23 Board, room rent, student fees and/or tuition wist be paid in advance in cash, or its equivalent; either monthly, quarterly, or semi-annually as may be your customary procedure Notes must not be accepted unless the payment of the same are reasonably and a squately secured either by endorsement or endorsements of persons financially responsible, or by the pledge salable collateral. The Presidents and Local Treasurers of the respective stitutions will be held personally respons le for violation of this rule.

Should the above directions not only be borne in mind but strictly adhered to there is no question but the pertain embarrasements at some of the institutions will be much relieved

As you are aware, the Regents of the University System of Georgia have a regulation that no institution in the System can make any contracts to purchase supplies, etc., nor do any business with any individual Regent or with any firm or corporation in the any member of the Board of Regents has an interest.

The Chairman of the Board, has by executive order, further extended such regulation, and directs that you fully acquaint the necessary employees at your Institution with same, as below:

> "That the regulation of Regents of the University System relative to purchases from individual members of the Board of Regents, or firms, or corporations in which they are interested, be further extended so that no institution in the University System will be permitted to contract with any official or employee of the University System, nor with any firm or corporation in which such official or employee has an interest, for the purchase of supplies, building materials, and the like."

HHADS & LOCAL TREASURERS

Finds will, as you are aware, be materially decreased from the allotment given in your 1933-34 budget. This reduction will be particularly acute during the present quarter, covering the months of July, August and September, as bhe best estimate of funds available from the State for this period will not exceed 13% of the 1933 State Appropriation of your Institution, a portion of which, of course, will be applied according to former instructions under your 1932-33 operations, should there be any obligations due on such operations.

For your information, it is probable that you will receive during this quarter approximately as below:

> July 15th ----- 4 14 40.00 August 15th ----- 4 36 00.00 September _____ 4 3 20.00

In order to further assist you in intelligently working toward full liquidation of your proposed expenditures on the 1953-54 budget, and upon recommendation of the Chancello: of the University System and myself, the Chairman has directed that the following items be cancelled from the expenditures of this budget. Viz.

> 5449.90 for debt payments 2718.00 surplus,

a like amount of reduction will, of course, be made from your proposed State Income.

It is hardly possible for us to calculate on more than 60% of our 1933 State Appropriation, though it is possible that we may receive 70% of same. Please carefully consider the situation facing your institution and discuss same with those responsible for your fiscal operations so that all may be fully acquainted with the very serious problem facing us.

Please acknowledge receipt of this letter, advising in writing of your budget changes, also should any part of same not be fully understood, please write us in detail covering such instances.

HEADS & LOCAL TREASURERS?

It is quite evident that foodsstuffs and other necessary commodities to be consumed by your institution during the present scholastic year will increase substantially in cost during the next six to ten months. Therefore, where it is possible, it is the thought of the Finance Committee of this Board that your institution make contracts for such purchases that will be needed during the scholastic year

I would particularly call your attention to an expected increase in the costs of such items as table cloths, napkins, or other textile products, as well as food stuffs

Should you make any such contracts, please endeavor to arrange payments on same over the several quarters of the scholastic year, so that such payments can be adjusted in line with your respective quarterly budget. If your investigation proves an absolute necessity for other than uniform quarterly payments in order to protect costs, I would suggest your communicating with the undersigned prior to the placing of contracts.

Please be sure to bear in mind that all purchases must be made on a competitive basis

I have discussed this matter with State Supervisor of purchases and you may rest assured that he will be glad at any time to be of every assistance to your institution toward making the best purchases ossible

PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS ON THE CAMPUS OF THE GEORGIA STATE WOMANS COLLEGE AT VALDOSTA.

- A. The College needs and has needed form the beginning an adequate auditorium or chapel.
- B. It also needs an adequate kitchen.

Both of these were provided for in the original plans of the institution, the chapel as part of West Hall. This Hall is so constructed that without special change or modification the addition could be made at once, and the plans proposed will relieve the dormitories from a use that they were never intended to serve. In other words, the practice rooms of the music department, studios of teachers, and studios of the vocal expression department are all housed in them now, taking up space that would accomodate some thirty or forty students in rooming.

We estimate the cost of this addition to be between \$60,000.00 and \$75,000.00. Mr. W. A. Edwards, the architect who provided the original plans, is at work on this scheme at present, and will in a day or two furnish us with a very definite estimate of the cost of this improvement. We believe this proposition can be financed by setting aside annually a part of the fees of the music and expression departments, inasmuch as these departments are now housed in a dormitory and will be housed in the auditorium wing, asswas provided and is provided in both old plans and new.

For the item mentioned under B, it is an extremely desirable addition, but ought to be in the form of a separate building in which would be combined a kitchen and dining room. This would probably cost \$25,000.00 or \$30,000.00. It is not, however, as essential as the item mentioned under A.

We will keep you informed about this matter from time to time, and hope we may be able to secure the greater amount mentioned above, as I believe improvement of the kind mentioned would go further toward building up this institution than almost any other thing.

HEADS OF INSTITUTIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA:

Gentlemen:

Please note below Executive Order issued by Chairman Spalding of Regents of the University System, covering waiver of certain tuition fees;

> "WHEREAS, on account of shortage of funds, it has been necessary for the Regents of the University System of Georgia to substantially reduce the salaries of employees in the various institutions of the University System; and

WHEREAS, from present indications there may be some reduction for the scholastic year, beginning July 1st 1933, in the salaries for such year to employees.

WHEREAS, the Regents of the University System of Georgia passed a regulation requiring the children of such employees to pay fees and tuition at any institution in the system upon the same basis as other students; and

WHEREAS, such regulation was based upon the assumption that such employees would receive in full their respective salaries

NOW, THEREFORE, the premises considered, it is ordered that the existing rules on this subject be temporarily suspended, and during this emergency, that the children of employees at any institution in the University System be, and are, authorized to register and attend classes at the school in the University System where parents are employeed, without payment of fees and tuition, except Laboratory fees, and such other like fees as would cause an actual financial loss to the Institution attended."

Please see that the proper distribution is given this order and that the extra copy attached be placed on file in your Local Treasurer's office as a matter of record for his information and guidance.
