## Election results show three run-offs

About a month ago qualifying for the SGA offices began, and anxious hardworking potential candidates began competing for the four offices. After long hard campaign trails were traveled. election day emerged on the campus of VSC.
As voters made their way to the polls located in the cafeteria and the lobby of the College Union Building, :he candidates waited with great anviety. All day long voters turned out much heavier than election officials expected.
Beginning shurtly after the closing of the pollis at $5 o^{\circ}$ clock, the election officials began counting and tallying results. The votes were counted by 7 people, Dean Shamin Sisson, Dr. Eugene Baloff. S(iA senators Rick Bracewell. George Strickland. Laura Walton. David Kendrick. and SGA President David Tucker.
Roughly around 8:30 p.m. election night the ballets had been tallied and the results were announced to the candidates and interested observers. A winner had to receive at least $51 \%$ of the vote, and the office of President was the only office decided. The rest of the offices will be decided in a run-off.

The candidates that were unsuccessful have 2 days to ask for a recount of the votes. If there is no demand for a recount then winners will remain winners and the run off voting will be scheduled shortly.
Also resulting from Tuesday's voting, VSC students voted to establish an annual with 688 yes votes ( $76.6 \%$ ) and 210 no votes $(23.3 \%)$. The referendum will take affect upon approval of the

State Board of Regents. Referendum \#2 was also successful with 586 yes vates ( $68.2 \%$ ) and 272 no votes ( $31.7 \%$ ). This referendum now makes it easier for candidates in the future wishing to qualify for elections to do so.

Election officials were very pleased with the voter turnout and are hoping for just as strong a turnout for run off elections and alsn elections in the future.

## Trip to Spain offered this summer

The modern foreign languages department at Valdosta State College is again offering a summer program of study in Spain. This year's enrollment limit has been raised to 200 as opposed to 120 of last year. Students who participate will spend 4 weeks at the Ciudad Universitaria in Madrid from July 10 to August 7. While there, they will be able to take courses in elementary, intermediate, and advanced Spanish.
"In addition to the Spanish courses," said Dr. Jose B. Fernandez, director of the program, "we are also offering for the first time courses in art at the Prado Museum, radio, television, and cinematography in English. For
the education student and teachers, there will be a course on contemporary education in Spain which will give them exposure to working with bilingual children." According to Fernandez, any student, including qualified high school seniors graduating in June 1980, who participates in the program will receive full college credit (up to 10 quarter hours) from Valdosta State College.
"The program package will include round-trip, trans-Atlantic plane fare from New York," said Fernandez, "transportation between Barjas International Airport and the Ciudad Universitaria upon arrival and departure, 4 weeks' room and board and
swimming pool priviledges, health insurance, and week-end excursions to Avila, Segovia, La Granja, El Escorial, Valle de los Caidos, and Toledo.
"In addition," continued Fernandez, "there will be an option for a Miami departure for those who prefer it over New York. We also have a 2-weet, cultural program for those who do not wish to spend a whole month in Spain. Persons interested should act promptly, because available spaces are limited."

This article is going to cover two very important subjects, one being the student goverment of this school and the other , the public hearing $I$ attended in Atlanta last week.
To give you a rough estimate of time, I would say about three weeks ago, I started a petition which was placed in the cafeteria for students to sign if they did not want to see the legal drinking age raised. It was also to get the students aware of what was going on in the state legislature. I got a good response to this petition over 700 students had signed in one day.
I also went to Perry McGuire, who is the Vice-President of SGA and asked him to bring up to the senators, a proposal to back me up with a statement when I went to Atlanta.At the meeting Perry brought up my request of endorsement, I was at this meeting along with mayor Gil Harbin of Valdosta who was called at the last minute to attend, and by the time I left that meeting I was literally shaking from anger and
disappoinment. None of the senators or officers could decide whether to write a small statement to send to legislators in Atlanta and the time anything was said about lending the SGA name to a cause, two-thirds of the senators had gotten up and left, which meant nothing could be done that night because there couldn't be a majority vote. Perry asked for a called meeting the next night, I attended that also, and barely any of the senators showed up.
Without the backing of our student goverment, I spoke on Monday, Jan. 28 at a public hearing in Atlanta. I took off from school for two and a half days, because I felt my rights as an adult were being threatened. I wanted everyone to know what was going on and I used my own personal money and time to try and show the students and young adults of Georgia how they are going to discriminated against if this bill passes. This is what I said to Mr. Thompson and the other 'fine' lawmakers of this state:

The young adults of Georgia have a certain lifestyle that this legislature made possible and the social drinking that 18,19 and 20 year olds do is a far cry from alcoholism.

