Mitchell was granted to the Georgia State Teachers College. The Georgia State Teachers College, by an act of the Board of Regents, no longer exists, and it occurs to me that the direction of its proportionate part of that fund creates a question with which the Board of Regents must deal. "Your letter of the 20th enclosing copy of letter sent you by Rev. C. M. Coalson received. I appreciate the suggestions received from that letter.


It might be well for me to state our method of handling the religious lift of the campus. The pastors of the town lead chapel once a week. Sometimes these are interesting and sometimes they are not. I find the longer the preacher helds his charge the more uninteresting the exercises become. The students attend Sunday should and Church ever Sunday morning. Classes are organized for the students and where good teachers can be secured from the city they are preferred the faculty since the students are instructed by the faculty six times a week. At the beginning of the school the Sinday Schools of the community have a reception at the church for the faculty and the students. Once a year a special effort is made to have the students invited into the homes of the citizens of the town for Sunday dinner.

Every Sunday evening immediately after the meal the religious organizations of the campus meet. All meet in the chapel first where they have a short combined interesting programme, then the members of the various churches retire to their respective rooms and study and render programmes in the auxiliaries of their church. The Baptist have three or four B.Y.P.U.'s, the Methodist have several leagues, etc. These various organizations are affiliated with their state organizations. Last year the Baptist Student Union of the state held their annual session for two days at Middle Georgia College. We have prayer meetings on Wednesday evenings. All of these religious meetings are promoted by the students under the advice of the faculty members.

ITHM 10 (A) of the Will of Dr. Thomas E. Mitchell.

One of such parts I give, bequeath and devise in trust to the Trustees of the University of Georgia, in trust to use the net income, issues and profits derived therefrom, according to the best judgment of the Trustees of the University of Georgia, to assist poor, worthy and deserving students, who may be bona fide residents of Georgia, in obtaining an education at the University of Georgia at Athens, or at one of its branches, towit, the Georgia School of Technology at Atlanta, Georgia, the State Normal School, at Athens, Georgia, and the State College for Women, at Milledgeville, Georgia, and in paying the expenses of said students while obtaining such education at the University of Georgia, or at any one of its mentioned branches. In the use and application of the revenue of said trust fund by the Trustees of the University of Georgia, it is my will and desire that the same be allotted as equitably as possible in the judgment of said Trustees, to the University at Athens, and to each one of the three mentioned branches of the University of Georgia. The corpus of said trust fund bequeathed to the Trustees of the University shall, whenever changed from the original securities in which invested and delivered to said Trustees by my Executor, be invested in bonds of the State of Georgia, or any subdivision thereof. It is my desire, without in any way making my wish obligatory upon said Trustees of the University of Georgia, that students resident of Columbus, Georgia, shall have the preference

in the use of said trust fund, and next thereafter students resident of the section of Georgia in which Columbus is located, and lastly, students resident in other sections of Georgia; and it is further my desire, that said Trustees lend the income of said trust fund to worthy students and take from them interest bearing notes, payable on easy terms, since it is my opinion that such a method of assisting students by loans is better adapted to the formation of character than to make absolute gifts to such Wherein said Trustees of the University of Georgia students. may lend the income of the trust property to worthy students, the interest and income of such loans shall be added to, and become a part of the corpus of the trust. It is my will that the fund and property herein bequeathed to the Trustees of the University of Georgia shall be known as the Thomas E. Mitchell Educational Fund of the University of Georgia."

Dear Marion:

I received this morning a request from Chancellor Weltner to furnish you with that portion of the will of Dr. Thomas E. Mitchell relating to the scholarship fund, the income from which went to the Georgia State Teachers College.

I am enclosing that item of the will as requested. Under the direction of the Board of Trustees, the income from this trust was apportioned one-fourth each to the Georgia School of Technology, the Georgia State College for Women, the University proper, and the State Normal School. The loans were made by the Trustees of each school. In the case of the State Normal School, later on the Georgia State Teachers College, the loans were approved by the Trustees of that institution and on the delivery of the students' notes to me as Treasurer I issued to the school the money to cover the notes. The repayments when they were made were credited principal and interest to the Georgia State Teachers College Mitchell Fund, so that as they accumulated they would be invested and the interest therefrom would be added to the one-fourth distributed from the parent fund. This is in line with the Brown Fund idea that all principal and interest be added to the corpus of the fund so that where the borrowers in one institution pay back more promptly than in another that institution would get a corresponding benefit from the income on its own repayments.

I thought I would give you these side facts as you might wish them in studying the question you have in hand.

Dear Philip:

I enclose a letter to me from Mr. Reed enclosing a copy of item 10-a of the will of Dr. Thos. E. Mitchell.

The language of this will in my opinion clarifies and simplifies the problem heretofore propounded. The following is my construction of the item:

lst: The principal of the trust fund, together with such accumulations as may be added to the principal, constitutes one trust fund. The apportionment of the fund referred to in Mr. Reed's letter should be regarded as a step taken for administrative convenience only and not as effecting a legal severance of a portion of the fund.

2nd: The will requires that the net income be used according to the judgment of the trustees in aiding students at four designated institutions. This income is to be allotted as equitably as possible in the judgment of the trustees to students at these four institutions. One of the designated institutions has ceased to exist. The trustees will, therefore, have a certain income which they are obligated to allot to students at the other three designated institutions, the allotment to be as equitably as possible. In my opinion the trustees would not be authorized to allot any part of the income to students elsewhere.

Had Dr. Mitchell known that other branches of the University would be established, or that one of the branches designated by him would be discontinued, it is entirely possible he might have made other provisions. I do not think we are at liberty to speculate about this or to attempt by construction to rewrite wills.

It is a beautiful piece of long leaf pine, and with grass sod taking the place of wiregrass sorub there, it would greatly enhance the looks of our campus.
