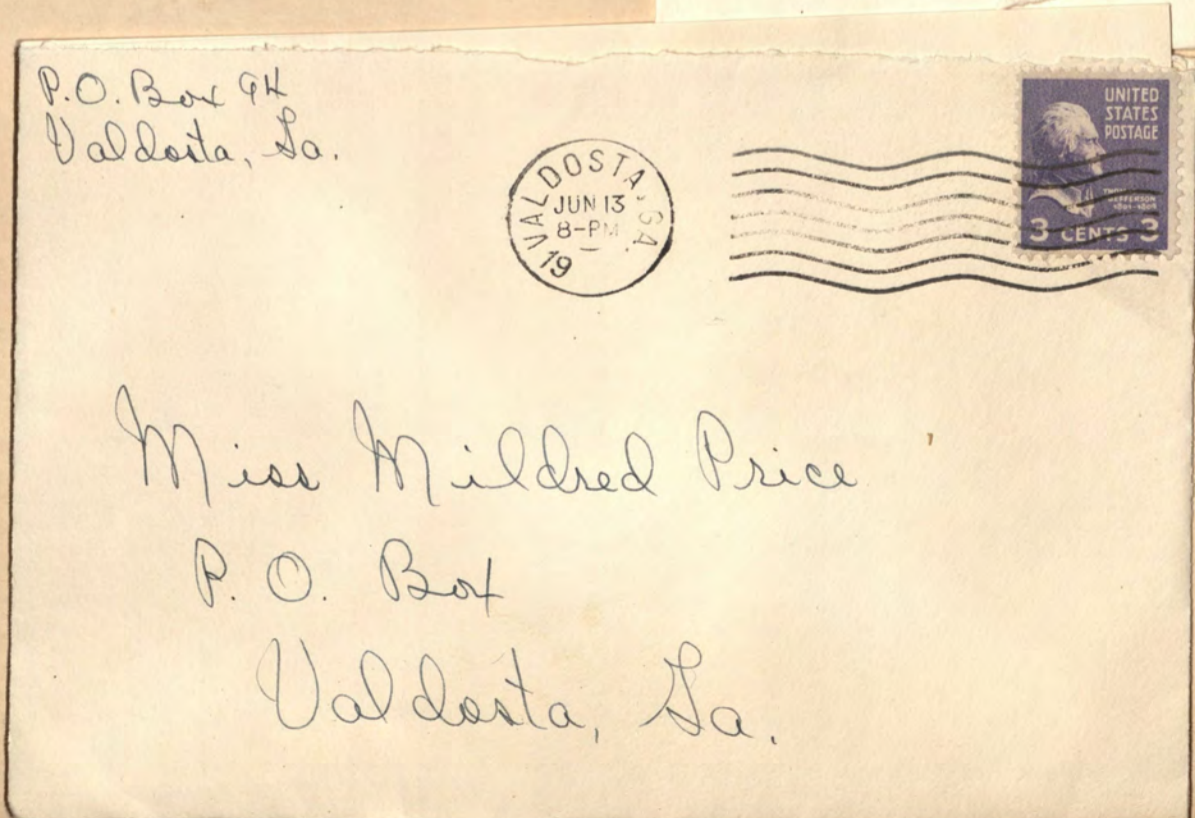

## Foreign Policy Forums Planned

Delegates from 60 colleges in five states will begin gathering at Troy State Teachers College Wednesday for a regional conference of College International Relations Clubs. The three-day meeting will get underway tomorrow morning.

While on the campus the 300 delegates will hear discussions of foreign policy by experts and will participate in several forums on international relations. They will also turn their attention to a full slate of social activities.

Among the speakers are Dr. Emmett Kilpatrick who will speak on "Views on Russia," and Jack Branyon, I. R. C. Secretary recently returned from Europe, who will deliver some of the observations made during the trip. Both Kilpatrick and Branyon will speak at the first general assembly of delegates.
