


# VSC offers many options

Valdosta State College is a multi-purpose, senior unit of the University System of Georgia.

As an accredited member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, VSC provides a wide range of opportunities for higher education. Undergraduate degrees in over 45 major areas of study are offered. VSC also offers graduate degrees in more than 20 fields of specialization.

Over 25 completely airconditioned buildings occupy VSC's 168 acres. Main Campus buildings are Spanish Mission architecture while those buildings on North Campus are a form of red

VSC now has an enrollment of about 5,000 students. Approximately 20 states and 20 foreign countries are represented in the student population. The majority of VSC students, however, are Georgia residents. The college employs some 230 faculty
