

We know the fine type of young woman who has always attended Georgia State Womans College and we hope that Miss Savage was able to interest some of them not only in our country's tremendous present wartime need for more nurses, but also in our equally urgent postwar need for nursing leaders. Because of the heavy responsibilities which they must be prepared to assume, we know that such leadership will come largely from the college prepared group; and we are counting heavily on Georgia State Womans College sending some of its best young women to collegiate schools of nursing for further study during the next few years. In turn, we believe that no profession for women will have greater opportunities for a satisfying career to offer them, than has nursing.

The National Research Council is making an important educational survey in biology, agriculture and chemistry for agencies in top policy making positions. Because of the lack of standardized organization in these fields, the Office of Scientific Personnel is asking that you distribute the appropriate blanks to the deans and department heads concerned.

Mrs. Jane McConnell has told us of her visit to the Georgia State Woman's College and of your part in making her stay a pleasant one.





Before Dr. Reade left on his vacation he asked me to write to you and to accept item seven (7) of your proposition submitted in your letter of February 9, 1937; with reference to the rental and use of a part of your residence and reading as follows:

"I agree to rent the lower portion (or first floor) of my house, as at present, and also the building adjacent, which is now occupied as a music studio, for a monthly rental of \$45.00 per month".

In consideration of this offer and its acceptance, and in view of the fact that our budget year has been advanced two months to begin July 1, 1937 and end June 30, 1938, we are willing to begin this contract on July 1, 1937 provided you are willing to incorporate the phrase "by the year" after the word "rent" in the above offer. We merely wish to protect our occupancy of the dwelling for the full year and to give you the advantage of rental income for the two months (July and August, 1937) when the house will not be occupied by the college except for storing pianos and other furniture now in it.


