

Thirteen qualify for SGA positions

Thirteen students have qualified to run for four executive offices in Valdosta State College's Student Government Association. The election will be held on Feb. 24.

Voting booths will be open in the College Union Building, Education Center, and on North Campus from 10 a.m. till 9 p.m. A voting booth will also be open in the Cafeteria from 10 a.m. till 7 p.m.

ID cards will be required in

order to vote. Absentee ballots may be obtained from the SGA office in the College Union from 9 a.m. till 5 p.m. on Feb. 19, 22, and 23.

In the President's race, incumbent Warren R. Royal will be opposed by current Comptroller Graylon Brown and David Michael Parks.

Incumbent Vice-President Virginia H. Williams will face current Secretary Frank Carter and Cheryle Cain Chandler in the Vice-Presidential race.

The office of Secretary is

being sought after by Jo Anne Hudson, Artie Renee Marshall, and Donald Kent Parks.

The Comptroller position has four candidates. They are Nadine Aldridge, Macarthur Hardin Daniel, Richard A. Dooley, and Nancy Whitfield.

Open Campus Day should bring VSC 1500 visitors

VALDOSTA, GA - More than 1,500 high school students, counselors, and parents are expected on the Valdosta State College campus on Thursday, Feb. 18, which has been designated as Open Campus Day.

"This is the biggest single recruiting effort of the year," said Lee Bradley, who is director of Open Campus Day, and VSC's Project officer.

"We are extremely proud of our college, and we are persuaded if we can show potential students what goes on in campus classrooms, what campus life at VSC is all about, and and tell them about financial aid, housing, and enrollment procedures, then we have scored."

Special events are scheduled during the day so students will have an opportunity to encounter disciplines outside the classroom, Bradley noted.

"We'll have information booths, tours of the biology department, criminal justice displays, foreign language slide shows, the computer lab will be open, planetarium shows are scheduled, and rat experiments in the psychology department, as well as many other special events," he said.

Many classrooms will be open, indicated by bright yellow signs. "Open Campus Classroom," so that visiting students may walk in and out at will.

"Our professors have been extremely cooperative about opening up their classes," said Bradley. "Students will have an opportunity to talk with professors between classes."

"The Open Campus Day Committee, which is strongly supported by the administration, has representatives from all segments of the campus,

including students. We think it is a great way for potential students to come and get a day-to-day glimpse of VSC, to find out about majors, professors, registration, and financial aid."

The visitors are to be guests of the college for lunch in the dining hall.

Opening session is at 10 a.m. in the Whitehead Auditorium, preceded by registration and a

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Nunn's Senate Internship applications available

Applications for Senator Sam Nunn's Senate Internship program are available now in the SGA Office. The deadline for application is March 1, 1982.

Senator Sam Nunn has established a student internship program in his Washington, D.C. and Atlanta offices. Students chosen for the program will work in Senator Nunn's office during the fall, winter, spring, or summer quarters.

The internship program is designed to involve students in the work of the Senator's office, and to provide first-hand experience in government at the Congressional level. Interns will be assigned such duties as background research for bill preparation and speeches, publication of press releases and newsletters, monitoring and reporting committee hearings and floor action, assistance with constituent requests and correspondence, assembling basic reference materials, and working with the Senator's staff.

The internship program is structured to be an academic as well as a work experience. Each student selected for the program will be expected to work out with a proper academic advisor in his school a program of study to comple-

ment the work experience through readings, research papers, and other methods of relating the intern experience to the student's course of academic study. A prerequisite for participation in the program is the agreement of the student's school that academic credit will be granted for the internship, the amount of credit and the requirements necessary for earning that credit to be decided by the school.

Participation in the Senate Internship Program is open to any college or university junior, senior, graduate, or professional student.

Each intern will receive a monthly stipend of \$600.00. This stipend should sufficiently permit the student to assume in full the basic expenses associated with his participation in the intern program.

Interns will be responsible for securing housing arrangements in the Washington, D.C. and Atlanta areas.

