

PRESS BOX

Cleveland Field, the football home of Valdosta State's Blazers, is topped on the south side by a two-level press box with adequate seating on the lower level for about 12 writers. Broadcasters, film crews and photographers use the upper level which is accessible only by ladder type steps.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Standard services are provided for media personnel — flip cards, cumulative statistics, media guides, programs, play by play accounts at the conclusion of each quarter, abbreviated statistics at halftime and complete final statistics as soon as possible at the end of the game. Ample telephone and fax service is available. Soft drinks and a snack will be served.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Contact Steve Roberts, SID, for press passes as far in advance as possible. Passes will be mailed if time permits. If not, they will be left at the Will Call table at the southeast corner of Cleveland Field. The passes will be at the Will Call table an hour and a half before kickoff.

MEDIA PARKING

Parking for the media is available in a lot adjacent the southeast gate at Cleveland Field. Parking passes will be mailed with credentials.

RADIO

Valdosta State has a radio booth for the originating station for the Blazer Football network. A modular plug phone line is provided the official broadcast team of the opponent for each game. The visiting radio crew should obtain permission and credentials in

advance from Steve Roberts, SID. Gulf South Conference opponents are provided the phone line at no charge. Other opponents are charged a \$50 fee. The visiting radio phone number as well as a trouble number will be given on request.

SCOUTS

Requests for scouting credentials should be made directly to Steve Roberts, SID, early during the week of the game to be scouted.

OFFICES

Offices of all football coaches are located in the old gymnasium, which also houses the football fieldhouse. All other athletic offices, including the sports information and ticket offices, are located in the physical education complex.






West Hall, located in the center of Valdosta State University's main campus, houses the offices of the president and vice president for academic affairs as well as severui academic departments.

Dr. Hugh C. Bailey

Valdosta State University has firmly established itself as one of the state's leading institutions of higher learning since Dr. Hugh C. Bailey became the school's sixth president on July 1, 1978.

He worked tirelessly for many years to make Valdosta State the hallmark institution of higher education in the south Georgia region, and his efforts were realized July 1, 1993 when Valdosta State officially became the state's second regional university.

The Berry, Ala., native firmly believes in academic excellence and athletic excellence and has added programs in both areas to further

enhance the attractiveness of Valdosta State to prospective students. In his 19-year tenure, enrollment has steadily increased as Valdosta State continues to serve students in the 41-county south Georgia area as well as other sections of the state, the United States and many foreign countries.

Dr. Bailey considers athletics to be an integral part of the total picture of Valdosta State and stays completely informed concerning developments in the entire athletic program. He promoted the initiation of a football program at VSC 13 years ago, and when it was overwhelmingly approved by student referendum he gave it his full support.

Dr. Bailey came to Valdosta State from Francis Marion College in Florence, S.C., where he was vice president for academic affairs and dean of the college. He went to Francis Marion from Samford University in Birmingham where he joined the faculty of the Department of History and Political Science in 1953. He was at Samford for 22 years, the last five as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences

He earned the A.B. degree from Samford in 1950 and his master's and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Alabama in 1951 and 1954 respectively. He is a member of numerous civic and professional organizations and has published more than 25 articles in various professional journals. He is also the author of six books.

Dr. Bailey is married to the former Ahleida Joan Seever of Mobile, Ala., and has two daughters, Debra Jane Helwig, a graduate of the University of Georgia, and Laura Joan Singletary, a graduate of Florida State University.



ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Herb Reinhard

Valdosta State University athletics has made a major impact on the national level in the six years since Herb Reinhard took charge of the now 11-sport Division II program. Reinhard joined the Valdosta State athletic family in December 1991, coming from Florida A&M University where he was assistant athletic director in charge of marketing and promotions.

In 1996-97, the personable Winter Park, Fla., native directed a superbly well-balanced program which won the all-sports trophies in the Gulf South Conference for both men's and women's sports, a feat accomplished by only one other school in the league's 26-year history. In addition, two VSU student-athletes -- women's basketball's Kathy Kennedy and football's Lance Funderburk -- won the conference's Commissioner Trophy, the highest individual honor awarded by the GSC.

"I am pleased with our accomplishments over the past six years, but we must remember how we reached this point," Reinhard said. "It will be necessary to push even harder in the next decade if we are to keep this program at its current level of success. We want to give all our coaches every possible chance to be successful, and

that takes a lot of commitment not only from our staff but from this and surrounding communities.

"I am very thankful that the community involvement has continued to grow. We have a lot of plans on the board which will need that involvement. For our part, we pledge to continue putting exciting and winning teams on the fields and courts."

Reinhard, 40, spent much of his first 30 months on the job turning potential supporters of VSU athletics into active supporters of the program. The list of corporate sponsorships is nearing 100, and his aggressive season ticket campaign for football, basketball, baseball and volleyball



has paid dividends. In the last year, Reinhard has worked to improve VSU's athletic facilities, overseeing a \$750,000 baseball fieldhouse project which was completed last May.


"We have made some inroads, but we still have miles to go. We must continue to present an exciting, appealing product which people want to come out to see. We have so much to offer the south Georgia-north Florida area in the way of entertainment and education. I feel very fortunate to be a part of this institution, which is making an even larger impact on the quality of life for this region."

Reinhard has an undergraduate degree in business from Florida A&M, where he was a two-time all-conference placekicker, and a master's degree in sports administration from Florida State. He began his career at Florida A&M in 1979 where he was women's sports information director for six years before taking over athletic marketing and development in 1986. He was promoted to assistant athletic director in 1990. He was elected to the Florida A&M Sports Hall of Fame in 1993.

