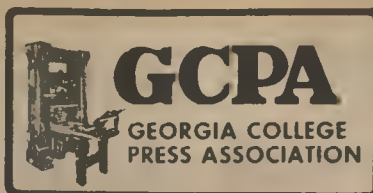

Linger Is Dean Of New School of Arts

When Dr. Bernard L. Linger came to Valdosta State College in 1979 as Director of the Division of Fine Arts, he expressed the hope that it would become the School of the Arts within five years.

It's less than three years later and it's been done. It's the only School of the Arts in Georgia and Linger is now Dean instead of Director.

He's delighted. He's proud. And he gives credit where credit is due.

"The action taken by the Board of Regents to make this a School of the Arts is the result of hard work on the part of many people," he said.

"It is through the leadership and guidance of Dr. (Hugh C.) Bailey that this had been accomplished. He's been a tremendous help to us. Others in the department have been working toward this goal for a long time, long before I came on the campus."

President Bailey is enthusiastic about the change in the academic structure. "This has been one of our major goals," he said, "and we are very pleased to achieve it. We are quite proud of our facilities- we have a fine physical plant, one of the best

in the University System. We have a very capable faculty and many eager students. The departments of Art, Music, and Communication Arts have produced so effectively they have earned the right to be designated as the School of Arts."

Student enrollment in the School of the Arts is growing, according to Linger. In 1976 four percent of the students were majoring in one of the arts but by 1981 the figure had increased to nine percent.

"We expect significant growth in the future," the new dean said. "As of last summer we now have a master's program in music education and we have developed an Associate of Arts Degree in Graphic Design. We have new facilities in radio-television with a color studio, our new jazz studies are very popular and our public relations program is growing rapidly."

"The physical plant is considered by many to be one of the best designed in the state. Sawyer Theatre is a good example; it is a professional theatre. Our building for the School of the Arts plays a major role in the Governor's Honors Program

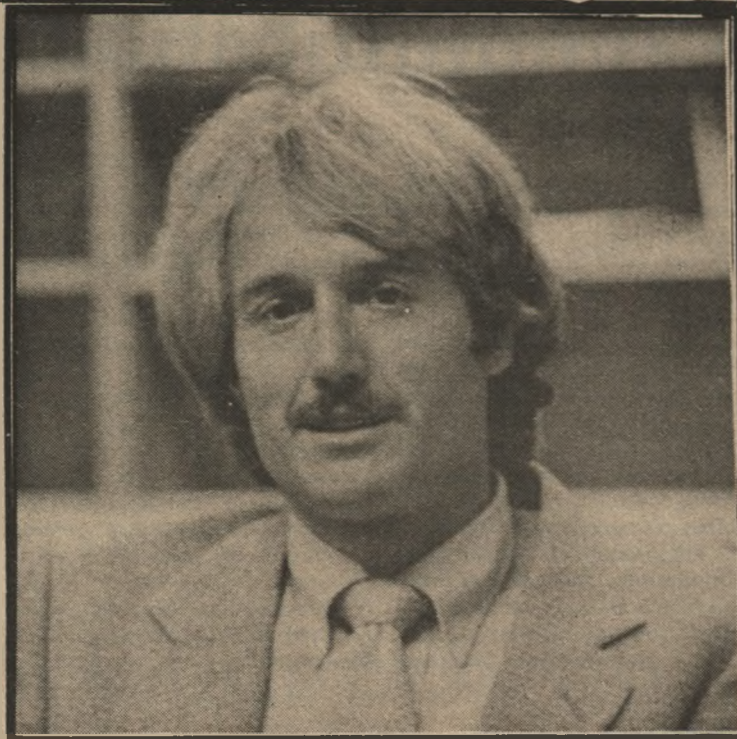
held on our campus each summer."

The VSC involvement with the arts stretches from the Alabama border to the Atlantic, he said. Art faculty members have shows and exhibitions in most cities of north Florida and south Georgia and beyond. The music faculty and students perform for many functions in various places including the Mayport Jazz Festival, civic clubs, churches and for schools and other colleges. The art gallery is the only bona fide gallery in the area and is available to schools for viewing throughout the year.

"Internationally known artists such as Baclev Nelhybel, Robert Starrer, Richard Rodney Bennett, Willy Thomas and Konrad Wolf have been attracted to our stage. We are also involved with community service, such as the recent Roberta Peters concert in conjunction with the Lowndes-Valdosta Art Commission and clinics for voice, piano and clarinet, etc.," he continued.