Selection of interns will be based on high academic standards and potential for leadership in political and governmental matters in the future, as indicated by academic record, work experience, extracurricular activities, interests, and maturity.

Schmeir publishes book on Southern history

VALDOSTA, GA -- What started out to be "two or three little essays" has turned into a book written by a Valdosta State College history professor, Dr. Louis Schmeir.

"Reflections of Southern Jewry," just published by Mercer University Press, is a collection of letters of Charles Wessolowsky in 1878-79 edited by Schmeir, who also wrote an introduction and conclusion.

Who was Wessolowsky? To hear the professor tell it, he was one of the most interesting figures in that era of Georgia history. Born in Posen, a Prussian province, and well educated (he spoke five languages), he immigrated to Sandersville, Ga. in the late 1850s to join a brother and cousin. He peddled notions all over Georgia, served in the 34th Volunteer Regiment during the Civil War, was captured during the Battle of Atlanta, and became a business man in Savannah.

"He couldn't make it in business," said Schmeir. "he was more of an intellectual. He met the editor of Jewish South, an Atlanta newspaper, and became a reporter for the paper, traveling through the Southern states, lecturing and promoting the paper and writ-

ing accounts of Jewish life, religion, and culture in Southern cities.

"Wessolowsky was also a promoter for the Masonic Lodge in which he held the highest office in the state, and for the B'nai B'rith. He was at one time clerk of the superior court in Dougherty County; he had a flowing handwriting and in those days you could tell the level of education of immigrants by their handwriting. He was also a state senator from Dougherty County.

"I was doing research on the history of Jews in Valdosta for a book I propose to write when

I ran across the name of Charles Wessolowsky. He was also a rabbi and performed the first Jewish marriage in Valdosta. I found these letters in the archives in Cincinnati, Ohio and realized how valuable they are in telling the story of the Jews in the South during that era.

"I was also very fortunate in being able to talk with Wessolowsky's niece, Sadie Davis, who recalled many things about his life, his work, and his influence. She died a week or so ago at the age of 96. Unfortunately none of his per-

Dr. Don E. Phillips, assistant professor in the Communication Arts Department, has been appointed as a Book Reviewer for the College Department of Humanities Division of the Random House Publishing Company.

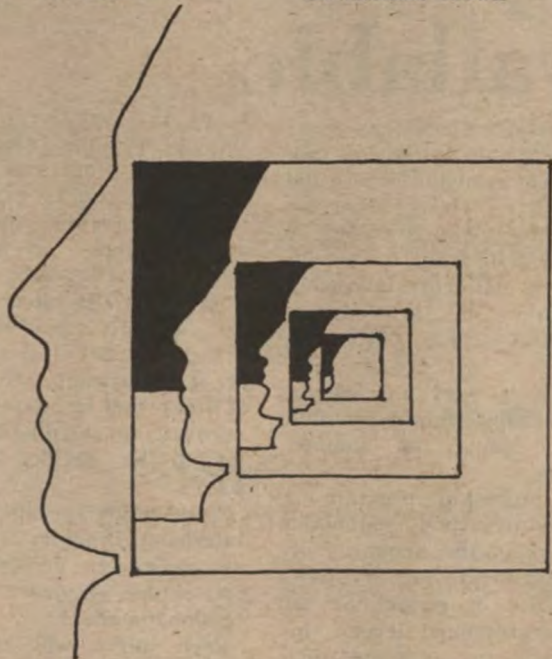
The appointment was based on recognition of Dr. Phillip's reputation in the communications field as well as a review of his communications book.

His responsibilities as a Book Reviewer include evaluating preliminary manuscript proposals for publication, evaluating total book manuscript proposals in some cases, and pre-publication review of communication texts.

Dr. Phillips is the author of two books: *Student Protest, 1960-1969: An Analysis of the Issues in Speech*, published in 1980 by the University Press of America, and the second volume of *Karl Barth's Philosophy of Communication* published in 1981 by the German publisher Georg Olms Verlag. He is presently working on revisions of his *Student Protest* book and is expecting to publish this late in 1982. The revisions will cover Kent State and update the book through 1970.