Reinhard is married, and he and his wife Linda have a son, Herb IV, 7, and a daughter, Rebecca Joy, 4.

BLAZER HEAD COACH

Mike Kelly

Camelot? As far as Mike Kelly is concerned, he's found it at Valdosta State University.

Kelly, 39, has spent his life preparing for the opportunity to be a head coach at the collegiate level. It began as "a little kid" growing up as a coach's son in Connecticut. "From the time I was about 8 years old, this is the only thing I've ever wanted to do. Everything I've done in my life from the time I started playing organized contact football in Greenwood, S.C., in 1969 has been to some day be a head coach."

The fifth head coach in Valdosta State's 15year football history, Kelly is arguably the best prepared of his four predecessors, building an extensive and impressive background at both the collegiate and professional level. He comes to VSU from Winnipeg of the Canadian Football League where he was offensive coordinator the last five years. Each of those teams reached the CFL playoffs, three won regular season conference titles and two played for the Grey Cup championship.

Kelly last coached at the collegiate level at San Francisco State where he was associate head coach for the 1990 and 1991 seasons. Other experience was gained at Capital (Ohio) University, Ohio Wesleyan University, Marietta (Ohio) College, Edinboro University and


Ridgedale High School in Morral, Ohio.

Born in Connecticut, he finished high school in Muncie, Ind., before going to Bluffton (Ohio) College where he was a three-year letterman at quarterback. He has a physical education degree from Bluffton and did further undergraduate work at Ohio State before earning a master of

education degree in secondary school administration from Edinboro in 1983.

"I'm tremendously excited about this opportunity," said Kelly, who began his coaching career in 1980 after graduating from Bluffton College in Ohio. "I have wanted to return to the college ranks, and to get what is considered one of the best Division II jobs in the country is very gratifying.

"While I consider it a very high honor to be chosen to lead this outstanding program, it is something I also expected to happen. I very much believe I am ready for this job. I have been groomed for it under a lot of outstanding head coaches. I've been exposed to the positive and negative, and I hope I've filed away the best things to bring to this program. I've always felt I've had to prove myself in



everything I do, and I'm ready to prove myself now."

To that end, Kelly has assembled what he believes to be a quality staff from top to bottom. "I'm very pleased we were able to attract the type of individuals we now have on this staff. We have revamped the staff, and it has a much broader base. Including our strength and conditioning coach (Michael Doscher), who is an integral part of the total program, we have 11 coaches who are involved with the football program every day, and that is a tremendous plus."

Kelly considers his two coordinators -Matt Dunigan on offense and Mark Nelson on
defense -- tremendous assets to his first
football team. "Our players began finding out
in the spring how fortunate they are to be
taught by these two coaches. In time,
everybody will understand why these two
men had the respect of people around the
Canadian Football League.

"The rest of the staff -- Scott Chandler (secondary), Ronnie Vinklarek (offensive line), Chris Boden (runningbacks, recruiting coordinator), Sadd Jackson (defensive line), Shawn Bostick (offensive line), Sean Pender (receivers), James Lockhart (linebackers) and



Ryan Branch (defensive line) -- will do what it takes to give our players a chance to succeed. I feel extremely fortunate to be going into battle with this group."

Six months into his first head coaching job, Kelly has bought a house and settled in with his wife and children, hired his staff, signed his first class of recruits, bought equipment, taken advantage of countless speaking opportunities and coached his first

spring practice. Now, he's counting down the days until fall camp gets underway.

"We barely scratched the surface in the spring. It was a learning process for the staff and the players. We'll get a lot more comfortable and a lot quicker in August. Hey, this is what I've waited for my whole life."

Kelly is married to the former Patti-Ann Ryan and has three daughters, Jamie, 11, Lindsey, 3, and Morgan, 1.



Career Highlights: As offensive coordinator at Winnipeg in the Canadian Football League from 1992-96, his teams advanced to the CFL playoffs every year, winning three regular season conference championships and playing in two Grey Cup championship games. His offense set one CFL and 17 team records, two CFL and 10 individual records and three CFL playoff records. As associate coach at San Francisco State in 1990-91, he not only coached wide receivers and runningbacks but was recruiting coordinator, special teams coordinator, admissions and academic liaison and director of athletic fund raising. As offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Capital (Ohio) University, his 1987 team won the conference championship and advanced to the Division III playoffs. As a volunteer, he is an active member of the United Way of Lowndes County and a spokesman for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation of Georgia. In 1989, he was named an Outstanding Young Man of America, and in 1996 he was inducted into the Delaware County Athletic Hall of Fame in Muncie, IN. He also serves on the advisory boards for American Football Quarterly magazine and Wilson Sporting Goods.



OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Matt Dunigan

hen Mike Kelly's lifelong goal of becoming a head coach at the collegiate level was realized, he knew exactly who he wanted in his corner to fill his coordinator jobs. On offense, it was Matt Dunigan, the secondleading passer in Canadian Football League history who Kelly coached for three seasons at Winnipeg.

Dunigan, who retired last year as a player after 14 brilliant seasons in the CFL, jumped at the chance to enter the coaching profession, especially at the side of his former offensive coordinator. And he expects big things from the offense he patiently began installing last spring.

The Dunigans — Matt and Katherine; Dolan, Madison and Christopher

The high-flying offense which Kelly has promised Blazer faithful will arrive ... in due time. In fact, if things look a bit boring initially, don't be surprised.

