To the Members of AACRAO:-

On April 30, 1948 the Committee on Revision of the Constitution and By-Laws mailed a letter and copy of the Constitution to each member of the Association and requested suggestions for changes. A considerable number of suggestions were received. The suggested changes were reviewed by the committee, and a progress report was made to the Executive Committee of the Association. This progress report was reviewed and considered by the Executive Committee at their Cincinnati meeting held in November, 1948.

The Executive Committee reported back to the Committee on Revision with certain recommendations on the suggested proposed revisions. The Executive Committee urged early consideration of a change in name of the Association, basing their recommendation on reports revealing to the Executive Committee that a considerable number of college admissions officers had a feeling that they did not properly belong to an association composed only of registrars.

After careful consideration of this matter, the Committee on Revision made a definite recommendation at the Columbus meeting of the Association that the name of the Association be changed to the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers. This recommendation was approved by the necessary vote of the Association in accordance with the Constitution.

The Committee on Revision held several meetings at the Columbus Convention and conferred with the Executive Committee relative to certain proposed revisions. A brief progress report was made to the Association at the Business Session on Thursday morning, April 28, 1949. A statement was made at that time that the entire membership of the Association would again be asked to review the proposed changes and send comments and suggestions to the Chairman of the Revision Committee as early as practicable so that the Committee on Revision could again make a progress report to the Executive Committee for its consideration at the fall meeting of the committee in October or November, 1949. We are, therefore, placing in your hands the proposed revision unanimously approved by the Committee on Revision and urge each member of the Association to send comments on the proposed changes, as early as practicable, to the Chairman,

Upon receipt of these comments the Committee on Revision will then reconsider the proposed changes in the light of suggestions received and will forward a report to the Executive Committee for review before finally submitting the proposed changes to the Association for final action at the San Francisco meeting in April, 1950.

OLD CONSTITUTION OF THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGIATE REGISTRARS

ARTICLE I-NAME

The name of the organization shall be the American Association of Collegiate Registrars (hereafter referred to as the A.A.C.R.)

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

The purpose of this Association shall be to provide by means of annual conferences and otherwise, for the spread of information on problems of common interest to its members, and to contribute to the advancement of education in America.

ARTICLE III-MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Active Membership. Any officer charged with the duty of registration, or of passing upon entrance credentials, or of recording the standing of students in any recognized institution of higher learning in the United States or in Canada, shall be eligible to active membership. It is understood that membership is either institutional or personal and that in institutions where there are two or more co-ordinate officers in charge of the duties referred to above, each such officer may become an active member.

Section 2. Associate Membership. Subordinate members of the staff of any officer qualified for active membership may be enrolled as associate, nonvoting members of the Association.

Section 3. Honorary Membership. Honorary membership may be recommended by any member of the Association to the Executive Committee. Election to honorary membership will rest with the Executive Committee, but only those who continue in some educational work, or who are retiring from active service, and only those who have been in the profession long enough, or who have been sufficiently active in the Association to warrant the assumption that they are interested in the Association's progress will be elected by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a secretary, a treasurer, and an editor. All officers, except the editor, shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, a majority vote of those present and voting being necessary to elect. The editor shall be appointed by the Executive Committee. With the exception of the treasurer, they shall hold office from the adjournment of the meeting at which they are elected until the adjournment of the meeting at which their successors are elected. The treasurer shall hold office from the beginning of the fiscal year following his election until the close of the fiscal year in which his successor is elected.

Section 2. The officers named in Section 1, together with the immediate past president, the chairman of the Committee on Special Projects, and the chairman of the Committee on Regional Associations, shall constitute an Executive Committee, with power to fix the time and place of the next annual meeting as provided in the by-laws, to assist the president in arranging the program, and to make other necessary arrangements.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION OF THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGIATE REGISTRARS AND ADMISSIONS OFFICERS

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of the organization shall be the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers (hereafter referred to as the A.A.C.R.A.O.).

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Association shall be to promote the advancement of higher education in its fullest and broadest implications.

