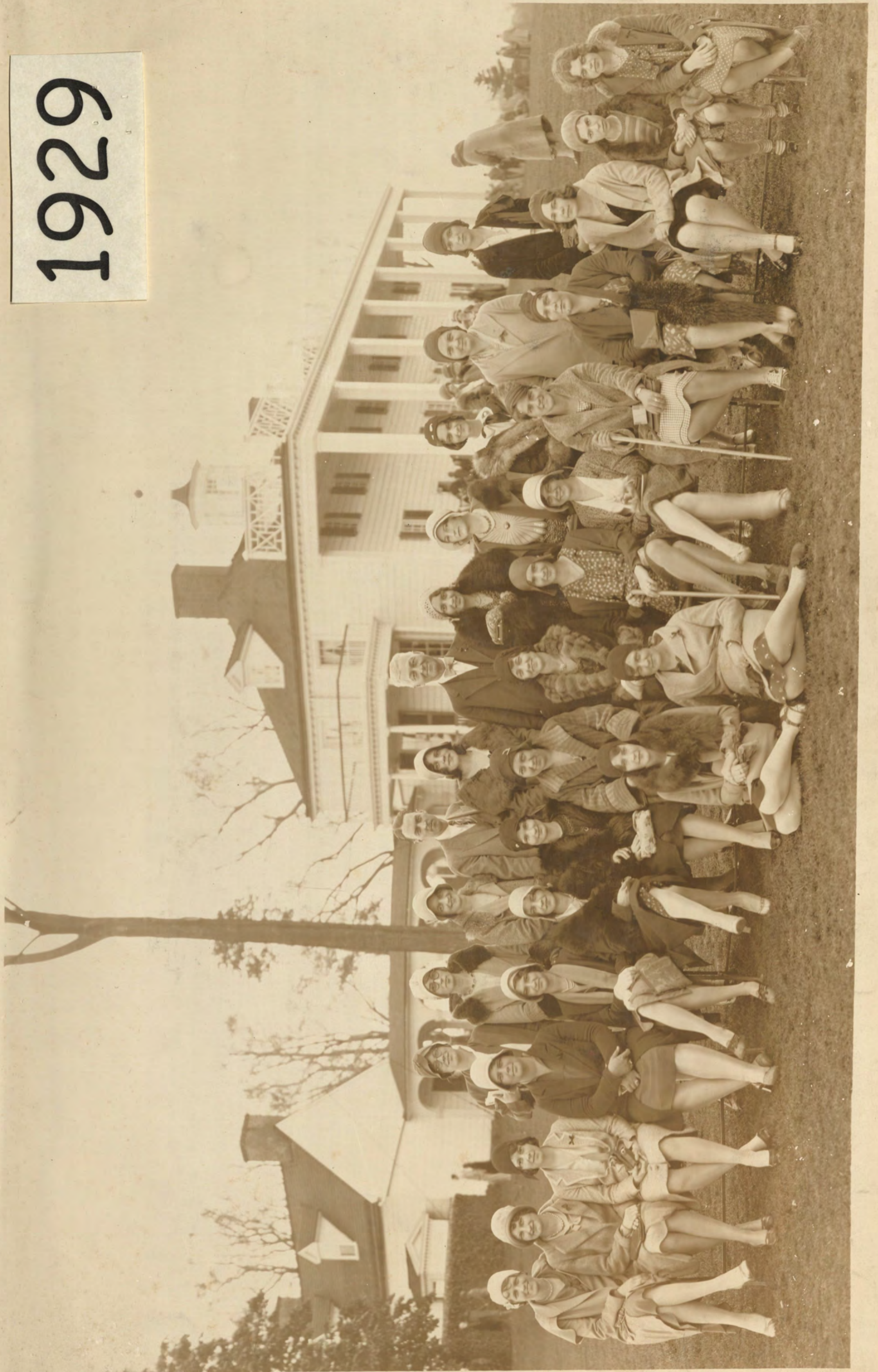
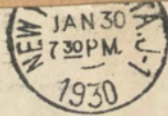

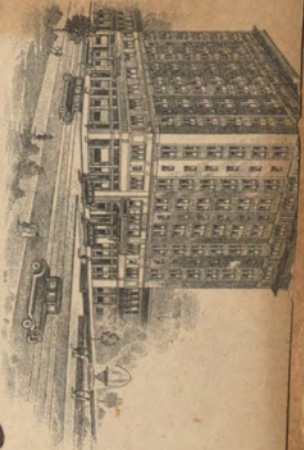
My dear Miss Price:
