Everett withdraws

35 Attend SGA Forum

In the wake of Monday night's SGA Candidate Forum, Presidential hopeful Mitch Everett has dropped out of the race for the next Student Government President, leaving John Robbins (alias Mr. Pythagoras) and Bobby Shannon to do battle on the grounds of Valdosta State College.

Everett left the race Tuesday morning after facing a somewhat forceful query by the 35 member audience.

During the one hour and forty-five minute forum, Everett spent time emphasizing a conservative approach by the SGA in dealing with college administration. Everett also stressed that there were no major problems involving VSC's student government.

When contacted by the *Spectator*, Mr. Everett said he had been thinking about dropping out of the race for a long time.

"Last night put the icing on the cake," said Everett.

In a straw vote taken on Tuesday by the *Spectator*, Bobby Shannon was leading with 18 votes to John Robbins' 14 votes out of a total of 50 students polled.

In the Vice-Presidential slot, Carol Carswell had 12 votes to Robert Yost's 5 votes and Warren Royal's 2 votes.

For SGA Comptroller, Ruth Johnson and Graylon Brown are running neck to neck.

Both candidates had 11 votes each.

In one incident during the forum, Everett questioned the seriousness of Mr. Pythagoras's running in the

race. When pressured by questions from the audience, Robbins stated that the reason for wearing his mask and robe and punning as Mr. Pythagoras was not a joke, but as a means to gain the interest of an apathetic student population.

Shannon stressed that his experience as SGA Comptroller gave him the insight into the inner workings of the SGA.

"My three years of experience in working directly with the SGA will give me the ability to work by the student constitution in cooperation with the VSC administration," said Shannon.

Mr. Pythagoras hinted towards a more radical approach in dealing with the student government.

"Although I haven't dealt directly with the SGA in the



past," said Robbins, "It is my belief that changes can be made in such areas as traffic regulations, food services, and academics. A survey of the 'real' problems at Valdosta State College will be taken in the event that I am elected," Robbins said.

Mr. Everett came out with a conservative approach to campus issues. He emphasized that the SGA is a good organization and that his experience as an escort to a former Miss America would benefit his abilities as a leader.

Vice-Presidential candidate Carol Carswell said she hasn't had the experience as an SGA member but stressed that her past duties as treasurer and president of a music fraternity, have pro-

vided her with a working knowledge of student leadership.

"As Vice-President of the SGA, I would preside over the senate and hopefully, with some new ideas, help prevent some of the apathy that has been blamed on the student government," Carswell said.

Warren Royal, a veteran student senator and candidate for Vice-President, stated that he has worked with WVVS, the VSC yearbook, and organizations funded by the SGA. He stressed that his ability to see things from both sides will insure his goal to establish a good relationship with the administration and the media

SGA Presidential Candidates

JOHN ROBBINS (Mr. Pythagoras)

Having served in neither the Senate nor held any other student government position, it may look as though I, John Robbins/Mr. Pythagoras, am not fully qualified for the office of SGA President. Furthermore, there are factions among the student body who question the seriousness of my candidacy. Therefore, I would like to take this time, first, to clear up any doubts about my campaign and then to state an overview of where I think the SGA should be heading.

I realize that the appearance and style of campaigning of Mr. Pythagoras are somewhat unconventional. But before anyone can appreciate Mr. Pythagoras, one must first understand what he stands for. Mr. Pythagoras is a partnership of ideas. Ideas that on the surface seem off the wall are usually founded on very serious grounds. Mr. Pythagoras is more than John Robbins and Alan Bernstein, it represents an element of college life that is lacking not only at the VSC campus but also at many other college campuses around the country. We seem to have lost our perspective that we are the future leaders of the world, hence, apathy has spread to every corner of college life. We have lost our sensitivity to the issues concerning us, as students, both on the local and national levels.

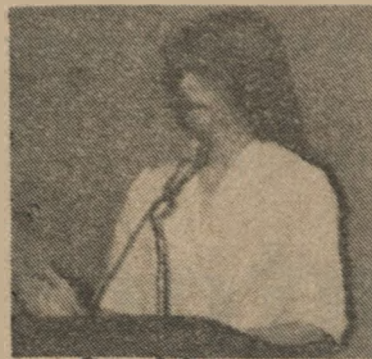

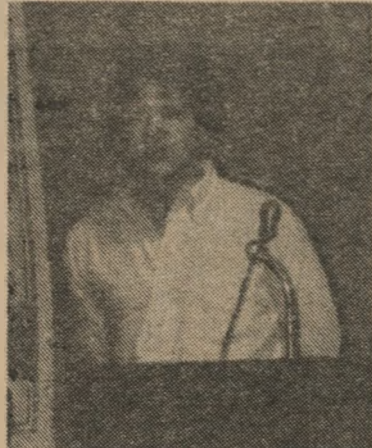
Three Main Problems SGA Should Focus on Next Year:

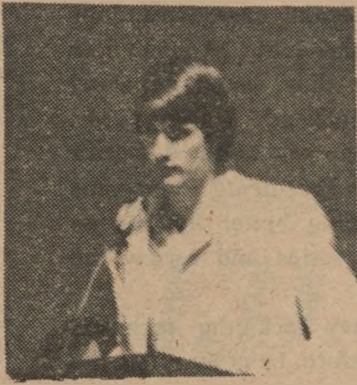
Reasons for running: I am running for Comptroller for several reasons. One of these reasons is that I want to be more involved with the Student Government Association.

Another problem is that the Senate is not getting a lot of the information that it is supposed to have. The

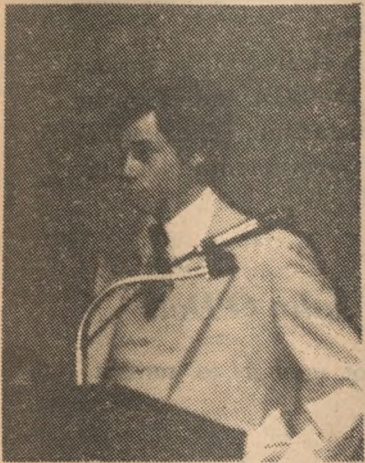
comptroller is supposed to give the Senate a monthly report on the budget. This has not been done.

The good, the bad, the indifferent

Despite the typical low turnout at the SGA Candidate Forum Monday night, enough was said by each candidate to indicate to us who might have the ability to bring some leadership and initiative back into the Student Government.

During the one hour and forty-five minute forum, the candidates spent much of their time covering the problem of student apathy and what they would do to reverse the trend if elected.

Beginning at the top, Presidential candidates John Robbins (alias Mr. Pythagoras) and Bobby Shannon both presented their views on how they would go about eliminating student apathy once elected. However, Mr. Pythagoras was the only candidate who outlined specific programs he would implement as President. Pythagoras mentioned goals such as installing better lighting on campus, re-initiating a lecture series and review the current parking procedures.

Although Mr. Pythagoras may lack the technical knowledge of parliamentary procedure, he at least has the energy and willingness to seek change in the present SGA. In the three years with the Student Government, Shannon did little to benefit the student body. It seems unlikely that he would be any more effective if elected.

The other candidate for president, Mitch Everett, must have realized the absurdity of his claim that there were no major issues on campus. Everett dropped out of the race Tuesday morning. It appears likely that someone put Everett up to running, knowing full well that he would fail to win--and then encourage him to support Bobby Shannon.

For the Vice-President post, Warren Royal projected the image of a candidate who won't play favorites if he's elected. Royal said he'd be a good man for the job of

Vice-President, having served on the Communications Board. We tend to believe him.

Carol Carswell, although her intentions are good, seems to lack the basic knowledge needed to run the senate. Miss Carswell would probably make a pretty good Vice-President but demonstrated to us that she is counting on her sincerity rather than her know-how.

As far as Robert Yost is concerned, we feel that he would spend more time trying to put a muzzle on the media than he would on their issues. Therefore, we doubt that Yost would be an effective Vice-President.

For the position of SGA Comptroller, Graylon Brown definitely held the power of persuasion Monday night. Brown seemed cool and confident and explained his intent very clearly. However, Brown convinced us that he would not be the best choice for Comptroller because of his opinion that the intramural program should receive more student activity fee consideration. Presently, the VSC Athletic Department is allocated approximately 50 percent of student activity fees.

Ruth Johnson, on the other hand, presented a stronger argument and provided a fresher alternative to the position of Comptroller. If elected, we feel that Johnson will not be easily swayed by various organizations vying for her support.

Willie Thomas appears to be a good choice for SGA Secretary, considering that he's the only candidate running for the office. Thomas has proposed some interesting ideas concerning the restructuring of the filing system now being used by the SGA.

We would hope that whomever is elected to the various posts will initiate change within the SGA and eliminate apathy as a major concern at Valdosta State. The time has finally come for a strong Student Government to lead the students of this college.

VSC students have already cast a vote of sorts in the coming SGA Executive election.

In spite of every effort by SGA Election Director, Kaye Edgar, and the campus media to promote Monday night's Candidate Forum, attendance was pathetic.

Discounting friends and supporters of the candidates, several SGA Senators and the news media, there were about ten interested students present at the forum. Of these ten, four were international students.

The President and Vice-President of the SGA did not attend, along with the majority of SGA Senators.

There were no representatives from the VSC Administration, and the only faculty member present was the moderator, Dr. Richard Saeger.

Everyone seemed to agree that apathy was a problem, and several candidates even had specific suggestions about how to address the problem.

These specific suggestions took the same form--that the SGA should make use of the campus media to keep students informed of their activities.

The low attendance at the SGA Forum, however, clearly

shows that media attention is not enough to combat apathy.

For example:

Earlier this month, the Freshman Council at the University of Georgia held a forum to enable members of the class to voice complaints, ideas and opinions.

Four hundred and fifty Freshman chose to forego the more exotic diversions available in Athens on a Friday night, and attend the event.