Section 1. This organization shall aim specifically to advance and professionalize the office or offices of admissions, registration, and records as established and authorized particularly in our member institutions as well as in other institutions worthily serving the cause of higher education. Any auxiliary educational activity directed toward the attainment of this aim is within the purpose of this Association. It is not an accrediting agency.

Section 2. Among the activities severally accepted and understood to be within the established authority and jurisdiction of this Association for the fulfillment of these purposes and aims are the following: (a) the holding of annual conferences or conventions, (b) the publication of regular or special bulletins, (c) the promotion of affiliated associations of regional jurisdiction, (d) the sponsoring of area meetings, (e) the conducting of co-operative investigations, studies, and surveys, either on the initiative of this Association or in joint responsibility with other organizations of similar general purpose, and (f) the dissemination of information on problems of common interest to its members.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Membership is institutional. Any institution of higher learning in the United States officially recognized by the U. S. Office of Education, or any institution in any other country approved by the Executive Committee of A.A.C.R.A.O. is eligible for membership. Membership entitles the institution to one vote, to one subscription to College and University, and to one copy each of other publications of the Association. Each member institution is entitled to be represented by one individual who is responsible for admissions or registration or records. In institutions where more than one officer is responsible for these duties, each additional officer may become affiliated with the Association upon payment of a fee, be listed under the institutional membership, and receive the publications of the Association. The administrative head of the institution may designate the voting representative.

Section 2. Separate divisions of colleges and universities of complex organization recognized and administered as independent or semiautonomous institutions (except for restrictions imposed by law or charter) may be considered institutions within the meaning of this article, as determined by the Executive Committee, and each of these divisions shall be eligible to membership.

Section 3. Honorary Personal Membership. Individuals may be recommended to the Executive Committee for honorary personal membership by any institutional representative listed by the Association. Election to honorary personal membership will rest with the Executive Committee, but only those who continue in some educational work, who are retiring from active service, who have been in the profession long enough, or who have been sufficiently active in the Association to warrant the assumption that they are interested in the Association's progress will be elected by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a secretary, a treasurer, and an editor. All officers, except the editor, shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, a majority vote of those present and voting being necessary to elect. The editor shall be appointed by the Executive Committee. With the exception of the treasurer, they shall hold office from the adjournment of the meeting at which they are elected until the adjournment of the meeting at which their successors are elected. The treasurer shall hold office from the beginning of the fiscal year following his election until the close of the fiscal year in which his successor is elected. With the exception of the editor, no officer shall be eligible to serve more than one term consecutively in any office.

Section 2. The officers named in Section 1, together with the immediate past president, the chairman of the Committee on Special Projects, and the chairman of the Committee on Regional Associations, shall constitute an Executive Committee, with power to fix the time and place of the next annual meeting as provided in the bylaws, to assist the president in arranging the program, and to make other necessary arrangements. The Executive Committee shall conduct the business of the Association in the period between the annual meetings.

ARTICLE V-AFFILIATED REGIONAL ASSOCIATION CONFERENCE

The Affiliated Regional Association Conference (hereafter referred to as the A.R.A.C.) shall be composed of delegates from affiliated regional associations of registrars. The conference and the executive committee jointly shall have power to co-ordinate the activities of the regional associations and the A.A.C.R.

ARTICLE VI-AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to the members at least one month in advance of the meeting. An amendment not thus proposed in advance may be adopted by a four-fifths vote of the members present and voting.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I-FEES

Section 1. The annual membership fee for active members shall be \$10.00 and for associate members \$3.00. The fee shall, in both cases, include a subscription to the JOURNAL.

Section 2. Any member who shall fail to pay annual dues for two consecutive years will, after notice in writing from the treasurer, be dropped automatically from the list of members.

Section 3. There shall be a convention registration fee of two dollars (\$2.00) paid by one representative of each institution represented at the annual convention.

Section 4. There shall be no membership or registration fee for honorary members. Such members shall be given complimentary subscriptions to the JOURNAL.

ARTICLE II-MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association shall hold an annual meeting in April of each year, the location and date to be chosen by the Executive Committee, which shall also have the power to advance, postpone, or omit an annual meeting in case of emergency.