"We kept it fairly simple in the spring,"
Dunigan said. "We were working with a lot of inexperience at quarterback, and it was my first time on the practice field when I wasn't taking snaps. We put in the base and began expanding on it just a little. We'll continue adding in fall camp and that's only going to help diversify what we want to do."

Dunigan is no stranger to success. He is a legend in Canadian Football League circles, leading six teams to the Grey Cup

championship game. When Kelly was his offensive coordinator at Winnipeg in 1994, he set a pro football record passing for 713 yards against defending Grey Cup champion Edmonton. But after 14 years in which he passed for almost 25 miles (about 44,000 yards) and rushed for more than three miles (over 5,000 yards), the physical pounding, especially in the way of concussions, took its toll.

As he begins a new career,
Dunigan said he has been too busy
to dwell on what to expect out of
his first coaching assignment.
"Things have gone pretty fast. I
never really thought about
coaching until Mike offered me the
job. I needed some direction and
when I found out what VSU is all
about and I met the people at the
university and in the community, it
was a no-brainer."



Dunigan readily admits the gigantic numbers he compiled in the CFL during his high profile career will make no difference this fall. But he believes the snaps he logged can provide a young stable of Blazer quarterbacks with some direction.

"My experience comes from behind center," he said. "I think I can give some type of insight as a coach. But I was like a sponge in the spring, learning from Coach Kelly, Coach (Chris) Boden, Coach (Shawn) Bostick and Coach (Sean) Pender. I've got to earn my stripes as a coach."

He has a simple ultimate goal...win the national championship. "We want to win a national title, and everything we do is geared toward that, nothing less."

Dunigan, 36, is married and he and his wife Kathy have three children, Dane, 8, Madison, 5, and Dolan, 3.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Mark Nelson

ike Kelly's basic philosophy on how to win football games is no different than thousands of other head coaches. It's the ageold cliche "offense sells tickets, defense wins championships". Kelly firmly believes Mark Nelson will produce the kind of defense which will give the Blazers a chance to win.

Once the head job was his, Kelly wasted no time persuading Nelson, a veteran player and coach in the Canadian Football League, to join him as a key member of his staff. "Mark has the kind of experience needed to take charge of the defense," Kelly said. "He's coached at all levels and has head coaching experience at the junior college level. I've coached against him for years, and he always had his defenses well-prepared. I'm very happy to have him on my side for a change."

Nelson jumped into his new job with unbridled enthusiasm in the spring and came away from the three weeks of work cautiously optimistic. "We got better every day, which is what you want to see in the spring. We're by no means where we want or need to be, but we have a chance to get there."


Philosophically, Nelson wants to see Blazer opponents throwing the football. If that happens, his defense is doing its job.

"Our number one objective always will be to stop the run," he said. "If they throw the ball, that's good. That will let us do what we're trying to do."

Nelson's extensive credentials on the defensive side of the ball provide weight to his words. He played linebacker at East Central Oklahoma and was an NAIA all-American. For seven years he played in the CFL, six with the Calgary Stampeders and one with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders.

His coaching career started at Choctaw

(Okla.) High School, moved to Independence Junior College in Kansas (where he spent five years, the last two as head coach), then on to the CFL where he coached linebackers and



special teams at Edmonton for three years and linebackers at San Antonio and Toronto a year each. The linebacker corps will be his on the field responsibility at VSU.

"We've got a good group there," he said.

"Our strength and conditioning program directed by Coach (Michael) Doscher has paid huge dividends. Our players are bigger, stronger and faster which can only be a plus in the fall."

Nelson plans to build on the foundation established by former Blazer coaches, a style which emphasizes getting to the football in a hurry. "My philosophy is a go-get-'em defense. We'll try to minimize mistakes, but if we do things right, our aggressiveness will allow us to get to the football."

Nelson, 41, is married, and he had his wife Lori have three children, Kyle, 10, Kayli, 8, and Kolton, 4.

A nother newcomer to the 1997 VSU coaching staff is Scott Chandler, who Kelly lured away from the defensive coordinator's job at St. Augustine (Fla.) High School to take



charge of the Blazer secondary and special teams.

A native Georgian, Chandler brings a wealth of experience at both the prep and collegiate levels and takes over a secondary which is both talented and experienced. "I found out in the spring that we can be solid in the secondary. It was a learning experience for all of us, but we made solid progress."

Chandler played high school football at Lakeview-Fort Oglethorpe in north Georgia and one year of college ball at Maryville in Tennessee. He transferred to and graduated from UT Chattanooga and immediately entered the coaching profession at the high school level. After five years, he went to graduate school at Kansas State, working for

two years under current Florida

defensive coordinator Bob Stoops.

This is his fourth coaching stop in the last four years. He was defensive coordinator at Copperas Cove (TX) High School in 1994, at Emporia State (KS), a Division II school, in 1995, and at St. Augustine last season.

impressed with the work Jackson did with last season's defensive linemen, assigning him to the same area. He will also continue as a staff member in the university's office of minority affairs.



hris Boden begins is second full season on the Blazer football staff, having joined the program in the spring of 1996 as quarterbacks coach. Kelly was impressed with the job Boden did in the



recruiting area during the coaching staff transition and retained him as recruiting coordinator. He also took charge of the runningbacks during the spring and will handle that position again this fall.

A native of Tawas City, MI, Boden was a quarterback at Saginaw Valley State University in Saginaw, MI, graduating in 1990. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Central Michigan University, working with the secondary for two seasons and earning his master's degree in 1994.