Reaganomics: Hard to swallow Regina Floyd

Gradually there is a growing indication that Americans may not swallow much more of Reaganomics. The White House report on Reagan's first year insisted that the 'Reagan revolution was under way'. The American people had once again begun to believe in themselves. Reagan himself said that interest and inflation were on their way down.

However, public polls give quite another view of this assumption. The Wall Street Journal reported that Reagan's 'support is steadily eroding.'

The overall state of our economy is not much better off than it was a year ago. According to Reagan, 'compared to the beginning of our term, there are a million people more working than there were in 1980.'

But The Bureau of Labor Statistics said total employment was 97,188,000 in December, down more than a half-million from the month Reagan took office last January and also 94,000 fewer than December 1980.

Once again we ask the question of how much will America swallow. Reagan has scared the older generation with cut-backs in social security. He has virtually stunned the general public with his ideas of tripling gas prices and a possible tax increase in certain areas.

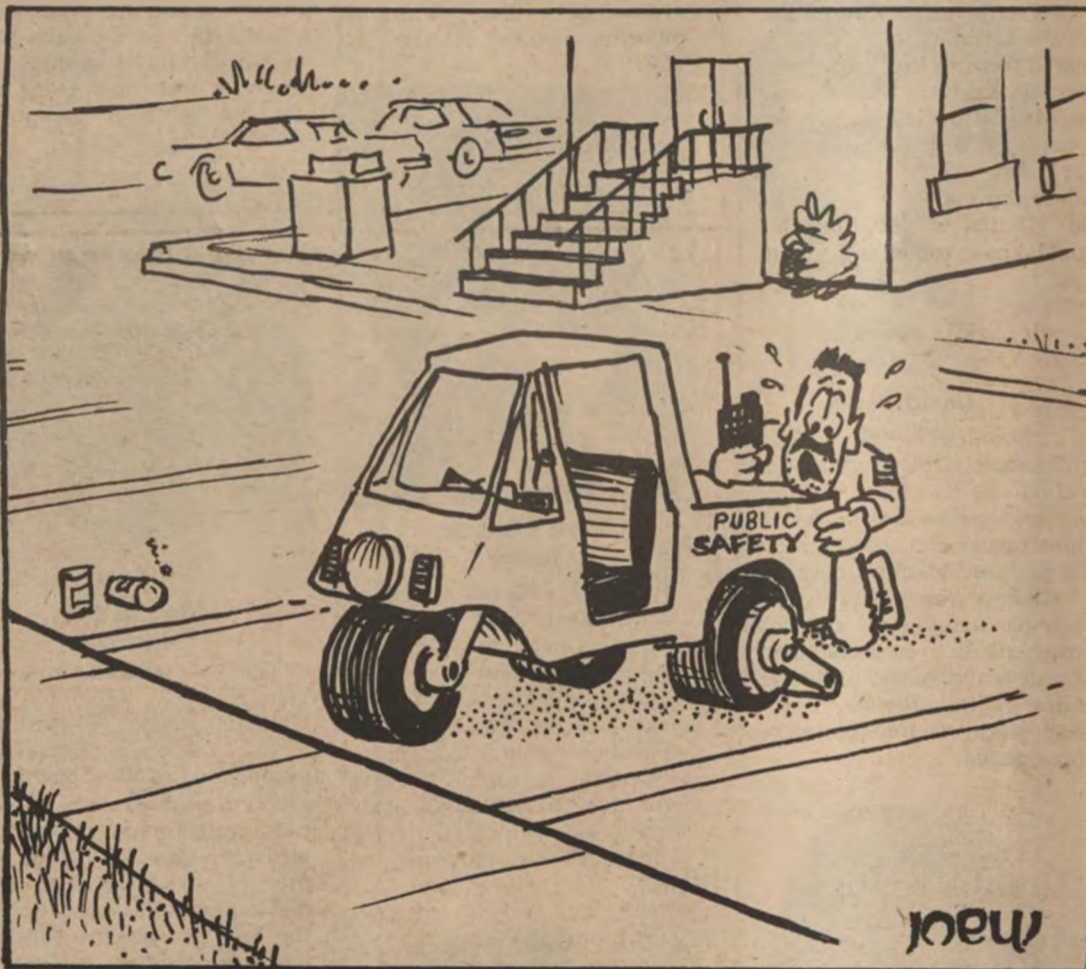
Reagan has said that there should be increased defense spending because America needs to 'rebuild something that has been allowed to deter-