Section 2. The geographical rotation scheme for the location of

Section 2. The geographical rotation scheme for the location of meetings, as adopted at the Atlanta convention in 1927, shall be followed; provided, however, that a variation may be made in any year for good and sufficient reason by action of the Executive Committee or by vote of the Association.

ARTICLE III—TERM OF OFFICE AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The president and two vice-presidents shall hold office for one year each. The secretary and treasurer shall hold office three years each. The editor shall hold office until his successor is appointed. Should any annual meeting be omitted, or the time for it changed, the time between two consecutive meetings shall be counted as one year in the administration of the provisions of this section.

Section 2. The president shall assume full responsibility for all the general activities of the Association, conduct all necessary correspondence with the members in regard to the annual program, and, with the assistance of the Executive Committee, arrange the program. All bills must be approved by the president before payment.

Section 3. The first vice-president shall act as the chief assistant of the president, and shall succeed to that office in case it becomes vacant.

Section 4. The second vice-president shall have charge of the campaign for extending the membership of the Association. This officer, together with the president, secretary, and treasurer, shall determine eligibility for membership in the Association. He shall succeed to the presidency in case of a vacancy in both the preceding offices.

Section 5. The secretary shall keep an accurate list of the members of the Association, correcting same from time to time upon the advice of the treasurer. He shall be the custodian of the records of the Association. He shall keep the minutes of the annual meeting and of the meetings of the Executive Committee.

Section 6. In addition to the usual duties of the office, the treasurer shall collect the membership dues and shall report changes in the list of members to the president, second vice-president, secretary and editor. He shall secure the approval of the president on all bills before payment. He shall prepare an informal report to be presented to the members of the Association at the time of the annual meeting. At the close of the fiscal year, he shall make a complete formal report, audited by a certified public accountant, to be presented to the Executive Committee for publication in the next issue of the Journal. The expense of the audit shall be defrayed by the Association.

ARTICLE V. AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to the members at least one month in advance of the meeting. An amendment not thus proposed in advance may be adopted by a four-fifths vote of the members present and voting.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I. FEES

Section 1. The annual institutional membership fee shall be \$10.00. For each additional membership from a member institution the fee shall be \$3.00. Each membership fee shall include a sub-continuous to College and University

scription to College and University.

Section 2. Any member who shall fail to pay annual dues before the close of the fiscal year will, after notice of reminder in writing from the treasurer and after approval of the Executive Committee, be dropped from the list of members.

Section 3. There shall be a convention registration fee of \$2.00 paid by each person attending the convention who is listed under institutional membership, except members of the families of Association members, commercial exhibitors, and official guests.

Section 4. There shall be no membership or registration fee for honorary personal members. Such members shall be given complimentary subscriptions to *College and University*.

ARTICLE II. MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association shall hold an annual meeting in April of each year, the location and date to be chosen by the Executive Committee, which shall also have the power to advance, postpone, or omit an annual meeting in case of emergency.

Section 2. The geographical rotation scheme for the location of meetings, as adopted at the Atlanta convention in 1927, shall be followed; provided, however, that a variation may be made in any year for good and sufficient reason by action of the Executive Committee or by vote of the Association.

ARTICLE III. TERM OF OFFICE AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The president and the two vice-presidents shall hold office for one year each. The secretary and the treasurer shall hold office for three years each. The editor shall begin his term of office with the October issue of College and University and shall hold office until his successor is appointed. He shall hold office for a term of three years and shall be eligible for reappointment. Should any annual meeting be omitted, or the time for it be changed, the time between two consecutive meetings shall be counted as one year in the administration of the provisions of this section.

Section 2. The president shall assume full responsibility for all the general activities of the Association, conduct all necessary correspondence with the members in regard to the annual program, and with the assistance of the Executive Committee, arrange the program. All bills must be approved by the president before payment.

Section 3. The first vice-president shall act as the chief assistant to the president and shall succeed to that office in case it becomes

Section 4. The second vice-president shall have charge of the campaign for extending the membership of the Association. This officer, together with the president, secretary, and treasurer, shall, in doubtful cases, determine eligibility for membership in the Association. He shall succeed to the presidency in case of a vacancy in both of the preceding offices.