In 1995 and 1996 he coached at Urbana University in Urbana, Ohio, working with quarterbacks and receivers and coordinating the passing game. He also taught in Urbana's health and physical education program.

nother new spring addition to the coaching staff was Ronnie Vinklarek, a veteran high school and collegiate coach who took command of the offensive line. He



inherited a young group which returns two starters from a year ago, and he approached spring drills with a "back to basics" attitude.

Vinklarek, 38, has a solid coaching background, highlighted by six years at Houston when the Cougars were a national power. He also coached the CFL's Birmingham Barracudas' line in 1995 when Matt Dunigan put up record passing numbers. He used that background in the spring, laying the foundation for what he thinks will be a good offensive line in time.

"We really just reached the tip of the iceberg in the spring," he said. "We just drilled fundamentals into them, working on leverage and angles. Repetition is the key, and we'll

get right back into it when they report in August."



A Texas native, Vinklarek said his knowledge of football in Georgia and his familiarity with the other offensive coaches were major factors in taking the VSU job. "Coach Kelly and Coach Dunigan are true football people. Plus I'd always heard good things about VSU, and when I met the people I found it a lot like Texas -- people live and breathe football and that's exciting."

Vinklarek is married, and he and his wife Marianne, a nurse, have a son, Trevor, born in April.

hawn Bostick, who has grown up in the Valdosta State football program, is another holdover from the 1996 staff. He coached the runningbacks last season but joined Vinklarek

as an offensive line coach in the spring.

Bostick, who received an education degree in health and physical education from VSU in the spring of 1996, was recruited to Valdosta State out of Monroe Academy in Forsyth in 1989. He took a redshirt season, then lettered on Blazer teams in 1991, 1992 and 1993. He started at center for the 1993 team which compiled an 8-3 record. That offensive line surrendered only 10 sacks in 471 passing attempts.

The 1997 offensive line is reloading this

season after losing three starters, including

two first team all-conference selections. However, returning starters Kris Gingrow at tackle and Brandon Jernigan at guard along with top reserves Harvey Moore and Ryan Sulkowski are back to form the nucleus of what is expected to be a solid forward wall.

A two-time all-conference selection, Pender was also a dangerous kickoff return specialist. An all-time Blazer highlight is his 97-yard touchdown return of the opening kickoff in last year's first round playoff game. He lined up all over the field offensively, once catching 20 passes in a single game.

Pender will be working with a talented group of

receivers, who should improve dramatically once the quarterback situation is settled.

Ryan Branch


Ryan Branch, one of the best linebackers to ever play at Valdosta State, will continue his VSU association

James Lockhart, another former Valdosta State defensive standout, will continue his ties with the Blazers this





The Jessie Tuggle Strength & Fitness Complex

he Jessie Tuggle Strength and Fitness Complex is an important part of the total athletic program at Valdosta State, but it is especially critical to the football program.

Named for former VSU all-America and current all-pro linebacker Jessie Tuggle, whose \$25,000 gift in 1992 endowed a football scholarship, the complex is a busy place yearround as various teams are put through a vigorous off-season program by strength and conditioning coaches.

The Blazer football off-season program provides a great opportunity for players to make progress in many athletic areas. The primary goal is to develop foot speed and quickness, along with focusing on explosive power, which is achieved through weight training four days a week.



All-pro linebacker Jessie Tuggle helped put Blazer football on the map.

Strength gains have been impressive across the board, and what the young Blazers have accomplished under the watchful eye of strength and conditioning coach Michael Doscher in the weight room and on the practice field will stand them in good stead when they report for fall practice in August.

"Michael Doscher is a key player in our total program," new head coach Mike Kelly said. "He did a great job last winter with a variety of extremely up-to-date techniques. He's helped us a great deal in the areas of overall strength and explosiveness. He adapted easily our ideas coming out of pro football, combining them with his expertise in dealing with the college athlete. I think we came up with a good mix to further benefit our players.



BLAZER FOOTBALL

New Coaching Staff, New Enthusiasm Keep Expectations High

Valdosta State will unveil a new coaching staff this fall, but the look will not be radically different from the pass happy teams of the last five years. Mike Kelly, the offensive coordinator for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers since 1992, took charge of the Blazer program in February, pledging to continue the wide open offensive style of play.

Kelly inherits much of a team which rolled up a 10-3 record and won the school's first Gulf South Conference championship. The new head coach and his staff greeted 32 lettermen in the spring from that club which advanced to the quarterfinals of the D-II playoffs.

After getting acclimated with his new surroundings, getting his staff in place and getting to know his troops during three weeks of spring drills, Kelly pronounced the Blazer football program "in very good shape".

"The VSU football program is on sound footing because the people at the top (President Hugh Bailey and Athletic Director Herb Reinhard) have provided the resources which make success possible," Kelly said. "I know we will remain one of the top programs at this level because of the atmosphere that has been created here by those two individuals."

Kelly was pleased with the work ethic of his team in spring practice and thinks a solid foundation was laid. One word describes Kelly's philosophy -- aggressiveness.

"It's always a difficult time when there's a coaching change, being involved in a transition like that. We do more things than they've done before; and we have a different philosophy. We're going to push the ball upfield, we're going to be more aggressive. We're coming in with the attitude that we're going to apply 60 minutes of pressure football on offense, defense and special teams, and we're not going to allow the opponent to breathe because we're going to continually come after them.

"We simply want to be more aggressive, more relentless. If we get knocked down, we're going to bite their ankles. It's a little different mentality for most of our players, but before spring practice ended we were getting there. And we'll be there by the time we kick off against Georgia Southern August 30."

So what does Kelly expect in his first season as a head college coach?