"We also host a number of state associations. Recently we've had the Georgia Music Teachers Association, the

Barnette Is Acting Vice President

Dr. Ron Barnette of Valdosta State College has been named acting vice president, following the resignation of the current vice president.

Barnette, the current head of the philosophy department at the college, has accepted the temporary position following the resignation of Dr. Ray Cleere, who has accepted a job as vice chancellor for academic affairs with the university system Board of Regents.

According to Dr. Hugh Bailey, President of VSC who announced Barnette's ap-

pointment, the responsibilities of the acting vice president will include being the chief academic officer at the college and overseeing the instructional programs.

Bailey reiterated the fact that Barnette's appointment as acting vice president is temporary, and that a search to replace Cleere permanently is to begin soon.

Barnette has indicated that he does not wish to be a candidate for the job.

A committee of about 15 members will be selected to interview prospective candidates for the position.

television, radio, film, theatre, public relations, organizational communication, rhetoric and P.A., and Speech Education."

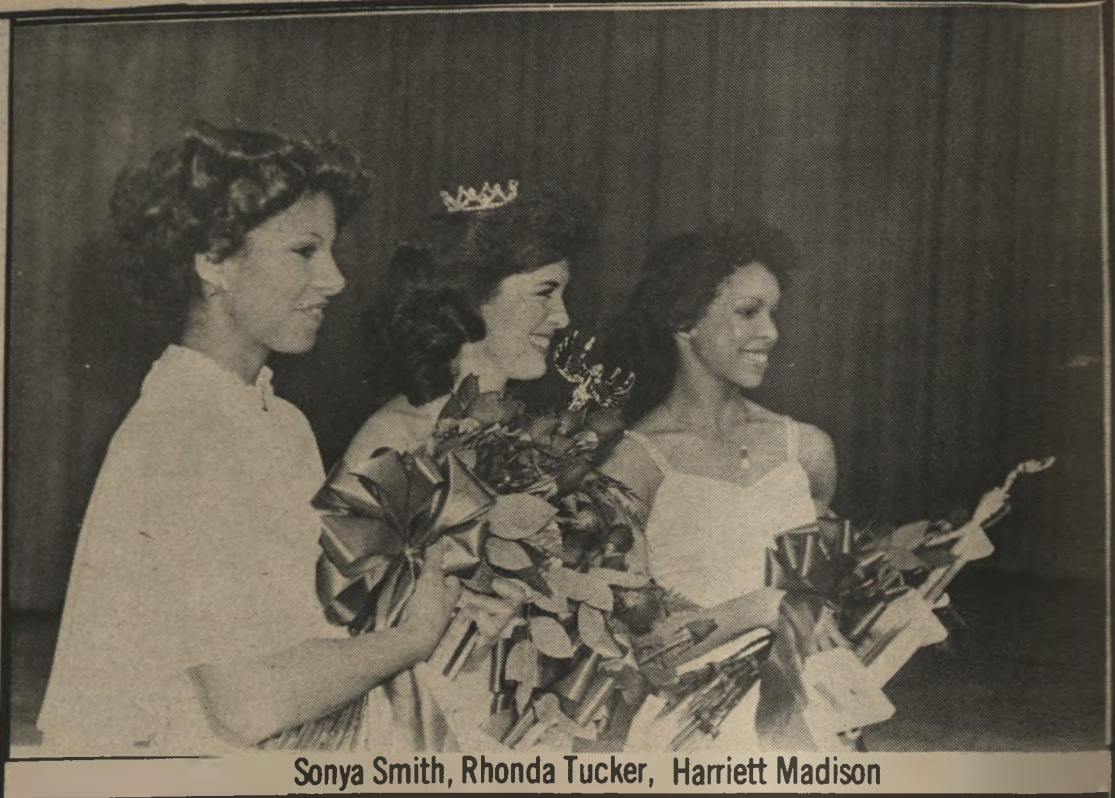

Chancellor's Office Assessment Could Delay Decision on University Status

Valdosta State College is presently seeking to change its status from college to university.

President Bailey, in updating the progress of this move, explained that the first step of applying for university status is well under way. Reports have been received from the six schools within VSC and are being compiled and edited at present. Those compiling the reports will be checking back with the school's executive

committees along the way to clarify the reports.