Section 5. The secretary shall be the custodian of the records of the Association. He shall keep the minutes of the annual meeting and of the meetings of the Executive Committee.

Section 6. In addition to the usual duties of the office, the treasurer shall keep an accurate list of the members of the Association and collect the membership dues. He shall report changes in the membership list to the president, second vice-president, and editor. He shall secure the approval of the president on all bills before payment. He shall prepare an informal report to be presented to the members of the Association at the time of the annual meeting. At the close of the fiscal year, he shall make a complete formal report, audited by a certified public accountant, to be presented to the Executive Committee for publication in the next issue of College and University. The expense of the audit shall be defrayed by the Association. The treasurer shall be bonded in an amount decided by the Executive Committee.

Section 7. The editor shall edit, publish, and distribute the JOURNAL of the Association and any other official publications issued in the name of the Association.

Section 8. The Executive Committee shall have authority be-

tween annual meetings to fill any vacancy not otherwise provided

for in this article.

ARTICLE IV—REGIONAL ASSOCIATIONS

Section 1. Any group of registrars may form a regional association, with the right to (a) determine its own constitution in accordance with local needs but in every respect consistent with the constitution of the A.A.C.R.: (b) to determine its own boundary lines with due consideration for those of existing regional associations with due consideration for those of existing regional associations with due to the consideration of the constitution of the collection of the collecti tions, and to determine its own membership of collegiate institutions or the appropriate officers thereof; (c) to elect its own officers, to conduct its meetings according to regional interests and needs, and to determine its membership fees, number of meetings, etc., except as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. Any regional association of college registrars may become affiliated with the A.A.C.R. on the following terms:

(a) The regional association shall appoint or elect an official delegate, preferably the president or a past president of that association, to the A.R.A.C.

(b) These delegates shall meet once a year with the Executive Committee of the A.A.C.R. at the time of the annual meeting of the Association to plan jointly a coordinated program of activity

for the A.A.C.R and the regional associations. (c) The regional association shall submit to the editor for publi-

cation in the Journal, subject to his approval, the program and proceedings of its annual meeting and the best papers, studies, or projects presented at each annual or other meeting.

Section 3. If feasible, regional association meetings shall be held annually, but at a time not conflicting with the national meeting.

ARTICLE V—COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be a Budget Committee consisting of the past president, who shall act as chairman, and three additional

past president, who shall act as chairman, and three additional members including the president, the president-elect, and the treasurer. Should any of these members be unable to serve, the retiring president shall appoint a substitute.

Section 2. There shall be a standing Committee on Special Projects of five or more members, appointed by the president, whose duty it shall be to supervise any special projects referred to the the description to coordinate so far as possible the to it by the Association, to co-ordinate so far as possible the activities of the Association and of individual members or groups of members in educational research, and to collect and disseminate information concerning study projects undertaken by various

Section 3. There shall be appointed by the president a Nominating Committee of five members whose duty it shall be to select nominees for the several elective offices and report to the Association on the second day of the annual meeting. At this time, opportunity shall be given for additional nominations from the floor.

Section 4. The editorial staff shall consist of the editor and nine associate editors appointed annually by the editor. The editor shall be responsible for the distribution of work among the associate editors.

Section 5. Nothing in this article shall be construed as preventing the appointment of additional standing or special committees deemed necessary for the work of the Association.

ARTICLE VI-FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Association shall extend from June 1 to May 31.

ARTICLE VII—AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority vote of the members present and voting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to the members at least one month in advance of the meeting. An amendment not thus proposed in advance may be adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting.

Section 7. The editor shall edit, publish, and distribute College and University and any other official publications issued in the name of the Association.

Section 8. The Executive Committee shall have authority between annual meetings to fill any vacancy not otherwise provided for in this article.

ARTICLE IV. REGIONAL ASSOCIATIONS

Section 1. The Association shall encourage the formation of regional associations, each with the right (a) to determine its own constitution in accordance with local needs but in every respect consistent with the constitution of the A.A.C.R.A.O.; (b) to determine its own boundary lines with due consideration for those of existing regional associations, and to determine its own membership of collegiate institutions or the appropriate officers thereof; (c) to elect its own officers, to conduct its meetings according to regional interests and needs, and to determine its membership fees, number of meetings, etc., except as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. Regional associations are encouraged to become affiliated with the A.A.C.R.A.O. and to submit to the editor for publication in *College and University*, subject to his approval, the program and proceedings of its annual meeting and such papers, studies, or projects as will be of general interest.