"Our expectations will always be high. We expect to play and win 15 football games (which would result in a national championship)," Kelly said. "If you think anything less than that, you're kidding yourself. You have to set your standards as high as you can, and anything less is a disappointment. If you gear yourself for a 15-week season, things like

the conference championship and playoff appearances take care of themselves."

Kelly declined to go into specifics concerning personnel because "nobody has really done anything for us yet as far as out there on the field."

"Generally speaking, I think on defense we're very strong at linebacker and I think our secondary is sound. If we pick up a couple of late recruits along the defensive front, I think our defense can be as good as anybody in the country. We'll win football games this year because of our defense. There is a new emphasis on defense here, which will become very evident."

Defense returns six (possibly seven) starters, led by senior free safety Jarmal Stevens (102 tackles). Other returning starters include senior strong safety Brad Trout, senior end Richard Freeman, junior linebacker Jesse Sutton, junior nose guard Terry Turner and sophomore cornerback Vaughn Clark. The seventh would be middle linebacker Tavaris Smith if he's academically sound.



Defensive coordinator Mark Nelson was pleased with the progress his troops made during the three weeks of spring work. "Every day we improved, which is all you can ask for. The important thing in the off season is to fine tune the defense and make sure we have the right players in the right position."

"On offense, the biggest adjustment has been for the offensive linemen because now we want to create a new line of scrimmage," Kelly said. "We will not be passive and give up yards on our pass protection. Our pass protection begins on the line of scrimmage, and we're running the football in a variety of ways. Now our linemen are down in a three-point stance, and I want them to be nasty and to get after people.

"Our runningbacks are a very solid group, and I think we'll have a good running game when we need to use our running game, but they're also very talented receivers. We will demand a lot of versatility from our backs.

"I was impressed with the corps of receivers in the spring, and I think we have quality depth across the board. We threw a lot at

them in the spring, literally and figuratively, and we still have a lot of work to do in that area. But the talent is there."

A major concern, however, is replacing all-America quarterback Lance Funderburk, the Harlon Hill Trophy runnerup, who was largely responsible for the Blazers' offensive success in 1996.

Senior Donnie Johnston, a backup strong safety last season, junior college transfer Ashley Lewis, redshirt sophomore Mark White and redshirt freshman Nathan Cronic all worked at quarterback in the spring, and all bring different skills to the table.

Prospects for the position were enhanced late in the spring with the signing of redshirt freshman Jason Vaughan, a 6-4, 215-pounder who is transferring from Ole Miss. Vaughan

Kelly is confident he'll have at least a couple of quarterbacks ready for the season opener. That fivesome plus two prep recruits will get intense work during fall camp. "I believe in having depth at quarterback. On paper, Vaughan certainly helps the equation. We expect him to step in and compete for the

The schedule Kelly faces in his first season is not favorable because only four home games dot the 11-game slate. "Obviously, we'd like to have more home games, but we're taking a positive approach to the schedule. We open with three road games, which will give this group a great opportunity to create a real family atmosphere. There are so many outside distractions, it is tremendously important that we huddle around each other, and I think the travel will allow us to build relationships that will last a lifetime."

"He's not the anointed one, but I'm sleeping better," Kelly said. "He brings a little maturity to the position. He's been at an SEC school for a year." Junior Kris Gingrow and sophomore Brandon Jernigan, who started on the offensive line, also return.

Special teams will get a lot of attention in the fall, but senior punter Wayne DeVane is back for his third season and is a great weapon.






Quarterbacks




Runningbacks

"This is a very solid group with a lot of versatility, which is a necessity in our offense. We will demand a lot from our backs," Kelly said.





The area was a recruiting priority, and Kelly believes some immediate help is in the offing this fall.






Linebackers


Defensive Backs

Sports Information

Steve Roberts is entering his 16th year as sports information director at Valdosta State University. He became the school's first full-time director in the fall of 1981 following the decision earlier that year to begin a football program at the institution.

Roberts is in charge of media relations, statistics and the production of brochures, flyers, schedule cards and releases for the university's 11 intercollegiate sports. Over the years several sports brochures have received awards in various competitions. The cover of the 1993 football brochure was judged best in the nation.

Roberts' office is located along with the offices of the athletic director and all coaches other than football and baseball in the Physical Education Complex. Part of his duties include scheduling the arena area of the complex which is used for graduations and concerts as well as athletic events.

A 1965 journalism graduate from the University of Georgia, Roberts worked for three years in sports then as Sunday editor of The Savannah Morning News before joining the public relations staff at Valdosta State. He became Sunday editor of The Valdosta Daily Times in 1972 but continued to handle Valdosta State's sports information requirements on a part-time basis. When football was established, Roberts returned to the university full time.

Over the years Roberts has built a reputation for timely and accurate statistics, and for the past eight years he and his football statistics crew have been in charge of game stats at the Gator Bowl game. In 1994, Valdosta State became the host institution for the Division II baseball championship in Montgomery, Ala., and Roberts and his staff take care of media relations and game operations.

Roberts is a member of College Sports Information Directors of America, his profession's national organization, and in June 1995 was elected to a three-year term as a college division representative on CoSIDA's board of directors. He serves as District III coordinator for football, baseball and men's basketball on the GTE Academic All-America Committee. District III is comprised of the states of Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia. He is also a member of the Baseball Writers

A native of Douglas, Ga., Roberts is married to the former Maggie Harden of Eastman, who serves as the director of the academic advising center for VSU's College of Education. Sports Medicine

he Sports Medicine program at Valdosta
State, under the direction of head athletic trainer
Russ Hoff, provides the athletic training
personnel and expertise for the 10 intercollegiate
sports. Hoff, who came on board in August
after serving in a similar capacity at Capital
(Ohio) University for the last 10 years, oversees
a staff which includes three other certified
athletic trainers (Michele Garber, Bobby Tucker
and another to be named), two graduate
assistants and a host of student trainers who
work the various sports during their seasons.

