

I sincerely hope that you will be able to return to Valdosta before our State Primary which will be held on September 11th. I need your valuable help in my race.


You recall my work in behalf of the college here while in the General Assembly. You recall the appropriation I got through in behalf of the college grounds paving, and my assistance in other respects.

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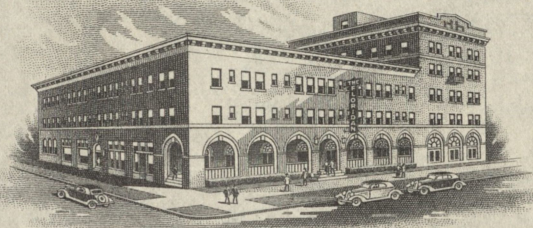