ARTICLE V. COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be a Budget Committee consisting of the past president, who shall act as chairman, the retiring president, the incoming president, and the treasurer. Should any of these members be unable to serve, the retiring president shall appoint

Section 2. There shall be a standing Committee on Special Projects of five or more members, each member to be appointed by the president for a term of three years, whose duty it shall be to supervise any special projects referred to it by the Association, to co-ordinate so far as possible the activities of the Association and of individuals or groups of individuals in educational research, and to collect and disseminate information concerning study projects undertaken by various individuals.

Section 3. There shall be a standing Committee on Regional Associations whose duty it shall be to advise and to co-ordinate the work of the regional associations. Its membership shall be

determined and be appointed by the president.

Section 4. The chairman of the Committee on Special Projects and the chairman of the Committee on Regional Associations shall be appointed by the president for a term of three years, and they shall be eligible for reappointment for a second term of three years.

Section 5. There shall be appointed by the president a Nominating Committee of five members, two of whom shall be members of the Nominating Committee of the previous year, whose duty it shall be to select nominees for the several elective offices and to report to the Association on the second day of the annual meeting. At this time, opportunity shall be given for additional nominations from the floor.

Section 6. The editorial staff shall consist of the editor and nine associate editors appointed annually by the editor. The editor shall be responsible for the distribution of work among the associate

Section 7. The president shall be ex officio a member of all com-

mittees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 8. Nothing in this article shall be construed as preventing the appointment of additional standing or special committees deemed necessary for the work of the Association.

ARTICLE VI. FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Association shall extend from June 1 to May 31.

ARTICLE VII. AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority vote of the members present and voting, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to the members at least one month in advance of the meeting. An amendment not thus proposed in advance may be adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting.

MEETING OF THE SOUTHERN ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY REGISTRARS Louisville, Kentucky, December 1, 1947 The Southern Association of College and University Registrars met in the Derby Room of the Brown Hotel, Louisville, Kentucky, at 2:30 p.m., Monday, December 1, 1947. Sixty-one persons were present, representing 53 institutions in 10 states of the southern area. A list of those attending, by states and institutions, is appended. The meeting was called to order by the President, Mr. Lloyd Chapin, Registrar of Georgia School of Technology. Mr. Chapin reviewed briefly the history of the organization, which was formed in Memphis, Tennessee, in December, 1941, by registrars then attending the meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. He stated that he would like to reverse the usual order and begin with an item of business; namely, the adoption of a constitution and by-laws. He presented Mr. John G. Kelly of Winthrop College, Chairman of the committee which had prepared the constitution and by-laws and submitted it to the members for consideration prior to the meeting. Each article was considered, discussed, and voted upon individually. Then the entire constitution and by-laws, as amended, was put to vote and adopted unanimously, as follows: CONSTITUTION OFTHE SOUTHERN ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY REGISTRARS Article I. Name The name of the organization shall be the Southern Association of College and University Registrars. Article II. Purposes The purposes of this association shall be to provide, by means of annual conferences and otherwise, for the spread of information and the interchange of ideas on problems of common interest; to contribute to the advancement of education; to foster a friendly spirit of unity and cooperation among its members; and to promote a spirit of professional pride in the work of the registrar. Article III. Membership Section 1. Institutional Membership. Any recognized institution of higher education shall, upon payment of annual dues, be eligible for institutional membership, which shall automatically provide individual membership for one person from that institution. Section 2. Individual Membership. Any officer of a member institution charged with the duty of registration or of passing upon entrance credentials or of recording the standings of students may, upon payment of annual dues, become an individual member.

