Following the program, Geraldine Bowen, president, presided at the business meeting. Plans were completed for the dance which the club is sponsoring on Saturday evening in the Recreation Hall. Ora Kate Wisenbaker and Mildred Wilson composed the refreshment committee.

To Members of All Clubs:

Several clubs have written to us, complaining that they have had no notice at all in regard to the conference expenses, program, etc. We have sent out two circular letters, and evidently some of them have gone astray. So, to those clubs who have heard from us, this letter will be largely a repetition of what you already know - and to those who haven't, here's the way it is:

The Conference is going to be held on the campus of the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, N. C. Registration is going to take place Thursday afternoon, March 21, in Graham Memorial, which is the University Student Union. Rooms are being arranged in University dormitories for both girls and boys - and meals are going to be given in the University Dining Hall. The cost, including rooms, meals, and the two dances the conference is giving, and all other entertainment - including a tea and a reception, will be three dollars and eighty-five cents (\$3.85). Rooms for faculty advisers are being arranged in the dormitories - if they wish, they may stay at the Carolina Inn; rooms there average three dollars per night. The Thursday night dance, a get-together affair, is informal for both girls and boys - the Saturday night dance is formal for girls.

Speakers for the conference are: Dr. Henry F. Grady, Assistant Secretary of State; and Dr. Warner Moss, of the College of William and Mary. The round table subjects are: The European Theatre of War; Our Neighbors to the South; Powers and Policies in the Orient; Economic Facts and Fallacies in a World at War; and The Peace of Tomorrow.

If you have not already done so, please contact us and let us know how many delegates your club is sending. This will help us make a lot of arrangements in advance.

The conference is progressing very nicely, and we feel sure we can offer you an interesting and informative time. Come to Chapel Hill in 1940!