Bailey pointed out that the reports should be compiled and ready to be sent to the Chancellor's office in Atlanta by the end of February. A committee will study the proposal and may likely decide that a visit to the campus is in order.

Providing that the original timetable is followed, Bailey stated that the committee will report to the school in June to inform them whether the analysis will continue. If the

report in June is favorable, another committee, including Regents, will review the proposal and report a final decision in December.

"The original dates may be advanced, however," stated Bailey. "The staff of the Chancellor's office is presently conducting a statewide assessment of higher education needs ordered by the Board of Regents. This is to be completed by December, so our timetable may be changed." "We may not know until 1983," Bailey concluded.

The Georgia Elks Association has started a toll-free statewide secret witness number (1-800-282-3096) for Georgia to help stop illegal drug activities. The number is set up to a tape recorder; the caller remains anonymous. The recordings are given to the Georgia Bureau of Investigation, who in turn release only the information and not the tapes to local authorities.

The purpose of the number is to aid in the stopping of the drug traffic in Georgia. The effort is aimed at those who peddle drugs and not so much the users.

The Elks began this number in May 1981, and by December of that year 907 calls had been received. The Georgia Elks Association is funding the number and the advertise-

ment. The Elks have distributed posters in schools throughout the state.

El Salvador chose to call this a military action against anti-government forces.

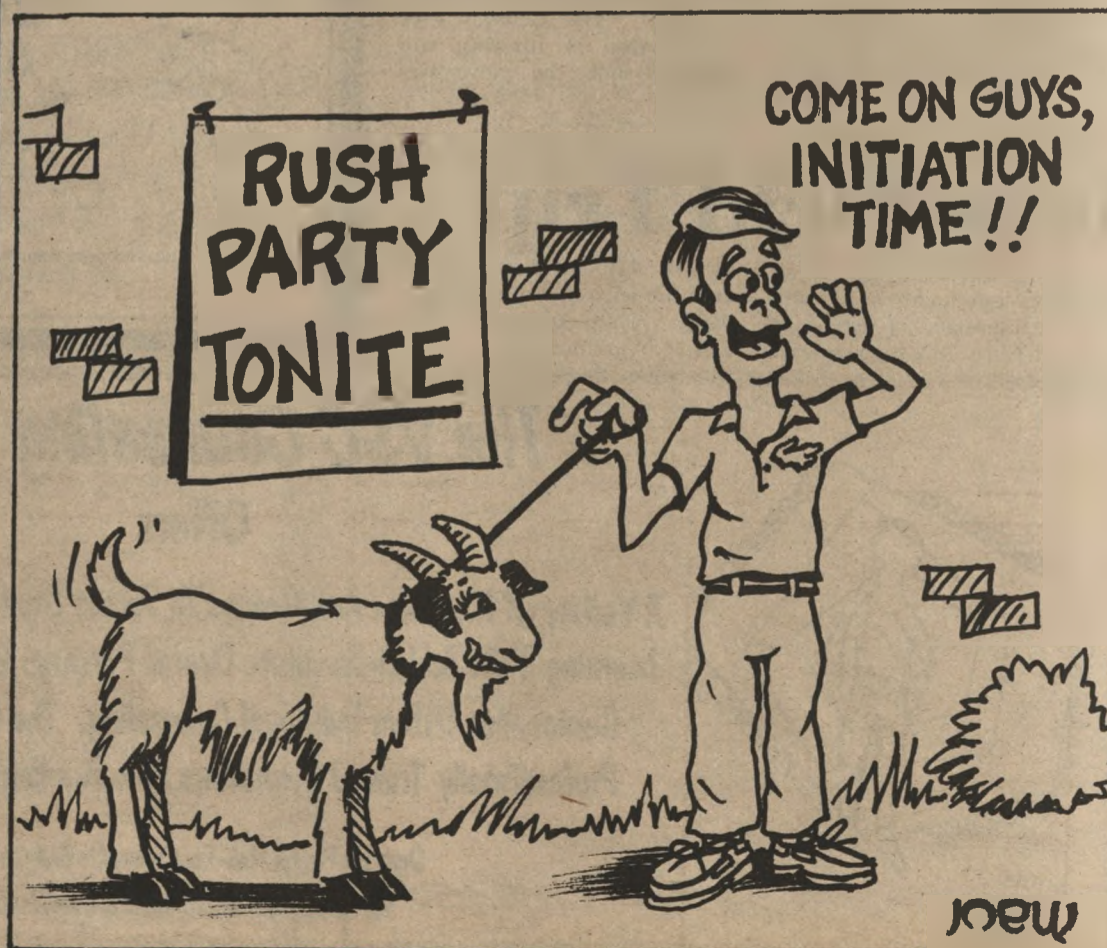
Rape is not political. It is a bestial act as terrible as the killings by the anti-government guerrillas. An army