Section 3. Any institutional member or individual member failing to pay the annual dues for two successive years will, after notice in writing from the Treasurer, be dropped automatically from the list of members. Upon payment of one dollar (\$1.00), in addition to the dues of the current year, any member thus dropped may be reinstated. Section 4. The executive committee is empowered to investigate each application for institutional membership, and to review at any time a member's right to hold membership. Article IV. Officers Section 1. The officers of this association shall be a president, a vice-president, and a secretary-treasurer. Section 2. The vice-president shall be elected by ballot at each annual meeting, a majority of those present and voting being necessary to election. He shall hold office from the adjournment of the meeting at which he is elected until the adjournment of the next annual meeting. Section 3. The vice-president shall automatically succeed to the office of the president. Section 4. The secretary-treasurer shall be elected by ballot, a majority of those present and voting being necessary to elect. He shall be elected for a term of three years, and may not succeed himself. Section 5. If a vacancy occurs in an office, it shall be filled, until the next meeting, by the executive committee, Section 6. Duties of Officers. (a) It shall be the duty of the president to assume full responsibility for all the general activities of the Association; to conduct all necessary correspondence with the members in regard to the annual program; and, with the assistance of the executive committee, to arrange the program. He shall refer to an auditing committee the annual report of the treasurer. In case the office of the president becomes vacant, the order of succession shall be the usual one, (b) The vice-president shall perform all the duties of the president in the absence of that officer. (c) The secretary-treasurer shall keep an accurate list of the members of the Association; shall be the custodian of the records of the Association; shall be responsible for keeping the minutes of the annual meeting, and for submitting selectel material from the programs to the editor of the Journal of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars; shall have in charge the preparation and distribution of the proceedings of the annual meeting; and shall keep the minutes of meetings of the executive committee. He, as treasurer, shall collect the membership dues, and shall make an annual report at the annual meeting, this report having been first submitted to the executive committee.

Article V. Executive Committee The officers of the Association shall constitute an executive committee with power to fix the time and place of the next annual meeting, to assist the president in arranging the program and in making other necessary arrangements, and shall have power and authority over the affairs of the Association during the interim between its meetings. Article VI. Amendments This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a twothirds vote of the members present and voting, provided the substance of the proposed amendment shall have been submitted in the call for the meeting, or at the previous meeting. BY * LAWS Article I. Meetings Section 1. The annual meeting of the Association shall be held at a time and place to be fixed by the executive committee after discussion by the members at the previous annual meeting. Section 2. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the executive committee. Article II. Dues Section 1. Annual dues for each institutional member shall be five dollars (\$5.00), payable on or before October 15. Section 2. Annual dues for each individual member shall be one dollar (\$1.00), payable on or before October 15. Article III. Committees Section 1. A nominating committee of three members shall be appointed by the president for each annual meeting. Section 2. A committee on registration and introductions shall be appointed by the president for each annual meeting. Section 3. A committee on resolutions shall be appointed by the president for each annual meeting. Section 4. An auditing committee shall be appointed by the president for each annual meeting. This committee shall audit the treasurer's books for the preceding year. Section 5. Such other committees as seem necessary for the welfare of the Association may be appointed by the President.

Article IV. Amendment

These by-laws may be amended by majority vote at any meeting, provided the substance of the proposed amendment shall have been submitted in writing to the executive committee prior to the first session of the meeting. The executive committee shall present such proposals to the Association at the first session of the meeting.

President Chapin introduced Mr. G. E. Metz, of Clemson College, who discussed the question of transcript forms, with a view to promoting more uniformity in the items to be included in a transcript of credits. Mr. Metz read from a set of standards which had been adopted by the American Association of Collegiate Registrars, and asked, as each standard was read, for a show of hands indicating the policies of those present. The presentation of this matter was followed by a general discussion of policies with respect to transcripts. It was suggested that a project for the registrars in this regional association might be a further study of the subject, with a possible view to offering suggestions for changes to the national association.

The President called for a report from the Nominating Committee. The chairman of the committee, Mr. R. F. Thomason, of the University of Tennessee, presented the following nominations: For President, Lloyd Chapin, Registrar of Georgia School of Technology; for Vice President, William H. Vaughan, Registrar of George Peabody College for Teachers; and for Secretary-Treasurer, Maple Moores, Assistant Registrar of the University of Kentucky. President Chapin then asked Mr. Kelly to take the chair and conduct the election. Mr. Kelly called for nominations from the floor, upon which a motion was made and seconded that the report of the Nominating Committee be accepted. When put to a vote, the motion was carried unanimously and the persons named by the committee were declared elected.