Teenage abuse of alcohol is indeed a problem; however there is no evidence that the proposed temperance bill will do anything to eliminate the problem of alcoholism in teenagers.
There is no way to control 18,19 and 20 years olds from crossing the state line into Florida and South Carolina, where the minimal drinking age is 18 , and buying the alcohol there. And when young adults do start buying alcohol from other states, it will increase the number of intoxicated drivers on the road and put a large drain of revenue dollars from Georgia.
There are alternatives to this temperance bill, Georgia has the necessary laws to deal with alcohol abuse but the laws are not being enforced strictly enough.

 tallying a career point tota' of 1.418 . A'ston was 'abe "led as a $6^{\prime} 5^{\prime \prime}$ forward with tremendous scoring ability. Kenny is a'so a member of VSC's one-thousand point c'ub with 1,446 and an 18.8 average per game. Brown and Pierce are both member of the four digit cluh and are continuing to prove themselves as $B^{1}$./cr mainstays.
Among giving opposing coaches gray hair and migraines, Brown is in the process of rew riting the $\mathrm{B}^{1}$ azer record books and going dewn in VSC annual's as the best Blazer ever. One of the rezords Brown is hot on the trai of is Oxford's total point mark. 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In the President's annual state of the L'nion Address to the Congress and the nation. Carter made a proposal which sent Georgia Senator Sam Nunn into ecstasy. Carter's proposal was the reinstatement of draft registration. The general alarm bell has not rung. . .yet. I remind you that it is only a registration. not an actual draft. However, I will admit registering for military service is more serious than registering for the MacDonaldland sweepstakes. A matter of this magnitude should be approached seriously and objectively.
Before the government reinstates draft registration, we should ask why do we need draft registration. The two most obvious answers are Iran and Afghanistan. The instability in the Middle East, Soviet aggression and the Carter Doctrine have caused the State Department to think America is in need of a draft registration. In order to maintain our influential position, as the savior of democracy in the world, we need to be equipped with a large, standing military force. President Carter can use military registration as a political tool in his foreign policy decisions to force Iran to release the American hostages, and to send the Russian Army back home for the winter. We, as Americans, can show the world our determination to stand and fight for our principles-the pursuit of life, liberty and not to wait in gas lines. The military can absorb our unemployment, and as a nation, we would be totally efficient and superior. Back
stage the military Generals would admit finally, that they have something to do, and maybe decorate their uniforms with a few more medals. What good is a general without a war?
On the other hand of the draft registration issue is the eventual confrontation with the Soviet Union. Registration is the first big step down the road to military draft, and as the military increases. And will a large army (or draft registration) deter Soviet aggression? The Chinese have an enormous army; however the Soviet army is sightseeing in downtown Kabul. Before the registration begins, we must come to a conclusion on the problem of forfeiting our life for Middle Eastern Oil. I do not condone the Soviet intervention into Afghanistan and I would not condone America going to war over a country that most Amercans could not even locate on a world map. Carter calls his increased military budget defense spending, when we are trying to defend a country on the other side of the world I call it military spending. I though an increase in sophisticated weapons, then would decrease the need of a large military force.
I personally am in favor of alternative measures. In the light of modern science, I would prefer growing our army in test tubes. If we needed to increase our army, then we would just increase the production of test tube soldiers. (Brave New World here we come). We could clone everyone eligible for the draft, then we could send our clones to
serve our military duty. In the short run, we could teach chimpanzees to serve in the military. We teach them everything else. But that probably would get the Humane Society after the Pentagon. We could use blanks in our rifles and play army maneuvers. The military Generals would have something to do planning their strategy and the soldiers would have fun knowing that it was all a game. Instead of drafting young men and women why not draft the old and unproductive in our society. They lived their lives, and it would take a burden off the Social Security Administration. I know there are better alternative to the Registration and the draft. They start with electing competent leadership. In reality our country may need the registration, but we must be able to trust in them our lives, that they will not run around blind in the name of democracy fighting cost-
ly wars and Soviet aggression. There is nothing wrong with the young generation's patriotism, when a genuine cause for war
rises so will the soldiers. We do not need another Vietnam Canada is nice in the spring

attend ROTC classes 4 hours a week during their junior and senior years. The Air Force pays all POC cadets $\$ 100$ a month tax-free allowance to help defray college expenses. Upon graduation they are commissioned as 2nd Lieutenants in the United States Air Force with a starting salary of $\$ 12,000-\$ 13,000$ a year, plus 30 days vacation with pay, free medical and dental benefits and numerous other fringe benefits. Normally, pilot and navigator quotas are reserved for four year cadets. However, there is a possibility that some exceptionally, well-qualified sophomores without previous ROTC experience might be eligible for a navigator or pilot space.
Sophomores majoring in Math, Chemistry, Physics, Astronomy or Nursing should check with Air Force ROTC concerning the possibility of a 2 year ROTC scholarship. Students in these majors who have at least a 2.5 cum GPA are very competitive for scholarships which pay for tuition and books. Additionally, sophomores in any major who will complete 10 hours of Calculus by the end of their junior year may also qualify for a scholarship.
