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

Valdosta, Ga.- A Valdosta State co-ed was found brutally murdered in his dorm room here Sunday night. Sgt. Vinson, investigating officer,

reports that the body of a French lick, Indiana native,

Joey Maul, was found at 11:35 p.m. in his dorm room in Patterson Hall Sunday night.

Vinson recalls receiving a disturbance call at 11:00 p.m.

in the Oak Street parking lot sub-station. He then proceeded to mount his trusty Cushman

and peddle to Patterson Hall, from where he had received the call. He reached Patterson

Hall at approximately 11:30 p.m. and was sent to the third floor by an anonymous

tudent.

Vinson found Maul's body sprawled on the floor in his

ransacked room. Bold red, spray-painted letters covered the walls and ceiling of the room and Vinson reports that

the letters were T-K-E. Also found at the scene in Maul's clenched fist, was a piece of red fabric imprinted with a white skull and crossbones.

A Valdosta coroner's report shows that the cause of death was stabbing, with a total of fifty-six stab wounds being found on the body.

Vinson reports that no arrests have been made but that the primary suspect at present is

Dear Editor,





B. Points of Interest to Men


1. Bermuda shorts are very popular this year but must be worn with loafers or deck shoes. Tennis shoes and thongs are definitely "out."


"The world did not explode after all when the planets lined up March 10," Dr. Dennis Marks, Professor of Astronomy at VSC, observed today.

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
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VSC Maintenance work on Brown Hall heating system

Irving Harris said, "whatever the reason, seven out of every ten players are bald."





KKK chapter comes to UGA

In another of its periodic shots at organizing students, a Ku Klux Klan official has promised to try to set up a University of Georgia KKK chapter, and Georgia administrators concede they'd have to let the KKK on campus if it qualified.

Klan leader Ed Fields announced on university radio station WUOG he intended to set up a Klan chapter at Georgia. If Fields does try, acting Student Activities Director Dr. Philip Weast says, "Legal precedents require that they be admitted as a group if they want to."

"I have to register any group that comes into my office if they have among them three full-time students at UG."

Getting students may be hard. College campuses have been infertile ground for Klan organizers over the years.

Klan leader Bill Wilkinson announced a February, 1980 campaign to organize Oklahoma students, but now, two years later, student activities officers at Oklahoma, Oklahoma State and Central State say they've seen no evidence of Klan activities there.

Also in the spring of 1980, the Klan sent leaflets extolling "white power" to University of Maryland students with common Anglo-Saxon surnames

"If it had any impact at all, it was certainly miniscule," says administrator William Kirwin.
"I can't imagine they had any success among educated people."

The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, which closely monitors the KKK, concurs.

"In all our monitoring of the Klan, I can flatly state that we have not encountered a single Ku Klux Klan klavern on a college campus," says Irwin Suall, the ADL's fact-finding director.

Neither Wilkinson nor Fields could be reached for comment.

Sual says Fields is not the head of the Georgia KKK, as he claimed on the radio show, but recently formed a splinter Klan group.

Fields, he adds, "is best-known as the national secretary of the States Rights Party, a long-established hate group. Ideologically, it's a cross between Nazism and the Klan."

Weast says Fields has not shown up yet to organize on campus, though he expects an off-campus Klan rally to be held shortly.

Fields' broadcast did provoke a response, if largely negative.

"After the first call, which was from a Klan member who wanted to know the date of the

next meeting, we had half an hour of uninterrupted opposition to Fields' ideas," recalls Lee Echols, WUOG's program director.

In the days after the

broadcast, the campus Black Student Unior, Hillel and a gay group formed an anti-Klan Coalition Against Prejudice, Racism and Discrimination (CAPRAD). "All we can do is give people a clear picture of what they stand for." says CAPRAD and Black Student Union President Marvin Ware.

"Right now, there are no

racial problems on this campus," he says. "But with the Klan here, people of all races will start to get nervous. Just by being here, they're going to cause problems."

Put something up there! Budget cuts shatter College students

The "breakthrough" conpromise federal budgets now in the U.S. Senate cut considerably less from student aid programs than President Reagan wanted, but college lobbyists say the impact on students would still be shattering

if they passed.

The three new compromises effectively freeze most federal student aid programs -- Pell Grants, National Direct Student Loans, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, State Student Incentive Grants and College Work-Study -- at current funding levels, which themselves represent huge cuts from 1981-1982 levels.

One of the compromises, which was passed by the Senate Budget Committee, would cut funding for Guaranteed Student Loans (GSLs) by \$289 million, \$819 million, and \$1.9 billion over the next three years, while leaving the other programs at 1982 levels.

Another compromise budget, by Sen. Robert Stafford (R-Vt) would freeze all aid programs, including the GSL.

The third, by Sen. Ernest Hollings (D-SC), would allow for 6.9 percent inflation increases for all but the GSL program, which would stay at

The Senate Budget Commit-

tee proposal, which some believe stands the best chance of passage in the Senate, "represents a 90 percent reduction in cuts" compared to President Reagan's proposed budget, says Jan Lilja, committee ana-

Like the Reagan budget, the committee proposal has students beginning to pay interest on GSLs immediately, instead of having the government pay it while the student is enrolled,

But the committee would keep the interest rate at nine percent instead of the "market rate" Reagan requested, and would keep the loan origination fee at five percent, instead of Reagan's ten percent.

After the committee passed the compromise, the president announced he would support

College lobbyists won't.

"A freeze is in effect a cut," asserts Ed Hanley of the U.S. Student Association (USSA).

"A freeze is a cut," echoes Charles Saunders of the American Council on Education (ACE).

"Given the recent losses to inflation, how can students deal with a freeze along with service cuts in the GSL?" asks Miriam Rosenberg, head of the Coalition of Independent College and University Students.

The Senate compromise, she

needs of students.'

All three lobbyists are worried that the Senate proposal-or any tampering with the in-school interest subsidies-would wreck the GSL program.

"Lenders (under the GSL program) have depended on the in-school interest subsidy as a way of keeping costs down, and making a reasonable pro-Rosenberg explains. "Without it, lenders will have an increased cost because of administrative problems and the obligation to collect interest due immediately.'

In seperate interviews, both Saunders and Hanley agreed. Hanley warned "you may find

that banks are unwilling to make the (GSLs) to anyone

without a bank account, a minimum deposit, or a good credit rating.

As for freezing the other aid programs, Saunders says. "We're looking at the same amount of students chasing the same amount of dollars as costs go up.'

Hanley contends that "at current inflation rates, a freeze amounts to a 20-30 percent cut over the next three years.'

But Hanley adds that freezes are politically popular. "Everything is a freeze in Washington right now.'

Rosenberg hopes that, despite the waning of the academic year, students will increase pressure on their representatives to resist the freezes. "Thank heavens it's an elec-

tion year," she says.

Palestinian and pro-Israel students come together

While both Palestinian and pro-Israel students have always had opposing viewpoints, Hussaini believes tensions in their homelands have raised the awareness levels of both

"The number of Palestinian students here, about 2000, has remained the same for the last few years," Hussaini says.

"But increasing attention by the press because of what's happening in the occupied territories has made people more aware of our presence and beliefs."

Indeed, many of the campus conflicts revolve around demonstrations and speeches by the opposing groups. Palestinian students, along with their pro-Israel counterparts, have stepped up efforts to take their views to American students. and in the process clashes between the groups have also increased.

When a Palestinian journalist spoke at Yale, for instance, more than 30 pro-Israel students held a candlelight vigil outside the lecture hall to protest his presence on campus.