President Chapin called attention to the next meeting of the National Association in Philadelphia, April 19-22, and expressed the hope that all present would plan to attend.

The meeting was adjourned.

Members of the Association are requested to fill out the accompanying forms as fully as their records permit and return them not later than October 25, 1947.

Duplicate copies of both forms are included. The duplicates are for your own files and will be of value to you when compiling this report for your institution next year.

Please do not send pages from published reports or fail to fill in the totals where called for. If each member of the Association will undertake to see that the forms for his or her institution are complete it will facilitate the publication of the report, prevent unnecessary errors in interpretations, and save the Association expense in assembling data.

Classification of Institutions.—Be sure to check the essential items at the head of both forms so that your data will be included in the proper group. 

SPECIAL NOTE: An attempt will be made this year to break down the enrolment figures into two main groups: I, Civilian students, and II, Service Units. This is important for the following reasons:

- 1. Civilian enrolment will show what has happened to the institution in comparison with the preceding year, so far as the usual type of student is concerned.
- 2. Enrolment in service units will indicate the part the institution is taking in the training programs of the armed services, as a substitute for its usual academic instruction.
- 3. The two groups need to be presented separately because of the varying lengths of attendance involved in the work given to armed service units.

DEFINITIONS: Civilian enrolment (items 1-25), along with regular students, should include members of the various army, navy, and marine corps still on inactive duty and attending regular college classes.

Service units (items 26-30) will include those groups which are using both the physical and instructional services of the institution, and should exclude those groups using only the institution's physical facilities, with all instruction given by the service personnel. Included will be the Army Specialized Training Program, the Navy College Training Program, and a miscellaneous assortment of military and naval units on various educational levels such as Meteorology A, B, and C programs, Pre-radar groups, Army Air Force College programs, WAC and WAVE programs, and specialized short courses of various kinds.

Curricula.—The more common curricula are listed. However, it is expected that each institution will report its enrolments in accord with its own administrative organization. The Committee requests that modifications of the printed headings be indicated in such a way that there may be no danger of misrepresenting the situation for individual institutions in the final compilation.

Institutions such as liberal arts colleges unless they normally segregate their enrolments should report their total enrolment under "Liberal Arts": if definite enrolments in music, art, and other curricula are recognized by the college, they may be reported separately.

Similarly it is expected that as a rule all enrolments in junior colleges will be reported as "liberal arts, pre-professional and general," unless definitely organized technical curricula are offered by the junior college concerned.

In the case of Normal Schools and Teachers Colleges the same principle would obtain, namely in general all students preparing for the teaching profession should be reported under "Education." GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

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FORM A

Curricula.—The more common curricula are listed. However, it is expected that each institution will report its enrolments in accord with its own administrative organization. The Committee requests that modifications of the printed headings be indicated in such a way that there may be no danger of misrepresenting the situation for individual institutions in the final compilation.

Institutions such as liberal arts colleges unless they normally segregate their enrolments may report their total enrolment under "Liberal Arts": if definite enrolments in music, art, and other curricula are recognized by the college, they may be reported separately.

Similarly it is expected that as a rule all enrolment in junior colleges will be reported as "liberal arts, pre-professional and general," unless definitely organized technical curricula are offered by the junior college concerned.

In the case of Normal Schools and Teachers Colleges the same principle would obtain, namely in general all students preparing for the teaching profession should be reported under "Education." This item should include all physical education, religious education and other special education students. If, in addition, regular junior college work is offered as a distinct curriculum, registrants in that field should be reported as "Liberal Arts."

It is not necessary to separate students in these institutions on the basis of major fields unless definite and distinct curricula are offered.

In general, pre-medical, pre-legal, and other pre-professional students should be reported in item 13.

Item 26—"Graduate"—Include registrations for advanced degrees—not students in undergraduate and professional curricula with first degrees unless the local plan of reporting includes such students in the graduate school.