VSC splits games with Troy

Lady Blazers defeat Lady Trojans 76-63

The VSC Lady Blazers outlasted the Lady Trojans in the Troy gymnasium on Wednesday night, handing their hosts a 76-63 loss. The final score marked VSC's largest lead although the ladies repeatedly pulled away, only to have Troy battle back.

Coach Cooper's Corps moved out to a 37-29 lead at the intermission. Missie Milton contributed 10 first half points as her team averaged 53 percent field goal accuracy.

At 17:11 Milton gave VSC a 41-31 edge. The Senior long-shot artist added a bucket to extend the lead to 53-41. A ten point Troy rally cut the margin to 53-51 with 10:04 showing.

Sherri France became instant offense with the Lady Blazers out front 63-59. She converted two free throws, popped a 17-footer, and hit a close-range jumper to make it 69-59 at the 3:28 point.

From there, Janice Washington, who led the team in rebounds with 9, hit a free throw and two inside power baskets, giving VSC a 74-61

advantage. Milton added the final touch from 16 feet.

"It was not one of our best games, but any time you win on the road you have to be happy," Coach Charles Cooper remarked. "We seemed to be a little hesitant, but a long ride and a strange court will do that to you," he explained.

The mentor added that Missie Milton shot well during the second half, and cited that Sherri France made several key baskets to turn the contest around. Milton and France had 20 and 21 points, respectively, while Janis Williams hit 12 and Janice Washington added 11.

"We stress a team concept, and our team as a whole played well enough to win," Cooper mentioned. As evidence of that team concept, Milton and Williams teamed up for 15 assists. In addition France hauled in 8 rebounds and Pam Johnson led the game with 6 blocked shots.

"We're a little tired, but we have 10 days off," Cooper concluded. The team's record is now 12-6, with 6 games remaining.

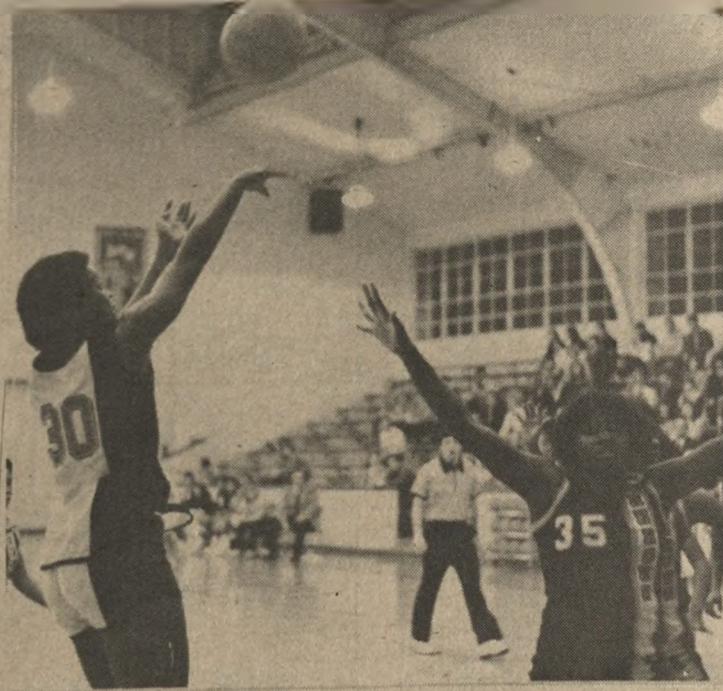

Troy ends Blazer string at six: 74-73

The VSC Blazers surrendered the lead with sixteen seconds left and were unable to cinch a winning basket as the Troy State Trojans recorded a 74-73 win on their home court Wednesday night. In doing so, Troy handed VSC its first loss after six straight wins.

