

the May 22 edition of the Spectator will give a complete schedule.






Office, the course to be taken would simply be marked on thtally sheet. Then when a particular couse was filled, the advisor would be notified not to pre-register more students for the course.

I think the benefits of such a system sould be numerous: the advisor could have an overall picture of course availability, the Registrar would face a lot less problems on registration day thus allowing a speedier registration process, and the student (knowing pre-registration was on a first come first served basis) would be more apt to cooperate with the pre-registration process. I do not mean to assert that such a system could cure all the problems, but I think it could mimimize them

At least, taking into account the professor response I got, I know the advisors are not indifferent to a potential change for the better.

With all the response I got, bhowever, one thing was most evident in the professors' complaints.

I saddened me to see that the major complaint was not the fact that my proposal was somewhat faulty, but that they did not get paid as I said. I was misinformed concerning pay adjustment, that I will admit. But the remark "I would do a better job if I could get more money" was prominent in nearly every response. 

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

The protessors which, in all probability, studied during the McCarthy era, were the most reactionary, expressing their beliefs that I had been conned by some ultra-right wing organization. Some of them even went so far as to condemn me and insult my intelligence in their classrooms.

I suspected that the McCarthy era products would be the most reactionary: indeed, they were. The post-McCarthy students, however, were rather passive in their responses. They simply stated that the comment was obviously open to interpretation, and that they saw it basically as raising a question pertinent to the idea that the

I think an evaluation of these responses has definite conclusions. Those who studied in a time when McCarthy was out to "Stop the spread of communism'' responded in a reactionary manner. Apparently, they have never shaken completely the indoctrination and hard set attitudes which were so dominating during the '50's. That is not to say that they are still (or have been) anti-communist, but to say that they do not have it is confidence in the masses when it comes to seeing the absurdity in certain political or national governments.

The post-McCarthy students, on the other hand, expressed by their response a great deal of confidence in the public. The interpretation is still open to the reader, basically. But it seems that political trends which affected students in a particular era are not dormant--even with the vast changes since made.

So, does this say something about the future? I think so! The current student attitude of basic political unconcern is likely to carry into the future. The professors of tomorrow will no doubt be politically aware, but it seems quite unlikely that they will be politically concerned. I see this as a major step in the promotion of "worldism" rather than "nationalism". It seems ironic that the movement which may at last cause

political constructivism and progress is based in political indifference.
