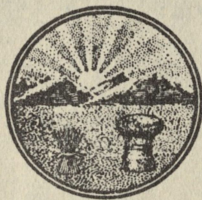
If the enclosed isn't grounds enough to sue the Atlanta Constitution for the three million dollars you need at Oglethorpe, then what is?!

Dear Max:

Please express to the city council our gratitude for the azaleas which Mr. Drexel has been permitted to give us from the city nurseries. These plants will do much to beautify our campus back of Senior Hall and around the swimming pool.

On numerous occasions, citizens of Valdosta have talked with me about the possibility of further beautifying our south woods as a sort of continuation of Brookwood Park. For several years past, we have set up certain funds for this purpose, but what with our state appropriations having been drastically cut, it has been necessary for us to use this money for what are commonly called the necessities of life.

Until such time as the college is in a position to do extensive planting in the south woods, it may be that the city council from time to time would wish to have Mr. Drexel plant some of his surplus azaleas and flowering shrubs in these woods. Such planting would not only be appreciated by the college but might also be good "advertising" for the city.