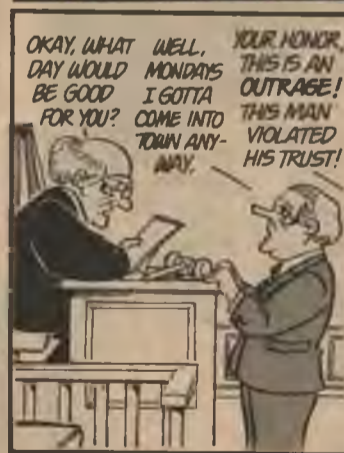

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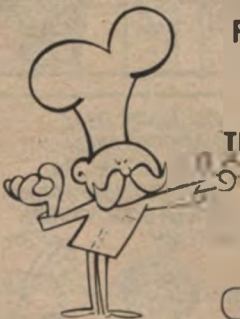
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Teachers' teachers' art displayed

Who taught the teachers who are now teaching future teachers?

That's what the exhibition in the Fine Arts Gallery at VSC is all about. It's called "Teachers' Teacher."

Last year the gallery had a showing of the art work of distinguished alumni. In the fall there was a display of faculty art. And now there is a showing of the works of art teachers under whom the art faculty at VSC studied.

"It's comparable to where we are, or what we are doing, where we came from and where we are going," said Don Penny, professor of art and gallery director. In addition, we usually have a gallery show of the work of our senior art majors.

"In this show we have a whole body of work showing our roots. This is a very exciting show with some wonderful pieces. Many of them are from our own collections but some we borrowed from private owners or from galleries."

The gallery is open to the public at no charge Monday - Thursday from 10 am - 4 pm and Friday from 10 am - 2 pm.

The names of some of the artists will be familiar to viewers because several of them have had showings in the VSC gallery from time to time. Other names are unfamiliar, since the VSC art faculty members studied in various parts of the country.

"It is interesting," commented Irene Dodd, faculty

member, "to see how different or similar are the works of our own faculty to those of the teachers under whom they studied."

Miss Dodd's father, Lamar Dodd, now Regents Professor Emeritus, is one who had a strong influence on those who studied at the University of Georgia where he was head of the art department for many years.

"He has been a vital force in art in Georgia," said Penny.

"Lamar Dodd probably had more influence on more teachers of arts in Georgia than any one else. He taught two of our faculty, Russell McRae, head of the department, and his daughter, Irene Dodd."

He is represented in the show by two oils, one a portrait of "Grandmother Cleveland," the other a still life of fruit, and by a charcoal of Wolf Fork Valley. Several of his paintings hang in the VSC library and in other buildings on campus.

Sculptor Ralph Hurst, who has twice had works shown in the VSC gallery, has several of his alabaster figures in the show - a grosbeak, o'possum, drake and a reclining animal form. A long-time professor at Florida State University, Hurst taught Ruth Kahler, Lee Bennett and Penny.

Karl Zerbe, who taught at FSU, also taught Mrs. Bennett and Penny. In the show are serigraph and a wash drawing by Zerbe, whose art has been on exhibition here in the past.

Fiberwork by Mary Riccardi, who also has had her work on display at VSC, is represented by interesting wall hangings: "Ragweeds," "Ol' Buttermilk Sky," and "Fjord." She taught Ruth Kahler in Tallahassee.