The Sports Medicine major is offered by the Department of Health, Physical Education and Athletics within the College of Education, and admission is based on academic achievement, course work, related experiences and recommendations. The first two years consist of coursework in the college core curriculum along with background courses appropriate to the

major. The second two years incorporate the professional sequence of coursework in the areas of injury assessment, therapeutic exercise, advanced anatomy, biomechanics, kinesiology and sport physiology.


It is during the second two years that the student becomes actively involved in the laboratory experiences in the athletic training room and on the athletic fields and courts. All of these experiences are under the direct supervision of Hoff or one of the other certified trainers.

In addition to the sports medicine staff, Valdosta State athletics is "taken care of" by Dr. Donald Hartig, associate team physician at VSU's Student Health Services, and by team physician Dr. Kurt Jacobson and members of his staff from the world famous Hughston Sports Medicine Clinic in Columbus.



BLAZERS FINALLY NAIL DOWN ELUSIVE CONFERENCE TITLE, RETURN TO PLAYOFFS

A Look Back at 1996

1996 will long be remembered as the year Valdosta State finally kicked down the door to the Gulf South Conference football throne room. After finishing second a frustrating five times in the previous 14 seasons, the Blazers brought home the gold for the first time.


VSU was expected to be in the hunt for the title, returning a veteran group of starters on both sides of the ball. Lance Funderburk, who set three national passing records as a junior, was back to lead the offense, and he was surrounded by a talented stable of receivers and runningbacks.


The high-powered offense responded to its lofty billing, leading the league in total offense, pass offense and scoring offense as Funderburk threw for 4226 yards and 38 touchdowns. The running game also was much improved with sophomore Vontrell Mitchell shredding defenses for more than 104 ground yards a game.


After posting easy wins in its first four games, the Blazers took a giant step toward their first championship with a heart-stopping 34-31 triple overtime victory over three-time defending national champion North Alabama at home in front of 10,039 mostly partisan fans. Three more easy wins followed before Delta State ambushed the Blazers in week nine. VSU secured the GSC crown the next week with a 63-30 thrashing of Central Arkansas at home before ending the regular season with a disappointing loss to West Georgia.

Valdosta State advanced to the second round of the national playoffs, beating Albany State at home before dropping a 24-19 decision in the mud at Carson-Newman in the quarterfinals. The final mark of 10-3 was the second best in history.

Another first for the 1996 season was the No. 1 national ranking. The Blazers sat atop the Division II Top 20 poll for two consecutive weeks before settling for a No. 4 ranking in the final poll. At year's end, a record seven players were named to the all-conference team, led by Funderburk who was the runnerup for the Harlon Hill Trophy which represents Division II's best player.

From the time Vontrell Mitchell returned the opening kickoff 59 yards until Lance Funderburk threw his fifth touchdown pass of the game, Valdosta State was the team in charge of the season opener against Gardner-Webb. Mitchell's exciting return set up a quick five-play, 38-yard drive, culminated by Funderburk's 7-yard TD toss to fullback David Glisson. The Bulldogs answered late in the quarter to briefly knot the count before the Blazers exploded for 21 second quarter points. Funderburk was in the middle of all three scores, passing seven yards to tight end John Taylor and 1 yard to flanker Nikko Cooper, then sneaking in from a yard out after the Blazers had recovered a Bulldog bobble at the G-W 8. VSU led 28-13 at the half, then put the game away by scoring on its first two third quarter possessions. Funderburk pulled the trigger on both scores, hitting Mitchell from 28 yards out and connecting with flanker Rodney Brown on a 20-yarder. Gardner-Webb kicked a meaningless field goal on the last play of the game for the final margin. Funderburk opened his bid for the Harlon Hill Trophy with a 34-47, 395-yard performance, good enough to earn GSC offensive player of the week honors. Brown caught six passes for 106 yards, and Sean Pender pulled in seven for 64 as 10 different receivers got in the act. The Blazers' young and thin defense turned in a very solid performance, holding the Bulldogs to 240 total yards.

The game was advertised as an offensive shootout, and it lived up to its billing, at least in the first half. Truman threw an early scare into the Blazer faithful, returning the opening kickoff 80 yards to set up a short touchdown run by tailback Jarrett Anderson, the Bulldogs' highly touted Harlon Hill Trophy candidate. But the VSU offense was brilliant on its first four possessions, scoring on four picture perfect drives of 88, 80, 84 and 73 yards, three of which took less than 1:24. Quarterback Lance Funderburk threw TD passes of 31 and 71 yards to Rodney Brown and 75 yards to Sean Pender, and fullback David Glisson scored from 6 yards out to give the Blazers a 28-7 lead with 11:36 left in the half. But Truman would not fold its tent, scoring twice to cut the lead to 28-21 before Brown thrilled the crowd with a beautiful 91-yard kickoff return to restore order. The Bulldogs came back again to get a score 20 seconds before intermission and keep things interesting. Better defense on both sides in the second half limited the scoring to 21 total points. Funderburk and Brown hooked up again, and Glisson put the game away with a 16-yard run late in the final frame. The Blazer defense, which surrendered 265 yards in the first half, gave up only 62 after intermission including just 24 to Anderson who finished the day with 111 yards on 27 carries. Funderburk won the battle of Harlon Hill candidates, throwing for 422 yards on 25-37 passing.

