for printing the new catalogue are being considered and if there is no paper shortage the new

State University in June 1973 with a Ph. D. in Slavic languages and literatures. There are about six Ph. D.'s in Russian in the state of Ga. and Connell is the only one born in

the U.S.A., not to mention Georgia. (At present Valdosta State is the only state-supported institution, outside the universities, which offers a Russian program.)

With respect to his dual role at the college, Connell said,"The essence of teaching is interacting

For example, a rule to protect the receiver prohibits bumping him past the line of scrimmage. I have seen receivers knocked down all year and when brought to officials's attention they have made such typical nonsensical replys as "we're not calling that rule."

Maybe such rules as this should not have been instituted. However, they were and when they are not called, players become rougher in other aspects of the game as oddicials lost control of the game. The large number of serious injuries this year point out this fact traaically.

WHAT IS ROLE OF INTRAMURAL BOARD?

The role of the Intramural Board has still not been determined. When this article was written a protest was being considered that concerned a game played in the season's opening weeks. The Board's ruling could determine the Fraternity league champ. It is tragic that a meeting was not held earlier for the ruling on this and other protests. It would definitely have affected the way the teams played their remaining games.

The Intramural Board was by-passed when new rules were instituted this year. Perhaps it will be decided that it is no longer the Board'ssplace tp decide on rules, but it remains clear that the Board does rule on protests.

It was unhealthy for this year's program that the Board was not formed earlier to rule on these protests and that a clear understanding of its powers was not decided.

NUMEROUS OTHER COMPLAINTS HAVE BEEN REGISTERED

There are other complaints much too numerous to mention here. A few of the more glaring cases range from fields that were unlined and in no shape to play on to a decision after the season had started, to count all games played on the league standings instead of only league games as decided and voted upon when the schedule was formed.

When this article was written, three teams had battled all of these problems and the rest of the teams in their league to remain in contention for the overall crown.



representatives met last week to discuss the rules and regulations of our winter quarter sport, basketball.