The brightest piece in the show is "Jazz 1-1981" by Joseph Perrin, whom Penny terms "one of the major painters in the Southeast" and who held a workshop in the VSC gallery recently. Retired as head of the Georgia State University's art department, Perrin was one of Penny's teachers.

The Blazers fell to 12-12 on the year. They trail West Georgia in the Conference by half a game. Games remain with Armstrong on Thursday and Augusta on Saturday. Both games are home.

Visitation Bill passes Senate

Valdosta State residence hall students who have desired an increase in visitation will soon see their wish come true. A bill calling for a weekday visitation option of 12 p.m. till midnight has passed both the Student Senate and Student Affairs Committee unanimously.

The bill called for the noon-to-midnight option to be available only if the voting floor approved it by a 75 percent majority. It will not affect current weekend visitation hours.

"Several students approached me saying they'd like to see visitation increased," Dooley said. He added, "I thought the best way to get it would be to ask for an increase in afternoon visitation."

Dooley said that the bill was also inspired by a survey conducted last year by SGA President Warren Royal. The survey found that 70 percent of the men and 51 percent of the women on campus that responded desired an increase in visitation hours.

sonal papers were saved; after his death, a son-in-law burned one of the first professional books dealing with any ethnic experience in the South other than that of Blacks. It raises the question of people not dressed in sheets, being drunk and of lynchings.

It tells of the story of a multi-ethnic society in the South and emphasizes the fact

that Jews were not aliens.

Editing the letters, the professor said, involved correcting the archaic spelling, writing footnotes to explain Jewish terms and indexing and cross indexing the letters.

Dining trays are victims of blizzards

ATHENS, GA(CPS)-- The January blizzards that temporarily shut down scores of campuses and even delayed the beginning of the new term at others swept away something different at the University of Geor-

gia: dining hall trays.

According to some estimates, students carted off as many as 450 trays--worth an estimated \$2000--to use as sleds when the university closed down in deference to a January 14 snowstorm.

Auburn University officials also reported 'a certain loss of trays' to sleds when the Alabama campus closed down, according to an Auburn spokesman.

President reviews year

With the Student Government Association executive elections only weeks away, a review of the term of office of SGA President Warren Royal is in order. Royal was elected to the position of vice-president last winter and assumed the office of president when Bobby Shannon resigned from the position at the end of the 1981 summer quarter.

Royal said that he has learned a great deal during his tenure as president. "Most importantly," he said, "I learned what channels to go through to get things accomplished."

Royal noted that he had worked closely with the student Senate to get legislation passed that would be beneficial to VSC students. "Richard Dooley's bill to allow increased visitation in dormitories that desire it was based on a survey that I conducted while vice-president," Royal said. "I also worked with senators to re-establish the Book Exchange and to have smoke detectors installed in the residence halls."

When the possibility of an increase of Georgia's drinking age to 21 was brought to Royal's attention, an SGA student referendum was initiated to learn students' feelings on the subject. "When the results were

tallied," Royal explained, "we sent letters to the legislative and executive branches of Georgia's State Government with the results." He added, "I really feel that we were instrumental in getting the effort dropped."

Other Senate acts during Royal's term called for the establishment of a four-year computer science degree, a 2.0 cumulative grade point average requirement to participate in the SGA, the development of a committee to oversee any problems with washing machine ticket dispensers, extended voting hours for SGA polls, the addition of a ladies' restroom in Reade Hall, and the placement of a bulletin board for off-campus students in the College Union Building.

Outside the Senate, Royal said he worked for and gotten a change machine placed in the College Union. "We've also worked on getting more washing machines for VSC students," he said. "I understand some machines will be placed in Patterson Hall soon."

Only an attempt to get telephones placed in the residence halls has met defeat thus far. "It would have been successful except initial costs," Royal said. "It may be feasible in the future when more funds may be available

for such a project."

Royal says he has strived to represent VSC students both on and off campus. He has attended Student Advisory Council meetings and was VSC's sole representative to the Georgia Student Association. "I also went to Washington, D.C., as a VSC representative to the American Student Association," Royal said. He added that while there he discussed the future of student aid with Senator Sam Nunn.