Savannah State managed to frustrate the Blazers' powerful passing attack, but the Tigers couldn't control fullback David Glisson, and the Valdosta State defense stood tall time and again as VSU posted an important 21-7 victory. With VSU leading 9-7 in the fourth quarter, Glisson scored a pair of touchdowns on runs of 12 and 22 yards to put the game on ice. Those runs put the cap on a 132-yard rushing day for the Savannah junior, second best in his career. Quarterback Lance Funderburk struggled, completing 23 of 40 passes for 153 yards, the lowest figure in the Hal Mumme era. He kept his string of touchdown passes going, hitting Nikko Cooper from five yards out to get the Blazers a 6-0 lead in the first quarter. After the Tigers took the lead, VSU took advantage of a high snap on a Savannah State punt attempt, taking over at the SSU 8. A 26-yard field goal by Paul McCall gave the Blazers a 9-7 halftime lead. After intermission, the VSU defenders held Savannah State in check, and the offense did enough to put the game away. The Blazers sacked Tiger quarterback Deondre Singleton three times and limited SSU to 17 yards rushing for the game. The win was VSU's fifth over Savannah State in as many meetings.

Valdosta State spotted Arkansas Tech an early touchdown, then rallied again from a two-point deficit in the second quarter to bury the Wonder Boys 43-26 for its fourth straight win and its first conference victory. Lance Funderburk threw for 337 yards and three touchdowns and fullback Vontrell Mitchell ran for 162 yards to lead the offense. The Blazers, ranked 13th in the country going into the game, won easily despite erratic special teams play which repeatedly cost VSU field position. Valdosta state had a punt blocked, lost the ball on downs because of a low snap on another punt attempt, had a field goal attempt and a PAT attempt blocked and missed another extra point kick. But the Blazer defense stepped up to force Arkansas Tech to kick field goals instead of allowing touchdowns, and the VSU offense punished the Wonder Boys on the ground and through the air. Funderburk threw touchdown passes of 38 and 18 yards to flanker Rodney Brown and 1 yard to slotback Tirrell Andrews. Freshman fullback Carlos Brown scored his first two collegiate TDs on 5 and 3-yard runs. The Blazer special teams had one shining moment when Richard Freeman blocked an Arkansas Tech punt and Howard Foster scooped up the ball and raced 17 yards for VSU's final touchdown. The Wonder Boys shocked VSU on the game's first offensive play when tailback Ed Duncan circled left end and rambled 87 yards untouched for a touchdown. But the Blazers answered immediately, scoring on Funderburk's 38-yarder to Rodney Brown and took the lead moments later on Carlos Brown's first TD. Arkansas Tech managed another brief lead at 16-14, kicking three field goals, but the Blazers rallied for 15 second quarter points to grab a 29-16 halftime cushion. Mitchell averaged 8.5 yards per carry on 19 rushes, and Freeman led the defense with 8 tackles and two sacks.

It was not for the faint of heart. Two Division II football giants battled into three overtime periods on the turf of Cleveland Field before VSU sophomore Todd Douthit split the uprights with a 22-yard field goal which lifted the Blazers to a thrilling 34-31 victory over three-time defending national champion North Alabama. The fourth largest crowd in VSU football history -- 10,039 -stood and cheered from the time the Blazers began a third quarter comeback until Douthit's kick finally settled the issue. Lance Funderburk directed the rally, throwing two touchdown passes and a twopoint conversion to catch the Lions at 24 at the end of regulation. After UNA scored on the first play of the first overtime, Funderburk got the Blazers even again with his third scoring toss of the blustery afternoon. The Blazer defenders were the heroes of the second overtime. UNA lined up for a game-winning 35-yard field goal, but Mike Bowman and Brad Trout broke up the middle to block the try and force a third extra period. The defense stood tall again, intercepting a North Alabama pass on fourth



down, setting up the Blazers' winning drive. Heroes were everywhere. Douthit's kick... James Lockhart's interception in OT ... 



Making its second playoff appearance in the last three years, Valdosta State opened the game in exciting fashion as senior Sean Pender returned the opening kickoff 97 yards for a quick 7-0 lead over intrastate rival Albany State. The Blazers quickly doubled the lead, driving 73 yards in 8 plays on their next possession. Rodney Brown caught Lance Funderburk's 15-yarder for the points and the 14-0 lead less than four minutes into the game. Playing on a field much more suitable for mud wrestling than football, Valdosta State's bid for its first national championship came to an end as Carson-Newman took advantage of Blazer mistakes and controlled the clock with a solid infantry attack and an opportunistic passing game. The Eagles, playing in the quarterfinals for the first time at the Division II level, turned the game in their favor in the first quarter, shocking the Blazer faithful with a 94-yard interception return for a touchdown just when it appeared the Blazers would take an early lead. The next VSU drive also was stopped by an interception at the Carson-Newman 32, and the Eagles began their afternoon of frustrating ball control. C-N extended its lead to 14-0 late in the first quarter, scoring in two plays after a short VSU punt put the Eagles in business at the Blazer 44. But Valdosta State answered immediately, sprinting 78 yards in six running plays. Carlos Brown got the points on a 3-yard blast to cut the lead in half. The Eagles added a field goal for a 17-7 halftime lead, but VSU pulled to within four late in the third quarter when Brown scored from 2 yards out, capping a five-play, 73-yard march. Carson-Newman answered with a 10-play, 54-yard drive,

highlighted by two pass completions for 44 yards (the Eagles were 4-5 passing on the day), to take a 24-13 lead. Battling to the bitter end, the Blazers made it close when Lance Funderburk hit Rodney Brown with a 36-yard TD toss. But only 1:38 remained, and Carson-Newman recovered the ensuing onside kick to seal the win.

aldosta State plays its home football games at Cleveland Field, located across the street from University Center, a former shopping plaza acquired by the university which has been beautifully renovated to house additional classrooms and offices for the rapidly growing institution.

