Historical Pageant At College

May 22, 1926
The Training School of the College will give a Historical Pageant of Valdosta on Tuesday afternoon, May the twenty-fifth, at five o'clock, in front of Converse Hall. Instead of an exhibit of the work done in the grades, the pageant will be a summary this year of several projects by the first seven grades. The historical facts which will be used are as follows:

Prior to the coming of Oglethorpe in 1773, the land now known as Southern Georgia was referred to as the "Debatable Land." The Spanish as early as 1661, had established missions to administer to the Apalachicolas or Lower Creeks, where Statenville and Valdosta now stand. Soon after these settlements, French and English freebooters came up the Caribbean, traded with the natives and raided the Spanish settlements. After 1670 the English were the most aggressive, continually driving back the Spanish toward the inland. When Oglethorpe came in 1733, this Debatable Land, by conquest, became open only to English settlers.

Slow, but steady growth was seen for the next century. The year 1859 marked the beginning of a new era, for it was at that time that a railroad was laid at the present site of Valdosta.

Progress has ever been present, until Valdosta is now rich in educational, agricultural and industrial institutions.

To present these facts in an authentic way has required historical research by both teachers and pupils of the Training School. This pageant represents a classroom project in geography, history and civics, correlated with music and physical education.
