- Line 3 "Number of Veteran Students Drawing Public Laws 16 and 346 Benefits" This includes all students reported in Line 1 who are drawing G.I.
 benefits under Public Laws 346 and 16.
- Line 4 "Will you accept additional applications from qualified students for entrance next semester or term" Please indicate by checking the appropriate item the group from which you will accept students next semester or term, i.e., Veterans or Non-veterans. If you do not anticipate accepting any students, check "None".

Dear Miss Schmidt:

Thank you for your letter of October 23, calling attention to omissions in our report. Giving this information in order:-

- 1. Requirements, for admission: For freshmen, a one week orientation course of general nature at the beginning of term; also, one hour a week for six weeks in the use of the library.
- 2. Requirements, for degree: The final year must be apent in residence. A major of from 40-50 quarter hours and a minor of 30 or 35 quarter hours. Eleven constants required in the junior college, exclusive of physical education. Three additional courses in each of the three divisions of study (see catalogue, page 23), partly met by major and minor. One modern fereign language.
- 3. Enrollment: No single number would be representative because of the three phases of the institution during its history; first, a normal school, se ond, a teachers college, and third, a liberal arts college with no teacher training features.
- 4. Library: We have many government documents in our library, but because of lack of space, these have never been catalogued. A library building is under construction at the present time, and by this time next year we will doubtless have room for everything!
- 5. Student Aid: \$2500 is the total amount available for student loans, and is lent over and over, the amount varying each year according to how well repayments come in. (This amount, though small, goes a long way. Total expenses for a year -- including board, etc. -- amount to only \$300. The average loan is about \$75, though some students borrow as much as \$150. Repayments are prompt.)