Item 27—Net total. Give here the total number of individuals enrolled for the college year (excluding duplicate enrolments and excluding those covered by items 28 to 31.)

Item 28—Note that the data for the summer session preceding the college year with which it is reported is called for.

Item 29—Under "Extension" include evening and part time students whether their class work is on the campus or not. Special or unclassed students carrying less than a full load, in classes regularly arranged for full time students, however, may be reported in items 1 to 26. No distinction need be made between students who have and who have not met the requirements for admission to the regular work of the institution.

Sub-collegiate—Include only enrolments of such students as are enrolled in an integral part of the institution. Practice schools, schools in Agriculture, etc., may be included. Extension students and correspondence study students should be included under those headings respectively even though they may not have fully met the institution entrance requirements.

Item 32.—This is a net total of all individuals for the year, excluding all duplicates. If this figure can not be furnished please indicate that fact.

FORM B

Note that two bases of classification are indicated: horizontally, according to type of degree and vertically by major fields.

The first five columns refer to 1935 degrees only, and should include all degrees awarded during the academic year 1934-35. For 1934 corresponding totals only are requested for comparison.

If the classification by major fields can not be furnished, the totals should be entered as item 9.

In cases where a part of the degrees can be classified by major fields, the balance may enter as item 7.

In institutions in which students graduate with more than one major, adequate explanation should be appended to permit the subtraction of the correct number of duplicates in such comparisons as may be made in assembling the data.

Item 10—This refers to certificates of less than baccalaureate grade, such as junior college diplomas, extension certificates, two year teachers college diplomas, etc. It does not refer to certificates in music, art, teaching, etc., issued in conjunction with four year and higher degrees, nor to sub-collegiate diplomas.





An Adequate Transcript Guide For Registrars

At a meeting of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars in Chicago, April 1942, the Committee on Special Projects announced the appointment of a subcommittee to improve the adequacy of college records and transcripts in the colleges and universities of the United States and Canada.

The committee selected the following 25 items of information as essential for an adequate transcript of a student's record. Selection of the 25 essential items was based on custom, previous investigations, but more directly on recent research in which many registrars cooperated.1

Essential Items

- 1. Name of student (in full)
- 2. Home or present mailing address of student
- 3. Name of college or university
- 4. Location of college or university
- 5. Basis of admission including name of secondary school and its location - date of grad. not necessary
- 6. Length of quarter, term, or semester
- 17. Institutional load per term credits reg, yor grad. 8. Explanation of grading system
- 9. Credit column clearly indicated . 10. Designation (name) of credit unit
- -11. Definition of credit unit
- 12. Dates of college attendance
- 13. Curriculum pursued, or college or school within institution
- 14. Course or catalogue number
- 15. Descriptive title of each course
- 16. Grades
- 17. Clear designation of transfer credit
- 18. Extension, correspondence and similar courses clearly identified
- 19. Number of hours required for graduation
- 20. Statement of graduation
- 21. Statement of academic status
- -22. Certificate of honorable dismissal
- 23. Signature of proper official
- 24. Institutional seal
- 25. General legibility and clearness of nomenclature

The deficiencies of current transcripts are revealed when comparisons of our records are made with these 25 essential items. Important items are omitted with high frequency such as hours required for graduation, value of the credit unit and descriptive titles of courses.

In order to bring about the desired improvement in transcripts each registrar is requested to refer to the 25 items outlined on the preceding page and to give his special attention to the following points:

- 1. Check one of his completed transcripts (including accompanying statement or supplement) to make certain that each of the 25 essential items is included.
- 2. Please add to the transcript or the supplement all items which have been omitted.
- 3. Please include descriptive titles of courses in every transcript, or list course titles on a separate form to accompany the transcript if student's permanent record card does not include this important item.
- 4. Please follow the "Guide" in any future revisions of student's permanent record, transcript or supplementary statement.

Omission of essential items often is due to an assumption that one's own transcript is complete and adequate. The committee believes that every registrar will want to make necessary changes as suggested. Cooperation of regional associations and all registrars is earnestly solicited by the committee.