On campus, Royal has worked closely with the Food Services Committee in order to make it a more productive organization. "I feel that it (the committee) has a great deal of potential for improving the food services in the cafeteria," he said.

"The main thing I take pride in," Royal said, "is trying to make myself easily accessible to students with problems. On many occasions students have approached me feeling they have been treated unfairly. I have worked closely with Dean Ferrell to correct such problems."

Overall, Royal feels he has had a successful term in office.

"I feel my job is to represent any student who needs help, advice, or who has a special problem and, simply, to make VSC a better college."

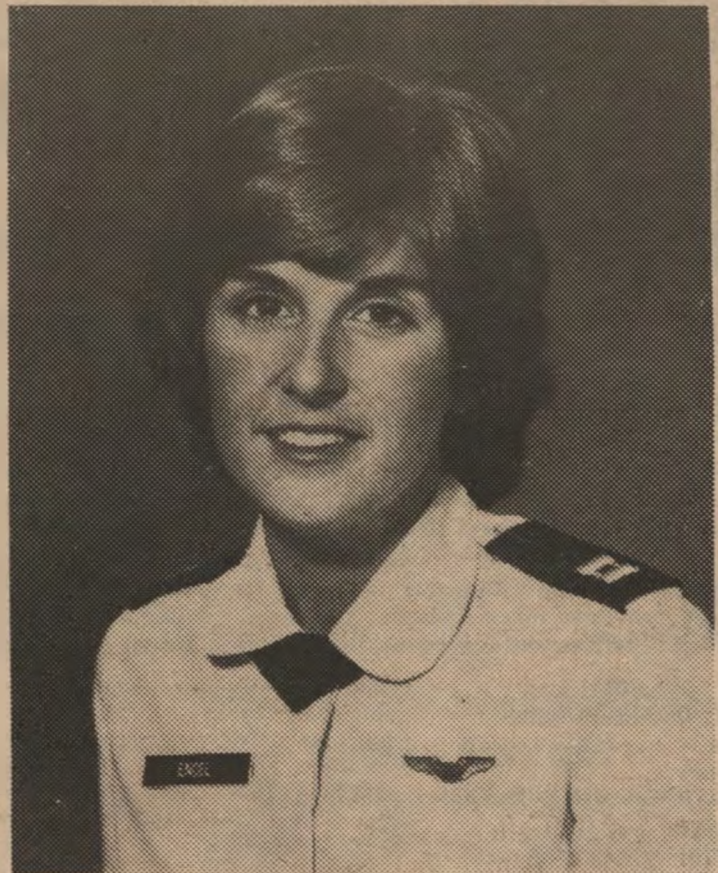

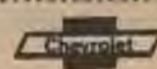

T. V. contract compromise helps small football programs

(CPS)--As the first effects of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's (NCAA) compromise with its major football powers sink in, some of the dispossessed schools and conferences are finding to their own surprise that their expulsion from the most lucrative football television contracts may help them.

'We think it's the greatest thing that could happen,' says Dick Oliver, commissioner of the soon-to-be-downgraded Southland Conference.

And though the accord may make some conferences change

shapes--the Ivy League, for one, may take in some new schools--the new formulas for splitting up the millions of dollars television pays to broadcast college football each year 'isn't going to make that much difference,' agrees Ivy League Commissioner James Litvack.

The NCAA's four-year struggle with most of its biggest football schools (those in the Big 10 and PAC-10 didn't participate) ended in compromise in January.

Sixty-one major teams had coalesced as the College Football Association (CFA) to gain

a more direct voice in negotiating tv contracts, an activity in which all NCAA members could participate. CFA members argued that, since they appeared on tv most often and generated the most profit, they should have the biggest voice in the negotiations.

'The NCAA has over 900 members of all categories and sizes,' explains CFA Executive Director Chuck Neinas. 'Before the recent changes, you had a situation where all schools, with or without a football team, had a say-so in the tv football contracts.'