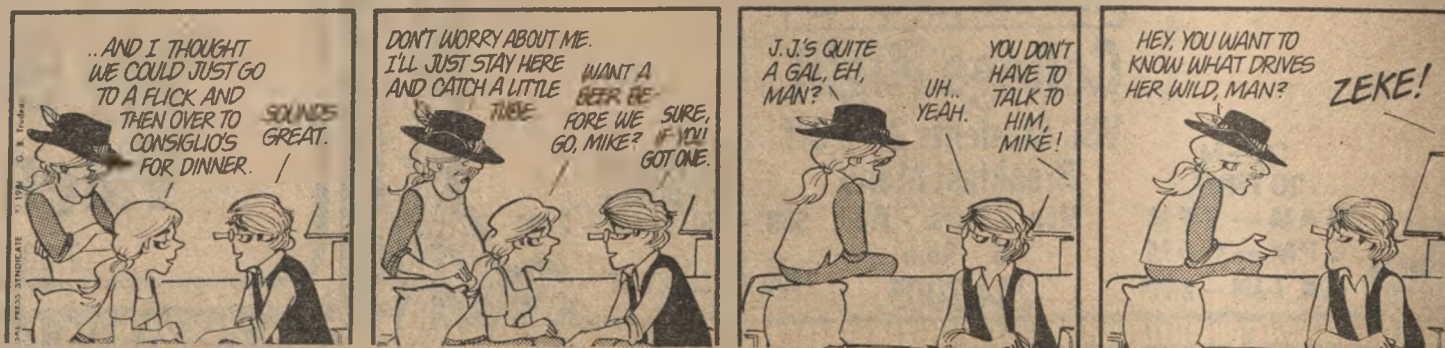
Ten Freshman had attended the previous Forum.

Both events had been well planned and extensively advertised in the campus media.

The 4,400 per cent increase in Freshman participation was attributed to the efforts of the Council members, who had gone from dorm-room to dorm-room and solicited the support of their constituents.

The results of their efforts dramatically illustrate one truism which might help the SGA here at VSC - "Actions speak louder than words."

If the SGA is truly concerned about student apathy, then perhaps with new leadership they can at least equal the accomplishments of the UGA Freshman Council.

Robert Yost, a third Vice-Presidential candidate has served on the student senate and several budget related committees on campus. He would propose, if elected, to lower the number of meetings of the Student Government per quarter.

Candidates for SGA Comptroller were Ruth Johnson and Graylon Brown.

Johnson has had no previous experience in dealing with the SGA but feels that because she is a freshman, she will be around to answer for any of her decisions while serving.

Brown has served as an R.A. in dormitory facilities for several years and has worked in retail sales and the health field. At the forum, he stated that one of his objectives, if elected, would be to try and get the student body to believe in student government and to cut down on apathy.

Willie Thomas presented himself at the forum as the only candidate for SGA Secretary.

"I'm just glad that there's no one running against me," Thomas said.

address itself to in the coming year. The problems are student apathy and campus publicity.

The first problem the SGA should address is the apathy of the students at VSC. The students have not been involved in the voting process of SGA representatives in the past. I feel the SGA can solve this problem by offering the students incentives to vote. Examples -

Everyone who votes will receive a free hamburger, or everyone who votes will be eligible to win a free steak dinner in a drawing. I feel that having to offer incentives

to vote in America is bad, but it is an idea which has worked on other college campuses. It could possibly work on our campus. We could also offer incentives at other SGA activities such as special guest performances and concerts.

The second problem is the amount of publicity given elections and other student activities on campus. The elections this year are receiving great publicity, but

elections received little publicity in the past. Few people knew of the Senate elections last year and this was evident by the final vote count. For students to become active in student elections and activities they must be aware of them. Through publicity we will see students

become more active. If I am elected Vice-President, one

of my major concerns will be the publicity of student activities.

So, remember me when you cast your vote Thursday,

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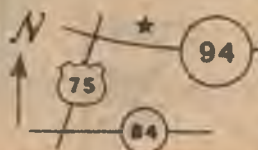
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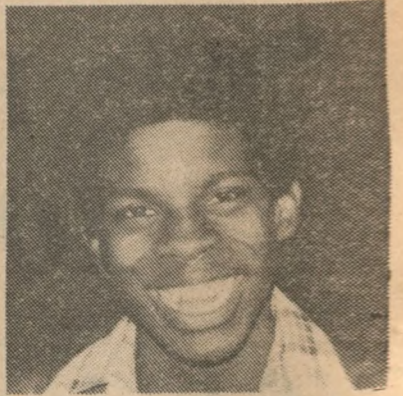

Mr. Pythagoras is used to counter student apathy and to make them aware that the SGA has become stagnant to the real needs of the students, however, he seems to be drowning in a sea of similarity. Therefore, I am running my campaign under the robe of Mr. Pythagoras because I believe that an academic institution can only benefit and flourish from somewhat controversial ideas.

I am pursuing a double major in Political Science and Philosophy while at the same time a member of the Philosophy Club, Chairman of the Political Science Club and a member of the VSC Debate Forum.
