I am sorry not to have written to you before now relative to your request for information about the birth date of Joaquin Miller.

Perhaps in an effort to minimize the escapades of his youth on the ples that he was scarcely more than a child, Joaquin chose 1841 or 1842 as good years in which to have been born!

The late George Melvin Miller, the youngest of the boys, was born in 1852. Some years ago, he wrote me that he thought Joaquin had been born in 1839.

Joaquin's boyhood diary, which was in the possession of a Mrs. Cook in San Francisco in 1929, carried the following entry on June 15, 1856:

There is a great deal of evidence to support this earlier date, and I think it is correct.

You will notice two other things, --- that Joaquin, always a bad speller, could not, even at nineteen, spell his first name. However, he did know that his middle name was Hiner! (As you perhaps know, good Dr. Hiner brought Joaquin into the world).

Please don't be misled by anything that Juanita or Mrs. Miller may tell you about the Poet of the Sierras! By the way, is Mrs. Miller still living?

I shall appreciate it if you will tell me where Miller's diary is. I suppose it is the same one from which I quoted.