Just as in their earlier loss to Troy State, the Blazers were in the drivers seat for most of the contest. Turnovers and poor free-throw shooting costed the Blazers most; however, a last-chance shot taken at :06 could have put the Blazers back on top, but the in-and-out shot was rebounded by Troy.

VSC trailed only once during the first half as Troy was up 3-2 in the early going. Ivey

Hubbard erased that lead with a slam.

The Blazers increased the margin to eight, 35-27, on a baseline jumper by Ben Mackey. Troy narrowed the gap to 37-33 at the half.

The lead swapped hands more than half a dozen times during the second half. A four-point Blazer lead at 64-60 was the halves widest gap. Troy stormed back with six straight points to go ahead 66-64.

VSC let a 73-70 lead slip away in the last minute. The Trojans cut the lead to 73-72, and a Blazer turnover provided a chance for the winning basket.

Ben Mackey paced the Blazers with 25 points. Ivey Hubbard accounted for 23, and Lee Green contributed 14.

Lady Blazers taking a break

VALDOSTA, Ga. -- Valdosta State's Lady Blazers are in the middle of a much needed 10-day break in their schedule and are gearing up for a tough home stretch as they go after a post-season tournament bid.

Coach Charles Cooper's club is 12-6 and ranked eighth in the country in NCAA Division 2. The latest win was a solid 76-63 decision over Troy State on the road. The Ladies stay on the road with games against Georgia State Feb. 6, Georgia Southern Feb. 8 and Florida Feb. 13 before returning home for a match with Georgia Southwestern on Feb. 19.

VSC's only loss to a Division 2 school was at Bethune-Cookman and the Lady Blazers will have a chance to even the score with the Lady Wildcats in the season finale Feb. 22.

Cooper has gotten solid play

up and down his lineup most of the season, but the offensive leaders since the holiday break have been senior guard Missie Milton and sophomore forward Sherri France.

In the seven games since Christmas, France is averaging 23.4 points and 11.9 rebounds a game while Milton is scoring at a 19.9 per game pace and has handed out 5 assists each outing.

France made the all-tournament team in the recent Dial Classic in Auburn, Ala., after scoring 50 points and grabbing 23 rebounds in the two games.

But as Cooper stresses, it's a team game and everybody in the lineup has contributed.

Cooper gave his troops a couple of days off to rest up for the final six regular season games, four of which will be on the road. "On The Road Again" could be the theme song this season as 16 of the

24 games have been or will be in enemy territory.

But Cooper believes the schedule will be an advantage when selection of teams to post-season tournaments are made. Obviously record is important, but strength of schedule will also be considered.

"It depends on how high the school is rated and how tough of a schedule you've played," he said. "Our schedule is one of the toughest in the nation for a Division 2 school, and that will help us."

"Right now, all we can do is play one game at a time, win as many as possible and hope for the best."

Only sixteen teams across the country will receive post-season bids, leading up to the four-team national finals in Springfield, Mass., March 19-20.

Wright directs theatre presentation

Micheal Wright will direct the upbeat musical "The Me Nobody Knows" in the Fine Arts Lab Theatre from February 10-13. Although the play's lyrics and lines were written by children between the ages of eight and eighteen, it is not recommended for those less than 17 years old.

The music for "The Me Nobody Knows" was written by professionals, but the words express the children's views of life. Wright defended leaving in the rough language because, "that's what they wrote. If I'd removed it, a lot of the (play's) feeling would be lost."

Wright noted that his first

directing experience "has no real star. It's just a bunch of stories and how they interact."

The play deals with the children's philosophies about school, sex, racism, and life in general. "The Me Nobody Knows" is not strictly comedy, nor is it a call for sympathy to be directed toward the kids. Wright said, "it's not a depression show, I don't like those. It's uplifting with lots of singing and dancing."

Wright feels many people will identify with the show. He said, "it shows some of the fun kids have growing up and the amazing things they notice that adults just take for granted."

An advantage to the play,

according to Wright, is the ability to cast more blacks. "We usually have to gear casting to the audience," he said.

"The Me Nobody Knows" has a low budget and Wright expects it to make a profit. There are no big set costs and the costumes are supplied by the actors. Wright said that the only real costs were for royalties.

Tickets are free to VSC students. Non-VSC students may purchase tickets for \$2.50. Adult ticket prices will be \$4 and groups of ten or more may buy tickets at \$1.50 per person.

We have many needs," he said, "and they all involve turning out better students and having a finer School of the Arts."