The stadium was built in 1922 and was named for the late Dr. A.G. Cleveland. who was superintendent of the Valdosta City Schools from 1919-1949. In the spring of 1996, two legendary Valdosta High School coaches were honored, and the stadium now bears the names of Wright Bazemore and the late Nick Hyder. Seating has been added through the years which has enlarged the facility to its current 11,500 seats. It features a beautiful natural turf playing field and is topped on the south side by a two-level press box.

The Blazers played their first seven seasons at Cleveland Field and returned to the facility six years ago to take advantage of its convenient location adjacent VSU's main campus. Facilities in University Center will be available to accommodate Blazer Boosters, and acres of convenient parking are available for tailgate parties on game days.

Blazer football's goal in 1997 for the four home dates will be to improve on the school's 48-16-1 record at Cleveland Field over the years. Since 1994, the Blazers have compiled an impressive 19-1 record at the historic facility.

conference championship but fell twice. once in the regular season and once in double overtime in the quarterfinals of the national playoffs, to eventual national champion North Alabama, finishing second in the league for the fourth

straight year. The final overall record that year was a school-best 11-2, 6-1 in the GSC.

After knocking on the conference championship door often, VSU finally kicked it down last season, winning the school's first league title and again advancing to the national playoffs. Once again the Blazers lost in the quarterfinal round to finish 10-3.

For the first time in five years, the conference has no membership changes and will begin the new season with 16 members, 10 of which play football. The league's grid members are North Alabama, West Alabama, West Georgia, Delta State, Arkansas Tech, Central Arkansas, Southern Arkansas, Arkansas-Monticello, Henderson State and VSU. The remainder of the conference consists of West Florida, Alabama-Huntsville, Lincoln Memorial, Montevallo, Christian Brothers and Mississippi University for Women.

Christian Brothers, which joined the league last season, has to complete one more year of transition from the NAIA before becoming eligible for NCAA playoffs.

The GSC, which can make a convincing argument as the toughest all-round Division II conference in the country, boasts 31 national championships in its 25-year history. These titles have been won in eight sports, and the league is represented in virtually every championship tournament of NCAA competition on an annual basis. Valdosta State and West Georgia represented the league in the football playoffs last season. In women's basketball, Delta State advanced to the Elite Eight while Delta State and West Georgia were regional tournament participants in men's hoops.

In baseball, North Alabama won the conference title and hosted the South Central Regional but failed to advance to the eight-team national finals. In softball, West Alabama reached the finals of the South Regional.

In men's tennis, Valdosta State and West Florida won two of four South Regionals, to advance to the 16-team national tournament where UWF finished second. West Florida's women also advanced to regional play before being eliminated. In golf, Valdosta State and North Alabama qualified for the South Regional but failed to qualify for the national tournament.

Previous national champions from the GSC include Delta State in women's basketball (six), former member Troy State in men's golf (three), football (two), baseball (two) and women's golf (three), North Alabama in men's basketball (two) and football (three), former member Jacksonville State in baseball (two), women's gymnastics (two), men's basketball (one) and football (one), West Alabama in football (one), former member Mississippi College in football (one) and former member Southeastern Louisiana in track (one) and women's basketball (one).

The conference was formed in 1971, and in those 25 years nine different schools have won the football championship. Jacksonville State and Troy State enjoyed the most success when they were league members, with JSU winning eight championships and Troy State winning six. North Alabama has claimed six title, Mississippi College four, and Nicholls State, Northwestern State (La.), West Alabama, UT Martin and Valdosta State one each. West Alabama won the first title on the way to the NAIA national championship in 1971.

Nathan Salant became the league's sixth commissioner in November 1992. The president of the conference, completing a two-year term is Dr. Robert L. Potts, president of the University of North Alabama.

1996-97... A Year to Remember

In every area, Valdosta State athletics excelled in 1996-97. The department swept the all-sports trophies in the Gulf South Conference, becoming only the second school in league history to claim both the women's and men's awards in the same year.

The Blazers captured their first-ever men's trophy on the strength of high finishes in each of the six sports they sponsor. VSU won its first football championship and finished fourth in cross country in the fall, had a third place finish in basketball in the winter, and finished second in golf and tennis and third in baseball in the spring for a total of 58.5 points, 7.5 points in front of defending champion North Alabama.

The Lady Blazers claimed their second allsports trophy despite not winning a single league title. VSU finished second in cross country and fifth in volleyball in the fall, second in basketball in the winter, and third in softball and tennis in the spring for a total of 58.5 points, 3 points ahead of West Florida.



Not only did VSU receive the all-sports trophies at the annual league meeting in June, but football quarterback Lance Funderburk and basketball forward Kathy Kennedy won the Commissioner's Trophy as the conference's top student-athletes last season.

And many of the department's studentathletes were heavily involved in other extra curricular activities including the Community Partners In Education and CHAMPS programs.

"I can't begin to tell you how proud I am of this athletic program for its overall performance last season," said athletic director Herb Reinhard. "It was a red-letter year for Valdosta State University."
